Friend Zuckweiler:

I think we are getting the sewer situation at Julian Straightened out by selling the property to a cattle man and hope to consummate the deal in a few days, then let him wrestle over the proposition. He may not object to it, but our plans called for a domestic supply of water developed with a 15 foot soil and water conservation dam built right where the sewage is being dumped. If we sell the property I am not interested any further and probably Mr. Hugh Wood, the new purchaser, would be willing to let matters drift.

I was up in Julian the other day and met a number of the Julian people and they agreed with me that the sewage of Julian should be piped on down below the proposed damsite and I offered them a place to dump the sewage down below the proposed dam, without cost, the city of Julian to lay the pipe down for about a half mile to that point and they all seemed perfectly satisfied, but if I sell the ranch I think you can indefinitely forget the problem.

I have before me a copy of the letter of October 12th to the Board of Supervisors signed by E.J. Kendall, and I am sending him a copy of this letter.

Regarding the Cuyamaca Lake swimming permit, will say Mrs. Fletcher and I gave the land on which the swimming pool is located, we arranged to get the water free of cost from the Irrigation District for the Camp Fire Girls and Mrs. Fletcher gave 10 acres of land to them free of cost, the only consideration was that our children and grandchildren should have the privilege of swimming there when it was open for that purpose. We don't mind having the public shut out, but we don't want our own children and grandchildren denied the privilege when we have the legal right to it.

I am certain by another year we can work things out mutually satisfactory to all of us and I have explained the matter to the Camp Fire Girls Executive. You can undoubtedly work something out where the public is excluded when that is necessary, but at least don't ask us without consideration to take any the only consideration which means so much to our children and grandchildren when the swimming pool is in operation by the Camp Fire Girls.
