REVELLE BARGAIN BOOKS

It is the beginning of a new quarter which means that you probably have old books that you no longer need leftover from last quarter and new books that you need to buy for this quarter. One alternative to the low price you receive for your old books and the high price you pay for new books at the UCSD Bookstore is Revelle Bargain Books. Revelle Bargain Books is a consignment bookstore located on campus across from the mudhuts by the Revelle Cafeteria and is open Mon.-Fri. from 9-5.

To sell your old books just bring them in to the bookstore and name

a price, up to 75% of the original price. It is recommended that you ask about 60%, but you might want to ask less for books in poor condition or books that are no longer being used for classes. You receive your money after the book has been sold, and you should come in to check approximately once every three weeks. If a book does not sell right away, don't despair. As long as you go into check on it at least once a year you can leave it in the bookstore indefinitely. If you let more than a year go by without checking on the book it then becomes property of Revelle Bargain Books.

New books are priced at the Student's asking price plus an additional 15% charge added on by the bookstore. Therefore most books are about 75% of the original price. This is quite a savings from the UCSD bookstore.

Unfortunately, there are a few inconveniences. For instance, there is no guarantee they will have the book you want, and if they do you can only purchase it with cash or check, no credit cards. Also you need to be sure you want the book you buy because there are no refunds.

HEALTH SERVICES

Perhaps you are familiar with Student Health Services because of an illness or an injury that you have had. Student Health Services (SHS), however, offers a variety of health care services beyond primary medical care.

There is a pharmacy for prescription and non-prescription medications at a reduced cost for students. Prescription and non-prescription glasses are available at a student discount through the visual care service, and dental care is available for cleaning, filling, and x-rays. The Pediatric Clinic is available for the health care of children of registered students. There is an immunization and allergy service, a variety of health education programs, as well as the Women's Clinic for gynecological care, pregnancy tests, birth control, information and counseling. Student Health Service is staffed by licensed health professionals including doctors, nurse practitioners, and health educators.

O.L. APPLICATIONS

It's "that" time of the year again!! The time to apply to be a Revelle Orientation Leader for the 1987 orientation sessions. Applications are now available at the Revelle Dean's office, and the deadline is Feb. 20th, so get your applications now!!

The first step to the application process is to pick

up a job referral slip from the student employment office (Career Services) and turn it in to the Revelle Dean's Office, at which time you will be given an application packet. (The job referral number is OW 15063). The application is to be filled out and turned in, along with four recommendation forms, by 4 pm on Feb. 20.

The selection process will begin with an initial group interview during which four to six applicants will participate in an interview/discussion on issues pertaining to orientation. After that, approximately twenty applicants will advance to the finals and will have a personal interview with members of the Provost's staff. The final selection of the twelve orientation leaders will be based on recommendations, interview evaluations, and applications.

The basic requirements for applicants are: a minimum of a 2.0 cumulative GPA; sophomore, junior, or senior class standing for '87-'88, thorough knowledge of the Revelle curriculum and lower division requirements; must be available for approximately 12-15 hours of training sessions during Spring quarter; and must be available for orientation program in late June and mid September. Additional skills and characteristics that an applicant should possess include: being truly

excited about Revelle college; possessing the ability to relate information about Revelle to incoming Freshmen; and possessing the type of personality to which Freshmen would be able to relate.

The general responsibility of the orientation leaders is to plan and implement the Freshman Orientation program and Fall Welcome Week activities. Other responsibilities of those selected as O.L.'s is to attend training sessions during the Spring quarter, assist with administrative duties when necessary, and participate in ongoing orientation programs during the Fall and Winter Quarters.

Yolanda Garcia, Assistant Dean and advisor to the orientation leaders feels that applying to be an O.L. is a very positive experience. "Just the process of applying provides the applicant with valuable practice in interviewing skills; furthermore, those chosen as orientation leaders will gain valuable leadership training, meet a lot of people, and have a great time!"

REVELLE HOUSING PROBLEM CONTINUES

In the 1986-87 school year, Revelle College was faced with a serious housing problem. Many students complained about the lack of on-campus housing available. Sophomores and Juniors who thought that they could get housing found themselves in the cold. Even some of those who received housing were tripled up. Almost everyone has heard some sort of horror story concerning housing here at Revelle. Most of the blame has been heaped upon the Resident Dean's Office since it seems like the logical source of the problem. Yet the Resident Dean's Office itself has been hindered in its attempts to accommodate students with the demand for housing.

Resident Dean Judith Edwin who has worked in the office for ten years says that this is the first time that she has encountered such a problem. She cites three major reasons for the present housing condition. First there is the new UC application policy which was used by the entering freshman class. This system allowed a student to apply to as many UC campuses as desired and therefore left many Admissions people unsure of the number of students they should accept. This leads directly to the second reason

which is the size of the freshman class. The incoming class was 200 students larger than the average freshman class. This meant that there would be more students to accommodate. The last contributing factor was the new policy of guaranteeing freshman 2 years of on-campus housing. This guarantee coupled with the increased size of the freshman class created a severe crunch in housing.

The group most effected by this crunch was females. Females are usually allotted fewer spaces than males since there are usually more males than females. This year, however, too many women had enrolled. In order to accommodate them with housing the Resident Dean's Office had to put three women in certain rooms. Seven of the corner rooms in Argo Hall were tripled as were four rooms in the apartments. A total of 21 women were affected.

While Judith Edwin came up with three major reasons for the problem, there were also other less concrete factors. A fewer number of students than usual are moving out of the dorms. Most students are sticking to guarantees and living in the dorms. Also the retention rate of students in general has increased. Fewer students are

dropping out of school and therefore space continues to remain tight.

Since the housing situation is tough, Edwin gave some important advice on how to retain one's space. She said that deadlines are very important. If a person misses a deadline for a form they are automatically placed on the waiting list even if they have the guarantee.

The current housing problem is not one which will disappear in time. This is a continuing problem which will have to be dealt with next year. The freshmen next year will also have guaranteed housing. This seems to make the problem worse. Revelle hopes to solve it by cutting down on the number of freshmen next year.

Also, in the upcoming year, the allocation of spaces will take place in a different manner. A student will have a space but will be given no choice between either a dorm room or an apartment. The Resident Dean's Office hopes that this will drop some people out of campus housing since they won't have a preference.

The housing situation at Revelle is a serious problem with no simple answers. Time and patience may, unfortunately, be the only answers.

AN INTERVIEW WITH ... YOLANDA GARCIA



REVELATIONS: Where did you attend college?

YOLANDA: I attended Southwestern College with a major in Sociology. I am a native San Diegoan and am now living in Bonita.

REV: When did you first come to Revelle?

YO: I came here in 1971 as a secretary to the Dean, who was Tom Hull at the time. I then became the Administrative Assistant, and in 1981, I became the Assistant Dean of Revelle.

REV: What is the major part of your job?

YO: I am the advisor to the student program committees for the college. I also supervise the Interns and I work directly with the Orientation Leaders. I also work with the Revelle Third World Alliance Program.

REV: What kind of problems could students come to you with?

YO: I will see any student that needs to talk to me, but I mainly advise and counsel students with problems outside academics. I also see all people who are withdrawing from Revelle.

REV: What do you think has changed in a more positive direction here at Revelle?

YO: The students have really changed the most. They have become more involved in running the college and still are very vocal about crucial issues outside of activities and program. Students have also learned to work within the system, which I think makes them more efficient.

REV: What do you like most about Revelle?

YO: I like the size of Revelle. It is small enough so that I can get to know a higher percentage of students. I also enjoy hearing the feedback of graduates of Revelle, who claim that they are more prepared for graduate work than their peers.

REV: What advice would you give to the students here at Revelle?

YO: To try and be well balanced and enjoy themselves. You should learn in and out of the classroom because in 15 years from now it's the outside activities you'll remember most.


ATTENTION GRADUATING SENIORS

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SPOTLIGHT ON... SHEILA RYAN

It's just another day in the life of Sheila Ryan. No, she's not running out of her Revelle apartment at 2 a.m. to meet her sultry lover in another building, nor is she bribing Provost Tom Bond to let her graduate Revelle College *summa cum laude*, and neither is she deceitfully dabbling in Ewing oil stocks. Sheila is just another Revelle student whose contributions can alone comprise a weekly soap opera themselves.

Most people come in contact with Sheila's beaming smile and natural exuberance at her job in the Revelle Sundry Store, but her dedication and enthusiasm have taken her much farther than Revelle College; she has traveled all over the nation promoting her pride in UCSD and, in turn, learning how to be an even better student leader.

Ryan's hope of becoming a student leader who could get everyone united and involved in student activities all started back in 1983, her freshman year, in which she became a member of H.P.A. Sheila's responsibilities as NCC included keeping in tune with what was going on in the college and university residence halls of the Pacific region — comprising California, Alaska, Hawaii, Oregon, Washington, and Nevada. Her communications extended to the national affiliate as well. She put many H.P.A. events up for the title of "Program of the Month," awarded to the school with the best, most creative, and successful programming event sponsored by a residence hall council. The 1985 Getaway Dance won "Program of the Month" at the regional level, and Streamer's Night took the prize at both the regional and national levels.

All of Sheila's hard work paid off when she was elected Associate Director of PACURH in November 1985 and this year Regional Director. Sheila's success stems from a personal commitment not to herself, but to others; "I like helping people and I like seeing jobs completed," she says. Her simple philosophy has molded her into the type of supporting leader she truly is: "I believe a lot in unity... it's really neat seeing people getting pride in their school... their region."

The motivating force behind Sheila Ryan's outstanding actions is the desire to "include everyone." She is not a fantasizer; Sheila transforms her words into concrete actions. One plain example is the founding of the Inter-College Residence Hall Association (ICRHA) at UCSD whose purpose is to "speak as the voice of students on campus" and to program activities that will unite all of the 4 colleges' residence halls.

Sheila is very happy these days and doesn't hide it. She admits that she thrives on praise, so the next time you happen to bump into the illustrious Sheila Ryan on the Revelle campus, just pat her on the back and tell her what a good job she's doing... she deserves it.
