





"As a part of our mission, it was necessary for us to incorporate the experiences of immigrants and second-generation LGBT pilipina/os, as well as, the queer experiences of the Philippines." I loved National Coming Out Day. Getting up and speaking at the mic in the middle of Price Center is very powerful and exciting. And I shared a story that happened to me some weeks ago at the beginning of September. Someone asked me to share it in writing, so here it is... "So James and I walk almost every night through Hillcrest before bed. Tonight that included having eggs thrown at us and anti-gay slurs hurled over the squeal of speeding tires. Sure makes buying that "great new condo" in that "wonderful location" feel like a decision that may have warranted further consideration, but I am leaping ahead of a realistic reaction, and am still just really upset... At about 11:20pm we were walking on the east on east-bound side of University between 8th and 9th Avenue, almost home from our trek through the neighborhood and Balboa Park. I feel it and hear it almost simultaneously. First an egg hits my arm, brushes it, really, and then hits the wall of the building which has the House of Heirlooms annex. At the same moment another one sails right past James head and hits the wall, too. He is ducking as it happens. And we hear, sarcastically, filled with anger, "Yea, Queer Rights." The car is passed us as we are looking up. I know it is white, big. Logically, I figure their must be a driver and at least one passenger. They are through the green light at 9th, crossing the 163, and with a right onto Tenth, down

the freeway on-ramp in a blink of an eye.

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James looks at me and asks it I am all right. I was snaking, but physically fine, and I just nodded my head. James was looking for the car, but it was already gone. The gay guy behind us, we had just walked passed him moments before, walks by with his head down. He is moving quickly, his body language saying "go, fear, get away from this." Across the street we see another same sex couple, who obviously had at least heard what happened, maybe even seen it, but they were scurrying, walking, moving away, too. I remember seeing the eggs smashed in the wall and on the ground. There seem to be other people around, there is traffic on the street. No one is stopping, though. We are standing there for a moment, just standing, then moving, going, getting away from it, too. We crossed University at 9th and went to the condo. I couldn't really talk. I got a glass of water, and then I called the police. My voice was still shaking. They took the verbal report over the phone, and were very respectful. A police car is on the way now, because it is a hate crime. That's what the officer on the phone said. It was a hate crime. I had gotten hit. Someone had to come out.



And I knew it was hate crime. I just hadn't named that it yet. It was still just this thing. This awful thing. This awful that had happened to me and my partner. Because we were two men walking down the street in Hillcrest. We weren't holding hands, we weren't locked in an embrace, truth be told James was a couple steps in front of me the moment it happened. I don't even think we were talking to each other at that moment. Just walking near to each other.

And I guess what is all the more anger-causing, what is making my blood boil, is that I didn't expect it. I just bought a place here. I live in the heart of the "gay-borhood." This is where the Pride Parade rolls down the street every year. There are rainbow flags on most every business. I walk by friendly, beautiful, loving people all of the time. This is my refuge from the reality of so many communities where I could not be out. This isn't supposed to happen here. My guard is down.

And suddenly I feel the need to hide again. To stay inside. To go invisible so I won't have to have that happen again. It is embarrassing, and scary, and awful to have eggs thrown at you, in your own street, within sight of your own home. It is frustrating to be working so hard to stop this kind of violence, and then have it happen to you practically on your doorstep. It is so upsetting to have a really good evening ruined by a really hate-filled blast of arrogance and privilege and false superiority.

And, I have to say, one of the first things that went through my mind, as I realized what happened, was "What if it would have been a bullet?" What small steps of anger does it take the hate-filled person to go from picking up an egg, to a rock, to a knife, to a gun? What degree of intolerance and fear have we taught, bred, ingrained in our culture, that cause some to so fear and so hate that they take it out with truly random violence?



And so I'll talk with the police later tonight when they come by. And when I read the annual report that the city will publish regarding hate crimes is 2005, I will know one of them regarding sexual orientation is me and James. And I will know that I have more work to do. Because I will not live in fear. I will live in love. With my love as an open defiance to those who believe that their love is better, more important, more privileged than mine.

So next time I hope we are holding hands when they hit us."

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
