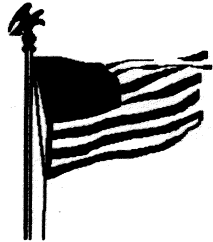

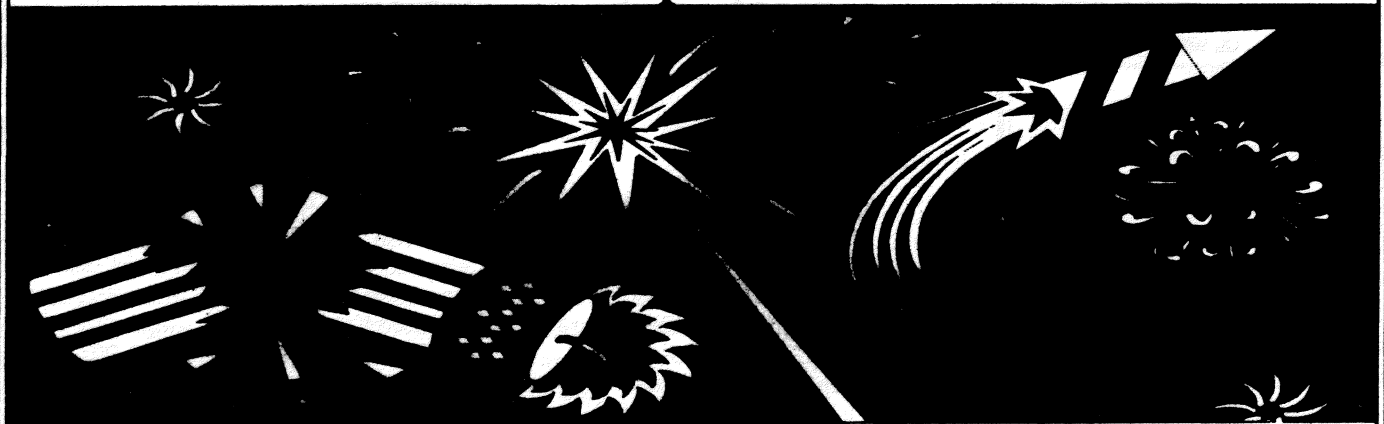

Coincidences

In April, our **Book Group** met to discuss Paul Auster's the *Book of Illusions*.

We were intrigued by the many aspects of this very complex story where layers upon layers of events and characters create a universe which does not appear to be governed by any rationality. As the story unfolded, piling up accidents upon surprising turns of events, unexpected appearances and disappearances with unbelievable coincidences, we tired at times of the writer's agility. Yet we remained curious to the end, and just slightly relieved when we finally came to the improbable conclusion of this well written but nevertheless often quite artificial book.

But, throughout the book, Auster appeared as having a predilection for the "coincidence" and, we must admit, that there is something to be said about "coincidences". Don't they often bring to life a sense of mystery and an undeniable charm?

Coyla Wilson, who was our able reviewer that day, told us what had happened to her, in that regard, as she was preparing for her presentation:

" In 1970 Paul Auster received his M.A. from Columbia and subsequently took a job as utilityman on a tanker which traveled between the Atlantic coast and the Gulf of Mexico. I was reading an interview in which he described the tugboat pulling the tanker into a gulf port when the phone rang. It was my brother calling from somewhere in New York harbor where he is a tugboat engineer. To compound the coincidence, for many years my brother was engineer on ocean tugs in the area Auster had just described. My brother rarely calls from the boat unless he has a specific reason, but this day and that moment he just felt like saying "hi"."

So, don't you agree that this particular coincidence was indeed quite surprising, and quite in accordance with Auster's tone?

RENTING THE INTERNATIONAL CENTER

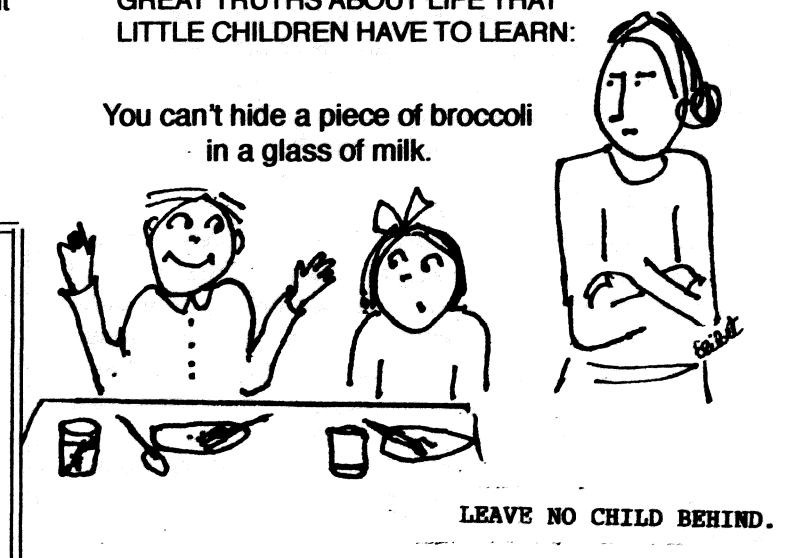

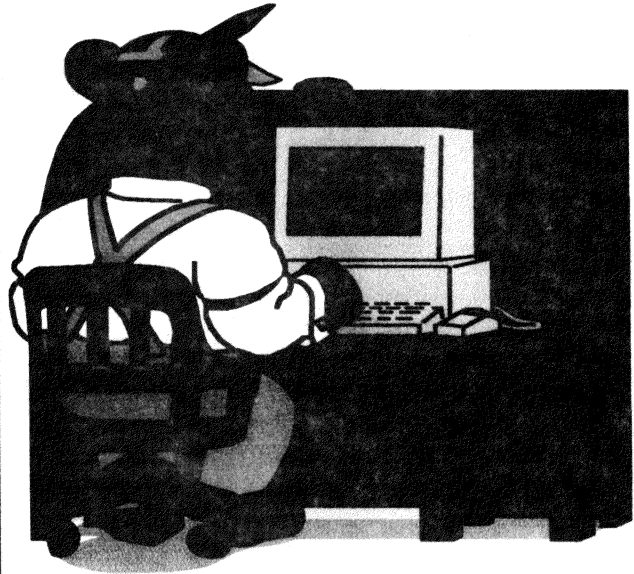

MARCH FOR WOMEN'S RIGHTS

Four hundred and twenty-five people from Planned Parenthood San Diego and Riverside Chapter flew to Washington, D.C. for the Pro Choice march on April 25th. Our group flew on Southwest Airlines nonstop to Baltimore on April 23rd. Over one million people came from everywhere by bus, train, cars and planes. Women carrying babies, mothers, fathers and grandparents. We assembled on the mall at 0900 between Congress and the Washington Monument. Giant TV screens allowed us to see and hear Hillary Clinton, Barbara Boxer, Gloria Steinem, Whoopi Goldberg, Cybil Shepard, Maxine Waters, John Kerry's daughter, etc., etc. Finally started the long march at 12:30 all carrying signs. My favorite sign read, "Keep your rosaries out of my ovaries". Many different groups marched including Naral, Feminist Majority, NOW, lesbian and gay groups, Republicans for Choice, Vietnam Veterans. It was an exhausting and exhilarating day. We even managed to visit the National Gallery, American Museum of Natural History, Hirshhorn Museum, the new World War II Memorial, etc.

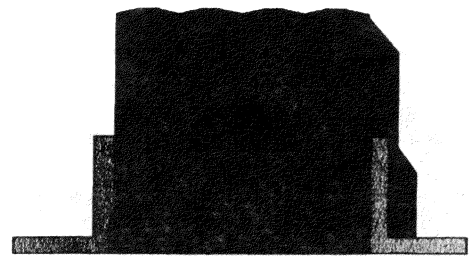
