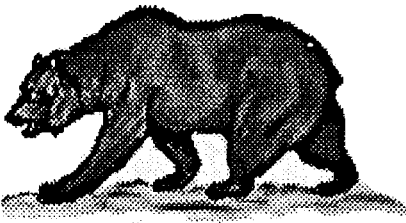

Edie Nierenberg, Vel Malmberg and myself spent a day in Tijuana scoping out our bus tour. We now know that we will visit the Agua Caliente race track, the Church of the Espiritu Santo, the Chapultaptec residential area, with a drive-by of the American Embassy, have a relaxing lunch at the Old Hacienda "La Escondida" with its formal gardens in view. We will then visit the Cultural Center for the current art exhibit and then see the film "The History of the Mayas". Shopping on Avenida de Revolution will cap the day with a final stop at a bakery to bring home some of the wonderful and inexpensive Bolillos and Pan Dulce.

The price is \$40.00—all inclusive (except for personal purchases), and needs to be paid by February 15. \$10.00 is tax-deductible. 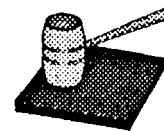

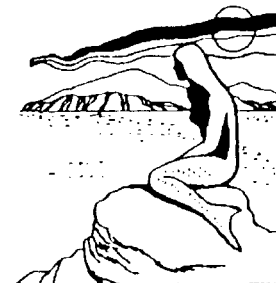

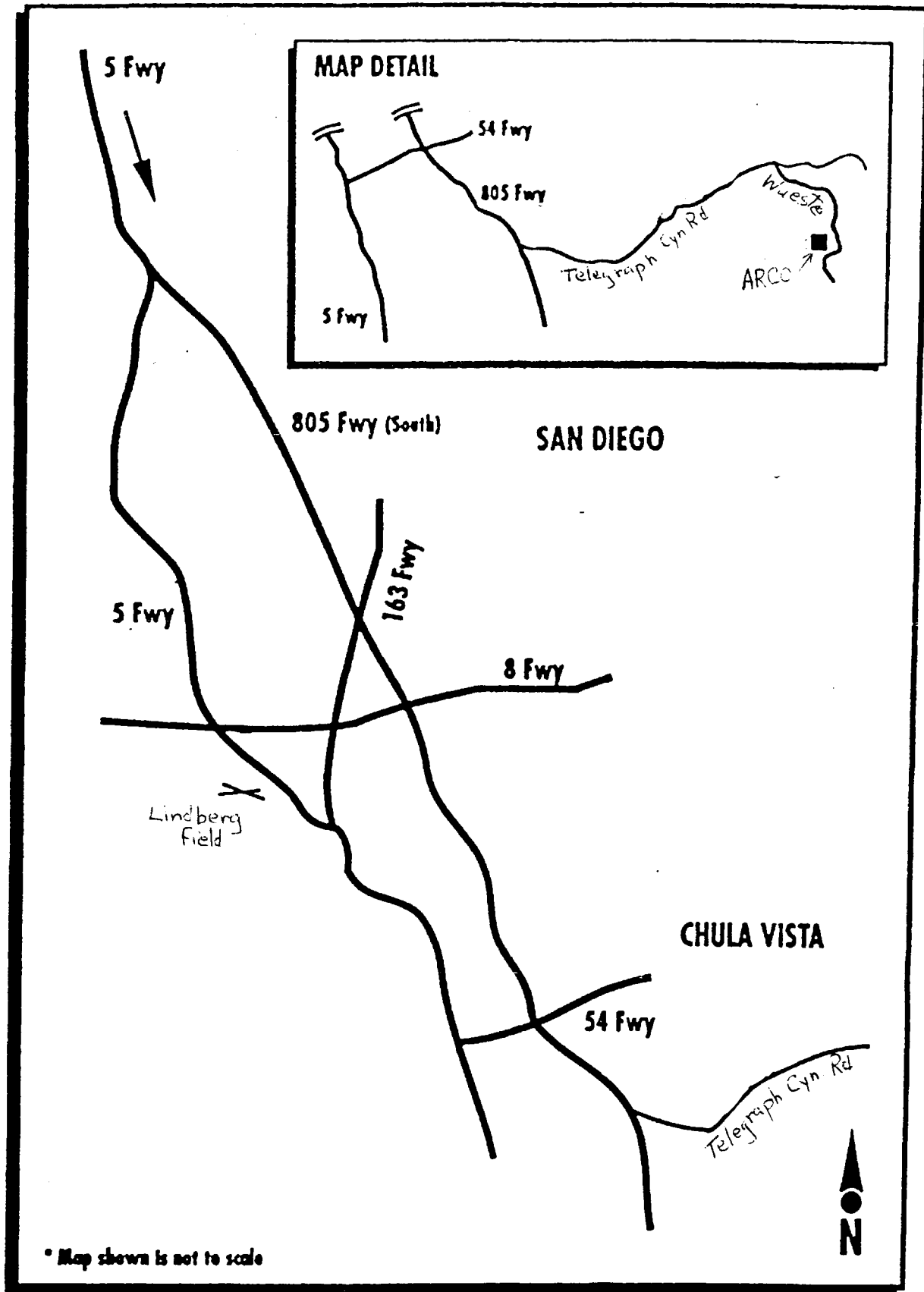

EVENING COUPLES BRIDGE

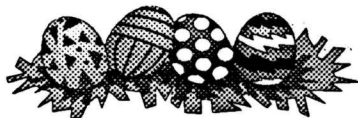

FIMO EGGS

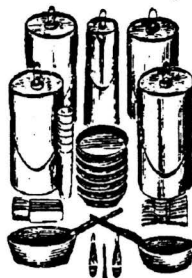

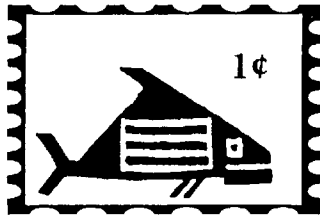
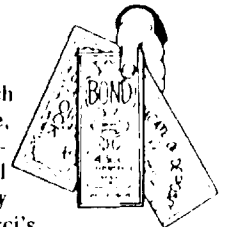


WITS

STAMP GROUP

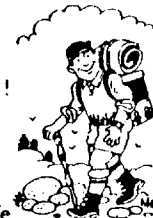
The members of the Oceanids Stamp Group collect stamps more for pleasure than profit. There are only a few of us, and we exchange (mostly used) stamps with

We pay a nominal amount for those stamps of interest to ourselves, and the proceeds are returned to Oceanids. Duplicate stamps are given to non-profit organizations that can put them to good use.

One of those organizations is the Postal History Foundation in Tucson, Arizona, which uses stamps to reinforce regular classroom instruction in social studies, history, science, etc. It sells surplus stamps from all countries as part of its income. Donations to it are tax-deductible.

If you have stamps to give us, you may leave them at the office of Friends of the International Center (I'm there once a week), or mail them to me. We usually do not collect stamps on envelopes, so you may cut them off or tear around the stamps, and we'll take care of them, soaking them off the paper.
