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AWARD-WINNING FILMMAKER, REGENTS' LECTURER TO SCREEN SHATTERING OF SILENCES MAY 30 AT UCSD

Award-winning filmmaker Stanley Nelson will serve as Regents' Lecturer in the Department of Ethnic Studies at the University of California, San Diego May 29-June 1.

There will be a screening of his film, Shattering the Silences: Minority Professors Break into the Ivory Tower, at 6:30 p.m. May 30 in Robinson Auditorium, School of International Relations/Pacific Studies.

Nelson will introduce the film and a reception for the filmmaker will follow the screening. The event is free and open to the public.

The 90-minute documentary explores issues of faculty diversity in American higher education in the mid-1990s, focusing on the experiences of eight minority scholars in the humanities and social sciences at a wide range of institutions.

Nelson has more than 20 years of experience as a producer, director, and writer of documentary films and videos. His television credits include producer for PBS programs such as Listening to America and What Can We Do About Violence, both with Bill Moyers. He has done a number of productions for the Smithsonian Institution.

Among the filmmaker's independently produced films for which he was awarded Golden Eagles by the Council for International Non-theatrical Events (CINE) are The Story of Madame C. J. Walker, about the life and times of the African-American businesswoman who became the nation's first self-made woman millionaire, and Puerto Rico: Our Right to Decide, the story of competing visions for the future of Puerto Rico.

A graduate of the Leonard Davis Film School at the City University of New York, Nelson taught film production at Howard University in Washington, D.C. He has been a fellow of the American Film Institute, the New York Foundation for the Arts, and the Washington, D.C., Commission for the Arts.

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
