## UCSD Oceanids Newcomers Desert Trip to the Anza Borrego State Park

## **Overnight Camping** at Agua Caliente

Friday, April 8 - Sunday, April 10

Agua Caliente is located in the Carrizo Valley Region of Anza-Borrego Desert State Park. It is best known for its heated springs, which have long attracted visitors eager to soak in their soothing therapeutic mineral waters. (Be sure to bring your bathing suits!) Spectacular vistas and miles of trails that meander through the park's canyons and across its hillsides are additional attractions. Centuries ago, the Kumeyaay Indians were initially attracted to the springs at what we now call Agua Caliente ("hot water" in Spanish). Spanish explorers, miners, then pioneers, soldiers and prospectors eventually made their way here as well. The seismic activity that long ago shaped the Tierra Blanca Mountains to the west and created the fault that runs beneath the park also enabled water to come to the surface and form the park's natural springs. A wide variety of wildlife is attracted to the springs, including foxes, coyotes, bobcats and mountain lions; wildflowers and succulents should put on a colorful show this year as we've had an unusual amount of rain.

The **easiest way to get there** is to take Hwy. 8 out to S-2 (Exit Ocotillo). Go north for approximately 26 miles. Or you can take 78 to S-2 and go south for approximately 20 miles. The camp sites will be available starting at noon on Friday.

On Saturday morning, Carole Ziegler will lead a hike at 10 a.m. She will also give a talk in the evening entitled, "60 million years in 60 minutes". A telescope to view the stars and planets away from city lights will be available. We will sing around the campfire, so bring your musical instruments and voices.

Please call Carole at 619-297-0798 **before 9:30 p.m. on April 6**, if you wish to go camping so she'll know to look for you. She has reserved 8 camps sites. She can also answer any questions you may have regarding camping. Some camping equipment may be available for loan--again please ask Carole. You have to bring your own food.

COSTS: \$5/adult and \$3/child under 12 years to camp. Please pay Carole when you arrive at the camp site. Be sure to bring mittens/gloves, sweatshirts and jackets as evenings in the desert are apt to be chilly. **Questions about camping should be directed to Carole at 619-297-0798.**

More information in the May issue This is my first attempt at keeping a New Year's resolution. I've enjoyed the articles in Bear Facts so much that I wrote one and chose the title:

## "My Worst Trip Abroad."

We were already living in Germany when my son and wife decided to visit us there and bring their two sons with them. Since they had only two weeks for the trip, I was determined to try to show them all of the best of Europe in that time. My husband Jules was working, so didn't come with us.

First I took them to stay at a castle on the Rhine where the boys had a great time pretending to be knights in armor, and attacking a castle bridge across the surrounding moat. The Michelin Guide of 1989 lists under outstanding sights to see, "The Baux Hills" in France, so that's where we were headed next. By that time my son was driving. I was apprehensive about the place where he ended up parking, far below and hidden from the village of Baux - I remembered reading the accounts of two writers about France; MFK Fisher spoke of a sense of evil which was haunting the village of Baux, and May in his book seemed to have experienced a similar feeling there.

But we enjoyed exploring the quaint cobbled streets and the shops of the village and had lunch there. When we went back downhill to our car it was about sunset. The road was bordered by goldenrod, and I was admiring the view, when suddenly I was knocked down and found myself being dragged behind a white car. The strap of my shoulder bag was held onto by the driver. The bag did eventually fall off my shoulder; the driver did not let go. My son thought I'd been hit by the car and ran after it. Of course, it was in vain. When we finally got to our parked car we found that everything had been stolen.

Another American couple had been walking down the road, too, so they helped us. The woman was a French teacher at a Boston college. She knew that calling herself a Professor would give her great prestige in Europe. She explained our situation to the police and obtained rooms at a hotel for us for the night. We called Jules and planned to meet him next day in Paris where he would be at a conference.

The next morning we went back to the police and were told that all our possessions had been scattered over the hill. The police had very carefully made a list of every item. This, by the way, was the hill where Alphonse Daudet's Mill stood. It is "where he is recalled for his letters addressed as from the Mill." (Michelin Tourist Guide, Provence.)

Although my credit cards were returned, I had no identification, and Jules had cancelled them. So our Professor lent us money and we planned to repay her in Paris. At least my son had a key to the car so he drove from then on. I had a very sore arm and thought it might be broken. I went to an American doctor in Paris the next morning and found out that my collar bone was broken, but not badly. My grandsons were thrilled with their room in Paris, because it had an icebox stocked with soft drinks and chips, etc.



All in all, it wasn't such a bad trip after all, and certainly a very educational one!

#### SURPRISE AT THE WINE TASTING

Recently Oceanids Newcomers and Wine Tasting II had a joint wine tasting event. Teresa and Dick Norris were responsible for choosing the wine and they chose 4 Sauvignon Blancs for us to compare in a blind tasting. Amazingly, it turned out that the group ratings were in inverse order from the prices! That is, the cheapest was the most popular amongst the tasters, the next cheapest was the second most popular, the second most expensive was 3rd in overall rating, and the most expensive was the least favorite!

Interestingly, when we taste white wines, there is more concensus; when we taste reds, there is never any agreement. In case you are interested, all four wines were purchased at Trader Joe's: Zarafa 2004 from Western Cape of South Africa at \$3.99 was the cheapest and the big winner. Parducci 2004 from Lake County, Ukiah was \$4.99, Cloud Piercer 2004 Mount Aoraki from New Zealand was \$6.99 and Stuart Cellars 2004 from Temecula was \$7.99.

#### Dr. Jeffrey Kirsch, Executive Director of the Fleet Science Center in Balboa Park, now speaker at the Sounding Board on April 7,

#### "Strategic Planning at the 'Fleet' and in Balboa Park".

What does Jeff Kirsch see for the future of the Fleet and Balboa Park? He is the founder and President of the Balboa Park Cultural Partnership (BPCP) that aims to help the BP's institutions achieve their full potential to enhance the Park as the City's cultural center. As one of two BPCP people appointed by the Mayor to sit on the City's Balboa Park Committee, he can tell us about plans and progress.

Dr. Kirsch, originally an aerospace engineer, came to the Fleet in Balboa Park in 1983, after nine years as Executive Producer and Director of the KPBS-TV Science Center. He became the major figure in IMAX film production and its wide use in science museums. As an award-winning documentary producer, he is a valuable member of the UCSD-TV Community Advisory Committee.

Under his leadership, the Fleet has doubled in size and quadrupled in membership. With emphasis on inquiry-based methods of science education, these programs reach 110,000 students per year, teachers, and many parents. Amazing transformation in science and science communications, due to rapid advances in computer graphics and digital data visualization, gave him the opportunity and tools with which to expand science education at the Fleet with IMAX films, intriguing interactive, hands-on exhibits, the planetarium, and various other programs.


