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



#### SUCCESS WITH GRAY WHALES

Blowing winds and frothy seas arrive sometime in September around the Arctic Circle and the Bering Sea. Precious energy expended just to take a breath soon becomes too costly for the thousands of California Gray Whales which have spent the summer months gorging themselves on gammarid amphipods. Feeding now ceases and associated bodily functions shut down. Fat reserves must now sustain the grays for the next eight months. It is time for their arduous journey to begin.

Six thousand miles will be covered as the herd travels to protected lagoons, situated on the Pacific side of the Baja peninsula. The Grays are there to the calve and mate.

This will be the 27th year that gray whale behaviorist Al Pentis has led the Newcomers' trips to view the whales from chartered boats. Because the herd passes just offshore—often being spotted from Pt. La Jolla—sightings are almost guaranteed. The two-hour trip will leave from Mission Bay and head north into the inshore area known as the "migration highway". A unique view of SIO and the bluffs above is another incentive to join the cruise.

The recovery of gray whales from near extinction in the 1930s is quite a success story. They were hunted to an estimated population of only 300 for their stores of blubber which was rendered into oil. After being placed on the Endangered Species List, the herd has grown steadily to about 24,000 (prehunting population?) and their only real threat today is by insensitive and uninformed boaters who race out and harass them.

However, the saga of the gray whales and their recovery is not over. The Mitsubishi Corporation, in partnership with the Mexican Government, is proposing to build a salt works in San Ignacio Lagoon, Baja California, which some believe may put the herd in jeopardy. This is a significant calving and mating arena and noise, as well as activity, is of great concern.

By March, the herd is ready to begin its return journey to their Arctic feeding grounds. Half of the females have given birth and their calves are now about two months old. The rest of the females are pregnant; they will give birth the following year when they return to the lagoons. Since the groups traveling north are more sporadic, they are harder to locate and the whale watching season tapers off.§

#### NEW DIRECTOR TAKES THE HELM AT SIO

Charles F. Kennel was appointed the new Director of Scripps Institution of Oceanography at UCSD, and approved by the University of California Board of Regents in November.

Kennel is a physicist and has been the executive vice Chancellor at UCLA. He succeed Edward Allan Frieman who retired from the position in August 1996. Frieman will continue to serve as Scripps research professor, while Kennel will assume his new duties at SIO in the spring of '98.

"I am truly honored to be selected to serve as director of the world's greatest institution of its kind," Kennel said. "As I contemplate embarking on the challenge of leading Scripps Institution of Oceanography I do so with the full realization that its greatness lies in the intelligence, creativity, and dedication of

its men and women. I look forward to working with them in the area of global environmental science, which I came to love while at NASA. From 1994-96, Kennel served as associate administrator for NASA's Mission to Planet Earth program, the world's largest environmental science program.

Kennel, 58, will become the ninth director of Scripps, as well as UCSD vice chancellor of Marine Sciences, dean of the graduate school of Marine Sciences, and a professor in the Scripps graduate department. He was born in Cambridge, Mass., and received his bachelor's degree in astronomy from Harvard College in 1959 and a doctoral degree in astrophysical sciences from Princeton University in 1964.§
