

ELECTION REPORT ON GENERAL ELECTIONS OF DEBU
LOCAL GOVERNMENT COUNCIL HELD FROM 10TH JANUARY,
1966, TO 13TH APRIL, 1966.

(1) DIARY:

See 'Field Officers Journal' - Pages 5,6,7,8.

(2) TYPE AND DURATION OF PRE-ELECTION CAMPAIGN:

Elections for the Debu Local Government Council were originally scheduled to commence on the 24th January, 1966, but due to non-gazettal of this date, proceedings were delayed and the Council wards advised accordingly. On gazettal of the election commencement date, all wards were contacted and advised of polling dates and electoral programmes.

A pre election patrol was not able to be carried out due to a shortage of funds and the lack of staff at Sea'ala Sub.District Office prior to January 1966. As a result, nominations were taken immediately before the actual elections.

(3) CONDUCT OF ELECTIONS:

After receiving nominations and the printing of ballot papers, short, but very informative talks were delivered to the voters by Patrol Officer Mr.R.Gibbs. The talks covered all aspects of the elections and included method of indicating first and second preferences, counting of votes, secret ballot, and the expected support of the people toward their new Councillor.

The Debu Council has now extended and embraces nine new additional wards, the total number of wards now being twenty two. The new wards are AMPHLETT ISLANDS; SANOROA, BOALEWA, WADALSI, URUA, BASIMA, DUDUNA, GAKKA, and SHURUIA. Special attention was given to the new wards especially in relation to the functions of the Council, it's mechanics and benefits it would contribute to their welfare in the future.

(4) INTEREST AND ABSENTEEISM:

A gratifying amount of interest and enthusiasm was shown toward the elections especially so by the nine new member wards of the Council. Not only were average attendances in these wards very good considering the fact that many of the population centres were quite distant from the polling points as compared with the majority of the old member wards, but the display of attentiveness was far above that of all but three or four of the latter.

Old wards such as Dwalura, Nade, Si'ilugu, Tenku, Debu, Kerwea and Darubia displayed uninterest and fielded disappointing attendances. No straightforward reason can be given for this attitude except that the patrol noticed much more life in the new wards as compared with the old wards. Whether or not the pleasing attitudes of the new wards will change as a result ...

.....of being members of the Bobu Council is difficult to fathom, but it is sincerely hoped that it will not.

Excellent attendances and interest were shown by four of the former member wards of the Council, and this compensated to a good degree, for the poor attitude displayed by the abovementioned old wards. Attendances at Bwaiya, Numanuna, Sawaadi and Tawer Mai were one hundred per cent (the statistics) closely followed by Onthus'now and it seems these four wards have grasped a very intelligent outlook in relation to the Council and will be valuable assets to its GROWING success.

FEMALE INTEREST:

Female attendance during the elections were quite pleasing in that figures show that 57% of enrolled females voted, 28% did not for reasons beyond their control and 15% could have but did not do so.

One female candidate stood for election in the ward of Bwaiya and although not successful, polled the second highest number of votes, defeating three other male candidates. (See 'Bwaiya')

MALE INTEREST:

One thousand six hundred and twenty nine males (56%) voted out of an enrolled number of 2957. One thousand two hundred males (40%) were unavoidably absent leaving a percentage of 4% (128) who could have voted but did not.

OPPOSITION TO THE COUNCIL:

Only one incident of opposition to the Bobu Local Government Council was encountered during the elections. This occurred at Duduna and it was reported to the patrol that one individual was firmly opposed to his ward becoming a member of the Council, even though he had voted for a Councillor. Upon discussion, it was found that if the ward did join the Council, this person had enough domestic work to do without devoting his time to Council projects. After a lengthy discussion, the objector was finally convinced that his ward's presence in the Council would benefit both himself and his children in the future.

SCRUTINIZERS:

No scrutineers were nominated by the candidates as in most cases the candidates themselves attended the scrutiny.

ELECTED OFFICE BEARERS:

The first meeting of the "Extended Council" was held on the 15th and 16th of April, 1966. The former President Nelson Kainmale and Vice President, Boitau Sonale were re-elected to these positions respectively.

AMPHLETT'S:

Due to the scattered and very remote Amphlett Islands and the unavailability of a motor vessel to forward mail, the people of this ward did not receive a pre election letter indicating the date and full particulars of the forthcoming Debu Local Government election. As a result, 72 out of 176 enrolled voters attended the poll. The M.V.'Yelengili' was operated to carry people from neighbouring islands to the Government Rest House at Nabwagetta, but it was not possible to locate a larger number than about 25 as many were working in gardens far from the villages and a large party of males was absent on Fergusson Island collecting food.

However the poll was conducted, but far from smoothly, the reason being not that the people did not understand the mechanics and motives of an election, but because many of them could not immediately remember their names as entered in the Census Register, with a result that the election took over three hours to complete.

Three candidates were nominated to stand for election as Councillor for the ward, Dauiaho Iai'iwai being elected with 42 votes followed by Dien Takosi with 30 votes, the third candidate receiving nil votes.

SANOROA:

The election of a Councillor to represent the ward of Sanorea was conducted at the Government Rest House in the village of Etana. Two candidates stood for election with Steven Kinokine polling 98 votes to Basil Bemide's 32 votes in an election which ran smoothly. Attendance was fair with 130 people attending the poll out of an enrolled number of 190 with 20 being unavoidably absent.

BOSALEWA AND WADALEI:

Due to another pre election briefing letter going astray, the people in the ward of Bosalewa were not prepared to attend the poll and were asked to be present at the Wadalei polling point to cast their votes as the patrol did not wish to break it's schedule with the remaining wards. Four candidates were nominated and voting once again moved smoothly with Eminose Baresi being elected as Councillor with 106 votes, his nearest rival being Diule Sadei who received 9 votes. Attendance was a marked improvement on the two previous wards visited, with a total of 117 voters out of an enrolled number of 169 with 47 people being unavoidably absent.

Two candidates stood for election to represent the ward of Wadalei, the election being conducted almost immediately after the completion of the Bosalewa ward election. Bebeia Kadimaina was successful with 92 votes to Gigmoe Beladi's 56 votes. The number of people attending the election was excellent with 148 voting out of an enrolled number of 193, with 43 being unavoidably absent.

URUA:

Two candidates were nominated by the people to represent the ward of Urua, with Tamaniuia being chosen as Councillor with a total of 126 votes recorded to.....

.....as against 60 votes polled by his rival, Kakukosi Labeloni. Once again, attendance was very gratifying and indicative of enthusiasm, with 186 people attending the poll to choose their representative on the Council. With 212 voters enrolled and 24 unavoidably absent, it meant that only two individuals could have attended but did not.

BASIMA:

For the ward of Basima, two candidates contested the seat; Abedi Townipe and Togadeia Awa'e. In a smoothly proceeding poll, Abedi, much the younger man, was elected with 132 votes to his rival's 100. Attendance was excellent with 232 votes being recorded out of 289 enrolments, with 56 people unavoidably absent.

DUDUNA:

Two candidates contested the seat in the ward of Duduna, with Sibele Leyuga being elected Councillor, polling 60 votes to the remaining candidate's, Keulika Fauliu, 43 votes. Attendance was again good with a total of 103 people voting out of an enrolled number of 142, there being 36 unavoidably absent.

GAREA:

The election of a Councillor to represent the ward of Garea turned out to be more interesting than the polls previously conducted to it, as the result of the peoples' choice was quite evenly divided in that Mwalagosi Tunalia defeated Kabam Sedeweia by 64 votes to 55. A hard climb to the Beast House for the aged and frequent rain showers did nothing to deter the attendance figures which showed that 119 people voted out of an enrolled number of 150, there being 26 unavoidably absent.

SEBUTUIA:

Once again, good attendance at the polls to elect a Councillor was evident at Sebutuia. A smoothly proceeding election showed that from an enrolled number of 242, 217 voted with 44 being unavoidably absent. Two candidates nominated, with Kwaliu Kenaisu being voted in as Councillor, polling 180 votes to Macli Kwiabigu's 37 votes.

NADE:

The gratifying line of high attendance was lowered at Nade, so much so that 26 people could have attended the poll but did not. Furthermore, figures illustrate that a total of 108 people were unavoidably absent, quite a percentage of these being 'sick'. Four candidates (Budemi Tedinale, Lubai Deulele, Samwaleta Malisi'ia and Kalamagu Tedinale) stood for election and on the first count each received 38, 58, 12, and 8 votes respectively. Completion of the second count finalised the election with Lubai receiving 3 additional votes, Budemi 1 and Samwaleta 2.

SILILUGU:

Sililugu was found to be similar to Nade in that attendance was again disappointing. From a total of 139 enrolled voters only 64 voted, the number of unavoidably absent people being 45. Candidates Abaliga Nica and Lalaia Aidani stood with Abaliga polling successfully on 51 votes to Lalaia's 13 votes.

GOMBA:

Due to the nomination of only one candidate in this ward, conduction of an election was unnecessary and Nevi Leia filled the position of Councillor automatically.

TAKWADAI (DASULANA):

Three candidates stood for election in this ward including Adama Lobosani, the previous Councillor, who sought re-election. The successful candidate, Kaloga Ailelani, polled 57 votes followed by Adama with 29 and Daulo Madiloia 6 votes. The overall attendance of females was very low with 24 women recording their votes out of an enrolled total of 111. This was due to a misinterpretation of the pre-election letter which clearly stated that both enrolled males and females were eligible to attend the polls. The male attendance however was excellent with 78 casting their votes out of an enrolled number of 143, there being 64 unavoidably absent.

DEAIDOA:

Five candidates nominated in the ward of Ewaioea including last term's Debu Local Government Council's Vice President (Folitoa Semale) and of note, a female, (Dina Didiwai) who also stood for election during the previous poll. Although only receiving 9 votes to Boitau's 146, Dina was his nearest rival as the remaining candidates, Antonic, Doageiwa and Pesciliela polled 3, 4, and 3 votes respectively. Attendance was most excellent in this ward as 170 people voted out of an enrolled number of 339, there being 169 voters unavoidably absent.

HUMARUMA:

Due to the larger than usual population of this ward, two seats were required to be occupied. FOUR candidates contested the election and on conclusion, Tedi Huvanura and Kwaradeda Boizili were seated with 151 and 27 votes respectively. Again, as above, the number of people who attended the election was a clear cut example of much interest and enthusiasm shown by the people toward the Council. Two hundred and one people voted and 167 were unavoidably absent out of a total enrolled number of 368.

SAKABEI:

Sickila Nagaleta, the former Councillor.....

.....for this ward stood for re-election against four other candidates as was again appointed by the people with a tally of 114 votes to the nearest candidate's 28 votes. Once again, attendance was on an even par with the two abovementioned wards with 164 voters being present, 130 being unavoidably absent and a total enrollment of 294.

DOBU:

Dobu is the most populated ward in the Dobu Local Government Council and although it is approximately only one mile across water from the three abovementioned highly interested and enthusiastic wards, and about the same distance in proximity to the Esa'ala Sub District Office and therefore sophisticated to perhaps a higher degree than the more remote wards, attendance was most displeasing. Having an enrollment of 529 eligible voters and a total of 234 unavoidably absent, one at once notices the blaring lack of interest shown when only 180 people recorded their votes.

Two seats were required to be occupied to represent this ward on the Council, the people being able to select from five nominations. The elected Councillors were Isbagumina Bwai'wiedi who received 96 votes and Gogononi Didilue with 43 votes, the unsuccessful candidates polling 17, 14 and 10 votes.

BWAKELA:

In this ward, two seats were required to be filled from a selection of four candidates. The elected Councillors were (after re-distributing to the fourth count) Adalaia Dimda with 83 votes and Peiani Bisabe with 56 votes. Attendance figures show that 164 people voted out of an enrolled number of 390, there being 162 unavoidably absent which left the patrol very disappointed.

KORUMA:

Four candidates stood for election in this ward, Nelson Kainsmale, the former President of the Dobu Local Government Council being included although he was not able to be present at the poll, his nomination being accepted at Esa'ala Sub District Office beforehand. Nelson was re-elected with a total of 62 votes to his credit followed by Makisimo Beniamanina with 18, Ledimo Mar with 1 vote and Teiagwa Nipoga with nil votes. Attendance was very disappointing in that only 81 people recorded their votes out of an enrolled number of 244, there being 120 unavoidably absent.

TAULU / SISIANA:

The election for the ward of Taulu was conducted at sub District Office Esa'ala. Four candidates were nominated and the counting was carried to the third count before Mogbi Ilaidia was able to secure an absolute majority. On the first count.....

.....Moabi received 40 votes, Gamakwea Minibu'ei 33, James Gunawalei 23 and Inoki Sabaiqunu 18 votes. On the second count, second preferences on Inoki's ballot papers were re-distributed to the remaining three candidates, Moabi receiving an additional 4 votes, Gamakwea 6 and James 8 votes. With no absolute majority in sight, second preferences on James's ballot papers were re-distributed with Moabi receiving 11 additional votes to bring his tally to 55 and thus an absolute majority over Gamakwea who received 12 more votes to bring his tally to 51 votes. Attendance was fair with 114 people voting out of an enrolled number of 254, 117 being unavoidably absent.

DARUBIA:

Five nominations were forwarded in this ward. Voting proceeded very smoothly in spite of frequent heavy showers of rain, with Didibweri Guismansua being elected Councillor with 64 votes followed by Sibeigai Simadu with 20, Begeigei Tadailmi with 13, Meicelani Giuumusua with 5 and Salimi Gamakai with 3 votes. Attendance figures again were low with 105 voters attending the polls out of an enrolled number of 241, there being 99 unavoidably absent.

Gonwebila:

Due to a miscalculation by the patrol prior to the election and only discovered afterwards, a bye-election to fill two seats will have to be conducted for the ward of Gonwebila which includes the village of Salome, as, during the election patrol, separate polls for both Gonwebila and Salome were held instead of one poll for both. This bye election will be held as soon as gazetted of the date eventuates.


