

The Juilliard String Quartet to perform

January 11, 1982

The Juilliard String Quartet, known as "the first family of chamber music," will present a concert at 8 p.m. Saturday, January 30, in the Mandeville Center Auditorium at the University of California, San Diego.

The celebrated quartet will perform Haydn's "Quartet in B flat, Opus 64, No. 3," "Quartet by Morton Subotnick" and "Quartet in A minor, Opus 41, No. I," by Schumann.

The Juilliard String Quartet, founded in 1946, is the quartet-in-residence at the Juilliard School. Its repertoire comprises 580 full-length works, ranging from the classics to the modern works of Bartok, Webern, Schoenberg and Ginastera.

The members of the quartet are: Robert Mann, violin; Earl Carlyss, violin; Samuel Rhodes, viola, and Joel Krosnick, cello.

The Juilliard Quartet is generally acknowledged to be one of the finest quartets in the world. Its concerts in the United States and Europe are always sold out and critics search for fresh superlatives to describe each performance.

The concert is the second in the UC San Diego Chamber Music Series, sponsored by the University Events Office. Tickets are \$10 for orchestra seating and \$9 for main floor seating and are available at the UCSD University Events Box Office, 452-4559.

Upcoming concerts are the Glinka String Quartet on February 4, the Bartok Quartet on March 4 and the Beaux Arts Trio on March 13.
