

- The AWT figure for Fall '05 (shown above) is the total traffic for the quarter divided by ten weeks instead of twelve (on Spread Sheet) to reflect that we did not keep statistics for Week 0 or for Finals Week. Similar method was used to discern Spring '05 AWT while Fall '04 includes Week 0 but not Finals Week in their figures so it was divided by 11.

## IV. Trends

• Highest amounts of traffic were found in the first two weeks of the quarter with a steady decline in weeks three and four. Increased again in weeks five and six but experienced a drop as the quarter concluded

- Two significant dips occurred on weeks 7 and 9 with both of these weeks including university holidays (Veteran's Day and Thanksgiving).
- Compared to previous years, the traffic shows greater consistency throughout the quarter than in past quarters. Possibly due to increased accuracy in the removal of meetings log.
- All figures with the exception of faculty have experienced a significant increase from the previous year. Staff figures from Fall '05 are greater than total for 2004-05 Academic year.
- Also have begun to look for trends in weekly traffic in correspondence with the weather. No trends to note as of yet but will continue to gather data for year.

## V. Goals and Concluding Comments

- Improve data collection method for off-site meetings and trainings
- Continue to work with Speaker's Bureau on more standardized statistics.
- Continue to explore possible weather trend with traffic.



The UCSD Campus Community Centers (Women's Center, Cross Cultural Center and LGBT Resource Center) want you to be a part of their contingent to the Chancellor's 5K! Participants can walk with the group while holding our banner or run the course. The Chancellor's Challenge 5K Run/Walk for Scholars was established by Chancellor Robert Dynes in 1996 and is now hosted by the newly appointed Chancellor Marye Anne Fox. The event brings students, faculty, staff, alumni and UCSD friends in the community together for an afternoon of fun and fresh air, all to benefit undergraduate scholarships at UCSD. The 5K run/walk starts at 12:15 p.m. on the North Campus Field near RIMAC, follows the campus cross-country course, and finishes back at the North Campus Field with lunch and an awards program.

Now in its tenth year, the Chancellor's Challenge has raised \$1.25 million for more than 550 undergraduate students at UCSD. It has grown to include nearly 1,400 registered participants and more than 100 volunteers. This year, the Chancellor's Challenge will be larger than ever, with even greater campus and community participation. Chancellor Fox challenges us all to beat last year's number of participants. If we beat last year's total of 1,395 runners, she will personally donate \$4,000 to scholarships. But wait, there's more! If we go above and beyond our efforts last year and register 1,500 participants, Chancellor Fox will donate an additional \$1,000 for a grand total of \$5,000 for scholarships.

This eversurprising film provides evidence of a great insight into the problems of Lerman's contemporaries and their relationship to the generation of their grandparents." 



## 15) Professor Patterson of the MMW Department Awarded Fellowship

Our very own Patrick Patterson, an historian who teaches in Eleanor Roosevelt College's "Making of the Modern World" program, has been awarded a 2004-2005 fellowship by the American Council of Learned Societies (ACLS). The 2004-2005 ACLS fellowships total 4.8 million dollars awarded to 139 American scholars from 102 institutions. Patterson's fellowship grant of \$25,000 is for postdoctoral research in Southeast European Studies. His project title is Socialist Societies Consumed: The Culture of the Market and Everyday Life in Eastern Europe and the Balkans. Patterson says the "comparative and interdisciplinary project assesses the nature and significance of socialist, consumer culture...Challenging prevailing interpretations of the region's (Eastern Europe and the Balkans) history, the research tests the global reach - and limits - of capitalist economics and market culture."

The New York-based ACLS is a private non-profit federation of 68 national scholarly organizations. Its mission is "the advancement of humanistic studies in all fields of learning in the humanities and the social sciences and the maintenance and strengthening of relations among the national societies devoted to such studies."

So here's to rock stars, and to those who aren't but who are still making a difference.



On the occasion of the release of his first novel, "Life, Sex, and the Pursuit Happiness," Fritz Klein, M.D., an expert in the field of bisexuality, will making two public appearances in San Diego the week of November 14. On Monday the 14th, he will be doing a reading at the Diversionary Theatre, 4545 Park Blvd, and on Thursday the 17th at 7 pm, he will be doing a book signing at Obelisk bookstore, 1029 University Ave. He is available for interviews and for commentary on the issue of bisexuality. Dr. Fritz Klein, a.k.a. "Dr. Fritz," is one of the world's leading authorities on bisexuality.

He is a respected psychiatrist, sex researcher, author of the much-quoted book "The Bisexual Option," editor of the Journal of Bisexuality, co-editor of "Bisexual and Gay Husbands: Their Stories, Their Words," and inventor of the Klein Sexual Orientation Grid which helps define who bisexuals are and where they fit on the sexual orientation continuum.

As a sex researcher for over 25 years and specifically as a researcher into bisexuality, Dr. Fritz Klein has met bisexuals all over the world. Active in the bisexual community since 1974, he founded the Bisexual Forums in New York and San Diego, and coorganized the 1st International Bisexual Conference in Amsterdam. He is the director of the American Institute of Bisexuality, and founder/owner of www.bisexual.org, a site dedicated to bringing bisexuals together and providing information on bisexuality.
