On the occasion of the release of his first novel, "Life, Sex, and the Pursuit Happiness," Fritz Klein, M.D., an expert in the field of bisexuality, will be making two public appearances in San Diego the week of November 14. On Monday the 14th, he will be doing a reading at the Diversionary Theatre, 4545 Park Blvd, and on Thursday the 17th at 7 pm, he will be doing a book signing at Obelisk bookstore, 1029 University Ave. He is available for interviews and for commentary on the issue of bisexuality. Dr. Fritz Klein, a.k.a. "Dr. Fritz," is one of the world's leading authorities on bisexuality.

He is a respected psychiatrist, sex researcher, author of the much-quoted book "The Bisexual Option," editor of the Journal of Bisexuality, co-editor of "Bisexual and Gay Husbands: Their Stories, Their Words," and inventor of the Klein Sexual Orientation Grid which helps define who bisexuals are and where they fit on the sexual orientation continuum.

As a sex researcher for over 25 years and specifically as a researcher into bisexuality, Dr. Fritz Klein has met bisexuals all over the world. I'll be back late Sunday night, and am taking Monday off so I can see James for a touch, because six days away from your partner is AWFUL!



"Since the 1998 publication of his groundbreaking book Out on Fraternity Row, editor and Lambda 10 Project founder Shane Windmeyer has witnessed many changes in the reception and treatment of gay fraternity members: "We have made tremendous progress on men coming out to their brothers and being more likely to find acceptance due to the credo 'once a brother, always a brother,' but the new challenge and logical next boundary to break down for the fraternity closet is rushing openly gay." His new book, Brotherhood, is a bold step in that direction. Windmeyer reveals a 10-year perspective of progress on gay issues within college fraternities and suggests a 10year plan to continue educational efforts for further systemic implementation to combat homophobia in fraternities. Windmeyer and others involved in the Lambda 10 Project provide valuable articles on:

Hazing and homophobia Trials and tribulations of rushing openly gay How to be an ally to a gay brother Passing sexual orientation in a fraternity nondiscrimination statement"







12) UCSD Conference Exploring "Jewish Masculinities" - Sun-Tue, Dec 11th-13th

Scholars from Israel, Germany, France, Canada and the United States will meet at the University of California, San Diego, December 11-13, 2005, to discuss whether antisemitism in the German past became more attractive through critiques of Jewish men. The program will feature papers and talks from 35 leading researchers in Jewish history, German literature, and related fields. Conference keynote speaker will be Sander Gilman of Emory University, author of works on Freud, Kafka, the Jewish body, and Jewish self-hatred. The conference is sponsored by the UCSD Judaic Studies Program.

"Some scholars are looking at the history of antisemitism in new ways, asking if satirists and critics saw Jewish men as insufficiently masculine, as too soft and flabby and cowardly, whereas they saw Jewish women as unusually sexualized, intellectual, and dominant in Jewish families," said Deborah Hertz, Herman Wouk Professor of Jewish Studies at UCSD, and local conference chair.

Among topics to be discussed are Jewish sports clubs in German and Palestine, conflicts about dueling, Jewish hiking enthusiasts, the politics of circumcision, contrasting male and female refugee experiences in the Nazi era in New York City and numerous other issues.

Sessions will take place in the Deutz Conference Room of the Institute of the Americas on the UCSD campus. 

TIPPING THE VELVET (2002) By Geoffrey Sax Based on the novel by Sarah Waters

Based on the acclaimed novel by Booker-nominated author Sarah Waters, Tipping the Velvet, is a daring, colorful, passionate and entertaining love story set in the 1890s. It follows the story of Nan Astley as she grows into womanhood. Confused and unsure of her feelings for her boyfriend, she slowly comes to realize she is attracted to women - which leads her into series of adventures. The exciting world of the 19th century music hall provides the backdrop for Nan's first love affair with Kitty, a popular male impersonator. They become a double act, both on and off stage, but their manager, Walter, wins Kitty's hand as she ultimately chooses the safety of a traditional life rather than risking public disapproval through her true feelings for Nan. Devastated by Kitty's betrayal, Nan takes to the streets to survive, in her guise as a male impersonator, and finds a niche as a 'male' prostitute. She is drawn to Florence, but is unable to tell her the truth about her secret street life. Instead, she is spotted by the wealthy widow, Diana Lethaby, a woman in her thirties who is amoral, capricious and predatory. She introduces Nan to a world of luxury and debauchery. When Nan is thrown back on to the streets, she searches for Florence, who is initially deeply mistrustful, but a strong bond develops between them that blossoms into real and lasting love.


