

Haydn/Schubert Music Festival arranged by La Jolla Civic/University Orchestra and Chorus Association

Music by the Austrian composers, Franz Haydn and Franz Schubert, will be performed in a ten-day music festival arranged by the La Jolla Civic/University Orchestra and Chorus Association to be held March 8-18.

Chairmen for the Haydn/Schubert Music Festival are Edwin London and Louise Spizizen.

The festival will open with a formal concert in the University of California, San Diego Gymnasium at 8 p.m., Thursday, March 8. Edwin London will direct the orchestra in "Euryanthe Overture" by Carl Maria von Weber, a "Trumpet Concerto" by Haydn, and Schubert's "Miriam's Siegesang" and "Symphony No. 9 in C Major."

The Schubertians, an all-male choral group from UC Santa Barbara, will perform in St. James Hall, 7776 Eads Avenue, La Jolla, at 8 p.m., Saturday, March 10. The chorus toured Europe during Easter Week, 1971, and sang in Schubert's birthplace in Vienna.

A mini-concert will feature Robert Haffenden at noon, Monday, March 12, in the Athenaeum, 1008 Wall Street, La Jolla. He will play Haydn's "Piano Sonatas."

The Recital Hall, Bldg. 409 on the Matthews Campus at UCSD, will be the location of four programs during the festival. Bertram Turetzky will direct a group of graduate students in chamber concerts, Thursday, March 8, and Thursday, March 15, both at 4 p.m. An open chorus rehearsal will be held at 8 p.m., Wednesday, March 14, to perform Haydn's "Mass in Time of War." American composer Donald Erb will lecture at noon, Tuesday, March 13, on "The American Composer and the Symphony Orchestra."

The La Jolla Civic/University Orchestra and Chorus will conclude the festival Sunday, March 18, with two concerts, one at 3 p.m. and one at 8 p.m., in Sherwood Hall, 700 Prospect Street, La Jolla. Included in the program are Tleber's "Euryanthe Overture," Haydn's "Mass in Time of War," and Schubert's "Symphony No. 9 in C Major." Tickets for these two Sunday concerts may be purchased at the box office prior to each performance

All other events in the festival are free and open to the public.

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
