

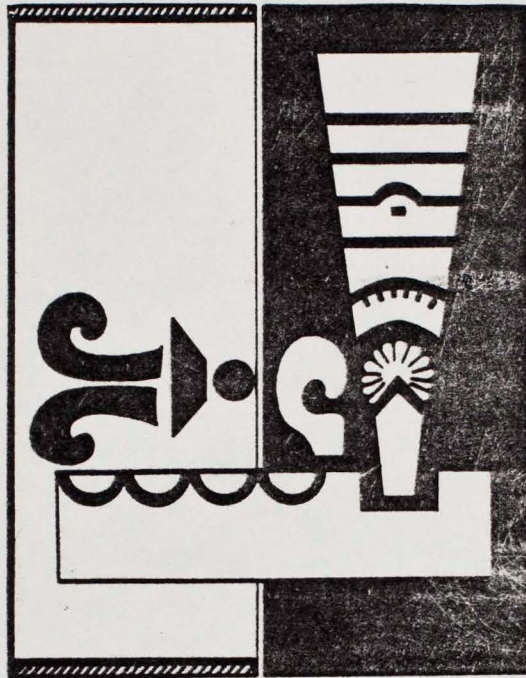

DR. CARLOS CORTES

—A young brilliant historian, Professor of History and Chairperson of the Chicano Studies Department at the University of California at Riverside. He has authored a number of books, book reviews, articles, and films.

RUDOLFO A. ANAYA

Rudolfo Anaya was born and raised in New Mexico. He received his B.A. and M.A. from the University of New Mexico where he is an Assistant Professor of English.

He is best known for his novel, *Bless Me Ultima* which won him critical acclaim. A second novel, *Heart of Aztlan*, was published in 1976. Anaya has also written numerous literary articles and several short stories and plays. He has edited several major works and participated in the KCET-TV "Visions" project.

Mr. Anaya has traveled throughout Mexico and the United States. This has enabled him to continue writing and speaking on various aspects of the Chicano experience.

CARMELA LACAYO

Carmela Lacayo received her undergraduate education at Immaculate Heart College in the field of Social Welfare. She also received a B.A. in psychology from the Regina Mundi Pontifical University in Rome, Italy. She is presently president of the Asociacion Nacional Pro Personas Mayores and president/founder of the National Hispanic Institute of Public Policy.

Lacayo was named Latine Woman of the Year in 1976 in Los Angeles, and was also honored by the Latin American Professional Women's Association as National Woman of the Year.

Renown speaker, educator who is actively involved in the Chicano movement especially as it relates to the Hispanic woman.

LORENZA SCHMIDT

Lorenza Schmidt has done extensive work in the field of education. She received her B.A. from the University of California at Berkeley, and her teaching credential from Fresno State University. She is presently the Associate Dean of Students and Director of Middle Earth University of California at Irvine.

Among the various areas in which Schmidt has been involved are counseling, affirmative action, curriculum development, adult education, and educational opportunities for potential minority student drop outs.

In 1976 she was appointed to the California State Board of Education by Governor Brown. She is also a member of the Governor's Advisory Committee on Child Development; the Industry Education Council of California, and the National Task Force on Desegregation Strategies.

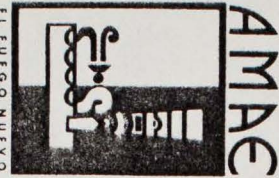
