

AIDS Quilt at UCSD for World AIDS Day

On Thursday, December 1st 2005, the University of California, San Diego will recognize World AIDS Day with a public viewing of the AIDS Memorial Quilt. The Quilt will be on display at the Price Center Ballroom on the UCSD campus from 9am until 4:30pm. For a map and directions to the Price Center Ballroom, please visit http://maps.ucsd.edu. The event is free and open to the public.

On display at UCSD will be ten sections of the Quilt that have emerged from San Diego organizations and individuals as San Diegans responded to the AIDS crisis, both in the early years of the epidemic and through the present day. Each "block" (or section) of The AIDS Memorial Quilt measures approximately twelve feet square, and a typical block consists of eight individual three foot by six foot panels sewn together. Virtually every one of the more than 40,000 colorful panels that make up the entire Quilt memorializes the life of a person lost to AIDS.

Founded in 1987, The AIDS Memorial Quilt is a poignant memorial, a powerful tool for use in preventing new HIV infections, and the largest ongoing community arts project in the world. As the epidemic continues claiming lives around the world and here in the United States, the Quilt continues to grow and to reach more communities with its messages of remembrance, awareness and hope. Along with the AIDS Quilt, UCSD will sponsor a number of other events in recognition of World AIDS Day. Red ribbons will be handed out a UCSD's Library Walk throughout the day. A reading of names of those who have passed away from AIDS will take place at Price Center Plaza from 10 am to 3 p.m. At the Quilt display, more specific information regarding people of color and AIDS as well as women and AIDS will be presented. At 1pm at UCSD's Cross Cultural Center in the Lecture Hall, the Peer Education Program (PEP) Los Angeles will lead informal discussions on sexuality, decision-making and negotiation skills and provide realistic techniques for resisting peer pressure to engage in the risk-taking behaviors associated with HIV/AIDS.

The film "A Closer Walk" will be screened at UCSD's Cross Cultural Center in the Lecture Hall at 6 p.m. "A Closer Walk" is the first film to provide a definitive portrayal of humankind's confrontation with the global AIDS epidemic. Directed, written and produced by Oscar nominee Robert Biheimer, and narrated by Glen Close and Will Smith, the film explores the intricate relationship between health, dignity and human rights.

These events are co-sponsored by UCSD's LGBT Resource Center, Student Health Advocates, the department of Sociology, The Imperial Court de San Diego (ICSD), San Diego Young Positives (SDYP), the Women's Center and the Cross-Cultural Center. LOOKING BACK

COMING OUT



In 1979, when I arrived at UC San Diego Warren College Orientation from Salt Lake City, Utah, I was perhaps naïve about Southern California. I had been waiting to "come out" and college seemed like the perfect place to express myself honestly and proudly—not just my sexual orientation, but also my politics. I hoped to somehow merge my interest in science and medicine with public policy and social justice issues.

UC San Diego in retrospect was the perfect school for me, although it started out slowly. You see, I asked simply at my student orientation session—"where do I find the gay student organiza-

tion?" The student affairs staff member politely responded: "While at one time there was such an organization, there is no such organization now." I asked why? And the response was, "I don't know, but you can start such a student organization if you are interested."

Slowly over the course of my freshman year, I found other lesbian and gay students interested in forming a social-political organization. And in 1980, we founded LAGO—the Lesbian and Gay (student) Organization. This was my first lesson in budgeting, politicking and public speaking. Scared as the devil, a small group of us asked for, and received, a

full-page Lesbian and Gay issues section in the Guardian—once each quarter beginning in 1980. For two years, we filled the pages with poems, private reflections, comics, community event announcements, and a listing of resources—mostly off campus. The group was notable by its inclusion of women and men, and I received basic lessons in political activism from my student peers including Paula Rosenstein, '82, Muir, now an accomplished attorney in San Diego, and Linda Sabo, who became a Student Regent.

I took a big step out of the closet with my LAGO co-chair, Christina Alvarez, '84, Warren, M.A. '95, when we were interviewed for a Guardian cover story titled: The Challenge of Being Gay at UCSD, which ran during January 1982. There was no going

back at that point, and we were invited with others to be on a panel for the UCSD Contemporary Issues course "Human Sexuality".

There were allied offices and places, although at the time there was no formal recognition of this. The counselors from Psychological Counseling and Services were a godsend for many of us as were peer support groups for gay men and lesbians. Academic advisers in the colleges were often helpful, and certain departments like sociology, visual arts, music and political science offered classes that were of a personal and academic interest to many. There were affinity groups such as Associated

> Students-Assorted Vinyl record store, Groundwork Books, the Food Coop and the CHE collective.

> Pretty soon, we figured out that we needed an office and a telephone information line in the Student Center. It was granted by the ASUCSD. We reached out to faculty and staff by hosting quarterly potlucks in the International Center. We worked with faculty and staff on issues in common, including a proposed minor in Lesbian and Gay History, health policy issues, and issues of equality and non-discrimination. We received support

and encouragement from helpful faculty


such as Professor Harry Hirsch (now at Macalester College in Minnesota). His research and teaching interests include civil liberties and gay and lesbian politics.

One of my favorite memories is the establishment of the first "Susan B. Anthony" Non-Sexist Dance, which took place on February 13, 1981. I hear the Non-Sexist dances are still going strong on campus.



6) UCSD Conference Exploring "Jewish Masculinities" - Sun-Tue, Dec 11th-13th

Scholars from Israel, Germany, France, Canada and the United States will meet at the University of California, San Diego, December 11-13, 2005, to discuss whether antisemitism in the German past became more attractive through critiques of Jewish men. The program will feature papers and talks from 35 leading researchers in Jewish history, German literature, and related fields. Conference keynote speaker will be Sander Gilman of Emory University, author of works on Freud, Kafka, the Jewish body, and Jewish self-hatred. The conference is sponsored by the UCSD Judaic Studies Program.

"Some scholars are looking at the history of antisemitism in new ways, asking if satirists and critics saw Jewish men as insufficiently masculine, as too soft and flabby and cowardly, whereas they saw Jewish women as unusually sexualized, intellectual, and dominant in Jewish families," said Deborah Hertz, Herman Wouk Professor of Jewish Studies at UCSD, and local conference chair.

Among topics to be discussed are Jewish sports clubs in German and Palestine, conflicts about dueling, Jewish hiking enthusiasts, the politics of circumcision, contrasting male and female refugee experiences in the Nazi era in New York City and numerous other issues.

Sessions will take place in the Deutz Conference Room of the Institute of the Americas on the UCSD campus. The conference is free and open to the public, but registration is advised as space is limited.



2) Debbi Blake's last day with us

From Shaun Travers, the Director of the LGBT Resource Center... "After almost four years of dedicated and unwavering service to the UCSD LGBT community, it is my great pleasure (tempered with profound sadness) to announce that Debbi Blake will be transitioning to a new position within the Campus Community Center's team. Her last official day on the job here will be Thursday, January 12th, 2006.

Please join me anytime between 4 and 6pm on that day at the LGBT Resource Center, as we celebrate and recognize her time with us, and as we send her off with well wishes. Not that she will be all that far away...

Debbi will no longer be with the LGBT Resource Center in the roles that we have all experienced these last many years. Instead, she will serve as the Fiscal Services Manager for all three of the Campus Community Center's, which includes us, the Women's Center and the Cross-Cultural Center. Debbi will be physically housed at the Women's Center, and part of the Chancellor's office team.

I had the pleasure of hiring Debbi (although Francesco Carusi, Kim Merino and Leeann Dolbeck comprised the search committee that discovered her) in early July of 2002. Her first assignment: PRIDE. Talk about trial by fire. Debbi tackled the events with gusto, and we had an excellent showing that year. It was a great way for her to connect with the entire community, and allowed for a slow down right afterwards so she could acclimate to the position.

However, her acclimation was never truly over, because her position never stopped growing! That was in large part to Debbi's strong desire, coupled with her true ability to keep expanding what she was doing. During the course of her tenure, she has supervised over a dozen different student interns, night/day managers and coordinators. She has taken the lead on numerous projects and assignments, including all aspects of Rainbow Graduation. Debbi has trained herself in numerous areas of skill, attending over 35 classes offered by Staff Education. In addition, her knowledge of the LGBT community grew through participation in national conferences, including GenderPac in 2003 and the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force Creating Change Conference in 2004. She took a lead role in the registration activities for our own Western Regional UCLGBTIA conference we hosted at UCSD in February 2003.

Debbi has pushed the LGBT Resource Center in exciting new directions. She was integral to our expanding budget for both programs and staffing. Her initial contacts with the David Bohnett Foundation led to our largest grant ever, for the David Bohnett Wireless CyberCenter. And her coordination of internal groups among the Campus Community Centers, including the "Fiscal Sisters" provided a model for collaboration that has served all our communities well.

The broader campus community has benefited from Debbi's presence as well. She has been chair the Umbrella Group (UCSD's employee LGBT association), co-chair of the Chancellor's Advisory Committee on Gender Identity and Sexual Orientation issues, and active in the Veteran's Association. Her presence on campus will continue to allow us to benefit from her community orientation.

On a personal note, Debbi and I have become quite close friends. We have often joked that we were "married" to each other within the context of our work lives. And there were times when we would see each other for more hours in any given week than we would see our respective partners. It has been during times like these that I have been most grateful that Debbi Blake is the person that she is. In the most vulnerable, sacred moments of my work life at UCSD, Debbi has been a support and confidant. I have truly appreciated that, and will miss her daily (sometimes hourly) presence in my life.

That being said, we still have a big chunk of her time, energy and effort in her new

role. So, although this is a change, she will not be too far gone. Again, please join me on Thursday, January 12th between 4 and 6pm at the LGBT Resource Center as we acknowledge Debbi's last day in her current role at the LGBT Resource Center.

Sometimes I have the delusion that, because I am the Director of the LGBT Resource Center at UCSD and I volunteer on the Board of Directors at the LGBT Center in Hillcrest, that I should have all my "queer" ducks in a row. Ya know what I mean? That I should have things figured out and worked through in such a way that I can support others in their journey. Of course, life doesn't work that way, especially in the kingdom of queer. A case in point (my case in particular...)

My family has a tradition of sending out a Christmas letter with highlights of the year and a reflection on what has happened within the family. I have continued that tradition with my family and circle of friends, and send out a letter each year as well. This year my letter included photo's of my partner James and I at the Center's Gala, all dressed up in tuxedos, as well as more casually in front of the castle at Disneyland. The letter reflected on the purchase of our first condo and me starting graduate school in January.

The same circle of family (and a few family friends) receives my parents letter as well. Of course, I get a copy in my card, too. It is monthly chronicle of what has gone on with my mom and dad throughout 2005, and wraps up with updates on the family. My sister and her husband... work, church, etc... my nephews (their grandkids) school, sports, etc... and "Shaun bought a condo this fall and he starts his doctorate program in January..."

Notice anything missing there? Perhaps, oh, I don't know, MY PARTNER?!?

And please realize that almost every single family member got these two letters. One with James, and one without James. And it is so odd, because my family KNOWS James. And not just my immediate family. He has met and been to family functions with aunts, uncles, and cousins. And all of my parents' parents are DEAD! Who are we hiding my partner from? More importantly, since he is kind of sticking out in the middle of the pictures in my letter, who are MY PARENTS hiding my partner from?

And the odd thing is, I have found it almost impossible to broach the subject with them. Though most all my friends, and more than one family member has said it would be worth the effort, I am quite scared to do it. My parents have been completely supportive of me. Many here at UCSD have met mom and dad. In fact, they drove the convertible down the parade route with our VIP at Pride this year! Yup, these are the same folks, car swathed in rainbow colors, transsexual activist in the backseat, grooving to the Village People and announced by Nicole at the grandstand, that forgot my same sex partner in the Christmas card.

And then there was a revelation when I actually thought, well... Maybe they did forget him. And it dawned on me how important marriage is to the cultural context of my family.

As my sister and my cousins have grown up and dated people, they were never



mentioned in the Unristmas letters until after marriage. I his even includes tolks that had been living together, even couples that were "great with child." Until that marriage ceremony, they just didn't figure into the equation of family in the same way.

And even though James and I have been together for over two and a half years, and we just purchased our home together, we aren't married. And in this state and country, we can not be.

And that weaves into a deep cultural fabric within my family that allows for the odd yet understandable absence of my partner in the Christmas card.

And so in 2006, as my queer life continues, I will work hard for change: political, educational, legal and cultural. And, after another year of work and life, we will see if James shows up in the Christmas card next year. If not, at least maybe I'll have what it takes to bring it up...



From Shaun Travers, the Director of the LGBT Resource Center...

"After almost four years of dedicated and unwavering service to the UCSD LGBT community, it is my great pleasure (tempered with profound sadness) to announce that Debbi Blake will be transitioning to a new position within the Campus Community Center's team. Her last official day on the job here will be Thursday, January 12th, 2006.

Please join me anytime between 4 and 6pm on that day at the LGBT Resource Center, as we celebrate and recognize her time with us, and as we send her off with well wishes. Not that she will be all that far away...

Debbi will no longer be with the LGBT Resource Center in the roles that we have all experienced these last many years. Instead, she will serve as the Fiscal Services Manager for all three of the Campus Community Center's, which includes us, the Women's Center and the Cross-Cultural Center. Debbi will be physically housed at the Women's Center, and part of the Chancellor's office team.

I had the pleasure of hiring Debbi (although Francesco Carusi, Kim Merino and Leeann Dolbeck comprised the search committee that discovered her) in early July of 2002. Her first assignment: PRIDE. Talk about trial by fire. Debbi tackled the events with gusto, and we had an excellent showing that year. It was a great way for her to connect with the entire community, and allowed for a slow down right afterwards so she could acclimate to the position.

However, her acclimation was never truly over, because her position never stopped growing! That was in large part to Debbi's strong desire, coupled with her true ability to keep expanding what she was doing. During the course of her tenure, she has supervised over a dozen different student interns, night/day managers and coordinators. She has taken the lead on numerous projects and assignments, including all aspects of Rainbow Graduation. Debbi has trained herself in numerous areas of skill, attending over 35 classes offered by Staff Education. In addition, her knowledge of the LGBT community grew through participation in national conferences, including GenderPac in 2003 and the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force Creating Change Conference in 2004. She took a lead role in the registration activities for our own Western Regional UCLGBTIA conference we hosted at UCSD in February 2003.

Debbi has pushed the LGBT Resource Center in exciting new directions. She was integral to our expanding budget for both programs and staffing. Her initial contacts with the David Bohnett Foundation led to our largest grant ever, for the David Bohnett Wireless CyberCenter. And her coordination of internal groups among the Campus Community Centers, including the "Fiscal Sisters" provided a model for collaboration that has served all our communities well.

The broader campus community has benefited from Debbi's presence as well. She has been chair of the Umbrella Group (UCSD's employee LGBT association), co-chair of the Chancellor's Advisory Committee on Gender Identity and Sexual Orientation issues, and active in the Veteran's Association. Her presence on campus will continue to allow us to benefit from her community orientation.

On a personal note, Debbi and I have become quite close friends. We have often joked that we were "married" to each other within the context of our work lives. And there were times when we would see each other for more hours in any given week than we would see our respective partners. It has been during times like these that I have been most grateful that Debbi Blake is the person that she is. In the most vulnerable, sacred moments of my work life at UCSD, Debbi has been a support and confidant. I have truly appreciated that, and will miss her daily (sometimes hourly) presence in my life.

That being said, we still have a big chunk of her time, energy and effort in her new role. So, although this is a change, she will not be too far gone. Again, please join me on Thursday, January 12th between 4 and 6pm at the LGBT Resource Center as we acknowledge Debbi's last day in her current role at the LGBT Resource Center.
