

### People-to-People Visits El Hogar

On Saturday, January 5th we joined the United Christian Church of La Mesa to act as the "wisemen" to bring gifts to the children at the orphanage in San Antonio las Minas. San Antonio is a one block town just east of Ensenada on the road to Tecate. It was a glorious day as we drove Highway One along the Pacific Coast and took in the scenery. We arrived at the orphanage at about 11:30 am where a Bar-B-Que grill was already fired up. Emily Stowell's daughter Rinda Young along with other members of the church had arranged to bring hot dogs, chips, homemade salsa and cookies for both the guests and the children at the orphanage. (To those who know her: Rinda's daughter, thus Emily's granddaughter, had given birth to a baby girl the night before.)

We were then treated to a program of singing by the children, and the older children gave little speeches thanking God for bringing us to them and for all of the wonderful things that are done for them. People-to-People along with the church provides money for scholarships so that the children can go to school. The children that had earned the scholarships for this year were then announced and each tried to thank us, that is if they were not too surprised or shy to get any words out.

Next came the "wisemen" part. January 6th in many religions is known as the Epiphany, the day that the Wisemen finally saw baby Jesus and were bearers of gifts. Each of us had "adopted" a child to bring gifts to. People-to-People had a 12 year old girl, Elisabet Martines. We gave her a UCSD sweat shirt, notebook, stuffed animal, and a wind chime.

We then had a beautiful drive inland to Tecate where we stopped to buy Pan Dulce and Bollilos at the bakery. When we got to the backery, however, we could only buy a special fruited bread in the the shape of a wreath. It turns out that apparently most Mexicans celebrate the Epiphany by eating this bread and they were buying it in droves. We were told that all bakeries would only have this kind of bread today. Disappointed we started heading toward the border. But on a whim, I stopped at another bakery that I had liked before and besides having the wreaths, they did have fresh Bolillos and Pan Dulce. I bought my usual three or four bags of goodies (they freeze very well) and now could contentedly head for the border. There was only a 45 minute wait at Tecate, I am sure much shorter than if we had crossed the border at Tijuana.

All in all, it was a wonderful day. I wish that all of you could see how beautiful the children at the orphanage are, and how little it takes to make them happy. They range in age from 2 to 17, and have been there anywhere from 11 years to one day. The girls' dormitory does not have heat, but they were pleased with the blankets that they had. The high school children have dreams of being lawyers, teachers, scientists. They can live these dreams if supported. \$250 helps send a student to high school for one year. If anyone cares to make a donation towards their dreams, a check can be sent to Jean Kramer made out to "People-to-People".

Participants with Healthy Eyes Needed for Eye Research (Volunteers paid \$10.00 per hour)



The Shiley Eye Center at UCSD is conducting a research study concerning the effects of aging and glaucoma on vision. We are testing individuals with healthy eyes (volunteers with glasses or contacts are accepted) ages 50 or older. Participants will receive a complete ophthalmological eye exam at no cost. Testing includes: color vision, peripheral vision, motion perception, contrast sensitivity and resolution ability. In addition, photographs and laser images of the eye will be taken. There are no known risks and the entire evaluation is easy and comfortable. Testing requires two visits for approximately 5 hours and volunteers will be compensated with \$10.00 per hour. If you or someone you know would like to volunteer, call Tess Acera for more information at (858) 822-1643. Your cooperation may provide early diagnosis and better care to patients with glaucoma.

### Today's Catalog Woman

(or:... why computers and romance do mix)

A favorite song of mine is the one that Elsa Lanchester sings about being a "catalog woman" in the 1880s ... her father sent off her photograph with a flattering description. And "right soon there came a letter written by a fella from Missouri".

Today with the Internet and the World Wide Web, things have changed. Now a woman can find a "catalog man" if she dares to look. The amazing thing is that it can be just as nice an experience as Elsa's. "Underneath his shirt there beat a heart of gold ... solid, not plated".

Three years ago I dared to look and I will tell you what I found ...

Having learned to surf the web, I stumbled one night on a sight called Match.Com - a website that offers anonymity in tiptoeing into the activity of "computer dating" - a scary thing by many accounts. All of us have heard those stories about the crazies that lurk in the Internet byways and highways.

After a few months of having Match.Com in the back of my mind, I starting toying with the idea of taking the first step and setting up an account. I had been widowed for a few years and was happily raising two sons by myself. But why not sit down in front of my computer screen and take a look?

Having very little time to go out socially, using the Internet seemed to be the best way to answer the nagging questions I had - what kind of single men were out there that weren't so young anymore? Were they intelligent, caring, AND looking for women their own age?

I was totally and completely surprised by how many men were actually looking. Not only were they well educated and intelligent, they were well employed, articulate, and nice. I was surprised! (And I didn't find a single boogieman.)

The fun thing about this way of meeting is that it takes us back to using written communication in the activity of "courting". Love letters have become something we read about in a World War II novel, but in meeting on the Internet, the initial contact is in writing. The play and romance in using the written word can be so much fun.

It can be a wonderfully romantic and a breathtaking experience to meet and get to know someone this way. Ideas can be exchanged and levels of education become apparent through grammar and spelling. I found that the ideal timing was to exchange emails for about a week or so and then make a decision about meeting in person.

To give you an idea of the kind of men that are out there - I met a psychologist, a CPA/attorney, a business owner with manufacturing plants in Asia, an electrical contractor, a computer engineer, a physicist, a cell biologist, an Internet web designer, and a chief financial officer for a restaurant management company.

We met at a variety of places - coffee at Starbucks, a stroll through the weekly Farmers Market in Ocean Beach, dinner at Brigantine in Old Town, sipping champagne at Summer Pops on the Broadway Pier, dinner at a Chinese restaurant on Convoy, lunch at Blumbergs at Samson's, lunch at Rock Bottom, and dinner at a Thai restaurant in Hillcrest.

A couple of observations - men are more forthcoming about their names, employment, email addresses and phone numbers. I always called and did not give out my phone number. (My number was blocked from being seen by caller ID.) I did not give out any identifying information until just before meeting and only after I had confirmation that this person had given me accurate information.

How did I confirm information? When a man gave me information, I did a little detective work. The first thing I did was look in the phone book for a listing. Next I did a general search on the Internet. I looked until I found some bit of information that said that this person had a presence in the San Diego area that agreed with what he was writing in his emails. For example, the cell biologist said he worked at a local research institute. I looked at that institute's website and there was his web page. The computer engineer had his own website. The web designer was listed as an employee at the company that was part of his email address. There was an article in the San Diego Union Tribune that listed the electrical contractor as president of a contractors' organization.

So by now I'm sure you want to know - did I meet someone, someone to spend time with, someone to celebrate Valentine's Day with? The answer is yes. My ninth date was with a professor here at UCSD and one who some of you may know. Hans Paar and I met through the anonymity of Match.Com one night, got to know each other and this February we will be celebrating our second anniversary.

### Valentine's Day

There are many legends associated with Valentine's Day. One associates this day with an ancient Roman festival called "Lupercalia". This was actually a festival held on February 15 to ensure protection from wolves. Young men would use strips of hide to whip people, and young women accepted hese whippings because it was believed that it would make them fertile. Ouch!

A second legend is that there were two men named Valentine, one a priest in Rome who is believed to have been martyred on February 14, the other a bishop of Interamna who also may have been martyred in Rome. There is a possibility that these were actually one and the same person. Anyway, during the rein of Claudius II, young soldiers were forbidden to marry because it was believed that they would be stronger if unwed. The priest Valentine would secretly marry couples.

A third legend is that Valentine had made friends with many children, but refused to worship the Roman gods, and was imprisoned. The children would toss loving notes into Valentine's cell. This is the most likely origin of our sending valentines to our loved ones today. It is also said that Valentine restored the sight to his jailor's blind daughter. Many legends say that Valentine was executed on February 14 around A.D. 269. Pope Gelasius I named February 14 St. Valentines Day in A.D. 496.

A fourth legend was highlighted by Geoffrey Chaucer, the English poet of the 1300's, who wrote in "The Parliament of Fowls", For this was on St. Valentine's Day, When every fowl commeth there to choose his mate. Shakespeare agreed with this, and wrote in a "Midsummer Night's Dream" as two lovers are discovered in the woods, St. Valentine is past; Begin these woodbirds but to couple now?

The custom of sending notes on St. Valentine's Day is also associated with the Frenchman, Charles, Duke of Orleans, who sent his wife a rhymed love letter from the Tower of London, where he was imprisoned after being captured by the English during the Battle of Agincourt in 1415.

Other customs involved young women involved in the pursuit of finding husbands: In the 1700's English women put men's names on pieces of paper and dropped them in the water. The first one to rise to the top was supposed to be her true love. Others pinned bay leaves to their pillows on the eve of Valentine's Day to help them dream about their future husband.

Another custom involved drawing women's names from a jar, and the man was to pay special attention to his "valentine". Taking this one step further, in the 1700's, men would wear their valentine's name on their sleeve, thus probably leading to our saying of "wearing his heart on his sleeve." There even used to be handbooks, called "valentine writers" that provided rhymes to copy if you had writer's block.
