
MR.MANDUI'S report is well over due and would have lost lots of its value if it contained some valuable information.

I am forwarding his report as it is even though it is not correctly reported upon. I have not commented on the report due to its long undue delay and I feel that the situation as reported upon might no longer exist. I think I will be unjust in criticising the Officer in his outdated information.

The patrols objections were not properly carried out. The report does not include up-dated Area Study and the figures were not properly compiled. The reporting Officer is currently out on patrol mainly engaged on Political Education. I will request Officer in Charge, NINGERUM, to mount another patrol to up-date Area Study and assess the present situation of the area.



Subject: INTRODUCTION.

1. This Patrol was launched from Ningerum on Monday 24th of July, 1972 to conduct the Annual Census and other objectives of the Patrol as verbally discussed with the Officer-in-Charge of the Post.
2. The area the Patrol covered was the North Awin Census Division of the Ningerum Local Government Council. It took the Patrol three weeks and two days.
3. During this three weeks and two days the Patrol mainly concentrated on Annual Census, Political Education and collecting taxes on behalf of the Ningerum Local Government council.
4. Providing an excellent accompanying on the Patrol were the following indigenous:- KAIKU+KONAI Projectionist from the Department of Information and Extension Services, UNAM KWAN Public Health and CONSTABLE BAIAI SAJALAI REG NO 0988.

The Patrol attempted to carry out all the instructions issued to the Patrol by the Officer-In-Charge of the Ningerum Patrol Post..

Subject: POLITICAL EDUCATION.

1. As has mentioned in the Patrol Instructions issued to the Patrol by the Officer In Charge of the Post that Political Education will be the main aspect in all discussions. This gives the author of the report another opportunity to attempt and explain clearly to the people the true meaning of the National Coalition Government, National Unity, and Self Government.
2. Other major points stressed to the people during formal and informal discussions were the functions of the House of Assembly and the role of the numbers the National Day Celebration on 11th of September, 1972.

LOCAL GOVERNMENT.

3. It was clearly and carefully explained to the people that Local Government Council is a form of Government beneath and at the same time within National or State forms. With general not specific powers given to by Law which exercise its powers through elected Assembly rather than through officials. Whose powers are separate from those exercise by the central government.
4. Ningerum Local Government council is a form of government but only a small one with a low income. Also the council was just recently formed and does not able to do or carry out concrete developments and services that could satisfy or make the tax payers happy. The people along the road will be much more fortunate than the people living far away from the road, because the Ningerum - Rumginea road has been constructed within their frontiers. I am sure this make some payers happy and be satisfied by sought. However, finally majority of the people have understood that Local Government council is a area machine or local fund to improve and extend social and Public Services at village level and gain higher standard of living in the villages.

NATIONAL UNITY.

5. Another major point the patrol stressed to the people was unification of Papua New Guinea as one Nation. It was clearly explained to the people that at the present stage unity is the key in this most significant period of our country's history (Papua New Guinea).





Subject: SOCIAL.....

1. Education.

Only a small proportion of the children in the area who attend schools. At Brunei the Montford Catholic Mission have demolished the school buildings, because the Councillor reported the Teacher to the mission at Matkomrae of his misbehaviours with the school girls. The Asian Pacific Christian Mission at Hawenai runs a Primary "P" school to Standard two (2). There are forty-five (45) students in standard one and twenty-four (24) boys in standard two. There are so called village or unrecognised schools in the area with low standard and poorly trained staff. A number of the student from the area attending Ningerum Primary "P" School while the rest attending HAWENAI, MATKOMRAE, and RUMGINAE.

2. Health.

While out patrolling in the area it came to the patrol's notice that quite a large number of deaths occurred early this year mainly because of poor health conditions and lack of medical patrols in the area to educate the people about hygiene rules.

4. I therefore strongly recommend that the Department of Public Health must allocate funds for patrolling in such areas. There are two (2) assistant aidpost orderlies, three (3) hospital supervisors and one (1) assistant medical officer, stationed at Ningerum. I can't see why the Public Health Department put aside funds for patrolling using these six men instead of letting them doing nothing on the station.

3. LAW and ORDER

The influence of the basic law and order is well seen through out the area. During the 3 weeks 2 days patrol, there were only minor grievances brought before the attention of the patrol. As these were only minor ones the patrol managed to settle them without difficulties in within its jurisdictions.

Few people were brought to the station for court actions under contra Regulations 101 A NP Papua failing to present themselves for census, when ordered to do so. They were found guilty and each received a month imprisonment at Ningerum Corrective Institutions. Otherwise law and order seems to be good.

4. CENSUS

In terms of the above heading the patrol had attempted to follow the Secretary's Instructions 67-1-O dated 25th November, 1971 and chapters X and V at pages 74 and 16 Departmental Instructions General Field Administration Volume I.

Generally all the villages presented during the taking of the census in the census division. Few family units were absent in their gardeh houses however they were finally rounded up like mop of cattle.

1. The D.I.E.S. Projectionist accompanying the Patrol showed movies to all the villages in the census division. These films certainly helped me a lot in giving Political Education and make the task easier when certain points such as functions of the House and role of the members were discussed with the people during formal and informal discussions.
2. I suggested that future Patrols to all census divisions should provide with them D.I.E.S educational films mainly about the Government of the Papua-New Guinea and the House of the Assembly.
3. Therefore the village people should and must know more about their own Government and its work. They should understand because this will play a greater part in the whole of the Territory. The village people should know more about their own Government and decide on the future self-government with the educated people.
4. The Ningerum Local Government Council tax for 1972-1973 have been collected on behalf of the council and delivered to the council Adviser on ~~xx~~ safe hands.

POPULATION DISTRIBUTION AND TRENDS.

Over the past twelve months there have been quite significant population changes in the Census Division. The last census in this area was conducted in June 1972.

In the June 1971 Census the total population recorded was 676. The population has now increased to 773. This increase is the result of migrations in from the former "enclave" village of OPIKA. The migrations from OPIKA are as follows:-

All residents of KUNDUBIRAN have now migrated out to AMBAGA, KOMOKBIN (South Oktedi C.D.) or LAKE MURRAY as follows :-

The reasons given for the migration from KUNDUBIRAN are (i) a large number of people during the last twelve months (15) (ii) Sago stands near the village are almost depleted (iii) there is a possibility that rubber may be planted near KOMOKBIN.

Over the last twelve months there has been a birth rate of 2.4% and a death rate of 3.4%. This means there has been a natural decrease of 1%. This is rather alarming considering the health services in the area, however it must be noted that over one half of the number of deaths occurred in the village of KUNDUBIRAN. The deaths were spread out over the twelve months thus it cannot be attributed to an epidemic. The symptoms of the sickness point to a form of dysentery. No reports of the sickness were made to NINGERUM during the year.

Villages now range in size from 66 to 352. BIRDEKAMBA 66, KUNGEMBIT 114, AMBAGA 241 and KUNGIM 352. The majority of the people live in the villages however there are many permanent garden houses situated some distance from the villages. These are lived in quite regularly.

There are now two elected Local Government Councillors in the North Oktedi Census Division.

REMAN BUROK - representing KUNGEM and KUNGEMIT.
KUREM KARUN - " AMBAGA " BIRINKAMBA

Both men have a good deal of influence over the constituents of their respective wards.

There appear to be no other leaders in the area.

To date there is no particularly dominant personality amongst the migrations in from OFKA.

LITERACY

There are currently 108 students attending the KUNGIM primary school. The school caters for students from standard 1 to 4. The teachers consist of two Montford Catholic Mission Sisters and two Indigenous teachers. The majority of the students come from KUNGIM and KUNGEMIT however there are 20 from outside the Census Division.

To date there is not a very high standard of literacy in the area however it surpasses that of the nearby NINCEREM Census Division.

ASIA PACIFIC CHRISTIAN MISSION.

ties with this mission are waining rather rapidly with the increase of influence from the MONTFORDS at KUNGIM. In the past there were fairly strong ties between AMBACA and BIRIKAMBA with ATKAMEA however since the European couple departed ATKAMEA these two villages have changed their allegiance to KUNGIM.

MONTFORD CATHOLIC MISSION.

The Catholic Mission was established in this area in the 1940's by Dutch fathers operating from MINATE (W.I.). In the 60's the MONTFORDS took over, being based at KTUNGA. In 1967 KUNGIM Mission Station was established. The station now has a staff of four Europeans who occupy two permanent material houses. The mission has a church, trade store, small hospital and welfare centre. The mission employs a small number of men on general labour duties. The influence of this mission now takes in the whole census division. This has been brought about by patrolling by the father and lay nursing sisters based at KUNGIM. The mission now has a fairly well organized health service to each village. This normally includes a pastor who administers treatment to minor complaints.

STATE OF POLITICAL DEVELOPMENT.

It is evident that there is a growing awareness regarding the Political aspect in this area. This probably the result of voting in three House of Assembly elections and one Council election. There has over the past few years been a strong emphasis on political education in this area. People are well and truly aware of the Council and do take an active part in council activities i.e. NINGERUM - COPE Road. Theirs awareness in the House of Assembly is not so evident possibly due to a feeling of lack of participation. With the recent election of their local member, who has already made one patrol into the area a greater sence of participation may come about. All residents are obviously aware of the House of Assembly to them the functions are rather vague.

With the anticipated introduction of an Area Authority in the near future there is sure to be some degree of confusion. This will only be overcome by patrolling and mass meetings with the two elected members. At least the introduction of an Area Authority may help to stress the importance of unity. Firstly within the District and then within the country.

ATTITUDE TOWARDS LOCAL GOVERNMENT.

The NINGERUM Local Government Council was officially opened on 16th November 1971. Since this date there have been five meetings of the Council. At each meeting there has been a large number of people present - this at least points out the interest in the area.

It has been emphasised to the Councillors the importance of speaking to their constituents before and after each Council meeting. It would appear that the Councillors from this Division have been doing such. I received a report from the father in charge KUNGIM that after each meeting Councillor HEMAN has assembled all residents and entered into lengthy discussions on the subject of Council meetings.

The tax rate for 1971/72 was \$1.00 per male adult. The rate for 1972/73 is \$1.50. There has been almost a 100% response from taxpayers in the area thus all tax for 1971/72 has been collected.

As the Council is only a relatively low income concern the services it can provide are rather limited. The majority of the people realize this and their demands on the Council are not great. Until the tax rate in the area is raised there is not a great deal the Council can do in the area beside supply small services such as ferry's etc.

The people who have migrated in from OPKA to KUNGIM and AMBAGA are extremely keen to join with the Council. They will take part in the elections scheduled for October 1972.





3. All villages except MIGALSIMBIP will join the new Ningerum Council. I believe they will join later on so no pressure has been exerted.
4. This move will, I believe, facilitate our work between Kennecott and the people when and if Mining operations commence.

1.5 Some exploratory work in West Irian was carried out using Kiunga as a base but this has been discontinued. The areas of potential appear to lie only east of the international border.

2. ATTITUDES OF THE PEOPLE.

2.1 Two publicity patrols in 1968 advised the people to be affected by prospecting of Kennecott's application for a prospecting authority. The people were all in favour of any such activity. In November 1968 all leaders from all villages attended a hearing of the Mining Warden at BULTEM. Again there was ready acceptance.

2.2 As the District Commissioner predicted in mid-1969 (situation reports of various dates) the first dissatisfactions expressed by the Star Mountains people concerned alleged preference shown by Kennecott in employing 'outsiders' rather than local men as labourers. By the time of Ningerum patrol 14 of 1970/71 each village had grievances of this nature which were aired to each patrol.

2.3 Petty pilfering has been occurring ever since operations began, and the company has looked on this fairly benevolently as a necessary evil. However Ningerum patrol 16/71-72 recorded the breaking into of the then deserted camp on Mt. Ian and the resultant theft of quantities of food, bedding, tools and tentage. This was the first major offence committed by the Star Mountains people. The last patrol was unable to locate the offenders and despite careful enquiry on this patrol, not even a rumour was heard indicating the identity of the people concerned. None of the stolen material has been sighted. While suspicion rests on the KAVORAPIP/GIGABIP group, it is possible that men from Telefomin or Tifalmin committed the offence while returning to their villages, as many labourers were being discharged at the time.

2.4 The patrol encountered a number of outspoken criticisms of Kennecott:-

- (a) Kennecott staff were accused of deliberately 'fouling' shotgun registrations and fees handed to them for forwarding to Kiunga for renewal action (see Patrol Report, p. 2).
- (b) There was repetition of previous criticism - that men from Star Mountains villages had been dismissed 'for no reason' while outsiders were given preference in employment.
~~(c)~~ This was most strongly voiced at MIGALSIMBIP, where it was found that the people had developed attitudes which were strongly anti-council, moderately anti-Kennecott and mildly anti-government. The Village Constable even wished to resign.
- (c) Two complaints were again aired - following accidents up to three years ago, two men who had lost parts of digits have not as yet received workers' compensation. INDIA KURKIM lost part of his thumb, and FARINIAP of BULTEM lost part of his finger, both in 1969. Compensation payments have not been followed through and finalised, although comprehensive reports by the company are said to have been forwarded to the Department of Labour. While the a/Site Superintendent promised to follow the matter up, he was due to depart on a month's leave soon after the patrol was completed and it is possible the matter may drag on. The people during discussions at TABUBIL referred bitterly to

the company's 'refusal' to pay what is due. It is also possible that ABAU AKANA of MARIA, Koroba area, S.H.D. who lost part of a finger on 17 November 1970 has not yet been compensated.

- (d) Fear that the people would be denied the use of Tabubil medical facilities was first expressed to Ningerum patrol 14 of 1970/71. The people still entertain the fear, caused probably by the medical attendant requiring that out-patients come in with adequate food for their stay at Tabubil (the company feeds in-patients) and that they wash themselves where necessary and desirable before treatment is given. Anything which makes people believe they will not get medical treatment is dangerous in this area with its declining population. Although the people have said that they thought only company employees are entitled to treatment, it was made clear to them that villagers are also entitled to this.

2.5 The problem of 'foreign' labour will have to be watched closely. Villagers were told that men are dismissed for good reason - usually continual absence from work and stealing, and then only after a series of warnings. These men are not re-employable, whereas those laid off because labour lines are being decreased are able to be re-employed. The company lays off men from other areas rather than Star Mountains men in the latter case. However the number of men with cards marked not to be reemployed could grow with time to cover a large proportion of Star Mountains men, all of whom, understandably, display a fairly unsophisticated attitude towards steady work. It may be necessary to reconsider their employability in the future, especially men of the land-owning groups.

2.6 The people generally appreciate the school and health facilities made available by the company, in spite of the reservations expressed by some in para. 2.4(d). The school is becoming too popular, to the extent that children are reported to be trying to leave Olsobip school and come to Tabubil. The free food supplied at the latter is the main attraction, for there are food problems in the Olsobip area similar to those in this census division. The school had broken up during the patrol and I was unable to discuss this trend with the teachers who were attending an in-service training course.

2.7 Star Mountains men who have been continually employed by the company expect to be trained later for skilled jobs, especially driving.

3. LAND

3.1 The people are not perturbed at the present and future land needs of the company should development go ahead. They are willing to release Tabubil and as much of Mt. Ian as is necessary, as they consider these sites 'useless'. However I foresee problems in the future acquisition of land.

3.2 From surveyors and other field workers, as well as from talk around the camp, the people have heard of all the areas of land referred to in the company's engineering feasibility report - the hydro-electric scheme, new township, treatment areas, etc. Most of the information appears to have been passed on to the people while survey lines were being cut in the areas concerned. MIGALSIMBIP people are concerned that they may lose gardening land if a dam is built on the OK MENGA. From the contour plan I saw this will not happen but areas onto which the BCIANGON people (Faiwolmin census division) are now moving - the old GISATARAU gardens (see map) - could possibly be affected.

3.3 The proposed new township site will present the greatest problems. Part of BULTEM village has moved onto it (see map) and gardens have been established. More villagers intend to move onto this land while the remainder will establish another hamlet closer to the former BULTEM hamlets - at the Ok Tedi/ Ok Kam junction. The Ningerum people who are on their own land at MANIKIT, south of the Ok Mani/Ok Tedi junction, stated they had been invited by the BULTEM people to live with them north of the Ok Mani. When this land is required at a later date it will prove politically undesirable to have to move people off the land.

3.4 The WANGBIN people will soon complete their move to a new site, BALONGAVIP, adjacent to Tabubil. At this stage the people are planning to use higher land near WANGBIN to plant taro for subsistence. There are areas between the Ok Tedi and Tabubil which are suitable for warm climate crops - kaukau, bananas, etc. However it is not improbable that a claim will later arise to the effect that 'all' suitable gardening land has been alienated on Tabubil. Little can be done to prevent this as the people are at this stage prepared to give the land away, let alone sell it.

3.5 The Investigation Report on Tabubil land has been completed and it indicates that the WANGBIN people are willing to sell the land 'for a song'. During this patrol they said they were prepared to give it to the company for nothing if necessary. However it has been strongly recommended by the District Commissioner that a high price be paid for this land, much higher than what will be set by the Valuer-General. Over the last three years the people have received occupation fees for the land, and it is doubtful whether the land could be valued at much more than last year's occupation fee. Thus, the people, if they receive a low purchase price for Tabubil, could later claim that they believed it was only another year's occupation fees.

3.6 The possible movement of parts or all of four more villages (BOLWOGAM, KUMGUIT, NICKSIKWI and TUNDENGHIATKWI) onto land at MANIKIT (see map) will also cause pressures on land in the proposed township areas. The people want to be close to Tabubil for census and tax purposes and want to form one ward of the council (see Local Government Survey, para. 15.2.2).

4. ECONOMY

4.1 As mentioned in the body of the Local Government Survey, wages received by labourers comprise the greater part of the income of the area. The people have not yet developed gardens large enough to sell excess food to the company. However many men have the intention to start these gardens near Tabubil.

5. SOCIAL AND WELFARE

5.1 The movement of villages to sites near Tabubil should not cause any social problems. The people however are very conscious of their decreasing population. The following figures from the three last census patrols show this clearly:-

To counter this dwindling population the people are keen to have outsiders come and live with them in their villages. This is happening in two ways - firstly as the BULTEM and WANGBIN men become comparatively affluent, women from Ningerum, Olsobip and Telefomin areas find them attractive as husbands.

Thus over the last two years, a number of women have married into the two villages, particularly BULTEM, bringing relatives to live with them with the encouragement of the Star Mountains people. In addition the Star Mountains people are encouraging anyone from anywhere to come and live in their villages whether related or not. BULTEM people report that 'Chimbu' (probably Wabag) men have 'promised' to fetch their families and return to live in the area. This will obviously create land problems in the future, the Star Mountains people feel that they must have more people in the area to garden their extensive lands.

5.2 The number of travellers in the area moving to and from Tabubil and Mt. Ian to visit Kennecott labourers is growing considerably. For example, the following movements were noted during part of the patrol -

- 13.6.72 Tifalmin Councillor and 9 adults en route to Tabubil.
- 13.8.72 Seven men from Olsobip and Bolivip, with families, en route to Tabubil.
- 15.8.72 Five men from Imigabip returning to village from Tabubil.
- 16.8.72 Twelve men, some women and children, returning to Bolangon and Olsobip from Tabubil.
- 17.7.72 Over forty adults from Telefomin and Tifalmin en route to Tabubil.

18.8.72 Group of five families arrived at Tabubil from Olsobip area. The amount of pedestrian traffic has already given rise to complaints about the misuse of houses and gardens (Ningerum patrol report 14 of 1970-71). These problems will increase.

5.3 GIGABIP and KAVORABIP villages have decided not to move to sites on the OK MANT south-east of Mt. Fubilan, which they had previously stated they would do (Ningerum patrol 16 of 1971-72). Instead KAVORABIP will move to a new site on the KAROM River.

6. RECOMMENDATIONS

6.1 Land

Land purchased must be paid for at a high price, to reduce the effect of the almost inevitable claims which will later arise. As was the case on Bougainville, it will be claimed that the people 'did not know they were selling the land outright' and 'were tricked into selling their land cheaply and look at the development on it now'.

6.2 Kennecott should be asked to advise their land needs as soon as possible to enable rapid investigation/purchase. This should if possible be effected before large settlements and gardens are established. It will be politically embarrassing to any government to have to move people off the land.

6.3 Liaison

There must be closer liaison between the company and officers of our department at the district level, to bring out into the open the problems and attitudes arising amongst the people. The labour aspects seem to be most serious at this stage but land and social problems are beginning. Once the new drilling programme commences towards the end of this year, an officer of at least District Officer level should visit Tabubil for a few days each month to assess attitudes and problems. It is not necessary to appoint a full-



time officer during this phase of development, nor is it desirable, for the following reasons:

- (a) any officer would be dependent upon the company for food, accommodation and transport, which would place him at a psychological disadvantage in bargaining, etc.
- (b) the officer would not have enough work to do, and this raises resentments amongst Kennecott staff, as was found by Mr. Eggleton when he was full-time liaison officer.
- (c) Kennecott management are very conscious of personality clashes and deal with them rapidly and decisively when they arise. The company would be reluctant to have an officer in the camp fulltime who might be involved in such clashes.
- (d) as was also found by our previous liaison officer, Kennecott staff consider any such person a spy, making fulltime co-operation less likely.

6.4 To ensure better contact between the people and the company in the near future, Kennecott management at Tabubil will hold meetings with Village Constables on a semi-formal basis, until such time as the four Star Mountains villages are incorporated into the Ningerum Council. Then meetings will be held with the Councillors just before full Council meetings are due to be held at Ningerum. The Councillors will be flown to and from Council meetings.



Since the last census conducted in May, 1971 the population in this Census Division has increased from 2444 to 2484 an increase 42. A total of 71 deaths were recorded during this period along with 101 births. This resulted in a 3.3% death rate and a 4.0% birth rate per 100. Thus a natural increase of 0.7% resulted. The following amalgamations and movements have taken place since the last census. The villages of MUNURU and MIANOR have now joined forces with SONAI.
