HONORIE NOCON ~ RECIPIENT OF THE BERTHA LEBUS SCHOLARSHIP

In my interrupted academic career, I have been fortunate to receive various kinds of recognition. Receiving the Bertha Lebus scholarship, however, has been especially meaningful. As a returning doctoral student (of a certain age), a sense of community has been somewhat elusive. Many of my academic peers are closer in age to my children than to me. Receiving the Bertha Lebus scholarship was a wonderful reminder that I am not alone, and that there are caring people who understand both the challenges and rewards of "going back to school."

My path to doctoral studies is not unusual, especially for those of us caught somewhere between Doris Day and Gloria Steinum. I was first woman to go to college in a very large extended family that lived just outside South Philadelphia. College was not part of our family culture. My father had broken the pattern and become a civil servant. Our family moved to Alaska, the Philippines, and finally settled in the D.C. Metro Area. In high school, I became interested in cultures and language. I had the opportunity to be an exchange student in the Dominican Republic and to participate in a summer honors program that studied the nature and expression of community. I desperately wanted to go to Georgetown University to study International

Relations. I studied hard, was active in migrant worker camps to enroll the student government and service organizations, and was accepted early decision. My family and I were not sophisticated about financial aid. There were five children, and my parents did not own a home. Financially, it was impossible.

Our family ethos was to work. College was viewed instrumentally as a path to better jobs and job security. For women, a college degree was the path to a college-educated husband. I, who had always loved to read and learn, and was called "the dreamer," suspected they had it wrong. I worked my way through an undergraduate degree in Spanish from the University of Maryland. Though I worked 35 hours a week, I graduated in 3.5 years with high honors and near complete exhaustion. It seemed, however, that my ticket was punched.

I began work as a contracts analyst and translator and then married a naval officer and had two sons. As I followed my husband (who left the Navy after four years and suffered from the shifting economy that closed plants and encouraged downsizing), I worked in community education projects. I was director of an adult education and community center, serving Spanish speakers. I tutored immigrant families in English. I worked as a public school aide visiting

workers' children in the local schools. When my youngest child entered kindergarten, I went back to school to take a masterís degree in Spanish, concentrating in linguistics. As I had in my undergraduate years, I worked my way through, teaching Spanish and assisting with research. It took four years, but I graduated with a thesis that generated a published paper and employment as a research associate at SDŠU's National Language Research Center.

My master's thesis dealt with the attitudes of English dominant students of Spanish toward Spanish speakers. My data suggested that the study of language itself, when it is a university requirement, does not assure, or even promote intercultural communication and understanding. Based on my years teaching post-secondary Spanish, I had suspected this. I wanted to know more about the roles of languages and cultures in inter-personal and interinstitutional communication. That desire brought me to UCSD and to the study of Communication. I have been fortunate to study with Michael Cole and the international and interdisciplinary cohort of scholars and students at the Laboratory of Comparative Human Cognition.

Once again, I have been working my way through, but this time, with

even more rewarding work, bringing university students and researchers together with community members and children in after school programs that celebrate both diversity and academic competence. My research, which is associated with developing and supporting these programs, explores the formation of community in diversity and the processes of intercultural, inter-personal, and interinstitutional communication that involves. I am particularly interested in the spirit of volunteerism that appears to be essential to the success of these collaborative efforts. I have been fortunate to observe its emergence among students, colleagues, and community members; among people of diverse socio-economic backgrounds, different ethno-linguistic heritages, genders, and institutional affiliations. The Bertha Lebus award has assisted me in studying this phenomenon and in continuing to work with children in whose family cultures college does not figure. I am grateful for both the economic and the spiritual support.§

CAMPUS PARKING UPDATE

Believe it or not there are almost always open parking places at UCSD but, during busy periods, they may only be in the peripheral lots. OCEANID NANCY VAN DORN

I take this opportunity to announce to her many friends the sudden death of my loving wife Nancy Van Dorn, who brightened the lives of all who knew her. I can think of no better way to mark her passing than the following paraphrase of Shakespeare's (oceanographic) Sonnet LV:

DR. WIGBERT C. WIEDERHOLT,

Respected and beloved professor, physician and researcher, an expert on neurodengerative disease, and chair of UCSD Dept. of Neurosciences, died of cancer March 9; he was 68.

DR. KENT R. WILSON

World-renowned UCSD chemistry professor whose work with X-ray bursts have helped move toward the goal of visualizing chemical reactions on an atomic scale, lost his battle with prostate cancer March 27; he was 63.

MELVIN J. VOIGHT

A campus memorial service was held March 3, to honor UCSD's first university librarian; he died February 4 at age 88. Voight was the architect of the seven-library system, developing a system to purchase core books for UCSD, UCI, and UCSC.

HERBERT SCHILLER

UCSD professor emeritus of communication died January 29 after a long illness; he was 80. Schiller was an economist whose early work founded what came to be known as the critical political economy school of communication research.

SHELDON SCHULTZ FIRES THE STARTING GUN

"The race to higher frequency has begun!", said Sheldon (Shelly) Schultz, physicist at UCSD, in an article by Peter Weiss, Science News, Vol. 157, March 25, 2000. Schultz and David R. Smith have led their scientific team at UCSD into a new dimension.

Unveiling their creation March 21 in Minneapolis at a meeting of the American Physical Society, they were congratulated for "...a great step forward" by John B. Pendry of Imperial College, London. Pendry and his colleagues laid groundwork for the new development.

Schultz and the team's work centers around how electromagnetic radiation functions. They created a devise with electroplated C-shaped copper rings, aluminum plates, and

rows

of copper rods. Even though the structure requires no power to function, the researchers say it influences electromagnetic waves as if it were a continuous material. "For any material, two properties known as permittivity and permeability determine how the material responds to electric and magnetic fields, respectively. If either

property takes on a negative value, something unusual is going on," said the article.

The researchers were able to influence both permittivity and permeability of their device, creating two negatives within a narrow band of microwave frequencies using both computer simulations and experiments. This is the first time that condition has been seen in any material or device, although, say the researchers, "...negative permittivity alone has been observed..."

"The range of materials for controlling microwaves is very limited," says Pendry, making this research important.

> "Schultz and Smith say that their innovation promises to lead to new types of microwave components, such as oscillators, antennae,

and delay lines," said the article.

The researchers predict their

device will reverse normal effects such as causing radiation to act contrary to the way it does in ordinary materials, and pressure ordinarily exerted by electromagnetic radiation to become an attractive force. Experiments will soon be conducted to verify these and other

peculiar behaviors. But a tougher challenge awaits them — creating a visible-light version by fabricating components on the scale of nanometers instead of the centimeters now utilized. But, says the article, "....Schultz predicts, nonetheless, that such a material's strangeness and possible usefulness will spark a mad dash among researchers to build it." (Shelly is the husband of Oceanid Carol Schultz, Bear Facts first editor. ...Ed.)
