

Lecture series, "Adventures in Research" continues with Paul Pickowicz's lecture on "Report from a Chinese Village: Is Modernization Really Possible?"

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Paul Pickowicz, an associate professor of history at the University of California, San Diego and director of the Chinese Studies Program, will offer a personal look at life in a Chinese village during the next "Adventures in Research" lecture scheduled for Wednesday, January 28.

Pickowicz, one of the first Americans allowed to live and do research in a peasant commune in the People's Republic of China, has titled his talk: "Report from a Chinese Village: Is Modernization Really Possible?" It will be given at noon in Conference Room 111A in the Administrative Complex.

The talk is the second of four "Adventures in Research" lectures offered during the winter quarter at UC San Diego.

The remaining two lectures will feature an oceanographer discussing new life forms recently discovered on the ocean floor and a former ambassador to the Comprehensive Nuclear Test Ban Treaty negotiations reminiscing about dealing with the Russians.

On February 11 Bud Smithey of Scripps Institution of Oceanography will speak about "Deep Ocean Hot Springs: An Oasis of Life" at noon in Conference Room 111A.

Former UC San Diego Chancellor Herbert York, director of the Science, Technology and Public Affairs Program, will talk about "Negotiating with the Russians: A Personal Experience" at noon on February 25 in Conference Room 111A.

The public is invited and admission is free to the lecture series which is sponsored by the Council of Provosts, the Public Information Office and Third College.

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
