Thank you all for helping at the Oceanids Friday Café. You all helped to make it a success. We served over 250 people. Here on request is the New Orleans style bread pudding recipe that was served at Friday Café.

Piña Colada Bread Pudding

by Barbara Starkey

Combine and let soak until the bread becomes soft, no lumps:

- *1 10 ounce loaf stale french bread, crumbled (or 6 to 8 cups of any bread crumbs)—Let the bread air dry for at least 2 weeks.
- *1 1/2 cups of piña colada mix
- *2 1/2 cups milk
- *1/2 cup butter, melted

The mixture should be moist but not soupy. Then add:

- *2 cups sugar
- *3 eggs, unbeaten
- *2 tablespoons vanilla (brandied vanilla is best)
- *1 #2 can crushed pineapple, juice and all

Pour into a buttered 9" x 12" baking pan. Refrigerate a few hours so the moisture is absorbed into bread. Place in a cold oven. Bake at 350°F for about 1 hour. Remove from oven. Mix together, then cover the pudding with:

- *1 cup coconut
- *1 cup brown sugar
- *1 cup coarsely chopped walnuts or pecans

Continue baking at 350° for 15 minutes until top is golden brown. The coconut will caramelize. Serve with a warm sauce. A guest in my home enjoys this rum sauce:

Rum Sauce

Cream together over a medium heat until all is absorbed:

- *1/2 cup butter
- *1 1/2 cups powdered sugar

Remove from the heat and blend in:

*2 large egg yolks (or 3 small or medium)

Stirring constantly, gradually pour in:

*1/2 cup rum (to taste) (any complimentary fruit juice or liqueur may be substituted.)

Makes 16 to 20 servings.

VENICE REVISITED by Sylvia Bal

Everything had gone smoothly so far. I had managed to sleep on the plane. I had been alert and had remembered enough Italian to get to the train station in Milan and onto the train to Venice. Then it happened. While I was negotiating my first set of steps on arrival, my suitcase took off on its own, heading straight for the Grand Canal. So much for a poised entrance into the enchanting world of this floating town.

A kind commuter intercepted the suitcase in its course, and both suitcase and I squeezed onto the packed vaporetto. It was five o'clock on a balmy late June afternoon. Perfect timing! The canal was choppy with the activity of all types of boats. There were more gondolas than I had ever imagined possible, from utilitarian commuter ones to elegant red and gold trimmed limousine types. The whole scene was bathed in a golden light, reflecting off the windows of palaces lining the canal, the shiny black hulls of the gondolas and the tops of the choppy waves.

At the Accademia stop the crowd gently nudged me onto the landing and I followed the directions to my hotel. After some narrow alleys and a small steep bridge, I entered a secluded garden. It was the Italy I had dreamed of! The hotel, a seventeenth-century patrician villa, and its garden were bordered by small canals leading onto the Grand Canal. In the garden, filled with flowers and statues, friends awaited me with a cooler of prosecco, the italian version of champagne. My vacation had begun.

The following morning, after a wonderful breakfast served in the garden, I shouldered my camera bag and tripod and started to stroll. I discovered a Venice I did not know existed. On earlier visits I had been jostled by throngs of tourists on and around the Piazza di San Marco. I had been denied access to the Basilica because that earlier visit fell during the (according to church officials) indecent era of the miniskirt. In revenge I decided this time to see every church in Venice, except the Basilica.

Thus the church Santa Maria Gloriosa Dei Frari was the first one I walked into. Besides two impressive Titians, one can see a most beautiful Bellini triptych in the Sacristy. I found myself all alone there and lit a candle in thanks for this moment passed in beauty and peace.

To get to the Frari church from the Accademia area, I had strolled through a neighborhood of small side canals, narrow streets, stepped bridges and Campos (plazas) of assorted sizes. I had photographed gondolas at rest, a small market offering an unusual assortment of fish and a shop that sold intriguing carnival masks. I had an excellent lunch of garlicky pasta and a radicchio and arugula salad on the vast and near-empty Campo San Margherita.

Every day I choose a different neighborhood to explore. Posters pasted on walls all over town informed me of festivals, concerts and plays. That is how I found myself one day in the picturesque Campo di San Pietro watching a children's festival. They were playing all sorts of games that reminded me of my childhood. In one game, they had to guide large wooden hoops with the help of a small stick. The wobbly hoops seemed to have minds of their own and quite a few disappeared into the audience, to squeals of delight by non-participants.

In a corner of the square, a little girl was moping by herself. A puppeteer who was setting up his booth spotted her and had one of his puppets start an animated conversation with her. I was so mesmerized by their performance, I nearly missed making my most precious photo of the trip.

Venice is enjoying a revival of interest in the skills required in gondoleering. On the day of the children's festival, teenagers competed in brightly colored racing hulls, each one

having carved his own forcola, a wooden piece that guides the oar. A few days later, there was a race of gondolas along the Canale delle Fondamente Nuove and around the island of Murano, watched with great enthusiasm by a large crowd, mostly Venetians.

One night I attended a play under the stars in what seemed to be the courtyard of an abandoned factory, in the working class neighborhood of the Canale di Cannaregio. I understood very little, but loved the interaction of the audience, some of whom were hanging out of windows in neighboring homes, and one persistent stray dog who decided to steal the show.

Foregoing the vaporetto that night, I walked all the way back to the hotel, catching glimpses of beautiful ceilings and interiors through the Gothic or Romanesque-style windows of the ancient. I stood on a Rialto Bridge totally devoid of tourists at this hour of the night. While I savored a nightcap of cognac in the garden and listened to the water lapping at the steps of the landing, I realized I had irrevocably fallen in love with Venice.

My visit lasted only one week, but I somehow feel the city has become part of me. I never felt lost even when I was. If you keep walking, you eventually end up near water and a vaporetto. Along the way I would see many things to delight me and to photograph. With its soft light and its reflections, Venice is a photographer's paradise.

I had wonderful meals. In a small pub, I lunched on typical Venetian Cicchetti (bite-sized snacks of deep-fried zucchini flowers, squid, cuttlefish, etc.). I ate a memorable monkfish on the island of Burano, where the houses are all painted in brilliant colors and the women seemed to compete in the artistry of hanging laundry.

I visited many museums, went to a concert, lit candles in beautiful churches and even set foot on the Piazza San Marco, pausing only long enough to take the photo everyone would expect me to bring back.

On the last morning, I got up before sunrise to see the tide push up into the Grand Canal and watched the vaporetto, its lights still on, deliver the first load of commuters. I drank a double espresso in a corner cafe. Then, in the hazy early morning light over the lagoon, I spotted a gondolier silhouetted against the twinkling waves and took the photo I had hoped to bring back.

Scripps Professor Emeritus Charles S. "Chip" Cox has been awarded the Alexander Agassiz Medal from the National Academy of Sciences (NAS). Chip will receive his medal and prize during the NAS annual meeting on April 30th in Washington, D.C. Chip was honored "for his pioneering studies, both theoretical and instrumental, of oceanic waves, microstructure and mixing, and of electromagnetic fields in the ocean and in the seafloor."

Helene Keyssar, 57, a professor in the Community Department at UCSD, died February 5. Keyssar served as chair of the Communication Department from 1983 until 1986. She is survived by her husband, Tracy B. Strong, a professor of Political Science at UCSD, and her children.

When I first arrived at University House in 1980, Elizabeth Houseman was the secretary/manager, as she had been for the Chancellors McGill and MacElroy. She knew all there was to know about the house and the university, and guided me (new to the job as Chancellor's wife) past many pitfalls. Elizabeth managed University House cheerfully and efficiently and was a good friend. When she announced that she wanted to retire, I was terrified! Who could ever replace her?

I need not have worried, because Bernita Whiting proved to be equally outstanding in every way. She and her husband Jim had recently moved to San Diego from Watkins Glen, New York. At the time Bernita was working for the West Coast Office of Cornell University. Jim, who had been a radio commentator and cartoonist in Watkins Glen, was trying his hand as a free-lance cartoonist. Bernita says the cold winters in upstate New York prompted the move west.

Among her previous jobs, Bernita had worked in a bank and a florist shop. The skills acquired in those jobs proved useful at University House. I recall that after a dinner during which one of our guests experienced cardiac symptoms, Bernita purchased an oxygen tank for the house and took a CPR course. She was going to be prepared!

Quilting has always been an important hobby for Bernita, and she has created beautiful quilts for friends and family. My granddaughter still treasures a quilt Bernita made for her doll's bed. She also sews most of her clothes, and enjoys cooking. Other interests include tennis and hiking. Bernita and Jim have been active in the Oceanid's Hiking Group. In fact, on one Anza-Borrego hike Jim helped rescue Madeleine Rast who had broken a leg.

Jim's talents as a cartoonist are impressive. He and Bernita are in contact with other cartoonist and often attend cartoonist's conventions. Dick and I have saved the birthday and Christmas cards that they have sent us over the years as delightful personal mementos.

I'm not worried that Bernita will have time on her hands now that she is retired. She has always been a devoted parent, keeping in close touch with her five children and eleven grandchildren who are divided between the east and west coasts. When I talked with her recently, she commented that she and Jim have been having a lot of family visitors of late. I feel certain too that she will continue her interests and involvement with UCSD.
