## Who's Community? Understanding Whiteness / **Unraveling Racism in the Oueer Community** Monday, April 24th, 5:00pm-7:00pm

In what ways do our queer communities mirror the whiteness of the dominant culture? How can white LGBTQI folks see and acknowledge that the very communities expected to provide comfort and safety may not provide it for LGBTQI people of color? How can we build anti-racist practice into daily life and move toward the richness of a diverse community?

Judy Helfand, invited community educator and consultant with a focus in issues of white privilege and racism, will facilitate this interactive workshop on dialogue and selfreflection using a tested model for understanding whiteness and unraveling racism.

Judy Helfand is a community activist, writer, educator, and consultant. She holds an M.A. in American Studies and Cultural Studies and teaches at Santa Rosa Junior College. Her scholarship is focused on understanding the relationship between dominant culture in the U.S. and white identity, which includes social justice issues in the U.S., especially the impact of the interlocking systems of race, class, gender, and sexual orientation in educational and other social institutions. She is also interested in the role of spirit and emotion in learning. A published author, her most recent works include Identifying Race and Transforming Whiteness in the Classroom with coeditor Virginia Lea (Peter Lang, 2004) and Understanding Whiteness / Unraveling Racism: Tools for the Journey (Thomson Custom Publishing, 2001) with coauthor Laurie Lippin.

"Understanding Whiteness Unraveling Racism makes whiteness and white privilege visible, revealing the cultural and institutional structures that keep white dominance in place. The book is both a workbook and reader, providing tools for examining what it is to be white in the U.S., for addressing fear and guilt as barriers to dismantling racism, and for identifying the small daily acts and larger organized movements that further the struggle for social justice and equality. It includes analytical essays, narratives, and poems from a variety of diverse perspectives. Numerous experiential exercises also aid readers in deepening learning through one's own experiences."

## Papadopoulos Lecture Featuring Prof. Kenji Yoshino's

UCSD's annual lecture in LGBT studies is funded by a bequest from the estate of Nicholas Papadopoulos '76, as well as by contributions made in his memory by members of his family. This year's selected speaker, Professor Kenji Yoshino, is Professor of Law and Deputy Dean for Educational Life at Yale Law School. His recent book, Covering: The Hidden Assault on Our Civil Rights, has been widely reviewed in the mass media. In Covering, Yoshino draws on personal experiences as a gay Asian American as well as legal scholarship to call for a redefinition of civil

rights strategies.

## The Trevor Project: Help for Suicidal Gay Teens

Suicide ranks as the third leading cause of death among young people between the ages of 15 and 29-outranked only by accidents and homicides. And for some teens the risk is even greater-national and state surveys indicate that gay and lesbian teens are far more likely than their heterosexual peers to attempt suicide.

While there are a number of hotlines and other resources for depressed teens in crisis, The Trevor Project stands out for its focus on gay and questioning teens. The project is a non-profit 501-3-c

headquartered in Beverly Hills, California, and operates the nation's only 24-hour suicide prevention helpline especially geared towards gay and questioning youth.

As part of its mission to aid in suicide prevention and to promote acceptance of gay and questioning teenagers, The Trevor Project also provides other services, including guidance and resources for teens, teachers, parents and educators.

## Coming Out: An Anthology of International Gay and Lesbian Writings by Stephan Likosky

## Coming Out of Shame by Gershen Kaufman and Lev Raphael

Most gay men and lesbians grow up learning that to be gay is to be sick, to be unnatural, to be a sinner. By adolescence, such negative attitudes have produced and reinforced a single, powerful emotion: shame, the feeling that you're inferior and judged as "bad" not for what you do, but for what you are—gay.

In Coming Out of Shame, Gershen Kaufman and Lev Raphael expose the role shame has come to play in gay and lesbian lives. Rarely discussed but vastly important, shame powerfully shapes individual's development of selfesteem, identity, and intimacythree areas where gay men and lesbians have been extremely vulnerable to the crippling effects of shame. Tracing the historical and cultural sources of gay shame, Kaufman and Raphael reveal how gay men and lesbians have internalized shame, resulting in self-loathing and selfdestructive behaviors.

The hallmark of shame is silence, and by breaking the silence around the dynamics of gay shame, Kaufman and Raphael offer a way to "come out" of shame and begin the journey toward wholeness and self-acceptance. Filled with the experience of those struggling to overcome shame, Coming Out of Shame includes strategies for: storing self-esteem, creating a positive gay identity, healing scenes of shame, developing partnerships in intimacy.


