

World-famous actress Judith Anderson will appear in fully-staged presentations of 3 of her great successes in La Jolla on November 29

The world-famous actress Judith Anderson will appear in fully-staged presentations of three of her great successes in La Jolla on Wednesday night, November 29.

Miss Anderson will present scenes from "Medea," "Tower Beyond Tragedy," and "Macbeth," with the distinguished American actor William Roerick. The performance will be given at 8:30 p.m. at Sherwood Hall, Art Center in La Jolla. Tickets for the performance are \$4.50 each. They are available at University of California Extension, 1221 Fourth Avenue, San Diego 1, Belmont 2-7321. The performance is sponsored by Extension and by the Committee for Arts and Lectures of the University of California, San Diego.

Dame Judith Anderson, now at the peak of one of the most distinguished careers in theatrical history, is realizing, with the present production, her ambition to present in a single program three of the greatest of her many great dramatic creations. The trio represent theater at its highest, and Dame Judith Anderson's performances in the two plays of Robinson Jeffers and the classic Shakespearean tragedy have been landmarks of contemporary dramatic history. Recent television films of "Medea" and "Macbeth" (for which she received the 1961 "Emmy" award as best actress of the year) added millions to the worldwide audiences which have hailed her as "our greatest living actress."

Dame Judith has been a foremost ornament of the American stage, but it was as an Australian-born actress that she last year received her greatest honor-- Knighthood by Queen Elizabeth II as a Dame Commander of the British Empire.

William Roerick first appeared with Dame Judith Anderson in New York City in the John Gielgud "Hamlet." Trained in the Broadway theater, in which he had wide experience, he has more recently become a resident of Hollywood, where he has gained a prominent position as an actor in television and films, and where he is also well-known as a writer of television plays.

The setting for the production was designed by Robert Lee. Dame Judith Anderson's gowns are by Valentina and Jean Louis.
