

DENNIS RUSSELL DAVIES KNOCKS 'EM DEAD IN S.F.

The critics are still sitting at their typewriters trying to come up with superlatives to describe Dennis' triumph as guest conductor of the San Francisco Symphony in November.

Paul Hertelendy of the San Jose Mercury called Dennis' Prelude from Tristan and Isolde "an unforgettable experience," and spent glowing paragraphs on his "consummate eloquence and elegance." Of course, this is no news to Festival fans, who tend to think of Dennis the way Yankee fans regard Reggie Jackson. (Right idea, wrong season. Oh well.)

He's finishing up his U.S. tour with the Chicago Symphony during January, and word has not yet reached this coast by Pony Express, but no doubt he's got the Chicago critics sitting up late nights searching for splendid adjectives, too.

If you were not fast enough, or motivated enough, to get tickets to see Dennis in San Francisco this season, you missed something special. However, all is not lost. He will be quest conducting there again next season, so stay tuned. 1982 FESTIVAL DATES ANNOUNCED

tup margarine or butter
2 large onions, chopped

cup lentils
cups chicken broth
l½ cup mashed or canned pumpkin
l/8 tsp. marjoram
l/8 tsp. thyme
type tsp. ground pepper
Dash tabasco

l cup half and half
Salt to taste
½ cup toasted almonds



Melt butter, cook onions till lightly browned

Add Simmer 'til lentils are done (about 1½ hours) Cool Puree in blender

Heat to serve Add half and half, salt Top with almonds Serves 6 to 8

FUND DRIVE SHIFTS INTO HIGH GEAR

John Brissenden and his Merry Band (a.k.a. the Fund Drive Committee) have been very busy, indeed. In fact, at presstime 16% of the Fund Drive goal for the 1982 season has already been raised. (That translates into \$9800 raised, and \$51,585 left to go.) So don't forget, the Festival is counting on its trusty, tried-and-true contributors (this means YOU). In addition, the matching funds from the Hewlett Foundation grant are still in effect, which means that anything you contribute over and above last year's contribution qualifies for 2:1 matching funds. (Think about it: You donate \$100 extra, and the sky opens and drops another \$50 in the Festival's lap. Not bad.)



ENDOWMENT CAMPAIGN IS OFF AND RUNNING

To celebrate the 20th anni-

versary of the Festival, there's a new push under way to develop a healthy Endowment Fund for the Festival. Earleen Overend is in charge of this campaign, which is looking for 20 contributions of \$1000 each--one for each year of the Festival's existence. These will be added to the existing Endowment Fund. Donors will be acknowledged in perpetuity. (Please note that Endowment gifts are <u>in addition</u> to annual giving contributions.) So far, Earleen has obtained 7 of the hoped-for 20 pledges.

Thanks to KUSP, the 1981 season lives!

And you thought the 1981 season was but a memory. Wrong. KUSP brings it all back in a series of rebroadcasts, Wednesday mornings, 11:00 a.m., between February 25 and April 28, 1982. This is your chance to re-live every golden moment of what everyone agrees was the best Festival Season ever. So far.

Here's a list of dates and what's playing:

February 25 Prelude Concert: An Evening of Chamber Music

A star-studded evening with Dennis Russell Davies and guest artists, including Alan Hovhaness conducting the world premiere of his Symphony No. 43.

- March 3 The Cabrillo Festival Orchestra is featured in symphonies of Hovhaness and Shostakovich. Guest artists Jan DeGaetani and Thomas Paul sing. Dennis Russell Davies conducts.
- March 10

 A Tribute to George Antheil. The surprise of the season! A joyful romp through the work of a mischievous American original-composer George Antheil (1900-1959). Pianist and conductor Reinbert DeLeeuw leads the Festival Orchestra and guest artist Vera Beths through what the Oakland Tribune calls "as stylish, gutty, entrancing a performance as you'll ever hear; it should be slapped onto vinyl right now."
- March 17 San Juan Fiesta Day Afternoon Recital. Internationally acclaimed artists, mezzo-soprano Jan DeGaetani and oboist Philip West, perform chamber music for voice and/or oboe in what Bill Akers of the Register-Pajaronian calls "an artistic gem" of a recital.
- March 24 San Juan Fiesta Day Evening Concert. Dennis Russell Davies conducts the Festival Orchestra in Five Ruekert Songs by Mahler with Jan DeGaetani, and Mozart's Requiem Mass with the Masterworks Chorale. Bill Akers called this "a flawless performance."
- March 31 Thomas Nee conducts an orchestra concert in a program of Hovhaness, Dvorak and Brahms, with pianist Justus Frantz.
- April 7 Ken Harrison conducts an afternoon chamber music concert from Holy Cross Church in Santa Cruz, featuring works by Gabrieli, Hovhaness, Hindemith and Dvorak.
- April 14 Violin and Piano recital with Romuald Tecco and Dennis Russell Davies from Holy Cross Church. Oakland Tribune called this one "the concert of a lifetime."
- April 21 Recital by pianist Justus Frantz, featuring works by Brahms, Beethoven and Schumann.
- April 28 The Festival Orchestra winds up with musical fireworks--Mozart's Concerto for Two Pianos features soloists Justus Frantz and Dennis Russell Davies. And Davies conducts Beethoven's Symphony No. 5. The Sentinel called the Fifth "inspired," and Bill Akers called the Mozart Concerto "among the supreme moments in Festival history."
