Erase Patrol 101 of 1968/62

Situation Report - (a) Political

1. Alta ugh this patrol was mounted only three weeks after the annual census patrol (reported in Hoskins 18/67-68) the attitudes of the people to the Admin has shown a marked improvement. A visit by the Assistant Iegistor of Co-cperatives and the opportunity to register their complaints to h m together with tl ? posting of a Cooperative Officer to tine area has inproved the relationship between the local people and the Departgent of trade and Industry. A ces.ain amount of reserve still exists and it is up to the Co-operative Officer concemed to produce results before a conipiete restoration of confidence can be expected.
2. I am particularly pleased in the improvement of relationships between D.A.S.P. and the local people. It is assentisl that a rapport exists between the two if the area is to develop til its $\mathrm{fu}^{7 .}$. The Officer in-Charge at Salelubu, Ag. Dey. Office= $\mathrm{Z}_{1}$. In cory is on extremely enthusiastic, practical officer who extends his interests beyond purely agricultural matters to road buil*ix's, co-operati 3 and social development. Informal weekis meeting 1 tin Council 3, Wis ed committees and cooperative society officers ensures their p. sticipation in local planning - a feal use mach appreciated by the people.
3. Deeptite this improvement in rel ationships with the Admin departments rrproceated in the area I cannot see ar overall improvement occurring, until something definite ts done about their major source of complaint -- internal resettlement roads.

Situation Report - (b) Bromic

1. The main purpose cf the pativi was to continue work on the hasibu wharf. Only two days vas available for this task before having to produced to Hoskins. A further two piles were placed giving a depth of some twelve feet at nigh tide. Two piles placed ten poet $f$ sharer should give this depth at low tides which will be adequate $10 \sim$ all vessels oi the costal trading type using this wharf. Cement blocks have been laced above each pile and on the end of the causeway to take serer for: decking.
2. This wharf will be of great importance to the area as a whole. It is estimated shat 1,500 tons of cocoa per annum will be produced by the Uasilau and Silanga settlements alone. All this produce, at current prices valved at some $\$ 750,000$, together with produce from the Mifrapu and Sale/Malasi areas is expected to be channelled through Lasibu.
3. It is essential that tive area of land jehind the wharf, known as Gaikeke, be purchased to eneble buik stores and other service facilities to be establisheci. Payment for the gevor ty acrer of land, \$150, was refused by the owners sore who clain they would be satisfied with $\$ 2000$ The owners are well awase of the significance of the land and their offer of $1 /$ sala of the land. or $\$ 200$ should be accepted withcut hesitation.

I consider it essential that the O.J.C. of ou area be kept informed of Admin activities such as. ty Set for iis own information and to avoid embarassment when quifies $\Rightarrow$ raised by the local people. It is also essential that officers thi charge of such porties keep the local pavple inficimed of thi:s activities and so avoid a potentially difficult situatiion suci s.? Lave oceurra as Mjeapu.

The abovementioned report and your covering memo 67-1-1 of 10th October is acknowledged.

Land reports covering the investigations have been rec eived and are being processed. The attitude of the natives of Nantambu is not unexpected. Frankly I do not lenow why the island is required. No plans have been made known here as yet, but you will be kept advised. I believe when something is known definitely and explanations can be made that the attitude could sorted.

I understand that Insurance of the vehicle at Ubili was refused unless other cover was taken out. This matter is being attended to under separate correspondence.

Demarcation Comittee workings and the reasons thereas must again be stressed to the Ulanona/Ubili peoples. There appears 2 fear that this work is connected with land acquisitions The latest more with Kakolan will no doubt tend to confine this but every effort mist be maintained to endeavour te explain the Administrations intentions in terms of local and national development. Continued contact, and active assistance by O.I.C Erase of local and governmental (L.G.C) projects is of prime importance.

Camping allowance claims submitted have been processed and are returned herewith for payment please.

\section*{Situation Report - (a) Political}
1. Land remains one of tive msjor points azong this groug of people le. the Madadua and Ulamona groups. of the land investigations completed one the people would not sell, the secorl the owners would lease for only five years and the third, a small site for Council use the owners agreed to sell outright.
2.

There are three distinct land owing groups in this araa: The Ulamona, Ibana and Madedua groups. Of these the Fiadedua and Ibana have sold large areas of land to the Adrainistration. The Ulamona, although they have beem approached on a number oucasions, will not part with any land in large quantities. This is of course, their right. In recent years the only land they have sold or are prepared to aell is two \(1 / 5\) aeme blooks, one for a Seismic tilt-meter station and the other for a Council liquor store.
3.

It is the Ulamona people also that are holding out over Demarcation Conmittee proceedings. Demarcation work is proceeding well in the Madedua and Ibana areas where delineation of clan boundaries is almost completed. The Ulamona group o.l the other hand still retain the syatem of communal land holdings by all individuals of all clans within the group. Opposition comes mainly from the powerful Abilimosi slan led by Kautu, Maila and the clan leader Vetata all of Ubili village。
4.

It was the Madedua group however that refused to sell land investigated. The land in question is Kakolan Island off Nantambu required by Forestry for logging port facilities. The owners reason for not selling or leasing is that the island has significance in folk lore and that it is the only land remaining in that area to the land owing clan. I feel an underlying reason may be thav the Madedua group hafe alveady sold in excess of 27,000 leres on which nu development has yet taken place. Earlierin the year the people also refused payment for a road access between land bought for port facilities at Nantambu, Nambau and the large Bakada block. I am frequently asked when it may be experted that development in this area will commence. It has been rumoured that development will onmuence in the near future but rumoured that cannot be passed on to the local peopla. Consequently I do not expect any land in this area to be availatle for purchase prior to development taking place. The investigation into Kakolan Island is a case in point. The owmers initial reply was that the Administration had already bought Nambau for port facilities and done nothing with it so why do they want the island as well ?

\section*{Situation Report - (b) Economic}
1. Copra production at Ubili is increasing raptaly. The last available D.A.S.F. coconut census indicated 16,723 ,alms of which 5330 were mature bearing palms. In this past year another 3000 odd should have come into beaxing and it appears that new plantings have been extensive.
2.

On a co-operative basis the village has purchased a tractor and trailex with which to collect out copra and transport it to the two driers operated by the village. As yet no marketing facilities exist but the Nakanai Council is sstablishing a copsa buying and selling business on a cost plus bais to assist the villagers in this regard.
3.

The planned road from Ulamona to Nuau wich is on the Council's woriks programme for this financs al year will bring Nuau village within tis scherae and should prov de a stimulus to the copre industry in that area.

Situstion Report - (a) Sooial
i. A point brought up for discussion was the possibility of insuring the houses. This results direetly from the Hakanai Council insuring their buildings and is an exarple of education through the Gouncil. Uppermost in their thoughts is if courge lamage aaused in the event of an eruption of Mt. Ulewnn. Although in 211 problbility any insuringe would not cover such an event I consider it is well worth their while obtbining insurance cover for all normal risk. With 47 permaneni houses and 10 permanent kitchens, together with other sundzy bui dings - stores, meotiing houses, they may well warrent a visit by an officer of one of the insurance companies and could obtain a mere favourable rate.

Thank you for Mr. A110m's roport on the above patrol together with covering comment by Mr. Alimark and yourself. The repert was excessively delayed, without explantion.
M. Sllem's report is of much less value because of the above delay. It is quite a good effort. I know Mr. Sliem has done a compateat job on tire projects concerned. Hewever he should be encouraged to give more factual rather than general information and where specific action is recuired to indicate what has been done by separate correspondence.
I. am particularly disappointed at the lack of any positive achieroment in political or any otier form of education. I have continually eraphasised the importance of pre-educating tha aative people In what we are trying to do so that they understand what wo are doing, are not so afreid and more likeiy to comoperate. I regard this of vital importance and there is ovidence in many fields that in the District and particularly the Hoskine Sub-District we are not kaeping sbreast of this. I want to soe a much more positive approach. Mr. Sllem had un ideal opportumity te talk witk people not only about the House of Asaembly, Councile ete but Diatriet devolopmont Eonorally, rural development funds and particularly what we are trijig to do to help the Uasialua/silanga settlement area.

The matter reported at Ig 19 of the report relating to a radio sent by Soa to the Assistant Administrator (Economic Affairs) has been daalt with by mysoli and rasolved. Mr. Ellem hints at other matters. If there are any you should get the factual information from Hr. Sllem and submit a report in the normal way. Iou a\%e well aware of the importance of information and the channel of reporting. of more iaportance is that significant matters that arise in the future are reported promptly and propewly and it ie part of your romponsibilities to see that through your offlcers this is done.

I all concerned about several matters aoncorning stores arising from the report and would ramind you that the provision of adequate services to the area sre a matter of interest to me and that I regard the improvement of services as an important mattor. Despite numercus requests over past months for specifle factual complaints I get very few. Geaeralities are not good enough. It is fommon knem - edge that shipping services are poor. I have the co-ordinator of transport and others interested to help but I mast supply them with faotual
information. I remind you and the OIC Swasse of ny Ciroular memorandum of 4th February 1969 concerning DISTRICT SERVIGES : SHILNING, STORLS, MAIL AND AIR SLRVICLS and would stress again the importance of sending ne a bsief minute of co plaint for all defieienctes. All I require is brief reference to vesoel, date, particulars of complaint.

On some matters relating to stores I am not satixstie satisfied that auficient action mas taken at the sub-District level. The delay
 about this? lias any follow kp action taken? |las anothor vessel sought? Concerning the lack of flele survey oquijment djd Hr. Lillem ask you \(R\) oflice Ior any? ith what result? I know ? no request to this Hi. I am surprised that no equipment appears to have been forthcoming.
Concerning the cement for the hasibu whert. I feel certatn that during
my viait on 20th December to the area with the D.W.O. that inmediate ( 4 requirements could be borrowed.

I am vory pleased with the progress I saw on the road and so was the Distriet "orks Officer. I have recently received Mr, dlem's details of work to be done once favourable weather coaditions return. I hope and expect wuch will be achioved beto oen April and August this year.

I am also pleased with the progress of the Nakanai. Council but mora attention must be paid idif to the educational aspects mentioned earlici. The administration must not be on the defensive in what it 13 dcing but should be in the forefront, leeding.

I largely agree with your comment on ciosing the area to rearuitment but here ingain tacts and figures \({ }^{\text {re }}\) what \(=\) require before
 ilgures on what workinf pogulation sa available in the aroa and what has left the area or when they are worling.

At page 16 Item \(B(d)\) of the roport Mir. Bilen refors to lack of DASF inspections. Such comment is often encountered. The comment though of interest is not helpful unless supported by factual data. I do not know if the situation ia unsatisfaotory or not. I do not know what, if anything, ias been done about it. In sy view thore could, ard perhaps should, have been action 2 ong two 1 ines locally. In the first place Mr. Eilem should hive tak in his notes of the aituation to the OIC DASF SALELUBU and discussed it \#ith him th cheek if what he has been told is factually corroct and ascertain what is proposod to be done. A second course of action is through the agrieultural committee of the Council. If this is done and an rassatisfactory situation still persists then there shouid be sufficient factual information available to discuss the matter at the He level at Fioskins, with the D.R.D.O. In seporting sucit natters you should make aure that Mr. Sllem (or any other reporting officer) indieates what action he has taken. If action is required outside his adainistrative area then he should indicate the matter is boing taken up by separate momorandum.

\section*{EWASSE PATROL No. 3 of \(1968 / 69\)}

Attached hereto please find a report of the above patrol conducted by Mr. J. Ellem, Patrul Officer.

Also appended are Mr. Allmark's (A.D.O.) compents on the
report.
As can be seen from the report, the patrolling officer was fully occupied with Rural Development works during the course of the patrol.

The wharf at the time of writing is still uncompleted and is awaiting the arrival of the cement.

The new design for the wharf should prove much more manageable and easier to construct than the old. Though the cement ordered has not arrived, sufficient has been obtained from P.W.D. Hoskins to coumence making the pipes to sheath the piers.

The survey of the Silanga project has been completed ard the field notes sent down to this office for draughting as drawing instruments are not available at Ewasse. The completed plans have been returned to O.I.C. Dwasse and the submission should be to hand shortly.

It is doubted that Mr. Ellem was able to achieve much in the way of Political Education in the course of the Patrol. He had little time to spare except of on evening, and after the people were busy all day on road, bridge and tank construction, they would have been rather loath to sit and partake in Political discussions.

In regard to recruitment, I do not think that D.A.S.F. or Harrisons \& Crossfield actively recruit in the area. The people themselves walk in and volunteer for work.

If the area is closed to recruiting this will have little effect as this does not debar the people from applying for casual work. All that is achieved is that recruiters will not be allowed into the area and the people cannot enter into agreerients, neither of which is taking place at the moment.

The practice of using private persons to fire ammunition manufactured by Administration officers is quite common practive in this Territory and may prove difficult to stop. The main danger lies in false assumptions being drawn where all the facts are not known to the officer concerned.

Mr. Ellem is a keen energetic officer and has achieved excelliont results, particularly with the UASILAU-SILANGA road improvements and development.

The phraseology of the report leaves something to be desired and Mr. Ell sm "ill be requested to pay more attention to the presentation of \(k\) is reports in the future.

However in this day and age, and noxe so at Silanga which is derezkrys dependent upon cocoa for an economy, a person who is not prepared to properiy care for pigs should not be permitted to disrupt the enterprise of otiers.
2. 4 and 5. I had expected a fuller report on just what political education was carried out. I agree that the present pamphlets and booklets are pretty dry stuff and do not give rise to a great deal of interest but this is what we have to work with at the moment and maxinum use must be made of it. As regards the Councillors not knowine cheir roles and knowledge of the House of Assembly this is exactly the type of pol tocal education required. It is only by constant and repeate\% explanation that points ci be got across.

> b) Labotr, I am in complete agreement with this section of the report. It has been said that block holders are not recruited to the palm cil settlement. This is not so and I have requested Mr. Ellem to prepare a list of blockholders. Who have worked or are working at either Harrisons and Crossfisld or D.A.S. F. Phe prodedures for closing an area to recruitmeat are laid down in acanding Instructions but I would prefer to see a voluntary rettriction on recruitment of labour from this area by the employers themseleves.

\section*{1. LAASIBU WHART.}

A little over twelve months ago the writer commenced the constmation of this wharf, following the instructions and plans of the Assistant District Commissioner for Hoskins at that time. ( Mr, C.T. Cempbell.)

The plans consisted of a sixty foot causeway built from reef coral which was obtained from Reefs situated over one third of a mile away. The wharf was to be extended by an additional forty feet by pilons which were to be constructed by using pipes.

The writer supervised wot on this where for two months before being transferred to Talasea sub-District.

Owing to the North West monsoonal conditions /the divers which hampered/who were obtaining the coral, only forth feet of this causeway was completed.

On return to the area during this patrol it was no i that the sight for the wharf had been changed and only lit. \(\rightarrow\) extra had been done towards the completion of this wharf The extra work done consisted of the construction/and placing til position four of the required
six pions.

During the \(x\) cont earth tremors in tais area, three of these pinons had toppled over ar ! dainage was done to the causeway.

Because of the nature of the new causeway, concrete facing for a total distance of sixty feet will be required to support and strengthen the causeway.

The required amount of cerient for this concrete has been ordered but not yet received.

The three collapsed pylons were regained from the sea bed after much difficulty and replaced into position. An additional two pylons were also placed into position.
pylons again tended to lean to one side.
As no equipment was available to assist with the construction of this wharf, the writer was certain that this method of construction would be unsuccessful and thus set about to find another more suitable and practivable method.

The results were that the causeway should
remain as it is and pions consisting of Kwila logs and 18" pipes would be used instead of the three foot pipes.

This plan was discussed with the District
Commissioner Mr. Dyer and on approval the new requirements (thirty eighteen inch pipes)were ordered.

As soon as the ceicent or pipes arrive the construction of this wharf will continue.

It took two weeks for the Uasilau people to gather sand enough fica the construction of this tank. On Saturday the 23 rd. November when sufficient sand had been gathered work commenced ion the construction of this tank.

This was the first
concrete construction of this nature attempted by the writer and the people of Uasilau. Thus no previous experience could be relied upon to assist with titis the construction of this tank.

The tank was constructed in accordance with the type suggested in the Local Government Bulletin.
get the people themselves to construct the inajor portion of this tank by showing and explaining to the people how and what to do, and than getting the people to complete the construction under the writers supervision.

As time passed it became obvious that this method was going to be unsuccessful as the people were woricing very slowly which was resulting with the portion first constructed becoming dry long before the remainder was compleied.

From the commencement of this project uritil its completion there remained a look of uncertainity on the peoples faces. This was because they had never before seen concrete used without boxing of the usual type. Thus how could a concrete tank be built wit out using similar boxing.

The most difficult part of the constriction was placing the top of the tank into position. The cop was to be constructed on the ground and then lifted into position.

The first attempt to do this resulted with the top of the tank being damaged and another had to be cons cructed.

The tank now completed
is a success and at this moment is holding about \(2,500 \mathrm{~g}\) gallons of water.

The guttering of the
aid post is still to be completed. This will be done as soon as the required materials become available (Tin snips, Fula)
on completion of the Aid post Orderlies house ( One reek) this new Aid post will be opened.

It was not until the fifth week of this patrol that this survey could be commenced. The reason being that no survey equipment ( compass, Chain) could be obtained. During the fifth week a compass from D.A.S.F. Salelubu, four pieces of chain to give a total distance of 200 links and a spirit level were used to complete this survey.

The results of the survey indicated that the main pipe line would have to be \(3,458 \mathrm{lks}\), in length, and the led pipes into each village having a total length of 30,052 l ks.
the required materials being unavailable (cement and sawn ti ber) the writer was unable to con inue with the construction of the Council Chambers.

\section*{*1. IAND IIVESTIGATION.}

\section*{Tiaura / Wilelo extended (Huala Land.)}

It took the writer four and one half days to complete this investigation.

These people are aware of the form of a Iand investigation as thesy have been involved in several before.
appoirited agents It was suggested to the writer that the apointed agents coul. comlile a list of the owners of this land. This was done but when the "Declaration of Custom" was being completed the writer noticed that several people were listed several times in different clans with the same or different name and approximately one dozen were listed in the one clan twice under different names. On investigating this matter it was discovered that each of these villagers had rignts to the land in one clan only.

The schedule of owners therefore had to be retyped resulting in the loss of much time.

The area of land involved consisted of 5847.6 hectars. Of this land \(25 \%\) is estimated as being suitable for Agricultural purposes. The remainder being rugged mountaineous country. Pherefore this land would be of little value to the Administration for Resettlement sahemes.

The owners themselves had approached the administration requesting the government to buy this land Whilst compiling the investigation report it was noted that some of the owners were expecting a high price for this land.

Owing to the nature of this land it is expected by the writer that the price recomnended by the lands department will be low, so it is possible that when the time for the purchase comes the owners may change their minds and wish not to sell this land.

The above two land purchases were completed by the writer during this patrol. In both cases the owners were satisfied with the purchase price.

ROADS.
\(a\)
(one H.D. 11 Buildozer) was shipped to Lasibu for the purpose of constructing the settlement roads in the Silanga and Uasilau settlement area. On the 2nd of December Mr. E. Kirkman and his grader arrived per. bardge at Lasibu to form and grade the roads being cleared by the bulldozer.

The bulldozer remained in the area for four weeks during which time it was unserviceable on four different occasions, as a result of different mechanical failours. The bulldozer cleared three miles of rasd before being returned to Kwalkessi.

The hire rate originally set for this dozer was \$16-00 per hour. However with this achine in its unreliahle state and therefore not working to its frll capacity and being operated by finexperienced New guinea operators, \$12-00 per hour would have been a more reasonable rate for inire.

Mr. E. Kirkman remain d in the area for three weeks and then retumed to Talasea ( Leaving his grader at Silanga) because daily rain made the roads boggy and unsuitable for grading. During his stay he managed to form and grade six miles of road.

Since the 23 rd December 1968. men from Silanga and Uasilau areas have been working voluntryly on these roads. They have concentrated on drainage in the low lying areas.

The newly constructed roads pass through several swampy places. To-iate the majority of these swanvy places have been successfully drained. The remainder being in the lower lying areas, will taike longer to succe--ssfully drain. It is expected that this drainage work will be completed by the end of January 1969.

When this drainage work is completed decomposed pumice which can be located in numerous areas will be used to surface and raise the road in these swampy areas.

During the two weeks from 23rd December 1968 to 3rd January 1969 little was achieved by the voluntry labourers owing to Christmas and New year festivity.

Starting irom 6th January one council ward from eac of Silanga and Uasilau Areas will work for one week following which another ward will work until a.l. wards have worked, then the cycle will start again. This will still enable the settlers sufficient time to maintain and develop their bolcks.

During the next few months of the liorth West Monanonal season observations of all the constracted roads will be made to ascertain what additional drainage work will be required (ie. places requiring culverts, dains and filling.)

The following is \(z \pi\) a sug estion by the writer which would save much construction time and cost of 100 yds . of road.

The sug estion is to relocate 200 yards of the Silanga (Portion 296; to \(\mathrm{K} \varepsilon\). . (Portio n321) road which passes through a swamp between the Geigavi and Popolu gullies located on the bound r of Portion NO. 367 and the Sacred heart Mission lease portion No. 295.

To avoid this swamp the road could be relocated approximately forty yards downstream from its present position. It is in this swamp that the two gullies mentioned above meet to form the Lalubaluba creek and a culvert could be successfully constructed in this creek.

The sacred Heart Mission is infavour of the relocation of this portion of road and is willing to have the road relocated through part of its taser land.

As soon as approval for this alteration is received the few trees to be felled along the side of the road will be felled.

Equipment for the construction of the Ala crossing at Salelubu have started to arrive.

These items were ordered by Public Works Department Hoskins who clearly indicated that the items were to be shipped to Lasibu.

The first lot of tools to arrived were shipped to Lasibu but the second, which were clearly marked to be shipped to Lasibu were offloaded at Wall. This ment that the Uasilau tractor had to be hired to transport these items to Salelubu where as the Agriculture tractor would have transported the items to Salelubu free of cost.

No word was received by the writer that
items were to arrive on the day of arrival and it was thus not until after this ship the \(\mathbb{M} . \mathrm{V}\). Paulus had departed that the writer received word that these items had been offloaded at Walo.

This is most satisfactory and could result in items getting lost.

\section*{SITUATION RTBPORT.}
"A" POLITICAL.
1. LOCAL GOVERN BNT.

The llakanai Iocal Government Council has now been operating for two years. The council has made several rules during this time. One being the rule to disallow pigs to roam in villages and they must be kept in fenced areas.

This is as far as hygene goer andoubtably
To-date the minority of the people have taken some action to see that their pigs are kept in fenced areas. The remainder have either dgnored this rule as no councillor has taken any action against him, or killed a.ll their pigs as they claim it is not worth having pigs if they have to be feneed in as this means that they have to be fed every day and this takes much time.

The number to have killed their pigs is estimated at about \(35 \%\).

If this percentage increases then these people will surely suffer from a lack of nutrition in their diets. Which would be detrimental to the commonity.

This was explained to the people during a discussion but little is expected to result from the discussion.

Is there an answer to the problem?
" For hygiene keep the pigs out of
the village."
"ForAgriculture (Protection of Gardens and crops) Fence them i. \({ }^{\text {" }}\)
"But this would mean that the pigs will become poor unless they are fed twice a day which involves much work."
"So we will kill the pigs to save us work, but then we won't have meat to eat."

\section*{2. IOCAT GOVERNMENT COUNCILIORS.}

The councillors contacted during this patrol are; Toluana, Neboi, Sukena anu Mimbuna from Silanga, Soa/Ubia, Pagege, and Laiga from Uasilau and Ga'a the council president and Peni from Gomu and Iwasse villages.

Of these only Toluana and Ga'a were impressive and showed ability related to and a knowledge of their roles as councillors.

Of the ramainder with the
probable exception of Soa/Ubia and Mimbuna little ws observed to show that these councillors were interested in fulfilling their rolas as councillors or even to increase their nowledge about their roles.

The people in this area
are now beginning to understand that there jas a House of Assembly. This is because the member for the Talasea Open electorate Mr. J. Maneke comes from Babata Village at Silanga. But their knowledge of the actual purpose of the house of Assennly is limited. This is likely to remain the same until much political, knowledge and experience, is received by these people.

Mr. J. Maneke is at this moment still touring various African countries. The purpose for this trip was explained to various people from Silanga and Uasilau but it is doubted whether thy understood what was being said to them.


\section*{5 POLITICAL EDUCATION.}

The writer would like to state that in his opinion little will be benefited by the people of Papua. and New guinea, from the political education discussions by the Administration officers, unless more simple phamphlets and booklets in question and answer form are issued to each patrolling officer for discussion, explanation and distribution in the area being patrolled.

This type of material would ensure that each officer would give the same or similar answer to the villagers questions. Thus minimizing confusion in the villagers minds because each officer gives him a different (Slightly) answer to that given him by the previous officer.

Also being in Pidgin English
the villagers could refer to them, after the officer had departed, to refresh their minds.
B. ECONOMIC.
1. Bconomic developnent in the area patrolled can only be explained ais being disatisfying.
1. GENTERA. RURAJ DEVELOPMENT.

During the eleven months sinch
the writer departed this area last year to the present moment it appeens that only very little if any development or the sett eme.it blocks bas taken place.

Admittedly about one quarter of the blocks only were observed but in discussion no inowledge of any development was gained.

The reasons for this as
best the whiter ean establish are;
a) DII? BACK .

With much dieback being in the area for some time and no cure or control of 1 ts spread being known, most of the Silanga and Umu settlers have a Defeatus attitude towards the problem. They are, liaturally enough, uncertaic as to whether they would just be waisting their time by planti.g larger areas as it now looks to them that Die back cannot be cor zuolled

\section*{b) TABOUR}
the men from both Silanga and Uasilau have, to-date, always been wiling io co-operate with the demands of Govermment and Buropean personal.

They also had a good reputation for being good workers. Thus much recruiting by Mission and Keravat plantations has been done in this area.
D.A.S.F (Department of Agriculture Stock and Pisheries) and Harrisons Crossfeeld (For the Oil palm project) have recruitec numerous men from these 'wo areas. liany of those recmited have blocks in the Silingl and Uasilau gettlement area.

This resulted with a little over on third of the potential/ of this area keing continually absent for the past twelve months.

Although there are several families iving in the area without official rights to suy of the settlen t blocks they have rig tsyby village qistom, to cocos on the community blocks.

This losis of potential abdux
immediately cripples the degree of maintenance on the established areas without considering further development.

The porition has been explained
to the peryle by the administration's officers and the Tocal Govermment Council in the area. Yet as soon as word is recelved that labourers are needea more mon leave the area.

If the employers were to consider the need for potential labour to develoo this area they m Hould come to tie conclusion that that \(m\) needs were certainly no more important than thas in this area. But one can rewt assured that the cupoyers are aware of this but they are taking advantage of the willingness of these puople.

In consideration for the development reeded in this area and for the people and their wish to
co-operate, no recruiting should be done in the Silanga or Uasilau areas.

Is it possible to close an area to
/done
labour recruiting ? If so I would like to suggest that it be labour recruiting? Uasilau area.

Within itself the area has sufficient labour to develop tself and thus have an important role in the development of the ter itory. But take part of this labour force away and this role is imnediately lost.
c) ROAD WORK.

Roads are known to be
important for the efficiont developinent of a settlement area. A little over one and one half years ago,work commenced on the roads to serve this area.

For the road work done kelore extensive labour remiting effected the area, road work done and organized in conjunction with Block worls had little affect to the care given to the blocks. Since then and at the present moment, maintenance alone is more than fust a daily task to the people remaining in the area.
d) Leck of supfirvision and inspections.

Several settlers approached the writer at various tims during this patrol and stated that they hadenot had their blocks inspected or been given any advice concerning the control of pests and diseases for over eight montha by ang Agriculture officer. This naturally hinders developmat for example as regards Die Back in the Cocoa.
B.2. ACTIVITI S OF DEVSIOPMIENT DEPARTMBNTS.

\section*{DEPARTMMNT OF AGRICULIURE, STOCK AND FISHERIES.}

The Agriculture station for the area is based at Salelubu. This station is staffed with two Overseas and cne Iocal (Papuan) Arricultural Officers.

The Fast Nakanai census division was tu be servad from Salelubu. This has proved unsatisfactory as far as the Fast Nakanais were concerned. In an ettempt to overcome this an Agriculture base camp is being set up at Twasse on the Iocal Government council Block.

During this patrol several settlers from the Silanga arei expressed concern to the writer because they had not had their blocks inspected or been siven advice for controlling pests and Diseases.

DEPARTMGNA OF TRADE AND INDUSTRX.
there are three co-operative Sociaties in the area petrol ed Silanga, Uasilau and Apapulu. These societies have been operating for several years and received supervision from co-operative officers patrolling in the area.

In early Lecember
Zast year an oficer was posied at salelubu to serve the Central and East liakanai societies. This is ur doubtably a move to promote success in the societies in thsis area as much more supervision can be given to the societies.

Both the Silsnga and tie Uasileu bocieties are facer with skipping prcblema. Their orders for supplies take ercin one to three months to nrrive but the nain problem is getting their pioduce shipped to Rabaul before damage is ed to it. An example for this problem is,

On 1st hovemier 170 dhe Silanga society adrised the Master of the zrivinta that 61 bags of cocos were awaiting shipkment from Lasibu to Rabaul. The following week the couperat/ve of iver responsible to the area forwarded a similes telegram.

The rasyits were that 223 bags of cocoa were awaiting shipnont -ut Lasibu before a ship (The Ereventa) owiled at La, ibu to collect this cocoa in Mid December.
W. Ch an officer permenently posted in this area It is rufed that this situation will improve.

\section*{2. HISATPH.}

The Roman Catholic mission have a Hospital at Silanga and the Government have an aid post at Uasilau. A health center has been constructed at iwasse but is not yet staffed. The people from the Base area get medical treatment from the Aid post.

Generally speaking the health of these people is good.

A short time before this patrol several children suffered from an attach of measles.

The only other cases reported to the writer were several cases where children were receiving treatment at the Silanga Hospital for Pnemonia.
3. Law and Order.

Five men were charged and found guilty under the Nakanai Local Government Council Pig rule. Three other men were charged with stealing but other then these cases Law and order in this area is good.
4. MISSIONS.

Both The Roman Catholic and the United Church are working in the Best and Central Nakanai census divisions.

The Roman Catholic Mission is situated at Silanga whilst the United church is situated in both Uasilau and Ewasse.

Both these missions have much influence over the people and have an important part in the villagers life.

Father Wagner of the Roman Catholic (Sacred Heart) Mission has been at Silanga for over sixteen years.
/ part He has played an important/in the establishment of the Silanga settlement and was one of the prime movers to get the settlement started.

\section*{j. CUT T AND UNRTSTT}

CULIS. Ja the area Patrolled cult activities is nil as far as could be observed.

During the past eight months a certain amount of unrest has arisen ir the Uasilau area. This unrest was promoted by an Agriculture of ificer from Salelubu who advised the people to write letters to Govermment odficials and to Radio Babraul for answers to their questions rather than answer them himself.

An example of this occurred when the bulldozer, which had been constracting the roads in the settlement area, was withdrawn for mechanical pepairs. The people from Unsilau were naturally interested and concermed with what was happesing wished to know why the bulldozer had been withdrawn. In seeking an answer to their question Soa/Ubia the leader of the Uasilau yeople put their question to the of icer at Salelubu. The oflicer rather than answer this question drafted a telegram in Pidgin \(\mathrm{Bn}_{5}\) iish to the Assistant Administrator and informed Soa that if he was to sign this telegram he would get an answer to his question and that this was the best way to get an answer.

The following day the writer returned to the Ceintral
Nakanai from lwasse and was working at Uasjlau when Soa approached the writer stating what he had done and that he now knew that he had done wrong.

A meeting was arranged with th. 3 Uasilau people and their question was answered. They were also told that they wert to seek answers to their questions from their Local Governemt council or the Administration Officer responsible for the area.

It was observed that these people were upset with what this Agriculture efficer had told them to do.

At the ens of this patrol the situation had returned to normel.

\section*{EWASSE PATROL No. 4 ox 68/69.}

Enclosed herewith please find a report of the above patrol, conducted by Mr. R. Allmark, to part of the POMIO S/D Zast New Britain and to part of the East Naranai Census Division of this District.

The Patrol was accompanied by Mr. R. Tobia, Patrol Officer in Training for part of the time and by various officers of the Dept. of Forests.

Mr. Tobia's Report is enclosed herewith.
The Patinol, being specifically mounted to assist the Dept. of rorests with large scale purchases of timber rights, dic not cover a wide range of activities.

I would suggest that the mattera raised by Mr. Allmark in regard to East New Britain (particularly cult activities) be passed on to that District.

The feelings expressed in the penultimate paragraph of the report are felt to be sound and it is thought that the matter of advance warnings to the people, particularly in regand to large scale operations such as this, be taken up with other Departments at Headquarters level.

Mr. Tobia has submitted an informative report.
The mention of new plantings at UBILI are heartening and the apparent political awareness throughout the East Nakanai most satisfying。

The parochial attitude of many of the counctlors is not unusual and can be a healthy attitude if not carried to extremes.

Mr.Tobia's English stili leaves something to be desired but is improring.

Tbe usual high level of cooperation between Deparimens in West New Britain was apparently maintained an this patrol and the large scale acquisition of timber rights should do much jo improve the economy of the area.

1. There arose little apportunity for political
discussion on this patrol as its purpose was salely to purchase timber rights throcighout the axea. Throughout the
Bxtended Memgen and Kol Census Division that the patrol visited
'matabers houses' were prominont. Whether this indicates a great interest in the House of Assenbly or in the cargo cult is not clear although I am more inclaned towards the latter.
2.

There appears to to considerable apposition to the Department of Lands in the Bxtended Mengen. Wien sale of timber rights was watcucutiz first discussed with them the people reiused to sell. It was not until af'ier full and careíul explanttion of timber rightu purchase with emphesis that their land was not being bonght that they agreed to sell. This opposition appears to stem from disagreement with Land Titles Commissioner Reads decision regarding the extent of the coastal Makanai land. An investigation into land wsa carried out recently to sea if the Ext.Mengen people wish io sell the land between tize Ibana and Nadedua purchase behind Itt. Jlewh. This investigation apparently met with a very definite reiusal. I understand that lands are still interested in purchasing this area but in veiw of the people's statements at this time that they will definitely not sell any land I feel tiv wouid be a breaci of faith to again ask the people.

\section*{Situation Report - b) Bconomic}
1.

The purpose of the patrol was to purchase timber rights over a large area of land in the Rast Nakanai, Extended Mengen and Extended Kol census division. As far as the East Makanai was ccncerned the intention was to buy timber rights over all land not owned by the Adninistration. (Refer map.)
2.

This aim was achieved in the Rast Nakanai with the exception of coastal strips on either side of Bialla plantation which were not considered important by Porestry as a timber source but would have been needed for accoss to other blocks.
3.

The Extended Mengen area sold the area required by Forestry after some initial confusion as to our intentions referred to in(a)para 2.
4.

The Bxtended Kol group declinez to sell on the grounds that they did not have a great amount of land and that tiey considered that if they sold their timber rights Jands would soon follow to buy their land. The area was not considered of real importance to Forestry as it is largely broken and unproduative for Forest purposes.
5. A total of \(\$ 76,093.00\) was paid for the rights purchased and was broken up as follow?.

833,510 in Treasury investment - a little over \(90 \%\) of the purcatase price. The coastal Nakanai people refused to sell for less than the full purchase price in cash. There are three main reasons for this.
(a) Previous large land payments in the area have all been paid in cash e.g. Mededua \$72,000.
(b) Large population in rolatively smal. areas. For example had the Ulanona roup accepted \(10 \%\) in eash each individual owner wuld have received 420.
(6) The need for cash to det lop economic cesh crops. Ubili villace has recently purchased a tractor and tratler and required cash to repay their loan to the Catholic Mission. Tools are required and a small amount of labour needs to be employed.

The Ext.Mengen is very economically depressed and until at Ir st some start is made on econonic crop extension no capital is \(r\) rev fod and the people realily accepted investment.

The south Maututu group declined to sell on the grounds that they did not have a great deal of timber and what remained they wished to keep. It was explained that trees such as galip, breadiruit, erima, black palm and canoe tress were excluded from the sale but made no defference to their attitude. It was explained to all groups that the right to sell was entirely their prerogative and apart from explaining what was entailed in a timber richts purchase no attempt was made to pressure the nomers to sell.
8. The purchase price for the north Maututu area was to be \(\$ 1720\) or \(\$ 4.20\) per person. This payment was refused at Apupul village with the claim that it w s not enouch. As an argunent they quoted the hich costere of sam timber and started that they wan: 3d \(\$ 100\) per tree or \(\$ 1000\) per clan befor they would agree to sell. This would have involved (using the figure of \(\$ 1000\) per clan) a purchase price of \(\$ 28,000\) and was obviously ridiculous.

\section*{Situation Report - (c) Social}
1. of abatina The Mencan Carden Oult appears to be showing no signs had a dins in the and a 'meribers houed for visiting cult leaders and 'Koriam Komitis'. I did not actively lexcerrx discuss the cult for fear of prejudicing our regotiations tor sale of timber richts. Mr.R.Frost, C. .O., from Ponio, who was conducting census in the area at the tile, will no doubt report fully on the siturition.
2. An interesting facet of the oult is the significance of the old liew Guinea shillin.. At Bago, when it was seen that kxax he had a shilling of this type, the pilot of the helicopter was offered up to four doliars to sell the coin. It was noticed that cult gardens are laid out in an exact replica of the reverse side of the shilling with a circle of crotins in the centre ropresenting the hole with crotons radiating from tlis to form the arms of the oross.
3.

Throughout the area and more particularly the Ext.Kol
the people are very baciward. Heolth standards are very poor; slin and eyn diseases are prevalent and goitre is present in large numbers. No economic development has ta cen piaco at all. There is no reason why the people carnot devclop as large tracts of good land are available from both r,anks of the Pandi River. A concentrated effort to establish coonomic erops at a village level could be one means of brealcing this cult.
1.

Th甲re was a certain lack of advance preparation by our department although the Department of Forestsy were very well organized. No officer was available from Bast New Britain until the final week of the purchase when there remained little to be done although some \(60 \%\) of the purchase area was to have been in thrt District. Sub-District Office, Pomio, had apparantly not been informed of the purchase as their officer patrolling the area knowledge of our prescence. No map of East New Britain was available and a considerable amount of expensive helicopter time was used in merely locating villages before actual putchase investigations could comence.
2.

I feel it would be an advantage for some advance warning to be give, to the people on future forest aquisitions. On this occasion sole confusion arose and in the case of the Bxtended Kol nessengero were despatched to Pomio to ascertain the views of senior Kol people resident at Pomio. This could have been avoided had advance notice been given.
3.

For this reason I have already had discussions witi land owners of the Nakanal Council area who will be involved in the Ania/Kapiuru forest purchase to be comenced in webruary, 1969 and recommend that the same shon-d be done in the Hoskins and Montague Harbour areas.

\section*{1 ITRODUCLION:}

This patrol was carried into the East Nakanai Census Division and it also covered part of an area administered from the Pomic Sub-District.

The purpose of the patrul in the writer case was practical. training covering all aspects of a Forestry Survey in a timber rights purchase. This patrol was conducted by the Forestry Department and the main purpose of the patrol (survey) was to purchase timber rights covering an area of some 200,000 acres. Mr. R. Allmark (A.D.0) was also made available to help in tere carrying out the survey and the writer moreless got instructions from him. In fact most of the talksygaand explanation as to what the Forestiy Department was trying to do in the area was cione by Mr. Allmark. The writer was present in most of the discussions with the people when cot attending to someother things. To the people it was explained that the Forestry was only intending to buy timber rights and not their gand and that the rights eatended to 40 years and that once the 40 years is up the timber than goes back to them. The timbers owners understood just what the administration was trying to and theiew was no problems.

Base camp was set up at ULAMONA MISSION and work partie: flown to the bush by helicopter. Because the helicopter could only war seat two passengers the writer had to stay back in camp most of the sta time when Mr. Allmark and a Forestry Officer, Mr B. Pamsey had to go and speak to villagers in land. The majority of the timber owners were eager to get some money out of the purchase so there wasnt any problem faced to slow the survey being carried out. One village visited iniand at first didnt wa nt to sell their timber the first time they were seer by the witer and Mr Allmark however on the second trip a week later by Mr Allmark and Mr B. Ramsey they agreed. The reason they didnt want to sell timber in their land was because a few years back a patrol was carried into their land by the Department of Lands and they werentold the reason for such a survey and were not told that such a patrol will: be carried out. This was explained to them that the patrol was 10 or sc years old and that its probably already forgotten.

Up to the day the writer left a total of \(\$ 37,759\) was paid to four areas covered in the purchase leaving three more still to be paid. The remaining three etill awaiting payment are areas that can only be reach by helicopter or boat and because the helicopter had some engine trouble it had to go to Rabaul to be fixed and until it got back no further payment could be made. Up tow date of the payments alr -eady made the lowest each person has been paid is \(\$ 4.00\) and the high--est \(\$ 267.00\). ULAMONA one of the areas had 9 clans having rights to timber and because there many clan members each could only get \$4.00. GULAGULA another area had 4 clans having rights to the timber and because there werefft many clan members each person received \(\$ 267.00\). When all the payments are fully made the people in the area should be well off and with the money they've got asome good will be expected in the area. The administration has a system where when such purchase are undertaken the people get \(10 \%\) of the total price and invest the rest of the money. However only twa 7 clans at the village of BAGOs followe the idea and the rest wanting their money whole in cash. Correction this was only up to the day the writer left. These 7 clans have rights in the area known as the EXTENDED MENGEN. The total price their timber worth was \(\$ \$ 19,860.00\). \(\$ 17,890.00\) was invested and the people getting \(\$ 1970.00\) with each persom getting \(\$ 5.90\) each. Most of the people spoken to gave the reason that kh they wanted their money stwaight out because thoy needed it in the next few years to snable them to go ahead with the work they are now doing mainly their coconut plantings and cocoa. They want to have the \(A\) money ready in hand or in their personal bank books when the need aris They also stated that seeing they had a council in their area if and when the council appeals for halp they would have the morey there to help the council. The fact that at'ter all the payments were made the people in the area would be quite well off and any progress thought of by the people could well be carried out now that they have the mone The reason the Administration haa this system of investing native wan s clearly outlined to the poople. The was only present on two ocassîon when paymerte were being made to to areas TLAMONA and IBANA with the clans mostly found around UBILI VILLAGE. The others needed trips by hellcopter and it could only seat two passengers.

The mission logging and sawmill in the area has already given good job oppotunittes to the natives working the mill and the loggers. Most of the jobs and machinery are done and operated by the natives with the Brothers surpevision. All heavy equipments like graders are drimen by natives. With another such enterprise moving into the area the na'lves would benefit a little more.

\section*{POLITICAL.}

\section*{(i) Local Government Council:}

The people are inside the NAKANAI LOCAL GOVERNMNET
COUNCIL with the council headquarters at EWASSE.
Just how much interest the people have in their council the writer cannot very well cover in details. The people wer mostly worried about getting paid for their timber than discuss council matters, as experienced. In any case where a few did have time t \(\dagger\) 略 to talk about the council the same thing was repeated, ie that a council is a goon organisation to have at village bevel because it helped the people. Just how and what they meant when they said that is left to ones opinion. It gets down to the point then that the council is good at village level because the people ran their own affairs with their own money or that the impression the writer got speaking to the people. It is vel hard to know exactly whether the people understand what the council means to them for they say very little when the subject is discussed. Personally the writer thinks th people are aware at least the fundementals of the council as a body in their area. Most of the time one hears of complaints to why the council hasnt yet got around 20 doing what it has planned to do in a village. Because this was not a D.D.A. routine patrol, villagers spoken mostly came from the nearby village of UBILI. Maybe other villagers would have different ideas about the council.

\section*{(ii) Local Government Councillors:}

The writer met only three councillors during this time.
Iaxatsemszxwaycoumek. Once again its the same story, that they were worried more about getting paid than discussing things corncerning the council. The councillors in this area are especially concerned about their council and the way its run more than the writer thought they would. Of the three councillors spoken to they all stated that they want to get their payments in cash whole, than invest some of it with the government. They said that if they had the money handy they could face problems without much trouble. Perhaps it would be more correct to say that they were more worried about progress in their little community than the area as a whole. Its seems to appear then elf each councillor is moreless corncentrating his efforts around the are he is councillor for and each one expects the other to be the sume in his own wards.
(iii) House of Assembly:
these people know and understand the House of assembly to the same degree they do with the tr village council. They know that the same set up in the House is that exactly found in the counci except that the House of Assembly is the 'namba wan gaviman' which has wider powers and covering the whole territory. Like they do with the council the people say little when the matter is being discussed. Its best to say that they are more apmxamex able to understand the council than they would the House of Assimbly. In fact very little was mentioned on the subject during this time.
(iv) House of Assembly Member:

The penple know that they have a member for their electorate and that he is elected in the same manner they elect their council representative. They know that their House member is on a four year term in representing them at the House of Assembly. After four years another election is held and they either put up a new member o: elect the same member back into the House. A question was asked about their member Fir J. Maneke and another House member making their current trip to New York. This they said was over the A.B.C. news. Unfortunately the writer didnt listen to the broadcast but \(x\) answered the question as best as I could. The reason Maneke together \({ }^{\mathbb{E}} \mathrm{B}^{-}\) with another House member were currently visiting New Irk was to attend a very big meeting of the United Nation. They were making this trip together with the Australian Delegates to the United Nations. These two members would help the Australian members to answer r questions corncerning the Territory of Papua and New Guimea. Over the past few years members of the old House have undertaken the same trips for the purpose. It was suggested to them that when Mr.J.Maneke returned they best invited him to attend one of their councilex meeting and outline to the council why he went to New York. Their own councillors can then give them a proper talk on their metabers

These people were one of the groupe who did not \({ }^{\rho}\) ant their money invested because thry said that thiey needed tho to have part of handy when the need arises, and this isnt far off. It comp money to have it now or anytime. But they will certainly need the moner when their coconut and cocoa trees are producing nuts and beans. They will want the money to build a lasting proper dater and so on. They also have a tractor running and when it breaks down theylf money herdy to be able to repair it, rather pay for the req--uired spare parts, Pix

\section*{(ii) Lozging Companies in The Area}
here can be found in the area an old long establisked logging set up run the Catholic mission at ULAMONA. The mission has been logging trees in the area for some time now and has a sawmill at themission station. The mission logs for timber in an area totalling some 16,300 acres. It is a forty year leas Logs are sawn up the mission sawmill to the required measurement and are then realy for buyingo Nost of it is sent to VUNAFOPE where the finishing touch are done and made available for sale to people and businesses wanting timber.

This mission set up has provided jobs for many of the village people in the area as sawmillors, drivers and semi-skilled workers. Nost of the heavy quipment are operated by the locals.

Ar aut a mile or two from SOI landing their is another logging set up. This is only a loggine company and it logs timber from the forest and these trees them have to wait for sometime till a japanese boat cails in to ship the logs away. It has been over the news lately that logging companies are having problems because Japanese ships havent been making their runs for the past few monthe to ship the logs. A firm in Japan has stopped sonding its ships to the Territory because it claims that kik Australia is getting the best timber and leaving the low quality timber for them to buy. For this reason it has stopped sending ships to ship logs in the territory. As one goes past the logging foint near SOI loge can be seen lying along the beach being poundered on by the sea. Tork on this logeing zoint has etop kusquaroxyrxiketix for the time being.

\section*{(iii) Forestry}

\section*{a) Proposed Purchase}

The area being purchased coters some 200,000 acres. Iying al -most in a stricight line with each other the three mountains; Mt. ULANMM (the father), Mt. BAMUS (the south sor) and Mt. Llkuranga. The purshase affect the areas around these three mountains. Hiost of the area inside the purchase can be reached, rather roads can be built to enable logging tricks to reach in--land. There is a section arourd Mt. BAMIS wherea road cannot be built without having to spend a lot of money on. This is because there are many littlo rivare panning down from the mountain into the BALIMA RIVER. The FANDI RIVER divides th MADEDUA and the EXTENDED KOL sections of the purchase from the sections more towards the coastal section, however the problem of having to buizd a bridge if a logging point will have to be setup in the west coast can be got. around by setting up another logeirg point east of the North Son. If on the other lehd the PANDI RIVER was big onoug it could be used to flow the timber downstream, in this way saving trucks being used to carry the lcgs from the forest to the \(s\)


purchase is productive rainforest. Good stands of of trees suitable for logging are found in the area. The unproductive section of the purchase doses not cover a verylarge area. Most of this is at the back of Mt . BAMUS either because theres so many little rivers making it swampy or something else. In any case the Forestry Department was careful in considering whet areas to buy. Most of the unproductive and inacvessible areas were care--fully left out.

\section*{SOCIAL}

\section*{(i) Education} is staffed by four indigineous teachers and a mission Sisiter who is in charge of the school. The school caters for classes from prepatory up to standard six. The school comprises of three school classrooms the third still undergiong item completion stage. Crildron from catholic villages attend the school and those children whose home villages are a fair wa; away from the school sleep in the school and attend classes. The top floor of one sc hold bail ling has been turned into a dormitory and the ae children use it.

At village standard most of r the people can speak pidgin and
a few can read and write pidgin english. These group wolud normally be those who have attend mission schools sometime in their earlier days.

\section*{(ii) Health}

Overall health andard in thearea is generally quite good.
The mission in the area also runs a hospital providing medical services for the local population in the area. Infant welfare clinics are iso soaducted by the sister in "arge of the hospital in the villagesnearby. Mothers have weir babies born at \(t\). hospital and the ho bal also takes in pationt who are very sick.
(iii) Mission

The people in this area are followers of two dinorinations, tie Roman Cainolic and the United Churn. Thess are the only churn in this area. There are more cat ic followers than United Church fol overs.

\section*{(iv) Cults}
[he peon]. on the coast are not invovled with any any cult or sort. If they are there is no light on the subject. It maybe true with the people on the tala nd of LOLDBAU, Mr Allmark went in investigate the matter and just what results e found he hast mads this known yet.

The certainly can be found is the inland villages of BAGO, MANU and KAMITANE the people are followers of the MORTAl cult. The writer on a trip Sc the village of BAGC fou d that in the village the people have built a house special for KORIAM. The house well decorated and seems to be kept clean every day. The peopic are reported to waiting for their ancestors to send them cargo or something. They also keep their cemetery generally clean and tidy. These
coup of people have for sometime L . Ww be opposing the introduction of a council into tania area.

\section*{PEOELIN'S ATPITGDES TOWARDS PURCHASE}

On the question of what the natives thought about the the administration buying ties area up and leasing it to companies so they could log the timber in the forest the people said very little. They did rention that lseeing there are goog timbers in the area and that they arent akle to make uce of and make money out of it they were quite happy to sell the rights to administration. They may have ideas of t.eir own but the fact still remains that tbey havent got the capital to beablo to carry out logging and buying th equipments required. The also unstand that once a logcing company movos ia this would have job cpportuaities opened to them. They are asare too of ways they would benefit from this. The companywx once it moved in would have to roads and bridges and when the term expires tbey leave and the roads will 00 used by them. A good road net work can be extended as far as the in land villages of BAGO, MANU and KAMITANE. These three villages will benefit: greatly if roads were built as far inland as possible. There are iittle river bo be problems but this wouldnt present any major problems and most cases they are dried up in the dry season and timber can be logged in these areas during this time when the rivers are dried up. They are mostiy creeks running into the PANDI and the BALIMA RIVERS. All in all the people were quite happy knowing that they paid for the right of timber only being logged in the area and that the land still belonged to them. After 40 years the rights in gett--ing timber of their land would once again belong to tem. They were quite happy to to get easy money when most needed and at this stage they certainly need without them having to convince you.

Up to the day the writer left this was the situation;
(1) \(\$ 37,759.00\) paid to four ereas, MADEDUA, GULAGULA, IBANA, and ULAMONA.
(2) MADEDUA - 9 clans in this section and each person receiving \(\$ 63.00\) each.

(4) IBANA - 7 clans each getting \(\$ 130.00\) each.
(5) ULAMONA - 9 clans each getting \(\$ 4.00\) each. This section was the smallest of the rest of the other areas, and there were more clan mismbers in the 9 clans.

Attached is a copy of BWASSE Patrol Report 5 of \(38 / 69\) describing an outbreak of cargo cult in the Manusi and Malasi areas which the reporting officer considers can bo attributed to lack of progress in the Sale/Balasi resettlement. Apparently cocoa plantings commenced before Administration purchase some three years ago, but everything has been at a standstill sine then as there is no other suitable land for cocoa plantings.

The District Comisaioner has commented that he has unsuccessfully pressed your Department fer an indication of action, but the proposal has not yet reached the Lend Development Board. He feels that "we should have prom grossed further than we have", and warns that lack of action may lead to unplanned squatting.

Could you advise me what is the present position, please?

Attached please find a report of a special patrol to Malasi conducted by Mr. Allmark, A.D.O.

The report cuvers the situation quite well and leaven little need for comment by me.

I understand you are aware of other activities associated with the name of KORIAM in other parts of the District. The situation will be watched.

In regard to the Sali. Malasi development I understand that the preliminary eub-Divisiun plan has been drawn but not yet surveyed. I am not sure if the plan itself has yet been approved.

The Nakanai Council will once again be asked to make a submission to the District Cc-ordinating Comittee through this office, for the Sale Malasi roads, though until the sub-Division itself is approved the location of the roads is in doubt.

I agree with Mr. Allmark that an sarlier commencement of this development would probably have averted this outbreak. At the very least with something to occupy them the people would have had lese time to listen to the Mamusi cultists.

Discussions with Mr. Jones disclose that the further progress of the scheme rests in the hands of the Departments of Lands and Agriculture Headquarters.

I will write to the Executive Officer of the Dietrict Co-ordinating Committee to seek the help of that Cummittee in instituting the Sale/Malasi sclecme as soon as possible.

There was no camping allowance claim attached to the report.

\section*{34tuation Report - a) Political.}
1. I am rather concerned with the political implications of this outbrea of cult activities at kilalasi village. The cult was brought in from the lauri Ho 1 Census Division and partioulaxly from 2okapuna village. The cult will be discussed in more detail under (c) Social, outhreskis of this cult have occurred previously at Uasilau but this is the first occasion that I have heard of propaganda being used to the effect that the cult has government support.
2.

This of course relates directly to Korian Urakit the member for Kandrian - Pomio in the House of Assembly. The various cult workers are still known as 'Korian Komiti' and it was found that cultists had been telling the llalasi people that the governmont in the person of Marian together with a 'llasta San' were coming to Pokapuna to hold a 'kago pati' and that funds were required for this purpose.
3.

I believe Korias hae held a pablic meeting Cisclaiming angl connection with the cult. If this is the case and the liamsi are still using his name as a lever then surely they must be open to prosecution. It was explained to the llalasi people, some of when are originally of llamusi stock that Korism does not rysesent them in the House of Assembly and that they have their or amber to represent them. This was understood and Malasi people claim to have been tricked by the Mamusi.
4. I woeld refer to paras \(11-13\) and 33 of inoskins Paurol Rejort 18 of \(1967 / 68\). Unfortunately wy prediction that the area was fertile ground for cult activities has proved correct. The present outbreak can be directld attributed to the complete lack of progress on the Sale/Malasi resettiement ares. For the past three years the Sale/llalasi socoa plantings have stagnated since the Administration bought the land with a view to resettlement on a siailar basis to Uasilau and Silanga. There is no other suitable land available for cocoa plantings other than on the Administration land and the people haveint been languishing since the purchase awaiting some Administration action.
5.

There has been pressure through the Nakanai Council for development to commence with no result to date. The poople are aware of this and finally, have turned to othor avenues for development in this case aargo sult. I am hoperul that the oult outbreak has been stopped for the time belng but it is essential to the gocd adrinistration and development of the area as a whole that the Sale/ilalasi scheme be instituted as a matter of urgency.

\section*{Situation Report - (c) Socin]}

As previously reported the cult is based in the
Manusi Consus Division of the East Iew Britain District. The oult is defferent from the llengen Garden Cult in that to my knowledge the typical cult garden is not used.

Mainfestations of the eult are:-
Small tables decorated with
flowers ave placed in houses with offerings of food and money for the ancestors. This closly parallels the peevious outbreak at Uasilau.

Cash donations of 30 c for each adoule to be paid fortnightly. This is to enable the gnvernment and mission to hold the 'Kago pati'.

Visits by 'Koriam Komitis' to hold meetings with the Overgrown cocor gardens and a drop in procuction aen people. be direetly attributed to the cult.
8. It is defficult to understand why the Malasi people have ambarked upon this oult when the relationahip between the alasi paople and the limusi is explained. liad the eutbreak come from within this would be understandable. The Malasi people are proud of the fact that the Mamusi buy items from their Society store as they have none of their awn. When money is not available the Halasi employ Samusi men and women for a few shillings a week to clean cocoa gardens. In effect the lamusi are merely a sheap souree of labour and are treated as such but then the lalasi blinaly follow when oult activipts spproch them.

The remainder of Hr . Elles's report covers the same aspects as his patrol No. 3 of \(68 / 69\) and shows continuing progress in spite of difficult weather.

I had the opportunity to inspect part of the UAS\%LAUSILANGA roads on \(20 / 2 / 69\) whilat in the area (per helicopter) in connection with a Timber Rights purchase and Peel that aill concerned in this endeavour are to be congratulated.

It is interesting to note (Fulitical Zducation) that Mr. Meneke's, M.i.A., dischssions following his recent trip overseas does not appear to have had a great impact on the people.

In this regard Mr . Sllem's ©ariler suggestion re a simple booklet on the Political system in the Territory has merit. Howevor this type of booklet is already being produced and, though vory simple, stili fails to ispurt the required information due to the complete lack of any history, amongst most of the people, of any form of control or direction at a level. highor than a clan or group of clans.

Though Mr. Eljen's refusal to allow Block Holders from thie area to proceed to the oil Fala area to work appears to be obeyed, it should be reelised that thare is no legal need to make such a request or legal authority to forbid such a move.

If this is the nearest source of money fur these poople, who do not have eash loans to fall back on, we way be makiag a mistake to do more than advise against this preetice.

The investigation into the cult activities vas conductod by IIr. R. Almaric A.D.O. Who was then the officer in Chargo, Base Carp livasco.

The writer accoffianied \(U x\). Allmark on this patrol for the purpose of gaining experience for investigating cult activities and for ceining on tho spot information about the people concermed and mainfeetations of the cult.

From information gatwed duilng the inveatigation it appeared to be certain tbat these cult activities in the lialasi area were promoted by the lack of progress by the Adminigtration on the Sale/Lalasi land puxchase.

Tho Sale/Hajesi land puxchase was made by the Administration with the ain of eaottlemont taling ploce on sinilar betsis to that of silarges and "asilau.

Bince that/ these peoplu have been informed that in the near future the Administration would take action to got the resettioment underway.

To-date var/ litti sther than the puralase has taken place.

As a result during the pest few years new plantings of cocon have stagnatod as the only cuitable land on which to plant cocos has beon purchased by the Adminisuration.

The writor has beon advisad that pressure from the llakanai Iocal Gover ment council to got tho resettlement moving has had no effoct.

Wita the lack o- co-operation it is not unlikely that these people should have cougit other means for d volopment though it was a cargo cult.

During tho inveatigation several tables, decorated with flowors and with offerings of food, were sistod.

Tho cult workerv are known as "Koriam jecmiti" which relatos tho cult to, the earlior cult which appeared at Uasilau, and the Namusi cult.

Koriam Mrelcit is the mumber for Kancxiren-orio in the House of hssembly. Although he has denied mowledge oi/ "Levinm Cult" his nomo is still usod and this also gives the poople the idea that the cult has the upport of the Government.

The cult oane into the axce Prom the lianusi area and the leaders who came to the llalasi area are all Irom Pokag na vill . They are; Burusu Lelengo, Nakale Lelengo and Feo Iatamuife. ho Watasi poople appointed heir om comitte who is Pakosi Hagoga of Maiasi vil.1age.

Cash donations of \(-30 p\) Irom each alul wexs to be paid each fortnight to tho comittee man, this was to enable Govermmont anc lisision to hold a cargo Party.

As far ss could be ascertained only one of those pymonta were made.

It appesrs that the action taken by \(16 x\). Allnaza will put an ond to the cargo cult in the lalasi area. But itt is more than likely that unrest will remnin until a stait is made on the Sale/Malasi resettlement.

Attached please find report of a patrol conducted by Mr. J. R. Ellem to the UASILAU-SILANGA area of the Central Nakanai.

The patrol was of a routine nature aimed at Rural Development in the area and consolidated and advanced projects that the patrolling officer had been engaged upon during his last two patrols.

The Development works progress has been fully covered in the report and need no comment other than that progress is satisfactory and pleasing, particularly whein the present weather and some of the delays are considered.

In regard to Mr. Maneke's interference, I will ask Mr. Ellem to contact him regarding the allesed interference as Mr. Maneke is now back at home.

I do not know what can be done in regard to the extracted items for the Aia Niver Bridge D.I.V's at this stage. I will ask Mr. Ellem to keep me informad as to any further delays in the supply of materials.

The Uasilau Society has been in difficulties for some time and losses have ieen occurring in the retailing (store) section of the business. These have been borne by the producers to date with consequent very small net returns to the copra and cocoa growers.

Though there have been faults in processing of produce a greater profit should have been shown than there has bgen to date.

On \(21 / 1 / 69\) a general meeting of the Uasilau Society was held and attended by myself, a Co-operative assistant and an Agricultural officer. When it was disclused that the store has lost approximately \(\$ 8,000\) (in fact almost all of the share capital) since the inception of the Society, it was decided by the members to close the store for 6 months and compare producer profits without the drain of the retail section.

If it is decided to start a retail store again this will be a completely separate business to the producer co-operative.

After discussion some ideas were given to the people for improving produce quality and transport methods.

In regard to the loans most of the settleri have now refused to accept them and it is hoped that such a long delay (up to 3 years) will not occur with any future loans for developments such as Malasi.

The patrol was a short one and Mr, Wilem has submitted some usefu: but general comment. As far as the objects of the patrol are concerned from my own knowledge and baokground of the area \(I\) do not conaider thesi were adequately carried out. There wore no patrol instruetions with the ropost. Whe gave Mr. \(311 e m\) his instructions and precisely what was he to do?

Road survey and \(\lambda_{a}\) nd queriea were listed as objects. Two long outstanding mittors in the area are the Ulanole/Huau road - an approved and frundcd Rural Development Project and the amle airgtrip. To a cortain extent tictwo projeots are linked because ontinual damage is being done to the Sule airstrip by water that runs on it aeross ane down it from the existing Ulamona/Nuad road.

Hy file reierence 4-3-2 bears ample reference to my Aisatiafaction with progress on the Sule airatrip. The Diatrist Airport Inspector has continually insisted the work requirod is only minor. The 0.I.C. Swasse consistentiy said it war difficult and tha people fin the area did not particularly want the aixatrig. Accompanted by O.I.c. Hwasse, MXKINX and the Distriet works ofricor I imppeeted the airatrip on 22 nd December 1968 and elearly indicated the firist taak on the Nuau road project was to roroute it around the SULS airgtrip and keep watez off the strip. Action, not further examination, was required. I undesstood jocent laek of action was because of staff shortage. In commenting on Ewasse patrol Mo. 6 I auggested CPO Hurn should be moved te the Makanai area. I conelder sou have other staff availabie who covid bo moved up for a specific job:

Prygress to the 7 th larch, as discussed in the writers earlier reports, consisted of:-
1. The cons muction of 25 soncrete \(18^{\prime \prime}\) pipes.

3. Warking the position for the ten piers.

The onl equipinent which was available for this work and for the work required to complete this wharf consists of;
1. one chzin saw.
2. one spirit level.
3. four spries.
4. three pipe moulds.

The ten logs and thirty pipes were all brought to the sicht by usire bush cane and man pover.

Progress to the end of this patrol consisted of;
1. The ten piers were positioned and sheaved in \(18^{\prime \prime}\) pipes with concrete poured into the suace between the logs and the pipes, thus sealing the logs from contac由 with the salt water. Bolts were also positioned in the top of the piens for the purpose of securing the main bearers.
2. The main bearers to support the decking were cut to length.
3. Work commenced on the causeway.
his progress was pleasing and some what surprising. As the ten kwil logs had to be lifted, placed in position and forced dowm into tho sand by men uning only bush cane, this obviously involved difeiculties;
1. Constructing a solid platform over the wharf si ht on which to work.
2. Standing the logs up without having them driet out of position.
3. Working the logs into the sand to a depth of up to 12 feet.

Additional decking has been ordered but shipping problems heve delayed delivery of same.

It is estimated by the writer thet the construction of this whar will be nearing completion by the end of April. This will dopend on the delivery of the extra deckins and the \(5 / 3^{4}\) anger which has been on order since the 20t Tebruary.

a 2. ROADS.

At the end of Ewasse Patrol No. 7 of 1968/69, the writers last atrol in this area, the roads which had been construeted were in good condition with the exception 0; two ares requiring culverts on the road from portion \(\mathbb{N} 0.512\) to Salelubu.

Twenty months ar the men from Silanga worked for four months in mud and water above their knees and since then, in drier conditions, for over a year on these roads. For this a period, with the excedrin of two months, these people have been voluntry workers. Their efforts to-date have been outstanding and it is expected that this will be the case in the future.

\section*{can happen to the road constructed in the swampy area, adjacent} to Lasibu, if used when wet. They therefore requested shat "All persons in this area not to use this road during rain or afterwards whilst wet! The villagers efforts are therefore not encouraged when these requests are egnored, resulting with the road being extensively damaged, as was the case with the Lasibu to Silanga road which was used during the peak of the North West monsoonal season.

From the 10 th March to date 24 men have worked six days a week in an effort to repair the damage done to this road. The road is still not completely repaired.

It is therefore obvious that these villagers would, as they are, seek any and every possible excuse to avoid as much as possible of this road work as they can.
3. TOOTS AND MATERTATS.

This matter is becoming confusing with the tools and equipment arriving for the Ala river eros ing, read work tools which are arriving addressed to P.W.D. Salelubu and Tools and equipment arriving for the Housing projects at Salelubu. It thus is very easy for i ems to be misplaced and to avoid this much care is being taken to keep this problem under control.

The O.I.C., Erase, will be advised to continue an educative programme pointing out the need for speaifie areas to eater for potential development and in order to attract capital to the development.
I. Fill be requesting the Department of Lands as to tho possibility of arranging the swap of some Adaini.atrwtion land already purchased for Bala if this approach can assist. From your report I believe, however, that land shortage is nt t the point in question, out rather lack of positive developyent of the aron already gained.

Your situation report is of intareat, and I note specifically the references to "Kivung" influence in tho Fast Nakanai on page 50 However, you neglected to say in what villages. Please advise on this point.

An adequate report of a well conducted, if unsuccessful, patrol. Camping allowance and travelling allowance claims are being processed and will be forwarded to you and to Treasury for payment to you shortly.

\section*{PATROL REPORT.}

\section*{INTRODUCTION}

The patrol was mounted primarily for the investigation assessment and survey of some 3,100 acres of land near BAIA Villago, Fast Nakanai, being the Site for a Port and Hartour for the Open Bay Area.

The land required was investigated and assessed as required, however it was not surveyed, due to the refusal of the owners to sell and their refuscl to allow a Survey Party to enter the Land, cut bound aries and Survey the Isyd.

There was no hustility in the attitude of the people in refusing to sell, or to allow survey. They were simply of the opinion that they had sold suffiehent land to the Administration, and they thought that the land should only be surveyed if it was going to be sold.

\section*{The Land Investigation \(R^{\prime}\) port is submitied separatelt.}

The people have adequate land well in ezcess of their future foreseeable needs, and this land which is required for the Harbour Site is too hilly for cultivation, and fronts directly onto Mangrove Swamp. It is furthermore, the furthest land from the land owners village.

It is difficult to fully appreciate the attitudes of the owners in refusing co sell this land, which would seem to be of littie use or value to them, and for which they have no need.

The provision of a good, all weather harbour, together *ith suffieient land for Port \(F\) acilities is essential to the economic development of the entire Open Bay area. Timber Rights have been purchased over the majority of the area. In gddition some 20,000 acres have been purchased for Agricultural "elopment.

The Bay is so situated, that in the North West Season te there are extremely heavy seas and surfs on the exposed beaches. It is also reported that Powell \(\mathrm{H}_{\mathrm{a}}\) rbour (also on Open Bay) is also refidered ineffective during ihis season. It was thought that the sheltered point near Baia Village (Rangambol Point) together with nearby points and sheltering reefs, would provide a solution to the problem of a suitable anchorage, and together with the construction \(f\) of suitable loading and storage facilities, and a road along the coast would solve the probleza of effective exploltation of the untapped resources of this area.

A Forestry Portable Field Radio was taken on the Patrol to maintain contact with HOSKINS, but due to freak we ather conditions this was ineffective. At times Hoskins could be heard, and instructions relayed, but effective contact was not made until the Patrol returned to

Ulamona.

\section*{SITUATION REPORT}

The East Nakanai (like the Nakanai) may for Administrative convenience be described as containing three separate sicuations involving separaje types of people.
1) The resettlement areas of UASILAU, SILANGA and SALSmMaLASI. Salelubu DAS Station, with access port at LASIBU.
2) The coastal village people inhabiting the coastal plain from ?ariobi to BAIA.
3) The Mengen and Kol peoples inhabiting the Central Interior of the Island in the East Nakanai, access to these people is tixpugh ULAMONA.

Whis patrol visited only two villages in the East Nakanai - UBILI near ULAMONA Mission, and BAIA on the eastern extremity of the district, and one village in the Coastal Bainings Census Division of the East New Britain District MataNakunai.

In each village there were obvious signs of material prosperity and ready availability of cash from the sale of land and timber rights, which placed them far above average in economic status. For examole in \(1967 \$ 53,700 \mathrm{was}\) paid out at MATANAKUNAI, and \(\$ 69,000\) paid out at NANTAMBU for purchase of land; timber rights sales provided additional cash to all villages,

This prosperity manifests itself mainly in consumer goods such as outboard motors and dinglies, and in other material comforts. There are signs that the outhoard motors will be difficult to maintain and keep running, so that in effect the economic advantage of these people is only temporary, as there is littla or no re-investment of the money to create permanent improvenents, or to earn more money.

The major exeption to this rule is UBILI village near ULAMONA which has extensive coconut plantings, three copra dryers, and (through the efforts of the Catholic Mission) improved housing to a standard that could well put it in the position of being the best model village in the Territory.

As a joint project between the mainland villages, villages on Lolobau Island, local plantations and the Catholic Mission a light aircraft airstrip has almost been completed ne near UBILI. The surface is hard cororias and black pumice, and the strip is shortiy to be inspected by the Di.strict Airport Inspector.

Communications along the coast are by ship, and devend apon good wharves and anchorages. A wharf is in the course of construction at LASIBU to serve the Settlement Areas inland. A good concrete wharf exists at BIALLA Plantation, with a trolley line to aid ease of handiligg (howver there is no wharf at BWASSE Base Camp, and road link to BIALLA is poor). A solid timber wharf exists at ULAMONA, with a Railway line, and locomotive to assist loading.

Large areas of land have been purchased by the Administration along the coast, and timber rights purchased over the area; where coastal outlets exist the situation for development is excellent. Eventually it is hoped that all coastal ports will be connected to the hinterland, and to each other by a good network of economic roads.

There is a fonctional light aircraf ai trip at EWASSE, in addition to the recently completed striy at UBILI.

The resettlement schemes at UASILAU, SILANGA, SALEMALASI, and SALELUBU Agricultural Centre were not visited curing tnis patrol.

With the exception of UBILI village, where there are extensive coconut plantings how coming into bearing, and three recently constructed copra dryers, none of the east coast appear to be making any serious attempt to increase production in the area. I was also told at UBILI that people had attempted to plant cocoa, put that the soil was unsaitable.

There are approx 2 acres cleared for coconuts at BAIA, and a similar token effort at MATANAKUNAI.

There are plantations at BIALLA and LOLOBAU Island, under European management. They appear to be well run and prosperous There is a small (origanally 120 acres, but now extending plentings to 560 acres) plantation at Matanakunai, under European Management. This plantation is extremely hampered by the lack of a suitable anchorage on the exposed surf beaches during the North West season.

There are a number of small logging leases along the coast, cutting logs for export to Japan.

At ULAMONA Mission there is a well managed and set up sawmill. The equipment appears to be old, but is all functional and in working order (unusual for sawmills in this country), including a locomotive with trucks used to haul sawtimber to the wharf, along railway lines. The sawmill staff are highly skilled and achieve a high rate of recovery from logs, and the consistent high and uniform quality of ULAMONA sawn timeer, is again a by-word throughout the district.

Much land has been purchased along this cosst inorder to increase the productivity and economic output of the area. Plantation Depelopment and resettloment are both warranted as a means of obtaining Capital, Skills, and Personnell.

The areas purchased are the best, flat coastland, and mainly volcanic of uniformiy high fertility. They areq-
(a) East Nakanai
(1) BAKADA - 25,240 acres inland from Cape Deschamp.
(2) VAMBAU - 275 acres near Nantambu Village,
\(\left.\begin{array}{ll}\text { (3) BaUO BaUO } & 845 \text { acres } \\ \text { (4) GIO } & 275 \text { acres }\end{array}\right\}\) West of Baia Village.
(b) Coastal Bainings (Open Bay)
(1) KABOKU \(-22,000\) acres South West of Matanakunai.
(2) Matanakunai Plantation - 565 acres.
(3) PORELL HARBOUR - unknown acr age est. 3,000 acres.

Suggested Port Sites have been:-
(1) NANTAMBU - as the anchorage in the vicinity of the BAKADA lands. This area known as NAMBAU was purchased.
Nantabu is a suitable harbour in the North West, although small, however it is said to be exposed during the South East season.
(2) POWELL HARBOUR - as an outlet for KABOKU and the lands between Powell Harbour and the TORIU River. This has been purchased; however Powell is said to be exposed in the North West.
(3) BAJA HARJOUR (Rangambel Point) - adjacent to Baia Vill.
- Wett of KABOKU \& East of GIO and BAUO BAUO? AS AN ALL WEATHER Harbour for Li. Open Bay area. As aforesaid it was the object of this Patrol to investigate this ares with a view to purchase.

The investigation was carried out, however the owners of the Port Site at 3 aia have refused te sell, or lease this land. They claim that they have already sold tax most of their flat arable land to the Administration, and akso a Hoarbour site at Powell Harbour. They also state, on the grounds of personal observation, that Baia is not sultable for a herbour site (there are too many reefs, they say). They are quite insistent of this and are openly incredulaus of claims that Baia Herbour is equal to, or superior to Powell Harbour.

These arguments put forward by the Matanakunai people, the owners of the land, appear to be unfounded and irrational:the land is neither Plat nor arable, End is situated furthest wax from Surveys indicate that Baia is superior to Powell.

They do not appear convinced by talk of the proposed developments at Baia, and are openly sceptical. Fossibly some more positive proof of planning and planned development could change their general attituds. (Ieannot suggest that it be done through the Local. Government Council, as the Matanakunai's people belong to no Council).
J.t seems probable that the reluctance of the Matanakunal peoplo to sell the Baia Harbour land, is influenced by the Baia people. The 3 aia people are not owners, but they have married a smail nuaber of the actual owners, and have obtained permissive occupancy, or usufructuary rights over this land. A small number of the owners are resident at Baia with tieir spouses and families.

The Baia people then, are gardening, and residing nn land owned by the Kaboku Clan of Matanakunai. The Bala people have land of their own West of GIO and BAUO BAUO and East of the alienated land BAKADA, however this is reputedly swampy, and they do not wish to move their pleasant village site to any other place.

While the Baia people do not wish to move, it seems to me unlikely that the Matanakunai people would sell the iand from under their feet.

\section*{POLITICAL}

The attitude of all the village people visted was friendly, courteous, cooperative and helfful.

Despite the refusal of the Matanakunai perple to sell or allow survey of the Baia Harbour land, when the patrol was forced by a storm to stay overnight without camping equipment, the fir people were extremely hospitable and generous.

Mokolkol people are living with thie Kabblau people at Matanakunai with no apparent signs of friction.
has some The "Kivung" movement, headed by Lima of Hoskins
in thee area, and some money was recently sent to LTMA.
The Nakanai Council has only peripheral influence at Baia, and Matanakunai is still administered under the Luluai and Tul Tul system from Lassul Bay.

Some of the younger men have knowledge of the Melanesian Independence Front as informal discussion elucidated, but none are actively involved, or much interested - my discussions with these people emphasised thet "United we stand, divided we fall - Unity is strength \({ }^{\text {. }}\).

The Local MHA, John Maneke is very approachable, and seems to be strongly antim. I.F., pro-Mission, pro-European, and anti-Africian in his attitudes. This is John Maneke's area, and he is a strong influence towards constructive development, in cooperation withe the Administration, the Missions and Business.

\section*{SOCIAL.}

Traditional systems of social organisation and social Control appear to be breaking down. old legends, dances and ceremonies have been forgotten or discarded (partly through Mission influence, and partly through Cargo Cult), and have been replaced by imports, mainly from the Gazelle Peninsular.

Villages are generally clean, but the standard of housing (apart from UBILI) is genera ally poor, but improving a small amounts of awn timbers supplement the traditional materials.

On the other hand, UBILI village, adjacent to ULAMONA Mission Saw Mill, has permanent improvements of such a quality and standard chat it must rate as one of the best "model" villas in the Territory. The village has been laid out in streets of individual allotments and drained roads, and over 30 houses of a well-designed low cost style have been constructed from concrete, awn timber, iron roof atc.

The plans were drawn up, construction supervised, and the scheme financed originally by the Catholic Mission. The people were advanced individual loans, and the mission ports that the majority have repaid these loans, by instalments from cash earned as labourers at ULAMONA Sawmill. The majority of these homes are painted.

The improved housing has lead to improved health, and the Mission Huspital at ULAMONA reports that the UBILI people are not as subject. to seasonal illness, 'flu. pneumonia as the people in villages with unimproved housing.

Health on the coast, however is generally good, diet supplemented by sea foods and the people well built, chanlooking and healthy.

\section*{Special Patrol part East and Central Nakanai}

Forwarded find patrol report submitted by Mr. T. Heuston A.D.O. covering a special patrol to part of the central Nakanai, specifically for the investigation into ownership of lard between \(P\) ane Bay and Uasilau/Silanga.

The investigation was satisfactorily completed and Mr. Heustoa's report gives a complete coverage of his activities during this period.

In respect of the section of land known as "Sibu Lakova", this situation is arising more and more often as land purchase investigations proceed through areas which have been under determination by the Lands Titles Commission. As stated by Mr. Heuston, this small area was delineated, but subsequently claims are now held over it by two opposing clans.

In forwarding the investigation report, I am recommending that this area be excluded from the purchase and further attempts will be made to see if the peoples concerned can reach a compromised solution. I do not believe that this can again be brought before the Commission which has already decided on ownership. There has been until now no claim or appeal against Mr. Read's earlier decision. The area concerned is very small in size, and does not gravely affect the area investigated for alienation.

It is however now a small island in the centre of Administration land for which little real use can be made, but which can be alienated at a time when a solution as to ownership is established locally.

Mr. Heuston's comments on the political, economic and social life of the \(\mathbb{N}_{\text {akanai }}\) interesting and adequate.

Camping allowance claims have been processed and are being forwarded through Treasury to Mr. Heuston now in the southern Highlands.

It was explained to the parties that this land had beer. the subject of a Native Lands Commission hearing, and the decision of the Lands Commissioner, which was based on evidence given to him by all parties at the time of the hearing, which was in 1960, after intensives investigation by Mr. Read into the Land Ownership of the area. Accordingly there was the faintest possible hope of aver being awarded by the Lands Commission in contradiction to the original decision, and that it would be far beytter to skittle any slight quibbles privately, amongst themselves rather that to attempt to attack the original decision.

This the Ila - Lose and A1lili - Vol Glans originally agreed to do. However due to several loud mouthed individuals who stireed up some 111 feeling, when the patrol was ready to depart for Lasibu to return to Hoskins, it was approached by angry deputations from both the Ilau-Loso and Ailili-Veli groups who were demanding that the matter be settled in Court. With time on my side i believe that I could have again calmed everybody down, and got them to agree to pribvately compensate, when the land was sold however I had to meet a boat schedule.

I have prepared claims in the Land Commission on behalf of both groups, howver before they are finally submitted I consider that a further approach be made to the grouped to explain the undesirability of bringing the matter to court:
(a) This will hold up the purchase of this land until the question of ownership is settled, and ac one willget paid until it is setiled;
(b) Development will be held up in consequence of the land dispute and failure to sell the land, with adverse effects to everybody.

It is also most undesirable from the administrative viewpoint that any challenge suceed against Commissioner Read's decisions, as the entire structure of Administration purchase

File of how oust trenail! Commissioner Read's decisions in respect or who are the owners of the Native Land concerned, and who was entitled to payment. If a small quibble in respect of portion of Commissioner Read's decision suceeds, it then throws the way open for every disgruntled claimant to attempt to obtain a fresh decision favourable to them for purely selfish reasons with no regard for the stability of land tenure and the general development of the area.

Forderce hand files Bell.
If the Administration's new Bill in respect of Ownership of Administration occupies land, is passed by the House of Assembly and becomes law, the damaging effect of such minor quibbles succeeding will have been elimintited, all that will be open to prospective claimants will be a civil action for damages against those persons who they claim were falsely paid for the land, and the result of such action will not affect the Administration's tenure of the land.

However, until this 3111 becomes law, the entire structure of Administration occupation and ownership of 1 and depends essentially that there was no error in establishing who were the correct owners of land, and ensuring that these correct owners were properly paid and legally signed owe \(z\) the \(l\) and. Ir tiflis case as Comr ssioner Rend's decision is taken as correctly and legally establishing ownership of the land, and there has been no private agreement amongst the parties which could (by native custom) waive all or part of his decision, it will lead to a great deal of confusion and difficulty if the decision is challenged, and the challenge, (possibly due to new evidenced evidence not available at the time of the original hearings) succeeds.

POLIPICAL-
The area is politically part of the Nakanai Local Government Council Area. The Council is strong and pervasive throughout the area. The people perform much valuable and economic volunt ary work for the Council on community projects, such as roads and bridges and the Lasibu wharf.

The value of such work depends essenti:lly on the quality of the advise and supervision of the work, and it would be a pity to let the good intentions and hard work of the neopie be wasted and frittered away due to poor advise or i'aulty supervisioz.
For example I consider that much time has been wasted surfacing the Lasibu to Silunga road with pumice stone which washes away in the silghtest downpour, instead of using heavy river stone, or river grayel which is also avallable in the area for road surfacing.

It must be remerobered that the people do this work voluntarily, by rotation of villages and as they akre have work to do in their own viliage and on their own blecks it is important that their time be well used, well supervised and not frittered away simply because it is not paid for. It is important that the valuable pool of voluntary labour and good will is not wasted, and that the people can see rapid and positive results for their hard work. This area is one of the few places in this District (excluding Kandrian and Gloucester) where voluntary labour is a major component of any public wuiks project.

There is some feeling by the Uasilau-silanga sattlers that the Council headquarters should be atLasibu, or Uasilau-silanga, this is indicative of the feeling by the settlers that they are the only group achieving positive development in contradistinction to the "lazy" coastal people from Tarobi to Baia. These are normal parnchial feelings indicative of a traditional rivalry, which with greater contact and greater development in the area (by tive opening of the Sale-Malasi Settlement blocis) whill be forgotten and become absorbed into new problems.

The Catholic Mission has a strong influence at Silanga, the neople attending church assiduaously, daily.

The local Member of the House of Assembly, John Mazeke is from Silanga. \(e\) is outspoekenly anti-Mcianesian Independence Front, and is pro-Administration and promMission in his attitudes and stat ements. He is very approachable, and tho Distriet is fortunate in having an amenable man of his capacity and type. \(\overline{\text { on }}\)

ECONOMIC
Uasilau - Silunga Settlement Blocks (some 500 blocks) bared on Cocao, with the D.R.S.F. Station at SALELUBU in the centre of the blocks is the mafor undertaking. Coffee is planned for the blocks, and possibly coconuts with the extension towards the coast with the purchase of the Lasibu-Ala River land.

Road routes to the coast are the Uasilau-Nalo Road, and the Silanga-Lasibu fibad. With the completed construction of a small ships wharf at Lasibu, and the present under construction of the Ala River low leval crossing between asilau \& Silanga at Saleltbu, it is to be hoped that permanent all weather communications will be established.

Cocot is under production from fermentaries based on Cooperative Societies at Uasilau and Silanga.

On the coast at the villages of Taro and Pasusu some attempt has been made to plant coconuts under traditional tenure, however the blocks marked out for each family vary considerably in size and are not regarded as being economically sized for the support of a family. Unfortunately there cannot be much improvement under tiraditional land tenure systems with seattered holdings.

SOCIAL
Life throughout the entire area has changed considerably from its traditional tempo.

4 he settlers at Uasilau and Silange live a very organised scheduled and productive life between their various duties and obligations to the Council (reads \& bridges), community projects \({ }_{5}\) D.A.S.F. plantings, block improvements; Mission, church attendances etc.

The coastal village people do not live at such an organis ed tempo, however th rillagres are well set out, well kept and new coconut plantings are everywhere in evidence. There is some small production from coconuts linted for the first time some yeas ago.

The people througout arr healthy, cleanskinned, alert and well fed, friendly and helpful. It is a pleasant area in which to work, and the people are more amenable than is usual in coastal areas of long contact.

\section*{EWASSE PATROL No.11年 1968/69}

The progress shown on the wharf and roads is heartening and with the interest shown in Political discussion further supports the view that these people are far more progressive than the remainder of the NAKANAI.

I am advising Mr. Elem not to threaten the Malasi people. Admittedly it is disheartening to see cocoa overgrown, but the general disinterest shown is largely the fault of the Administration.

As has been mentioned in previous reports and at District Coordinating Committee meetings, the long delay in proceeding with the SALE-MALASI scheme is the basis of most of the discontent.

The people obviously will not do any work in the aras until they find out if the scheme is going ahead.

In fact the cocoa that is not being cleared is on Administration land and the people do not know as yet if the Administration intends leasing it back to them.

For an officer of this Department to say that they would not get larger bl nocks if the present ones were not looked after is exceeding his authority, though he may make such a recommendation.

I am of the opinion that the Sale-Malasi people should be gently handled for the present.

Mr. Elem will be advised to consult a dictionary when composing future reports.

1. Progress on Central Nakanai Roads.

\begin{abstract}
During the past five weeks continuous falls of rain have hampered the men in their efforts \(t\) continue with the work on these roads.
\end{abstract}

This has resulted with little booing achioved. The only real achievement is that even with the heavy rain falls the Lasjibu to Silanga to Salelubu road has been kept in a servicable condition.

On the list May,
1969 a tractor with traylor arrived at Lasibu to be used for this road work. 'this will undoubtably have incouraging effects on these Central Nakanai villagers.

Work on these roads is now being supervised by \(\mathbb{W r}\). P. del Hum Cadet Patrol Officer who will be submitting a Special report this week to cover the progress on these roads.
2. Iasibu Wharf.

Progress on this council project has also been hampered by the prolonged wet season. However during the two days of this patrol, that the writer spent at Silanga, he was able to secure \(50 \%\) of the decking to the piers.

Weather permitting this wharf should be completed within three weeks.

4. Malasi, Inspection of Cult Activities.

The cult outsbreak in the llalasi area was investigated in January this year. This patrol visited the area for the purpose of ensuring that the cult activities had ceased to exist.

General discuscions were held during the patrols stay in the area. \(\mathbb{N}\) oohing indicating further cult activities was noted. The only fact that/concerm was the condition of the cocoa blocks belonging to these people. The cocoa blocks in \(60 \%\) of the cases, have not unattended since the January patrol. Ferns, shrubs and vines grow in a tangled mass amongst the cocoa. On these blocks the cocoa is being harvested but that is all.

These villagers were informed that the blocks were going to be inspected on llonday the 23th of April. Then on this Monday it was 1000 hours before the majority of these villagers made an effort to commence work on their blocks.

The proposed
sub-division plan of the Sale Malasi land purchase was
discussed with these villagers. They were informed thel if they were not capable of looking after their present small cocoa blocks then the Government would not consider giving them a larger block. This resulted with the villagers meking a greater effort to clean their cocoa blocks during the afternoon.

At night general meetings were held during which many points of Goverment were discussed. These people showed a great interest in these talks.

It is some time since an hriculture patrol visited this area. The writer is sure that a patrol of three or four days spent at lilalasi by an Agricultural officer would result with these villagers taking a greater interest in their present cocoa plantings. This has been discussed with r. A. Grant, Agricultural officer in charge of the Nakanai area Bast of the Ala river, of of Salelubu.

After discussion with the councillor for the area, Tavis Ogola of Sulu village the writer feels sure that this matter will be discussed at the next council meeting of the Nakanai Council.

This rule was explained to the villagers ocncerned and it was stressed that it was not the intention of the council, when making this rule, to use it as a means of reducing the number of pigs owned by the lakanai vil agers but to improve the general hygiene of the villages.

It is unlikely thet
this had any effect on the villagers and it is very likely that unless their/can roam free, they will kill the pigs.
2. Sights for village water projects on this years estimates were inspected and insttan of springs creeks were found. This will lead to difficulties during the construction of this project.


This was one of the
main purposes for this patrol.
In all villagers
visited general meetings were held during which Gove:mment and other political facets were discussed.

The interest shown by
the villagers concemed vas very pleasing. After the meeting had completed the discussion it was normal for the writer to be asked two or three questions. In ond case it looked as though the patrol was not goins to include sale in these meetings and the villagers expressed their interest by asking if they cocld attend the meetins that was going to be held in the nexu village. This was the writers plan.

It is very incourageing
to see this interest by the villagers.

B BCONOMIC.

discussed in Special report 110.4 . covers the lilalass Rural development. The only other poin of interest arose at Kaiamu viliege. In t is village the villagers requested assistancs in establishing their own Fermantary and drier for cocon. They were advised to bring their requests to the Department of Agriculture, Stock and Pisheries at Solelubu.

BDUCATIOH AND HBATMI.
Both of these social interests have been in discussion for some time with the Sale dalasi villagers, the Government and the Nakanai Council.

the Department of Health states that an Aid Pos is Orderly will again be posted to the Malasi Aid post.

There is no school
in the Sege, Kaiamu, Sulu, Malasi, Sale area. This point iss to be investigated by the writer in the near fuss are in connection with the approval of the Sub-division plan of the Sale Dalasi land purchase.
xittik the introduction
of fees at the Silanga Hospital has resul oed with the majority of tine settlers at Silanga avoiding the Hospital unless absolutely necessary.

This was discussed during the general meeting held at Silanga.

IAN AND ORDER.
Generally this is good. During this patrol fourteen cases were held for offecnes against the Nakanai Council Pig rule.

Each individual officer will present his own viev of the poople and we should then obtain a better ovorall pioture. P1case give this full consideration.

Aitashed please find a report of a patrol conducted by Mr. P. HURN, Crdet Patrol Officer, to part Gi tise Central NAKANAI.

The main object of the Patrol was to further tha road construction programme in the UASILAU-SILANGA area.

This aspect is proceeding satisfactorily but the report, and others from EWhSSE point out the fact that officers of this Department are becoming tco anvolved in carrying out of functions that fall within the province of technical Departments.

For some time the UASILAU-SILANGA roads have occupied this officer practically full time and though a worthy project has not allowed of his receiving the wide training that is essential at this stage of his career.

I am not proposing that this state of affairs be altered immediately, but feel that as soon as the roads are in a passable state he be given more time at Ewasse and Hoskins on other duties.

I think that the time is approaching, particularly in view of the proposed SALE-MALASI development, for P.W.D. to take over road works in the whole SILANGA-MALASI area.

The patrol was a useful one and though the report is brief little more could have been added without reiterating that which has been mentioned in the numerous previous reports or this area. Whilst an officer is constantly in the area and frequent visits are made from Ewasse and Hoskins it is not expected that patrol reports will contaia mich other chan changes noted and an occasional review ot the whole situation.

The Patrol was conducted in the Uasilau - Silanga area, for the purpose of roads and bridges (repairs and building) and the checking of arrival of equipment for the ALA river crossing, against D.I.V.'s.

The patrol commenced on the 17th of April, 1969, this section was completed on the 6 th of Mpy, 1969 , to be continued on the 8th of May, 1969.

The whether conditions of the patrol were bad in the first weeks, due to rain and thunder stress storms, which subsided in the last week, the conditions were then favourable.

\section*{SUBJECT}

The equipment that had been received, was at LASIBU, the store at the rest house and mainly at SALELUBU, where the ALA river crossing will be built.
The building of the crossing is expested to commence within several weeks.

Work on the wharf at LASIBU was in very slow progress during the two weeks of rain. In this time the main bearers were bored and placed into position on the pilons.

La er the cross bearers were placed and fixed into position with nine inch deck spikes. At this stage most of the decking is on and nailed into position.

The causeway has been brought back \(6-8\) feet from the pilons, the boxing for the end of the causeway is now ready for the cement to be pourdd. The main part of the cement will be poured on this coming Friday, which will leave the setting of the same for the weekend.

At this stage there is one main bearer short, but it ie hoped that this will be on the site within the next few days. There being one bearer short is due to two new pilons, which were added to the main structure. If toss bearer is not available for any lengtin of time the completion of the wharf will be delayed.

Roads in the area are now being Laintained, as the last period of rain softened the surface of the road to such an extent that when the tractor from D.A.S.F. - SALE. 'BU travelled to and fro, with nesesary cargo for building programs, cut badly into the rose road leaving wheel ruts and pot holes.

Now that fine whether is with us, the road has had sufficient time to dry out. the road from SILANGA to SALELUBU will be formed with a blade-terrace within the next few days. Also all drains on this section of road will be cleared of silt.

With this the concept of a shower block and cement table, for the washing of cloths, of which there would be one in each village,. These shower and washing blacks will be built if the people desire them as they will have to raise the money for these amongst themselves. The price of these units is considered to be at \(\$ 250\) to \(\$ 300\).
