2) Movie Nights at the LGBT Resource Center - Fri, Feb 10th, 5:00pm

This week Elvia is showing the movie "Fire", a deep and important look at the issues facing the rapidly developing India, whose culture is failing to keep up. "In New Delhi Sita, a beautiful and intelligent young woman embarks on an arranged, loveless marriage to a faithless husband, Jatin. The extended family, owners of a video store, live together according to custom. Family tensions escalate. Radha, Sita's sister-in-law, is unable to conceive; her disappointed husband Ashok (Sita's husband's brother) has taken a vow of celibacy, acquired a swami and is often gone. Eventually Jita and Radha develop a physical relationship which is far more emotionally sustaining than they have found with their husbands."

Next week Ryan will be hosting the very relevant "Brother Outsider: The Life of Bayard Rustin" in honor of Black History month. "Long before Martin Luther King, Jr. became a national figure, Bayard Rustin routinely put his body - and his life - on the line as a crusader for racial justice. Rustin's commitment to pacifism and his visionary advocacy of Gandhian nonviolence made him a pioneer in the 1940s, and captured King's imagination in the 1950s. In 1963, with more than 20 years of organizing experience behind him, Rustin brought his unique skills to the crowning glory of his civil rights career: his work organizing the historic March on Washington, the biggest protest America had ever witnessed.

But Rustin was also seen as a political liability. He was openly gay during the fiercely homophobic era of the 40s and 50s; as a result, he was frequently shunned by the very civil rights movement he helped create. The compelling new film 'Brother Outsider: The Life of Bayard Rustin' chronicles Rustin's complex life story, a tale of race, prejudice, and idealism at the heart of 20th century America. Though he had to overcome the stereotypes associated with being an illegitimate son, an African American, a gay man and a one-time member of the Communist Party, Rustin - the ultimate outsider - eventually became a public figure and respected political insider. He not only shaped civil rights movement strategy as a longtime advisor to Martin Luther King, Jr., but was known and respected by numerous U.S. Presidents and foreign leaders."

"The Sex Workers' Art Show Tour is coming to your town! The show is an eye-popping evening of visual and performance art created by people who work in the sex industry to dispel the myth that they are anything short of artists, innovators, and geniuses!

The wildly successful cabaret-style show is hitting the road again, bringing audiences a blend of spoken word, music, burlesque, and multimedia performance art, as well as a visual art display that travels with the show. The artwork and performances offer a wide range of perspectives on sex work, from celebration of prostitution and sexpositivity to views from the darker sides of the industry.

This year's incredible lineup of performers includes acclaimed Whitney Biennial artist and burlesque performer Julie Atlas Muz; iconic queer writer and author of The Chelsea Whistle Michelle Tea; hip-hop poet Juba Kalamka; foremother of the prostitutes' rights movement Scarlot Harlot; artistic director of the only existing Black burlesque troupe Harlem Shake, Simone de la Getto; filmmaker and performance artist Bridget Irish; writer and feminist smut purveyor Tralala Farsi Sentiamo; and tour founder and ringmaster Annie Oakley. 12) PFLAG National Scholarship Program - February 14th

The San Diego County Chapter of Parents, Families, and Friends of Lesbians and Gays (PFLAG/SAN DIEGO) will award four scholarships of \$1,000.00 each: the John Bessemer Memorial Scholarship, the Mary Wagner Memorial Scholarship, the Rob Benzon Memorial Scholarship and the John McCusker Scholarship to four bisexual, transgender, lesbian or gay students planning to attend a San Diego County undergraduate post-secondary educational institution in the fall of 2006 or currently attending such an institution.

The purpose of the awards are to recognize outstanding lesbian, bisexual, transgender and gay youth from the community for their involvement in the gay community and society at large, to encourage post-secondary undergraduate education of lesbian, bisexual, transgender and gay persons, and finally, to promote a positive image of lesbian, bisexual, transgender and gay persons in society.

The eligibility requirements are as follows: You must be a lesbian, bisexual, transgender and gay undergraduate student. The awards are restricted to students attending college in San Diego County or students who are permanent San Diego County residents. You must submit an application with four (4) copies of all materials, and finally, you must attend the San Diego PFLAG awards ceremony Monday, May 22, 2006.

The application deadline is Monday, March 20, 2006 (early application and preferred consideration) Monday, April 17, 2006, 5 p.m. Applications are available at http://www.pflag.com/pages/65.html and there is more information available on the requirements of the scholarship.

14) LGBT Journalism Scholarships - Due Fri, Feb 24th, 2006

The National Gay and Lesbian Task Force is now accepting applications for its Messenger-Anderson Journalism Internship/Scholarship Program for lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender (LGBT) students. Self-identified LGBT undergraduate college students who plan to pursue a degree in journalism, communications or a related field at an accredited 4-year college or university are encouraged to apply.

The Messenger-Anderson Scholarship Award is \$5,000 for the first year, followed by \$2,500 each year for the next two years, bringing the award total to \$10,000. Applicants must re-apply each year. Winners are required to participate in an 8-week Messenger-Anderson Scholarship Intern Program at the Task Force's New York City office during the summer. The postmark deadline for applications is Feb. 24, 2006.

The Messenger-Anderson Scholarships allow students to hone their skills in several areas of communications practice. Responsibilities include writing and editing press releases, updating Web site materials, tracking and archiving news coverage of the Task Force, researching media opportunities and assisting with rapid response to breaking stories. Successful candidates should have strong communication skills, both written and oral; be prepared to work in a fast-paced, newsroom-like environment; and demonstrate a desire and commitment to work in a multicultural environment where commitment to diversity is an important institutional value.

Women and people of color encouraged to apply. The Messenger-Anderson Scholarship was donated by Larry Messenger and Jim Anderson in memory of Lawrence and Selina Messenger. The Messengers believed that there was a pressing need to encourage LGBT people to become more involved in shaping media coverage. Fair coverage of LGBT issues insists upon the basic premise that we are all created equal; however, media coverage today often begins with the discriminatory notion that equality for LGBT people is somehow a matter for debate. By encouraging LGBT students to pursue journalism and by assisting them with their studies, the Task Force hopes to improve the way the LGBT community and movement are covered.

Founded in 1973, the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force Foundation (the Task Force) was the first national lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender (LGBT) civil rights and advocacy organization and remains the movement's leading voice for freedom, justice and equality. We work to build the grassroots political strength of our community by training state and local activists and leaders, working to strengthen the infrastructure of state and local allies, and organizing broad-based campaigns to build public support for complete equality for LGBT people. Our Policy Institute, the community's premier think tank, provides research and policy analysis to support the struggle for complete equality. As part of a broader social justice movement, we work to create a world that respects and makes visible the diversity of human expression and identity where all people may fully participate in society. Lesbian Ethics: Toward New Value by Sarah Lucia Hoagland

Hoagland's Lesbian Ethics is a startling revelation about the nature of social structures and the nature of oppression. She critiques the status quo systems of heterosexuality, provides the reader with a lens to view our world, and offers a refreshing glimpse at a possible future. Hoagland explains that the current systems of domination and oppression are fed by heterosexuality and the refusal to acknowledge other forms of sexuality. By rebelling within designated avenues of rebellion, and reforming within the expected lines of reform, those who wish to change the system unwittingly breathe life into it. The author concludes that in order to defeat the system, we must separate from it, and in this revelation, she includes a brilliant metaphor about a king and his kingdom. She argues that a king cannot be a king with no subjects. In this way, separation from the system collapses it.



UCSD LGBT EXTENDED MOVE INFORMATION

2) Setting the historical context - what all this means

This move represents an historic moment in the life of both the LGBT Resource Center and the LGBT Community at UCSD. In 1992 a request from a single student representing the student organization, then called LGBA, and now the LGBTQIA, said "What LGBA really needs is a resource center for lesbians, gays, and bisexuals." The Chancellor's Advisory Committee on LGBT issues (CACLGBTI) recommended a staffed Resource Center which resulted in a formal request entitled "Proposal to Establish a Lesbian Gay Bisexual Transgender Resource Center At UCSD" which was submitted to Chancellor Robert C. Dynes on September 10, 1998. The process of getting to this permanent space has been long and winding. More detailed information is on our website at <u>http://lgbt.ucsd.edu/about_history.shtml</u>

In the final formal request for a Center, some specifics were detailed, including "A LGBT Resource Center should be located in the University Center neighborhood. An overall floor space of approximately 3,000 sq. ft. should comprise conference rooms, offices, and library/computing resource space."

In November 1999, Chancellor Dynes officially dedicated a 300 square foot space on campus for the LGBT Resource Center (although back then it was designated an "office"). In February 2002, the Resource Center upgraded to its current location of 960 square feet in Building 312 of the University Center. Four years later, the Resource Center is now moving again.

I am delighted to report that we will have a permanent 2,700 square foot facility in the University Center neighborhood, with an operational Wireless CyberCenter, a large conference room, areas for our library, with three full-time professionals as well as eight student employees. This move represents the fulfilling of many, many dreams of our community.

For those of you who are distant from us, we hope to have extensive photographs and more information on our website in the near future.

We won't be so much of a resource center that week, as much as we are a big pile of furniture and files. But it is EXCITING! And, of course, if something dramatic happens (we are queers, right?) don't hesitate to access us, as we are here for you, even in the midst of our move.

8) First day of full operation Friday, February 24th





The Sex Workers' Art Show entertains, arouses, and amazes while simultaneously offering scathing and insightful commentary on notions of class, gender, labor, and sexuality!

6) Movie Nights at the LGBT Resource Center - Fri, Feb 17th, 5:00pm

This week Ryan will be hosting the very relevant "Brother Outsider: The Life of Bayard Rustin" in honor of Black History month. "Long before Martin Luther King, Jr. became a national figure, Bayard Rustin routinely put his body - and his life - on the line as a crusader for racial justice. Rustin's commitment to pacifism and his visionary advocacy of Gandhian nonviolence made him a pioneer in the 1940s, and captured King's imagination in the 1950s. In 1963, with more than 20 years of organizing experience behind him, Rustin brought his unique skills to the crowning glory of his civil rights career: his work organizing the historic March on Washington, the biggest protest America had ever witnessed.

But Rustin was also seen as a political liability. He was openly gay during the fiercely homophobic era of the 40s and 50s; as a result, he was frequently shunned by the very civil rights movement he helped create. The compelling new film 'Brother Outsider: The Life of Bayard Rustin' chronicles Rustin's complex life story, a tale of race, prejudice, and idealism at the heart of 20th century America. Though he had to overcome the stereotypes associated with being an illegitimate son, an African American, a gay man and a one-time member of the Communist Party, Rustin - the ultimate outsider - eventually became a public figure and respected political insider. He not only shaped civil rights movement strategy as a longtime advisor to Martin Luther King, Jr., but was known and respected by numerous U.S. Presidents and foreign leaders."

In keeping with the (mostly) foreign film theme of the quarter, next week Will is showing the film "Todo Sobre Mi Madre (All About My Mother)". "A single mother in Madrid sees her only son die on his 17th birthday as he runs to seek an actress's autograph. She goes to Barcelona to find the lad's father, a transvestite named Lola who does not know he has a child. First she finds her friend, Agrado, also a transvestite; through him she meets Rosa, a young nun bound for El Salvador, and by happenstance, becomes the personal assistant of Huma Rojo, the actress her son admired. She helps Huma manage Nina, the co-star and Huma's lover, and she becomes Rosa's caretaker during a dicey pregnancy. With echoes of Lorca, 'All About Eve,' and 'Streetcar Named Desire,' the mothers (and fathers and actors) live out grief,

love, and friendship."

11) LGBT Journalism Scholarships - Due Fri, Feb 24th, 2006

The National Gay and Lesbian Task Force is now accepting applications for its Messenger-Anderson Journalism Internship/Scholarship Program for lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender (LGBT) students. Self-identified LGBT undergraduate college students who plan to pursue a degree in journalism, communications or a related field at an accredited 4-year college or university are encouraged to apply.

The Messenger-Anderson Scholarship Award is \$5,000 for the first year, followed by \$2,500 each year for the next two years, bringing the award total to \$10,000. Applicants must re-apply each year. Winners are required to participate in an 8-week Messenger-Anderson Scholarship Intern Program at the Task Force's New York City office during the summer. The postmark deadline for applications is Feb. 24, 2006.

The Messenger-Anderson Scholarships allow students to hone their skills in several areas of communications practice. Responsibilities include writing and editing press releases, updating Web site materials, tracking and archiving news coverage of the Task Force, researching media opportunities and assisting with rapid response to breaking stories. Successful candidates should have strong communication skills, both written and oral; be prepared to work in a fast-paced, newsroom-like environment; and demonstrate a desire and commitment to work in a multicultural environment where commitment to diversity is an important institutional value.

Women and people of color encouraged to apply. The Messenger-Anderson Scholarship was donated by Larry Messenger and Jim Anderson in memory of Lawrence and Selina Messenger. Bad Education (2004) Directed by Pedro Almodovar

Handsome, enigmatic ?ngel (Gael Garc?a Bernal) arrives at the Spanish movie offices of director Enrique Goded (Fele Martinez) and happily proclaims that he's actually Enrique's long-lost school chum Ignacio--an announcement that is both less than convincing and more than it seems. A novice actor, ?ngel pitches a semi-autobiographical screenplay in which he's determined to star, a revenge-laden reflection of the doomed love he and Enrique shared as boys before a pedophile priest cruelly intervened. The script, and the lost days it recalls, carefully unfurls into a series of brooding movies-within-movies and memories-inside-memories, which allow the sensual, multiple-role-playing Bernal to give the performance of his young career--among other things, he makes a stunningly convincing drag queen--and Almod?var the opportunity to movingly suggest that people will pay any price to ensure that their stories are told.

Students, staff, and faculty may check out books from the Lending Library for two weeks free of charge with a Lending Library account, and videos/DVD's overnight.
