Queer Youth Digital Media Festival Saturday, June 3rd, 11:00am-3:00pm The Center (Hillcrest) The first ever Queer Youth Digital Media Festival is taking place on Saturday, June 3rd, 2006 from 11am – 3pm at the Center. The festival is a collaboration between Arcolris Lounge, the Center, and the Hillcrest Youth Center.

This festival is a first of its kind for queer youth in San Diego and will provide a forum for queer youth, ages 24 and under, to learn and participate in digital storytelling and youth media activism. It is different than any other youth conference because it enables identities and communities to empower themselves using media tools via their own stories and voices. The festival will provide a safe space for LGBT youth to establish their stories and voices as expressions for education, resistance, activism, and empowerment.

Through media and art practices, youth will gain the platform to envision themselves in a positive light, serve as role models for other youth, and promote media justice and social change. Without such communicative mediums, underrepresented youth, like queer youth, are left without outlets of expression and of self-determination.

Participants of the festival will get the opportunity to: watch other youth produced local and statewide media; acquire the basic tenets of creating their own digital stories; interact with other queer youth; and learn how they can become involved in media activism.

Profiles in Gay and Lesbian Courage by Reverend Troy D. Perry & Thomas L.P. Swicegood

Inspired by John F. Kennedy's politician's with study of principles, these eight portraits are of men and women with much more at stake than their own political futures. Elaine Noble, the first openly gay person elected in the United States, triumphs, while Harvey Milk, a supervisor in San Francisco, loses his life to an assassin. Other profiles depict the labor activist who invented liberation, a lesbian nun invited to the White House, and others whose political courage helped create a little-known but glorious chapter in American history.



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FORM FOLLOWS **FUNCTION**

New LGBT Center prides itself on a new design and an old mission in mind.

he inside of the new Lesbian Gay Bisexual Transgender Resource Center is so quiet, sometimes you can hear the shuffling of the cards during an Uno championship tournament. Silence this thick is usually tense, but the occasional bursts of laughter shatter any illusion of pressure. It is here, among the rollaway couch segments and little tubs of Play-Doh lining the windowsill, where professors hold class and office hours in the conference room, students relax or study, and card tournaments reach dramatic climax.

The old resource center was a cramped portable built with the Cold War in mind - small and easily deconstructed. Realtors would have called it "cozy." Since its relocation closer to the Mandeville Center, the interior design has changed from kindergarten classroom to a floor model for Ikea, where slick gray metal and chicly exposed wood ceilings adorn the space. It is spacious and well-lit by suspended white orb lamps; the architect seems to have

taken a leaf out of Frank Lloyd Wright's book, with the accommodating form following the openness of its function.

According to center Director Shaun Travers, the function of the space is simple — to "build community." He has directed the center since he was hired in 2001, two years after its creation.

"It is the largest LGBT center in any public institution, which makes me very happy!" Travers said.

Like any institution, the center's mission runs the risk of dissolving into political rhetoric. It is one thing to say one is providing, as Travers said, "an open, diverse, welcoming [space] for all members of the university campus to discuss sexual orientation and gender identity in," and a completely different matter to actually provide it.

When asked if he had a favorite success story, Travers laughed at the ceiling and said there were many. One story in particular, though, of a student who came out almost on his first day of college and is now going through Rainbow Graduation, remains a favorite. His name is Rafael Colonna.

Revelle College senior Colonna had a bold Welcome Week his freshman year, deciding to come out at the annual Q-Camp.

"I had planned to come out," Colonna said. "Q-Camp was a first step."

Q-Camp is the yearly orientation event that acquaints students with the LGBT resources on campus and provides an inspirational potluck.

"The potluck afterwards really helped me. Almost immediately it helped me get over some of the shit I had," Colonna said.

More than just a place to hang out, the center provided Colonna with opportunities and activities to fill his time. He volunteered for FallFest. He got involved with Speaker's Bureau, an outreach program meant to educate the campus about LGBT issues. Colonna said his experience was "empowering."

Center leaders have set their sights on academic achievement. One longterm goal is the creation of an LGBT minor, perhaps through the Critical Gender Studies program.

But the center will also continue to face its biggest problem — freshman orientation. Due to the changing and dynamic population of this campus' future students, the largest issue the center handles is the constant education of incoming freshmen. Despite its increase in square footage, the new building will be hard-pressed to keep up with its leadership.

"We will continue to expand our academic connections to the campus," Travers said. "[And provide] connections between the classroom, and the lived identity."





The title of my position is Newsletter Coordinator. Within this capacity I fulfill many roles at the Resource Center, both within the newsletter realm, and also outside of such duties. With regard to the Newsletter, I edit emails, letters, and general events into a template. It is in the process of writing this newsletter that my other main duty is highlighted, that of checking the Resource Center's Rainbow Inbox, and handling any and all emails that pass through the inbox in an appropriate manner. The writing of the newsletter, and the process of filtering the RC's Rainbow Inbox are the two major duties I have specifically as Newsletter Intern. My other duties as a coordinator include opening and closing the Resource Center at least once a week for each, and staffing the front desk during much of my time while working. Staffing the desk requires that one answer phones, greet traffic, maintain a certain level of decorum in the open space, and solve any other requisite problems concerning the running of the space.

During my time in the position of Newsletter Coordinator a number of important changes took place that had direct implications for my job. Regarding the Newsletter template format, the first two quarters of my internship this template was in plain text form, and was written as most plain text emails are. However, in the final quarter, the template was changed to an HTML version, thus increasing responsibilities for editing, including color, pictures, and hyperlinks, besides the usual information. This change was by far the most important for me specifically, and resulted in many hours of frustration at learning the ins-and-outs of the new format. However, this new format is a marked improvement of the old format, and offers many more possibilities for the future. Another large change over the course of the internship was that of our move from our old location to our new location. This new space brought with it new ways of interaction between our staff and those that utilize the space, including bringing in a larger amount of traffic. This made for a change in working habits, as it was much easier to be distracted during the course of work by the many faces entering or exiting, or merely existing in the space. Finally, the hiring of two new staff members, and the change of position for a third, made for a rather chaotic series of quarters. While reporting to a new staff member each quarter took some getting used to, the changes were definitely worth the hassle. The addition of Jan, to take care of certain tasks and to bounce ideas off of was invaluable, and the addition of Samuel to help in the running of the space allowed for a more efficient use of time.

In the course of the internship a number of areas that could be further looked at by a future Newsletter Intern, or other staff members came up. First, and most importantly, is that of the size of the Newsletter. I have heard a large number of people who say that it is too long and that they only glance over it, many times missing important events and announcements. If we could somehow limit the size of blurbs in the newsletter itself, as other newsletters do, by posting the detailed information on the LGBTRC website and other queer organization websites, I think we could effectively increase the dissemination of information, as our Newsletter is meant to do. Secondly, I made an attempt at working on a queer publication during the course of my work at Newsletter Intern. Unfortunately, this work fizzled out as I became too busy with other stuff, like the move and the change in format, as well as the daunting task of setting up such a publication. I spoke with the newsletter coordinator of the Cross Cultural Center, who was working on a joint publication based around progressive issues, and it would seem a very important project to become part of, potentially by institutionalizing a collaboration with this publication through either the Newsletter Intern, or another Intern. In this way, we could contribute, without the project becoming too burdensome.

LGBT RC Job Assessment Sakura R. Evans Library Coordinator

What this job is:

The library coordinator is responsible for maintaining and adding books to the rainbow and video libraries. The duties include checking out/checking in books, putting books away, making sure the end-caps are in order, staying up-to-date with new books, and recommending titles. The bookworms and quotes need to be emailed to the Newsletter intern and the resource wall needs to be kept tidy and up-to-date.

What I did in the job:

When I started work, I organized the library into its current categories and updated the computer catalog. I pulled out the duplicates from both the rainbow and M&M library. I did the bookworms and Q quotes for the rainbow newsletter and emailed the library contact list about new books and movies that were added to the library. In the new space, I organized the rainbow library onto the new bookshelves and created new label magnets. Other than that, I worked primarily on other special projects and clerical duties since the library didn't take up too much time and effort.

Ideas and thoughts for the future:

In regards to the library, the main goal was to have it on the website as a searchable database, but that needs to be done in coordination with the website intern. A card reader, that was purchased but the whereabouts are unknown, will be helpful in making the checking out of books and computers electronic. More space for bookshelves would be useful because the shelf space right now is already getting cramped and it will be difficult to expand and update the library in the future. More budget dedicated to the video library would be useful considering it is more utilized than the rainbow library.

I think the interns shouldn't close by themselves anymore in the new location: it's big and dark and scary sometimes. Having 2 interns closing every nite would be good. I don't really see the importance of having the interns open every day of the week considering it was originally started to relieve Shaun & Debbi's busy schedule and now with 3 professional staff, it doesn't seem necessary. Samuel is more than diligent about getting into work early and opening the resource center on time.

Side note:

The time that I spent working at the Resource Center was enjoyable and a worthwhile experience. I learned a lot about the LGBT community and the issues surrounding it. As supervisors, the professional staff has been influential and supportive of me as a student. They accommodate my needs as a student and encourage my involvement and ownership of the projects I am involved in through my work at the Resource Center. I don't think I have ever had, or probably will ever have, such a positive experience with "bosses" as I have had with Shaun, Debbi, Jan, and Samuel.

Rafael Colonna LGBTRC Volunteer Coordinator

For the 2005-2006 academic year, I worked as the Volunteer Coordinator for the LGBT Resource Center. My job can be broken down into three main parts: 1) Volunteer coordination for the LGBT Resource Center, 2) Managing statistics for weekly traffic, and 3) Assisting in management and reception of LGBT Resource Center space alongside Full-Time staff. I work ten hours a week, broken down as: 1) One-hour weekly staff meeting, 2) Six-hour closing shift, and 3) Three-hour morning shift.

My work in volunteer coordination consisted of: maintaining a volunteer list serve, e-mail and phone correspondence with volunteers, and, on many occasions, on-site coordination of volunteers for events and tabling. Examples of occasions I coordinated volunteers for included: Q-Camp, Intersex Awareness Day Tabling, World AIDS Day, Love Your Body Day Tabling, Admit Day, Transfer Admit Day, Out and Proud Week, and Rainbow Graduation. I also managed the weekly traffic statistics. Managing the weekly statistics included: tabulating totals for weekly traffic, archiving the information in hard and digital copies for storage and use in the Rainbow Newsletter, using the archived information to create quarterly and annual statistic reports to present at the LGBT Advisory Board Meetings (See Appendix A). Assisting in reception and management of the LGBT Resource Center varies day-to-day with the changing needs of the space and the community that inhabits it. The basic tasks I was involved in include: Answering phones; greeting visitors and answering their questions; check-out of laptops, library books, and library videos; keeping the space open in the absence of full-time staff; keeping the space clean; closing down the space one night a week; and opening the space one morning a week.

The flow of my work and the functions of my position at the LGBT Resource Center changed throughout the year to meet the needs of the space in light of moving into the new space and changing supervisors twice in that transition. During Fall quarter, I performed all the basic tasks described for my job. I also started the volunteer list serve that quarter because one had not existed prior to this year. However, in anticipation of the move originally set for December, I chose not to create any new volunteer programs during that time because the needs for the program would probably change with the move. Instead, additional time was put towards creating a tabling board (See Appendix B) as a tool to assist in tabling. Due to the delay in our move-in time, very little was coordinated in the first half of Winter Quarter. The last half of the quarter after our move was focused in preparation for the numerous events in Spring quarter and adjusting to another change in supervision. Spring quarter was markedly different form the other two quarters with new supervision, a larger space to manage, and more events than any other quarter to coordinate volunteers for. The majority of my time I have found on Mondays is focused on space maintenance with two meetings and one three hour class occurring during the shift, Monday nights are one of the busiest of the week.

Based on my experiences this year in this position, I have a few thoughts and suggestions for this job for the next academic year. First, I feel that in some way the hours spent outside the space performing volunteer coordination via e-mail or direct supervision during the events must be more clearly recognized. Second, in light of the numerous changes that occurred this that made it not possible to create an expanded volunteer program, I would recommend that to be a possible focus for next year's volunteer intern with assistance from their supervisor.

Clement NgGraphic and Web Design Coordinator
Annual Report

The Graphic and Web Design Coordinator of the LGBT Resource Center is responsible for most graphical and branding elements of the Resource Center. Under the supervision of the Director and Assistant Directors of the Center, the Coordinator shall prepare publicity and print materials. The Graphic and Web Design Coordinator is also responsible for all aspects regarding the Center's website, including the maintenance and updating of its content and graphical element.

The Graphic and Web Design Coordinator was a new position of the Resource Center, and I was the first student staff to fill such position. Due to the nature of my position, I started in the summer of 2005, in order to re-create and re-design the Resource Center's website to better fit the University's web standards before the 2005-06 school year began. The new website was launched in July of 2005. In addition to maintaining the website and creating new pages regarding as requested, there were several major implementations to give the Resource Center a more professional web presence. I've setup a user-friendly calendar management system for Calendar Q. In cooperation with the Newsletters Coordinator, Will Gorham, I've designed the new HTML Rainbow Newsletter template, and implemented a mailing list and archiving system for the newsletter. I've also setup a visitor tracking system that reports the statistics and traffics of the Center's website in real time. In addition, I've created the Campus Community Centers webpage, which acts as a gateway and connection to the three Campus Community Centers' websites.

In terms of graphical and print materials, I was responsible in creating print materials on a regular basis for operational purposes of the Resource Center, as requested by my supervisors. I was also responsible in creating the official letterhead of the Resource Center, logo and all publicity materials including poster and brochure for *Q-Camp*, binder cover for the *2005 Staff Training*, logo for *Speaker's Bureau* and *Rainbow Graduation*, publicity for the *Grand Opening*, as well as developing the *Let's Talk* coaster / logo design for the Campus Community Centers.

A manual detailing all operations of the website and graphic templates will be produced before the end of my term as a reference for future Graphic and Web Design Interns. Prospective Interns are recommended to further develop the document as necessary. During my term as the Graphic and Web Design Coordinator, a lot of the elements of the Center's website were not yet established. Therefore, it took up the majority of my responsibility developing and establishing the website. However, I perceive the future Graphic and Web Design Interns will be able to focus more on designing print and graphical materials and less on large-scale updates and implementations of the website. There were still a few improvements I would like to see happen to the website, such as the implementation of a searchable library and the re-organization of the resource section.
