SIX UCSD FACULTY MEMBERS SELECTED AS FELLOWS OF AMERICAN ACADEMY OF ARTS AND SCIENCES

Six University of California, San Diego faculty members have been selected as Fellows of the 211-yearold American Academy of Arts and Sciences, in recognition of their distinguished contributions to science, scholarship, public affairs and the arts.

The UCSD faculty members who have been elected as Fellows are: John Dower, a professor of history; Marilyn Farquhar, a professor of pathology; Gary Jacobson, a professor of political science; George Mandler, a professor of psychology; Donald Norman, a professor of psychology and chairman of the department of cognitive science; and Michael Rosenfeld, a professor of medicine with UCSD's Medical School.

The American Academy of Arts and Sciences elected 195 Fellows at its annual meeting this year. The purpose of the Academy, founded in 1780 by John Adams, is to "gather together the country's leading figures from universities, government, business, and the creative arts to exchange ideas and to promote knowledge for the public interest."
