

The UCSD LGBT Scholarship Program encourages gay, lesbian, bisexual, and transgender UCSD students to apply for the four scholarships made possible by generous contributions from many people, including Chris Arrott, Michael Marx and Donald Marshall, Russ Ty, and others in our community who support our students. The objective of the undergraduate scholarship program is to recognize and encourage academic excellence, and to offer financial support to meritorious students.

All 2006-2007 LGBT Scholarship applications should be submitted to the Lesbian Gay Bisexual Transgender Resource Center (LGBTRC). Applications will be reviewed by a subcommittee of the LGBT Resource Center Advisory Board, made up of faculty and staff members. There will be no student peer review. UCSD does not maintain any record of the sexual orientation of students and all application information will be completely confidential. Notification of awards will be made via mail to the address listed on the application form and not forwarded to the student's permanent address.


This is a part of a series of continuing events where we settle and make our new space truly a home for everyone in our community. The first was the traditional Cherokee Smudging that took place last week.

All About My Mother (1999) Directed by Pedro Almodovar

After her son is killed in an accident, Manuela (Cecilia Roth) leaves Madrid for her old haunts in Barcelona. She reconnects with an old friend, a pre-op transsexual prostitute named La Agrado (Antonia San Juan), who introduces her to Rosa (Penélope Cruz), a young nun who turns out to be pregnant. Meanwhile, Manuela becomes a personal assistant for Huma Rojo (Marisa Paredes), an actress currently playing Blanche DuBois in a production of A Streetcar Named Desire. All About My Mother traces the delicate web of friendship and loss that binds these women together. But fans of writer-director Pedro Almodóvar needn't fret--as always, Almodóvar's work undermines conventional notions of sexual identity and embraces all human possibilities with bright colors and melodramatic plotting. However, All About My Mother approaches its twists and turns with a broader emotional scope than most of Almodovar's work; even the more extravagant aspects of the story are presented quietly, to allow the sadness of life to be as present as the irrepressible vitality of the characters.

UCSD to host "Call to Duty" - Debating the "Don't Ask, Don't Tell" policy

On Friday, April 7th at 7:00pm in the Auditorium at Institute of the Americas on the UCSD campus, the University of California, San Diego will host the "Call To Duty" Tour. The event is free and open to the public.

"Call To Duty" will be a forum to discuss the rationality of the "Don't Ask, Don't Tell" policy with veterans of Operation Iraqi Freedom, veterans of the U.S. Intelligence Community, and discharged gay service members. It will feature the largely unheard voices of young service members who embody the reality of "Don't Ask, Don't Tell" in today's armed forces and highlight the policy's impact on the nation's security. A special guest speaker for the evening will be Rear Admiral Alan M. Steinman.

The past year has seen monumental strides on all fronts in the movement to lift the ban on gays serving openly in the military. Log Cabin Republicans and Servicemembers Legal Defense Network have initiated two historic legal challenges in federal court to attack the constitutionality of the Don't Ask Don't Tell policy. Congressman Marty Meehan (D-MA) and over 100 cosponsors in the U.S. House of Representatives have introduced a bill, the Military Readiness Enhancement Act, which would repeal the law that mandates the ban. The military's mounting recruiting and retention problems have risen to national attention, and new data have shown that the American public now favors lifting the ban. The "Call To Duty" Tour will serve to help introduce the audience to the arguments and issues involved in the debate, and to continue the current wave of momentum toward lifting the ban.

The event is being sponsored by the Dimensions of Culture Program at Thurgood Marshall College, UCSD's Lesbian Gay Bisexual Transgender Resource Center, and San Diego's Lesbian Gay Bisexual Transgender Community Center in Hillcrest.

UCSD School of Medicine's Annual Diversity Symposium, this year entitled: Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender (LGBT) Health Issues Throughout the Life Cycle is the first UCSD one day program planned by a committee whose members represent the LGBT campus as well as the broader LGBT communities in San Diego. The conference is a direct response to the needs and strategies identified in 2003 at the third UCSD Diversity Symposium where the LGBT community was present for the first time. The conference will also be a unique opportunity to establish new networks locally, regionally and nationally.

The target audience for this lectureship includes healthcare providers, healthcare administrators, medical educators, health and allied health professions students, and LGBT community and business leaders.

Who's Community? Understanding Whiteness / Unraveling Racism in the Queer Community April 24th, 5:00pm-7:00pm, Mandeville Room East

In what ways do our queer communities mirror the whiteness of the dominant culture? How can white LGBTQI folks see and acknowledge that the very communities expected to provide comfort and safety may not provide it for LGBTQI people of color?
