

An Interview With

<u> Mary Beebe</u>

Patron of the arts, *James Stuart DeSilva*, contacted UCSD in 1979 with his wish to use the UCSD campus as a site for displaying newly commissioned works of art. The works were to be called the Stuart Collection and an unprecedented collaboration became established at UCSD with the help of the Visual Arts Department and the National Endowment for the Arts.

In 1981, *Mary Beebe* came to UCSD as Director of the Stuart Collection. On my way to interviewing Ms. Beebe I had the fun of walking across a giant chess board which was set up on the grass in front of the Sun God by students of an art class. I made my moves among fanciful life-sized chess pieces, ready to play - an appropriate prelude to interviewing the Director of UCSD's contemporary sculpture collection.

Mary arrived a few minutes late, slightly breathless and definitely ebullient as she easily presented a concentration of material.

Let's begin with your early education.

I grew up in Portland, Oregon, graduated from Bryn Mawr as a Political Science major in 1962. I was going to be an *ambassadoress*. Then I spent a year in Paris at the Sorbonne and l'Ecole du Louvre and I saw art everywhere. Seeing the studio of the sculptor Brancusi in Paris *brought me to my knees*. I hitchhiked around Europe on five dollars per day and saw all the art museums I could.

Do you like the small galleries on the Left Bank in Paris?

No. They have never been much for contemporary art. Paris is not a center for artistic energy any more, as it once was. New York and Los Angeles are the active centers now.

Anyway, I realized that I wanted to work in an art museum so I took a job as an apprentice at the Portland Museum of Art. There were excellent people there. I worked on the American Indian Gallery and the Japanese print collection, but concluded that I had to get out of Portland.

Coincidentally, last month when I interviewed

Mandell Weiss, he said he decided as a young adult that he had to get out of Portland, also.

Oh, I love it there, especially the rain, but I wanted to see other places. After that I worked as curator for the Boston Museum of Fine Arts and the Fogg Museum at Harvard. I was not yet into contemporary art. Then I went to the **Andy Warhohi** show in New York and it knocked me out; also the **Ellsworth Kelly** show in Boston.

Do you see those artists as the beginning of contemporary art?

No. The beginning was with **DeKooning**, **Motherwell** and the Abstractionists of the 50's. The Abstractionists said, "Paint your own soul." Andy Warhohl and the Pop Artists worked as a response to the Abstractionists; the Pop Artists said, "Paint society." Then a whole mix of things developed in art, very complex and pluralistic.

How did you get into contemporary art?

I was working for a Portland theatre company and a group of artists asked me to create an Alternate Space at the Portland museum of Contemporary Art.

What is an Alternate Space?

The Sushi Performance Gallery in San Diego is an outstanding one. It's a space for alternative or non-traditional theatre - performing art.

What is your opinion the La Jolla Museum of Contemporary Art?

It is fabulous. One of the best in the country. I don't think La Jolla realizes how lucky it is to have this museum.

You have been at UCSD as Director of the Stuart Collection since 1981, how have you found this job to be?

This was a challenge, to build something that had never been built before. I love the job, although I find Santa Anas to be worse than snow and ice. I think these hot winds make everyone go crazy.

How about the technical challenges of getting trees to

talk, and erecting the big Sun God? Have these been difficult problems to solve?

We have *Matthew Gregoire* to solve these problems. Artists themselves do not usually have the technical knowledge to do these things, but Matthew is superb.

How about the battle over the neon lights of the Bruce Nauman piece, LUST, ENVY, SLOTH, ETC.?

Well, a little art never really hurt anyone, even though it can cause a big commotion. And I enjoy watching people change. There was *Bill Mitchell*, the former city councilman who said, "If the university displays LUST, it will incite infidelity in the community." Yes, he really did say that.

What are the Stuart Collection's plans for the future?

Our ninth work is *Jackie Farris*' set of three terraces at the Molecular Biology Building. *Alexis Smith's* tiled snake path to Central Library is planned for 1991; this is a visual pun of a serpent of knowledge going through the protected university (Garden of Eden), to the Library as the Center of Knowledge. We have seven new works now being planned.

How are your fund raising efforts going?

Very busily. We have a support group called *The Colleagues*, headed by *Amy Coté* to work on fund raising also.

What did you do for "A Day Without Art"?

That was December First when we shrouded the Sun God and turned off the Bruce Nauman neon lights in commemoration of the toll that has been taken in the art world from AIDS.

I understand that the December issue of Art in America has a picture of part of the Stuart Collection on its cover.

We are very excited about that. We are getting more and more attention. Tours are coming here from Berkeley and Chicago to see our collection. Not many schools have something like this. The Stuart Collection is outstanding and very special. I love being part of it.



Every once in a while the sun was obscured by a cloud, and we shivered slightly. Finishing our pears we got on our bicycles and began to climb in earnest.

As we went higher the grade was steeper, and the clouds darkened. Near the top of the range the wind was so strong that we were almost motionless. With the rain pelting our backs we struggled to put on our ponchos. By the time we reached the crest, we were cold, wet and exhausted. The grade had been so steep at times that it took all our might to pedal.




We headed down the other side and luckily found a trattoria. By now it was late in the afternoon, so we hailed our van to take us to our destination for the night. Along the road to our mountain shelter we saw the Rochester contingent pedaling confidently. They were used to the cold.

The quarters where we were sequestered were Spartan. With my teeth chattering I climbed into bed just to get warm. The mattress was ancient, full of bumps. I felt as though I was packaged with a lot of those styrofoam peanut-like squiggles. It was very comforting. Then I took a hot shower, but my hands and feet were still cold. We walked several doors up the street to the ristorante for dinner. Inside the door were a few chairs facing a television set. The regulars were watching an old Perry Mason rerun dubbed in Italian. From earlier experience I knew that Perry would win his case.

We went upstairs for dinner. The proprietor had been warned that bicyclistshave large appetites. For that reason our dinner consisted of spaghetti, ravioli, coleslaw, lettuce tomato and carrot salad, veal, french fries, and a chocolate cream dessert. We sailed through it in no time.

The next morning was perfectbicyclingweather, overcast, cool and no precipitation. It was downhill all the way to Piacenza, just a short distance to the airport for our flight to take us back to the United States.

The streets were practically empty at just past midnight when we drove down to the UCSD Medical Center. Even the hospital seemed deserted at this late hour as we made our way to the eleventh floor for check in. I was looking forward to a sleeping pill hoping to get a few hours of sleep before the scheduled 7:30 a.m. surgery. But not yet. Even though I had had what I thought were all of my pre-op appointments the week before (heart, blood, lungs, x-rays, ECG, anesthesia etc.), the nurse drew blood, stuck needles, and took vital signs. It wasn't until 3 a.m. that I finally got my sleeping pill. After a few short hours I was awakened to have my temperature taken, brush my teeth and go to surgery. No one spoke to me but each nurse, orderly, doctor carefully checked my wrist bracelet so I felt assured that I was being taken to the correct place for the right operation.

The next several hours are a total blank. I awoke to find bottles of clear fluids and one of my donated blood draining into my arm. The period of recovery had begun.

I enjoyed ordering gourmet meals from the extensive menu...but no appetite. Physical therapy included tilt board, parallel bars, stair-steps, crutches, walker, bolster, weights and complete exhaustion.

However, it didn't take long until I was eating, maneuvering my wheel chair to chat with other patients on the floor, having my hair washed by a student nurse, and receiving a visit from TLC, a beautiful dog of the *Tender Loving Canines Pet Therapy Program*.

After eight days I was ready to leave. Like most elective surgeries, I entered on my own two feet and left in a wheel chair.

But...my totally replaced hip has improved the quality of life 100%!

Holidary Party




