

Resource center opens at UCSD



\$800,000 meeting place is hub of gay life on campus

Step onto a college campus these days and you might hear the remark, "That's so gay."

For many students, the words seem like a harmless way to poke fun at something. But for University of California San Diego senior Peper Anan, it's a personal attack on her sexual identity.

Anan, who considers herself bisexual, says she hears the sentence about once a month and always tries to educate the person about how offensive it is. It's this sort of comment that she hopes will disappear with the creation of UCSD's first permanent Lesbian Gay Bisexual Transgender Resource Center. The center will officially celebrate its opening today.

It is billed as the largest of its kind among public universities in the United States. UCSD students and faculty alike hail the 2,700-squarefoot facility, in the heart of the university, as a major milestone for the campus.

"We're coming into our own," said senior Rafael Colonna. "We've got a permanent space with a set budget. I think it's a big step for UCSD."

By many accounts, members of UC San Diego's LGBT community say they feel safe on campus and have not experienced overt discrim-

GOP primary victor wins seat outright

One candidate is a threeterm supervisor. An outspoken conservative Republican, he has said he really doesn't like his opponent.

The other candidate is a former state assemblyman and more recently a Bush administration appointee, a conservative Republican who has said he really doesn't like his opponent.

Incumbent Bill Horn, 63, of Valley Center said he has never been involved in such a "slimy" campaign, and his opponent is responsible.

Bruce Thompson, 52, of Fallbrook said Horn's arrogance has created an untenable disconnect between the supervisor and the people he serves and that the time for change has arrived.

The June 6 primary is the election, as the two candidates are the only ones on the ballot. Whichever man gets the most votes will be the county's 5th District representative until 2010.

In his quest to retain his seat, Horn has raised almost ten times as much as Thompson, according to the most recent records filed with the Registrar of Voters.

Thompson is running a grass-roots campaign with what he says are a thousand volunteers. He believes he can win, despite the financial disparity.

"North County does not have a strong voice," Thompson said. "That's what I bring to the table, somebody who has been to Sacramento. Somebody who has been to Washington, D.C. Somebody who understands coalitions and how you get things done. Horn just doesn't seem to understand that. He doesn't play well with people."

Horn, meanwhile, contends his record speaks for itself. He said Thompson was an ineffectual assemblymen in the 1990s who is basing his campaign on negative rhetoric rather than ideas.

"I'll match my 12 years in

public office against his six nonyears in public office. The best thing that ever happened were term limits because it got Bruce Thompson out of the Legislature."

In recent weeks, Horn has come under fire for a financial deal he has with his chief of staff, Joan Wonsley, who is living in a million-dollar home in Carlsbad that Horn purchased three years ago.

After the arrangement was revealed, Horn acknowledged he incorrectly filled out some state forms listing his economic interests. He has since corrected them to show that Wonsley is joint owner of the house, having paid Horn \$350,000 for a share in the property. He said he didn't realize he needed to list the income on the forms and that it was an honest mistake made by someone who has lots of assets.

The arrangement, however, caused rumors to resurface that Horn and Wonsley have been romantically involved, which both deny.

Thompson's campaign, though, is relishing this attention on Horn. Recently, Thompson released his federal tax returns to the press and is asking why Horn won't do the same.

"Bill Horn refuses to release his tax forms," Thompson said. "He refuses to divulge what really is going on with his finances and his finances with his chief of staff. I presume, and I think the voters will presume, he is hiding something. And the question is, what are you hiding, Bill Horn?"

Horn said he is not legally required to make his tax returns public, and for privacy reasons he will not do so.

Thompson also criticizes Horn for refusing so far to debate. Horn maintains he will participate in a few debates as the election nears, but as of this week none has been scheduled.

"I guess he's just scared," Thompson said. "I guess the reason he doesn't show up and doesn't want to debate is he doesn't want to talk about his failed leadership of the past 12 years and have that come to the light of day in public.

That's not the American

way. The American way is to talk about our communities. We talk about problems. We brag about the good things. But we show up for debates."

Horn said he is looking forward to confronting Thompson in public.

"I'm happy to debate the issues, if there are issues," he said. "I haven't heard any yet (from Thompson). All I've heard about is what a drag I am.

"To be honest with you, this is the slimiest, most unethical campaign I've ever been in. He started off on the low rung and he's gone lower. I have yet to talk about the issues or compare our records."

The county, Horn said, faces major problems, including illegal immigration, which he calculates costs the county government more than a billion dollars a year for such things as social, health, and public services. Although acknowledging the issues are complicated and that the supervisors have only limited control, he said he is doing everything he can to strengthen the border.

Traffic, and the growth that creates it, continues to be a problem, Horn said.

Thompson refers to Horn and "Bulldozer Bill," saying he has been consistently pro-development and has accepted campaign contribution funds by the hundreds of thousands over the years from developers.

"Everybody always looks at me and says, 'well what about all the new development you've had in North County,' " Horn said. "Well, in my 12 years in public office I doubt that we've built more than 2,500 homes in (my district). The biggest de-

velopment we've had is 4S Ranch, and that was in Supervisor (Pam) Slater's district. And that traffic is farther down (Interstate 15), before the Lake Hodges bridge gets crossed in North County. Really, our traffic is flow-through traffic from Riverside, which we don't really have control over."

Thompson agrees that traffic is a major problem.

"Somebody has to step up to the plate and say, 'Hey, I'm willing to deal with this,' " he said, "... bringing county, state and federal leaders together to solve the problems. That's the big difference between myself and Horn. He refuses to do it. He blames other people. For every problem there is he blames other people."

Thompson says growth in North County concerns everyone.

"What kind of growth are we going to have?" he said. "When I go around, especially in the unincorporated areas, people are really concerned. They are scared to death about what is coming. They moved to a rural environment and now the county wants to change the rules on them and make this another Orange County.

"But again, Bill Horn is nowhere to be found. He's just kind of off in left field doing his own thing and thinking everything is fine."

ination. A report released in March by a campus committee found varied experiences, with one recurring theme being that students and faculty in the science departments have more concerns about jeopardizing their academic standing if their sexual orientation became public.

UCSD has had few reports of hate crimes involving sexual orientation. Campus police say there has been only one hate crime reported in the past four years, and no hate incidents.

The project's \$800,000 price tag strikes some on campus as high.

"It does seem like a lot of money. I don't know if students would have approved it," said senior Joshua Norton, 22, a math major and president of the New Life Student Ministry, a Bible study group. Norton said he supports pro-

Norton said he supports providing services such as counseling for people in need but considers "promoting the homosexual lifestyle to be immoral."

Which brings up the question: Why spend the chancellor's discretionary money and other campus funds, including student fees, to build the center?

For UCSD lecturer Amanda Roberts, who holds her office hours at the center, it's about the future.

"The more we can do to provide diversity awareness," Roberts said, "the more we'll be raising a tolerant generation."

Experts say UCSD's investment is part of a trend that has intensified in the past decade. The first LGBT resource center opened in 1971 at the University of Michigan, and the rate at which others have followed suit has increased since the mid-1990s, said Ronni Sanlo, director of the LGBT Center at UCLA and the author of a howto book on setting up LGBT centers.

That said, only about 3 percent of U.S. colleges — or 105 out of 3,500 — have established LGBT resource centers, according to the National Consortium of Directors of LGBT Resources in Higher Education.

The idea for UCSD's center was born 14 years ago when a student submitted a modest request to the chancellor to create a resource center for lesbian, gay and bisexual students and staff. The first LGBT resource office, dedicated in 1999, consisted of two small rooms inside the financial aid building. Three years later, the office moved to a 960-squarefoot trailer and was renamed as a center.

Through the years, the center's mission has not changed: to provide a safe space for LGBT students, faculty and staff.

But the permanent center's expanded size and resources have already translated into more staffing and educational programming on campus. Three full-time employees, an

increase from two, operate an annual budget of \$180,000. In the coming weeks, the center's workers will organize sessions on LGBT issues for the campus police and athletic department.

It would be easy to miss the second-story center, if not for the rainbow flag hanging outside and the life-size images of Wonder Woman displayed in front. Located between Mandeville Center and the original Student Center, it features a "living room" with a bank d lounge chairs, multimedia con ference room (the dining room), 3,000-book library kitchen and counseling room. On a recent afternoon las week, the center was buzzing with activity. Several students sat in the front, eating lunch and working on laptops. A professor held office hours in a room in back.

The center's location near the middle of campus has helped it to double its foot traffic — from about 100 visitors to some 200 — in the two months it has been operating, Travers said.


"It's definitely a place where we can go to on campus that we know is safe," Anan said. "We think of each other as a family."



The Klein Grid measures actual sexual experiences, but also sexual attractions, fantasies, emotional preference, social preference, lifestyle and selfidentification as they relate to a person's past, present and ideal future. Klein's research showed that these factors can change over time for an individual, and vary not just between but also within groups of straight, gay and bisexual people. He concluded that people generalize from their own experiences and feelings to assume, often wrongly, that other people must experience their own sexual orientations the same way.

As a result, Klein concluded sexual orientations are too complex to be broken into simple, well-defined categories.

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) estimates that 180,000 to 280,000 people nationwide are HIV-positive but are unaware of their status. HIV counseling and testing enables people with HIV to take steps to
