

San Diego Campus recipient of Woodrow Wilson Fellowships

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The San Diego campus of the University of California is one of six graduate schools receiving subsidies from the Woodrow Wilson National Fellowship Foundation for the first time this year.

The others are the University of Alberta, University of Louisville, University of Nevada, and Southern Illinois University.

In all, 71 graduate schools are being provided with checks totalling \$1,738,000 by the Foundation. The San Diego campus receives \$6,000.

The money provides fellowships for three graduate students: Gregory A. Benford, physics, Richard M. Lindstrom, chemistry, and Richard M. More, physics, says Norris W. Rakestraw, Dean of the Graduate Division.

The schools receiving subsidies are those that were chosen by the Woodrow Wilson Fellows for their first year of graduate work. Each graduate school grant is proportionate to the number of Woodrow Wilson Fellows now enrolled.

The program of grants to graduate schools is one phase of the Foundation's efforts to meet the critical shortage of college teachers in the United States and Canada. Since 1957, its program of first year graduate fellowships, the subsidies for graduate schools, and the more recent dissertation fellowships has been supported by \$52 million in grants from the Ford Foundation.

Two other campuses of the University of California received funds under the plan. Berkeley received \$128,000 and Los Angeles \$16,000.
