UCSD COMPUTER SCIENTIST AWARDED FULBRIGHT GRANT

Te C. Hu, a professor in the Department of Computer Science and Engineering at the University of California, San Diego, has received a Fulbright grant for the 1994-95 academic year.

Hu will use the grant, awarded on the basis of a national competition, to conduct research at the University of Bonn in Germany.

The grants, administered by the United States Information Agency, are awarded by the J. William Fulbright Foreign Scholarship Board and are designed to support international educational exchange.

Hu earned his bachelor's degree in engineering from the National Taiwan University in 1953. He subsequently received his master's degree in engineering from the University of Illinois in 1956, and a Ph.D. in applied mathematics from Brown University in 1960.

During the next six years, Hu was a research staff member of the IBM Research Center. Subsequently, he joined the Mathematics Research Center at the University of Wisconsin where he was a professor of computer science. He joined the UCSD faculty in 1974.

Hu is the author of several textbooks including Integer Programming and Network Flows (translated into German, Russian, and Japanese) and Combinatorial Algorithms, both published by Addison-Wesley. He is co-author of Mathematical Programming with S. M. Robinson (Academic Press) and Theory and Concepts of Circuit Layout with E. S. Kuh (IEEE Press).

His current interests are computer-aided design and combinatorial algorithms.

Hu served as a consultant from 1968-72 to the Office of Emergency Preparedness, in the Executive office of the President. He also has worked as an associate editor and editor for the journals of ORSA, SIAM, and IEEE Transactions on Computers.
