

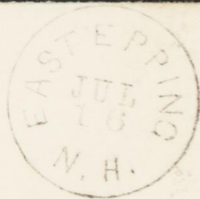

Articles of Agreement made the
day of November eighteen
hundred and seventy three between
A. B. Morse and E. W. Morse both of
the town of Amesbury, State of Massa-
chusetts, parties of the first part,
and E. W. Morse and A. J. Chase
both of the City of San Diego State of
California, parties of the second part.

The said parties of the first and
second part have agreed and by
these presents do agree to become
Cofpartners together in the buying
and selling of Carriages in the
manner following, to wit:

The parties of the first
part shall purchase all the
Carriages required for the business,
using their best skill, judgement
and discretion in such a manner
as shall best promote the profits of
the business, and shall ship the
same to the parties of the second
part at San Diego California.

The parties of the second
part shall take charge of and
sell said Carriages upon their
arrival in California, for the best
price to be obtained therefor,

using their best skill, judgement and discretion for the promotion of the profits of the business.

Neither party shall claim or be allowed any compensation for their time, while occupied in attending to any business growing out of this contract, but whenever the business shall so increase as to require considerable time of the parties of the second part in the sale of said carriages they shall then receive a reasonable compensation therefor.

All necessary expenses, such as costs of transportation, storage, breakage &c, and the profits and losses of the business shall be shared equally by said parties.

A full statement of all receipts and ^{assets & liabilities} expenditures shall be made by each party to the other six months from the date of this agreement and every six months thereafter.

This agreement shall continue and be in force

years from this date.

All moneys advanced by either party for the use of the Company shall bear interest at the usual Bank rate at the time and place where said moneys are advanced.

Anthony Morse, of Newbury, Mass., in the name of God amen, I being sensible of my own frailty and mortality, and being of perfect memory, do make this as my last Will and Testament, commanding my soul to God that gave it, and my body to the dust, in hope of a Joyful Resurrection—and as for my worldly goods, I dispose as folieth:—I give and bequeath to my son Joshua Morse, making him my lawful heir, all my housing and land, both upland and meadow with my Freehold, and privilege in all Common Land, *always provided*, that if the town of Newbury shall divide any part of the Common Land, that then one-half part of that land that belongeth to me, which cometh by virtue of my Freehold, shall be the lawful inheritance, of my son Benjamin Morse.

Also, I give to my son Joshua Morse, all my cattle and horses and sheep and swine and all my tools for the shoemaker's trade, as also, my cart wheels, dump forks, plows, harrow, yoke and chains, axes, hoes, forks, shovel, spade and grindstone. Also one feather bed, which he lieth on, with bolster and pillows, and a pair of blankets, coverlid and two pair of sheets, a bedstead and matt, one pot and a brass kettle, the best of the two kettles, and a bell metal skillet, two platters and a porringer and a drinking pot and two spoons, and the water pails, barrels and tubs.

All the above named, I give to my son Joshua and his heirs of his own body, lawfully begotten.

But, if my son Joshua Morse die, and leave no son of his own body, begotten lawfully, that then, all the above given to my son Joshua, shall return to the rest of my children, upon the payment of £40 in good money, to my son Joshua Morse's widow, besides what estate, she at any time may have and she the said widow shall enjoy the whole estate one-half year, before she shall surrender.

Also I give to my son Robert Morse and children £18. Also to my son Peter Morse and children, £12. Also to my son Anthony Morse's children, £12. Also to my son Joseph Morse's children £12. Also to my son Benjamin Morse, £12. Also to my daughter Hannah Morse Thurlow's children, £12. Also to my daughter Hester Morse Holmes, £12. Also to my daughter Lydia Morse Smith, £12. And to my grandson Richard Thurlow, one sheep. To my grandson, Robert Holmes, I give £5. Also agree that the remainder of my household goods, which is not particularly given to my son Joshua, in the former part of this my Will, to all my children equally, to be divided between them and my grandchildren whose parents are dead, namely: Anthony's children, Joseph's children, and Hannah's children. Also, I do by this Will allow and give liberty to my son Joshua Morse, that it is my desire to make sale and dispose of that land by the Pine Swamp which I had of Benjamin Jackman, and of that piece of land by John Atkinson's house, if he sees reason to do so. Also, I do by this my Will appoint my son Joshua Morse to be my sole executor—to pay all debts, and legacies by this my will given, and to receive all debts.

Also, I do appoint my loving and Christian friends, Daniel and Tristram Coffin and Thomas Noyes, to be overseers of this Will. Also, I do appoint my executor to pay my son Robert and my son Peter, one year after my death; and the others to be paid within three years; the place of payment to be Newbury. And my Will is that my son Benjamin shall have the one-half of all the Common Land when divided as above said.

In Witness Hereof, I, Anthony Morse, have hereunto set my hand seal, this 28th day of April, 1680.

CODICIL.

That, Whereas, I, Anthony Morse, in this my Will above said, have given one-half of all Common Land, if divided, to my son Benjamin. My meaning is that my son Benjamin shall have the one-half of my proportion of land, when divided, which lieth above Artichoke river, in the Upper Common. But my son Joshua to have all my right in the Lower Common. This is my mind and Will as witness my hand and seal, this 29th day of April, 1680.
