I am enclosing a Memorandum indicating what it is that I might try to do. It is my hope that General Hester would serve as Secretary of the Commission described in this Memorandum, and that other good men will make themselves available. There is considerable doubt in my mind that any of the large foundations would want to provide funds for such an unconventional approach, though I do not anticipate any difficulty in finding a suitable university or some other tax exempt organization to take over the administration of funds, if funds can be obtained.

I would very much appreciate your looking over this material and letting me know whether you are interested at all, in which case we could perhaps talk about the matter at some time convenient to you. After March 14th, I
