

# **UCSD LGBT TOP STORY**

#### 1) In Memoriam: Drew Mattison, Ph.D.

From Shaun Travers, the Director...

"Dear UCSD LGBT community~

It is with a heavy heart that I write you to let you know that Dr. Drew Mattison passed away over the winter break at the San Diego Hospice after a prolonged struggle with stomach cancer. He was 57. Dr. Mattison was a Clinical Professor of Psychiatry and Family and Preventive Medicine here at UCSD. During this time he and David McWhirter, M.D., his lifelong partner, completed a series of clinical studies that culminated in their landmark 1984 book, The Male Couple. This pioneering study was based on extensive, structured interviews with gay couples, was among the first to document the variety and longevity of their relationships, and was followed by their important video of the same name.

As you know, the gift of the research and personal library of Dr.'s McWhirter and Mattison make up our non-circulating research library for the LGBT Resource Center collections. It is from these materials that much of the background for The Male Couple was drawn. Through the initial work and relationship of UCSD staff member Paul Stravinsky we were able to receive this gift, and we have been blessed by a great relationship with the couple over the years. I have wonderful memories of visiting their home in Palm Springs to pick up the initial 20 boxes of volumes which made up the bulk of the collection.

A public memorial is planned for 10 a.m. on Feb. 18, 2006 at the Cassius Carter Stage at the Old Globe Theater in Balboa Park, San Diego. In lieu of flowers, the family suggests donations to Commonweal, a non-profit health and environmental research institution in Bolinas, California.

I have sent a card from our community to David with our condolences. As we transition to the new space, we will remember the wonderful generosity of Drew, and highlight the collection as part of his legacy to the UCSD and broader LGBT community.

# 15) A Little Bit of History: Coming Out by John O. White '83, Warren

The history of our community's existence on the UCSD campus is incredibly deep and filled with experiences of courage and understanding. This article, written by our very own John O. White for the Alumni Association Monthly Publication, highlights not only the differences between now and 25 years ago, but also the similarities...

"In 1979, when I arrived at UC San Diego Warren College Orientation from Salt Lake City, Utah, I was perhaps naive about Southern California. I had been waiting to 'come out' and college seemed like the perfect place to express myself honestly and proudly-not just my sexual orientation, but also my politics.

I hoped to somehow merge my interest in science and medicine with public policy and social justice issues.

UC San Diego in retrospect was the perfect school for me, although it started out slowly. You see, I asked simply at my student orientation session-'where do I find the gay student organization?' The student affairs staff member politely responded: 'While at one time there was such an organization, there is no such organization now.' I asked why? And the response was, 'I don't know, but you can start such a student organization if you are interested.'


Slowly over the course of my freshman year, I found other lesbian and gay students interested in forming a social-political organization. And in 1980, we founded LAGO-the Lesbian and Gay (student) Organization. This was my first lesson in budgeting, politicking and public speaking. Scared as the devil, a small group of us asked for, and received, a full-page Lesbian and Gay issues section in the Guardian-once each quarter beginning in 1980. For two years, we filled the pages with poems, private reflections, comics, community event announcements, and a listing of resources-mostly off campus. The group was notable by its inclusion of women and men, and I received basic lessons in political activism from my student peers including Paula Rosenstein, '82, Muir, now an accomplished attorney in San Diego, and Linda Sabo, who became a Student Regent.

I took a big step out of the closet with my LAGO co-chair, Christina Alvarez, '84, Warren, M.A. '95, when we were interviewed for a Guardian cover story titled: The Challenge of Being Gay at UCSD, which ran during January 1982. There was no going back at that point, and we were invited with others to be on a panel for the UCSD Contemporary Issues course 'Human Sexuality'.

There were allied offices and places, although at the time there was no formal recognition of this. The counselors from Psychological Counseling and Services were a godsend for many of us as were peer support groups for gay men and lesbians. Academic advisers in the colleges were often helpful, and certain departments like sociology, visual arts, music and political science offered classes that were of a personal and academic interest to many. There were affinity groups such as Associated Students-Assorted Vinyl record store, Groundwork Books, the Food Coop and the CHE collective.

Pretty soon, we figured out that we needed an office and a telephone information line in the Student Center. It was granted by the ASUCSD. We reached out to faculty and staff by hosting quarterly potlucks in the International Center. We worked with faculty and staff on issues in common, including a proposed minor in Lesbian and Gay History, health policy issues, and issues of equality and non-discrimination. We received support and encouragement from helpful faculty such as Professor Harry Hirsch (now at Macalester College in Minnesota). His research and teaching interests include civil liberties and gay and lesbian politics.

One of my favorite memories is the establishment of the first 'Susan B. Anthony' Non-





#### 16) Now available in our library...

What the Bible Really Says About Homosexuality by Daniel A. Helminiak, PhD

Helminiak, a Roman Catholic priest, has done careful reading in current biblical scholarship about homosexuality. While cautioning against viewing biblical teaching as "the last word on sexual ethics," he stresses the need for accurate understanding of what the biblical "facts" are and concludes that "the Bible supplies no real basis for the condemnation of homosexuality." Using the studies of Yale historian John Boswell (Same-Sex Unions in Premodern Europe, LJ 7/94), New Testament seminary professor L. William Countryman, and others, Helminiak examines the story of Sodom (where the sin was inhospitality), Jude's decrying sex with angels, and five texts-Leviticus 18:22 and 20:13, Romans 1:27, I Corinthians 6:9, and I Timothy 1:10-all of which, he concludes, "are concerned with something other than homogenital activity itself."

Students, staff, and faculty may check out books from the Lending Library for two weeks free of charge with a Lending Library account.
