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

(b) Labour, Recruiting etc.

The No.2 Meroi has always provided a supply of unskilled labour in large numbers. At present 261 26.9% of the total make population between 16.45 years are absent working under agreement. This is not considered excessive and there are no signs of membower shortage in the villages. The natives of the sub-division are populately of a high stendard and are consequently in dermal as labour.

2. CONTACT MICH HAW HADINGS.

They did not appear to be particularly impressed by the proceedings and evidently expected to see a little more, and possibly obtain a little wore, than the dublous blessure of having their mass entered in a book. I fear that the next parel might not even see the 160.

3. GENERAL ADVINESTRACION.

The sub-division as a whole is relatively quiet. There are pavoral large willings, large by Attaus steminals, and most of them have the apperance of being lived in for at least part of the time by part of the people. The remainder favour timy hamlets and settlements in the been where they protect themselves from surprise attacks from their neighbours by ingenious if drastic methods. A device very much favoured in this particular area is that of short largets of basboo, sharpened to a meetle point, protrading about I inches from the ground and hidden by leaves or loose soil. But at irregular intervals on bush tracks leading to family attlements and gardens they provide a particularly paints hazard for anyone the placement of the troop. Spear bits are less favoured, probably became they involve sore labour, and it is considered, with good reasons, that the prospect of 15 inches of bumbon through the cule of the foot is sufficient deterrent to the would-be garder robber or assessin. Nevertheless, clashes between ramed partice are not infrequent, and the native who travels alone is likely to be set upon and surdered, dither as a "pay-back" for some provious assoult or merely as a diversion from the daily round.

After some little distances an animabil native appeared out of the bush and informed the official who was accompanying me that the SAUT fighting mean ware writing in the minush further down the road. There was obviously nothing to be gained by going on and forcing a class. In the absence of any complaint or information ledged by the SULMA mativos I was not prepared to force the issue and risk the lives or my party in a situation so heavily maighted to the advantage of the absence of any natives, particularly so the total fire-source of the patral consisted of one .22 rifle, one .32 revelver and a single-barrelled shot, un the three police constables all carried sits rifles, but no assumition, and in any case, whether which sight sake the task of galving the popples' confidence even nore difficult.

Mether the men concerned can be apprehended peacebly remains to be seen, but present indications are that it is unlikely three men of RSUIT were erreated for sunder e riv in the year without trouble, but with a large number involved the chances of avoiding a clash are lessened. I do not intend any forceable errest until all other rethods have failed, even if it takes a considerable intended to be a considerable time to climinate these. The RAUT natives have a large area of dense bush in which they could conceivably hide inderindely, and it would take a large party a long time to get any results. I don't if anything could be accomplished by this bethod without bloodsied, and a falcody success, as much as an abject failure, sould do irreparable hare.

Many notives here are firmly convinced that an Administration patrol mean. Trouble, and their hostility is born of four, not agressiveness. I intend to context these people again without taking police, or at least by taking in an unamed patrol. In any case I have not, at the present time, any chance of making a drow of force, at their police strength available for patrol being three constaller, nor have I say intention of becoming involved in an arread fraces without prior instructions from feedquarters.

The whole of the sub-division bears obvious scars of the big spirale disturbances of 1934 and 1935, and in some villages to bellt.

One could socycly expect accommendation to be built and maintained in an area patrolled so infraquently. It was noted, indeed without affort, that most of the buildings reserved for the patralling officer were perched precariously on the edge of a precipice and in constant damper of collapse into the gorge below, blother such missearch in of meremains or facing is not below. Whether such placement is of accessity or design is not quite apparent, but the selection of less invisidating sites was urged.

Very difficult to census. Unco-operative.

13. XOMAL - Sep ref. 22 SON. Large village built on steen rocky outcrop, about 16 hours up and down from Mingil. People co-operative. The plantiful. Officials outstanding in the area.

14. MILLY and DESE - Sap refs. 02 8210 and 2 5420. Small villages. No contact for over 12 years. People friendly. Food plentiful. Rest House good, at both villages.

15. AUAGG - Mep ref. % 8618. Border of Mapei and Falsi native districts. Small village, people co-operative. Last DS visit in 1911. Wood plantiful. No Rest house.

The patrol was not accompanied by a M.M..., as for real and of mobility the personnel was cut to a minimum, so that little was attempted in the natters of hygiens and health.

The general health of those seen would appear to be good. A master of bed sores and TU's were noted, and the people urged to attend the health and years at TUPU, which seems to be functioning as well as can be expected.

The people of the sub-division are generally of good physique, and with a more adequate fool supply than in other areas they probably do not suffer to the same entent from mutritional diseases. Most 75% of those appearing for census were suffering from colds, and as meny of the villages are constantly ensuroused in mist arm cloud, this is searcely surprising.

There would seem to be no great urgamey for a medical patrel to the area, but it is recommended that it be visited within the next six months.

The District Commissioner, Sepik District, WEWAK.

Subject: LUMI Patrol - WKL.5/51-52.

Mr. Fienberg's report of a difficult situation has been read with considerable interest.

- 2. The patrol was carried out in a sensible manner and this Headquarters places considerable importance on the prestige of the Service being maintained in a humane manner. We are not to attack but we are to resist attack when operating on lawful cocasions. This matrol remained long enough in the area to ensure that we could not be thought to have run away.
- 3. Inter-tribal fighting and murder in backward areas always present the problem of arrests having to be made and it is always necessary that those who have placed themselves within our protection and have ceased to use violence to obtain redress, should be given as much protection as possible.
- 4. The action to be taken need not be immediate and while Mr. Fienberg is now in a position to issue warrants for native criminals who are now known to him by name, he is to rest assured that this Headquarters expects him to choose his own time, and place for such action.
- 5. The consolidation of some groups within the law may permit of the co-operation of the groups at a later stage to induce more reluctant areas to give up violence and resistance to law and order.
- Mr. Fienberg should not commit himself to carrying out anything which he considers beyond his present resources.
- 7. He is to be informed that his work under difficult conditions at Lumi is highly appreciated.

The nine members of the M.O.P.M. conducted thomselves in an efficient and setisfactory marker. They showed good discipline and restraint when faced with despenses situations and their conduct is to be commended.

- Progress in this area seems to have been consistent and we feel sure that the hard work and patience of Mr. Fienberg will be rewarded.
- 6. It would appear that more recruiters have visited this area than patrols. However this Headquarters has taken into consideration the fact that Mr. Fienberg has had a very difficult job to do and is entirely satisfied with the incidence of patrols from Lumi and the work done by Mr. Fienberg, but an emphasis should be placed on patrolling by whoever takes over from Mr. Fienberg.

In view of Mr. Fienberg's departure on leave in August, care should be taken if possible, to see that the officer who relieves at Lumi, gains a proper appreciation of the task to be performed at this Station before Mr. Fienberg's departure.

INTROPUCTION :

The sub-division was last visited by me in December of 1950, and a slight, but definite, improvement in general conditions has occurred since them. Travelling is still extremely arducus, with roads, after a days walk from Lund, degenerating into overgroum and little used tracks (11 between ankie and knee deep in mad. The sub-division is too sparsely populated to expect any great effort towards road making, and at the present time has been so hadly demanded of its chie-bodied makes by recruiting that those remaining have more necessary tasks to perform. Freetically all villages have been over-recruited and a recommendation for their closure has already been submitted. This shutting of the stable door is a more gesture and can accomplish little if any good, the gamage having already been done. So number of notices and declarations in the Covernment Gazette can make two old men perform the tasks normally done by a dozen young ones.

PATROL SUPPARY

1. CENSUS.

(a) The Census:
There are 19 villages in the sub-division having an average population of 101.5, an increase of 7.1h over the 1958 figures. The overall increase of 129 has been caused by a natural increase of 71 and the recording of 55 "New Hames".

Although the area is sparsely populated the naturel increase of 71 is, I think, particularly good, and the recording of so many new names shows that the confidence of these rather backward pacople is gradually being gained. Most of these names were young unmarried women and for once the totals in the 10-16 age groups show a reasonable belance. However some ifficulty is still experienced in persuading the people to present themselves for census checks, and a number of absentess were noted, especially in the larger sottlements. The people of this area have a large amount of bush at their disposal and as many of their gardens are some considerable distance from the main village it is quite understandable that a number of families prefer to live in proximity to their food supply. Rowever very adequate warning of my visit was given and on this occasion all villagers were warned that any future absences will not go unpunished.

The number of reported programacies (23) is exactly helf the number recorded in 1950, and is considered to be quito insecured. One must rely, however, on voluntary information where the condition is not obvious, and apparently the natives are still somewhat diffident in this regard, despite considerable test in approaching the subject. The greatest number of deaths occurred in the "over 13" age group, the least in the 5-0, and no voman was reported to have died in childbirth.

It is considered that the consus for the subdivision is now 96% accurate, that is that there is not more than an actual population of two thousand.

(1) b. Recruiting - Village Labour Resources etc.

Ten of the nameteen villages visited have been recruited by private employers to a degree likely, in my opinion, to cause hardship and to seriously dirupt and endemper native village late. It these villages have more than one third of the ableboiled males absent under Agreement, five of them having more than between the and 45 years, many of whom remaining in but to makes between it and 45 years, many of whom remaining in the villages are physically incapable of stremums effort. The percentages for the actual "able-bodied" absent would therefore be somahat higher. A recommendation for the cleaver of these villages by notice in the Gazette has already been forwarded to the Director through the D.C. Mewak.

I have resorted to this measure out of sheer desperation, not because I consider it can be of any benefit. There is only one logical method of preventing the over-recruitment of villages, and that is to give statutory authority to the officer "on the spot" to declare the maximum number of matives who may be absent at any time. I cannot see how this clashes with any views on the freedom of the individual, which, in any case, is merely a nice ideal only partially recognised in any civilised country, the reason no doubt why they can be termed civilised). Closing villages because they have been over recruited is aidn to mending a leaking vessel after the contents has dripped sway. Freedom of individual action is not countermanced in any British country where such action is to the detriment of the general well-being of the community, and I consider that the unrestricted liberty to desert wives and families for up to two years comes un'or this estagory.

(2) GENERAL ADMINISTRATION.

(a) Bative Affairs :

This patrol was only the third to visit the erea since the war, and a slight, though definite, improvement was noted over general conditions since my last patrol at the end of 1950. The population still live under most primitive conditions, but an effort is obviously being made to improve housing both in design and construction, and some little interest is being shown in ordered events. However inter-willing contact is still very sketchy and trade practically non-axistent. The people of Whill, for instance, were unable to inform the petrol of the descrition of the village of EHLAWA, although both settlements are not more than 3½ hours walk apart, and there is no definite road connecting the villages. The EHLAWA natives have left the old site after the commencing to build a new village nearer warin. The actual site is not yet known, but as accurately as possible has been placed as twap reference ve 6298. In the meantime the population is scattered among relatives in the Southern sub-division and in the bush nearer the proposed new village. The village of GALGATV has also been moved to map reference QZ 5203, and with a slight increase in population the people appear to be regaining a little of their lost confidence.

Travelling conditions are far from pleasant throughout the sub-division. Roads for the most part are scarcely discernable tracks which appear to be bogsy at all seasons; carriers are hard to obtain and several large rivers have to be negotiated. One or two minor complaints were arbitrated, and there was no show of hostility towards the patrol,

Future patrols should visit the new village of BULANA from WARIN, and then proceed to GALGATU vie WITELLI. This will eliminate travelling through a difficult stretch of uninhabited country between Warin and Galgatu through the old site of Bulawa as shown on the map.

(2) b. WAR DAMAGE COMPRESATION.

A number of claims for this sub-division were investigated and recorded during the 1950 patrol, but payment of these cannot be effected until such time as another officer becomes available.

No further claims were submitted.

(c) AGRICULTURE & LIVESTOCK.

The food supply in the area covered would appear adequate but not plantiful. Gardens inspected were not very actensive and did not contain any veriety of crops. Sign and taro are the stable items of diet, the tare being varied by sweet potate in season. Benamas and paspars are enten, but are not in great supply. Rach *llags has a large area of land and many of the bigger gardens were located too far from the rain village to allow one patrel to visit. The soil throughout the area appears to be suitable for agricultural development and at a later data rice seed will be distributed. Some of the land along the river fiets appeared to be highly suitable for the cultivation of this crop.

Livestock is in botter supply then in most other sub-divisions, possibly because loss of it is enten. With less contact element on the fragment inter-village gatherings for celebrations which occur in the gore populated areas. The sorrounding bushlands are alive with game - pigo, cassouary, vildfoul, source pigoon and other edible birds, while small fish are obtainable with hand note in the larger streams. The people are not very skilful hunters, however, and are inclined to go meathingry in a region which would be regarded by the Australian aborigine as a voritable Paradise.

(a) PEDICAL - HEALTH & HYGINEE.

As no medical assistant accompanied the patrol a separate Medical Report appears as Appendix "A" to this report.

(a) EDUCATION.

There are no schools, either Hissien or Administration established within the sub-division, and the number of students attending school elsewhere has dropped from seven to 3. The Missien school conducted by the Franciscan Missien at Lund enters for a limited member of children living in the closer villages, but their attendance is specuadic and the closer we mainly of a religious nature. It is doubtful if there is one native resident in the sub-division able to read and write in pidgin English, and the natives evince little desire for this accomplishment.

(c) ROADS A MEIDGES.

report. There are a few miles of resonably good tracks around the larger villages in proximity to Luci Patrol Post, and these have been improved over the last year with the issue of a few of the necessary toels. There is insufficient labour in most of the villages to cope with the gigantic task of road making and maintenance, and no overall improvement in the situation can be anticipated or expected.

(g) VILLAGE OFFICIALS.

Little if any improvement in the general standard of officials has been accomplished over the last 18 months. It is particularly difficult to find any notive of the necessary character willing to accept the dubins honour of sutherity. Most officials prefer to take the lire of least resistance, and as they only see the "kiap" occasionally but have to live with their fellow villagers it is obvious which direction this line will take. Pressure of work was prevented the conducting of cowses for officials which I consider desirable.

(h) PAST HOUSES:

Buildings have improved considerably since my last visit, although acting on my instructions, nothing elaborate has been provided anywhere. All buildings were weatherproof, however, a marked change. There is no Rest House at ByLAMA, where the patrol spent a most unconfortable night in a delapidated native hut, crawling alive with countless millions of small cockroaches, and infeated with rats. Future patrols will not be visiting this village as it has since moved,

a slight improvement over the last 18 months, and the obtaining of nearly sixty new rames for the records is a good sign. I do not consider that there are very many more natives not being brought forward for cemsus cheeks, and this opinion is born out by the census figures themselves, which show no great discrepancies has with the rest of the Wappi, the sub-division should be patvolled best by D.S. and P.H.D. at least twice per year, and preferably every three menths. Unfortunately absence of the necessary staff makes this impossible.

HATIVE AFFAIRS.

These people have had contact with the Administration and dissionaries since approximately 1938 but are still far from commisticated. Many of the women and children disappear as the petrol approaches. Besides being timed they disappear because they are humiliated by not having elothes to year. This is a result of Mission influence in the area.

Many village disputes are settled by the person in the wrong leaving the area to sign-on as labourers. They hope that the dispute will be forgotten by the time they return. In cases it is but in others the complainant waits until the others return then brings the matter to Court. This system of justice cruses much ill-feeling in the villages and village officials have been instructed to bring all disputes to this office for settlement before the party concerned disappears from the district. district.

The Wapeis have a remarked inferiority complex. They believe The Wapels have a remained inferiority complex, they believe that they are only capable of becoming copre cutters and labourers in grans lines etc. They remark "I'm not enough". And will not make any attempt to learn to become a sidiled labourer. This attitude is also adopted towards the Hission schools in the area. It is he ed that as schools become more popular in the area these people will realize they are capable of learningend will take more interest in other occupations.

CRESUS.

The census was revised and the figures are attached. The previous census was conducted just over two years ago.

There has been a natural increase of "3 in population during this time. Also 159 new names were recorded.

Except for a few places there was no difficulty in getting the recopie to line. It is felt that the census is not yet complete there being 200 to 300 new names yet to be recorded.

AGRICULTURE.

There is a slight shortege of food in the area due to the normal sessonal decrease. This will disappear as new gardens done into bearing.

In many places there have been experiments with the growing of hill rice. The first crops were successful but it was found that a second crop could not be obtained from the same piece of ground. Shortage of larour mate it impossible to close new ground for every planting if rice, the danger of a possible food shortage caused by cutting and preparing large rice gardens not leaving sufficient time to prepare other gardens was explained to the people. Also it was suggested that they rotate the rice with their other crops. Several crops of rice have been bervested and the rice is being used as seed and a little is being hulled. It was pleasing to mote that they were making use of the hulled rice and not letting it go to waste as has been the case in some other

EDUCATION.

There are two Mission schools in the area. The R.C. Mission have a school near WILIUM and Mr. Dale of the Open Brothron Assemblies Mission of Australia and America is conducting a school at INDERI.

Attendance at these schools is irregular. The pupils attending when they feel so inclined. Also there is slight friction between the two schools caused by pupils leaving one to attend the other.

VILLAGE OFFICIALS.

Village officials are of a low standard. It is felt that this is caused by the officials not knowing what their position entails. It is hoped to be able to visit the area more often to instruct advice the officials. Also they have been advised to visit Iami regularily for guidance and instruction.

ROADS AND BRIDGES.

All roads were found to be clean but in many places the surface has deteriorated. Instructions were given for improvements to be made. In some places drains are required in others steps will have to be cut into spit slippery mad-stone end clay.

There are no bridges in the area but it is hoped to be able to construct a bridge ever the MENI River between Luni and TRI. This bridge is urgently needed as both natives and Europeans are often held up from six to twelve hours when the river floods. The possibilities of constructing a log bridge will be investigated. If this is found to b, unartisfactory efforts will be neede to get materials to construct. A suspension bridge.

The patrol was of a routine nature, the objects being census revision and general administration.

In some villages there has been a general improvement while others have remained static.

NATIVE AFFAIRS :

As mentioned earlier there has been progress in some villages while not in others. The progressive villages are to be found between LUMI and KARATTEN, Much of this progress is due to MAKAIN of LUMI and YEFAI of KARAITEN who are leaders amongst these people and are influencing the villagers to build better houses, improve their roads and to become interested in rice growing. Also these people are regularly contacted by Missionaries who are encouraging them to take more interest in village affairs.

In the rest of the villages, little, if any progress was noted. The village officials do not have much influence and it is felt (although it cannot be proved) that in the past the officials have been more interested in accepting bribes from recruiters and their agents than carrying out and taking an interest in their duties as village officials. Both recruiters and village officials have been told that this practise is an offence under Sections 19 and 27(b) of the Native Labour Ordinance.

Many of the men leave thier villages to work on plantations. I feel that there are two reasons for this: 1. Conditions of employment are made very attractive to the Mapoi. 1il There is little incentive for the men to remain in their villages. Initiation ceremonies and dances have been discouraged by the missions. Now a dance is an insignificent affair which is finished within a week, where in the past, over three months was taken to prepare for a dance. The nature of the terrain prohibits the introduction of a cash crop or similar project which would occupy the native during the time which was spent in preparing for dances etc. There is very little feft for him to do so he packs up his belongings and goes away to work.

Several villages throughout the area have been termed as "model villages" - LUMI, OTEMGI and now YEBIL is being replanned and built. This, it is hoped will develop a civic pride among those people giving them an incentive to remain at home and improve their surroundings.

VILLAGES :

All villages were tidy having received a pre-patrol "spring clean"

Housing in most villages is poor. The houses are built on the ground and are dark inside.

An effort is being made to develop a civic pride which is hoped will improve the standard of the housing throughout the area. OTEMGI and LIMI will be used as the model villages. These villages have their houses built on piles approximately three feet above

the ground. They consist of either one or two rooms with a verandah attached.

In both these villages the people are adopting themselves to this type of house remarkably well. The health of the people in these villages is far better than the health of the people in the surrounding villages.

AGRICULTURE :

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BRA

Throughout the area the staple food is sago. Secondary foods are Samoan tarc, banana and sweet potato. There did not appear to be any shortage of food in the area.

Several of the villages have planted rice gardens but have lost most of their enthusiasm to plant rice. Their loss of enthusiasm is due to the small return they received in relation to the amount of man-power required to grow the crop. The rice was grown in a cooperative plot and, when harvested, it was hulled with a "Bental" hullet.

I am encouraging the villagers to plant their rice in a family plot. Rash family to harvest their paddy and suggesting that they hull their paddy to use, when for some reason, the family does not wish to go to the gardens to collect other foods.

There are three 'Bental' hullers available to these peop's. The hullers crack the grain but the rice is quite palatable. Best results have been obtained by using a course adjustment on the machine and hulling the paddy trice.

VILLAGE OFFICIALS :

All villages visited have officials, many, I feel, have been appointed on their ability to speak pidgin English and with little regards to their leadership qualities. I appreciate the difficulties in appointing village leaders as officials when bringing areas under Government influence. As the leaders become known they will be appointed to replace the existing officials.

ROADS :

The roads in this area follow mountain ridges and in many places river beds.

Often natives are unable to travel from one village to another during the wet season when the rivers are in flood. It is hoped to be able to survey tracks to obviate the using of river beds as roadways.

MISSIONS t

Two Missions operate in this area. The Franciscan Mission have a Station at Impi and at KARATEM. The Open Brethren Assemblies have Stations at IMEPU and XEBIL Villages. All four Stations are staffed with Europeans.

EDUCATION :

There are no students absent from this area either at Government or Mission schools.

The Franciscan Mission have a school at Lumi. This school has been recently inspected by Mr. Barron, D.E.G. Wowak,

The Open Brethren Assemblies Mission have schools at IMEPU and YEBIL. These schools are conducted from Monday to Wednesday each week. The aim of these schools is to educate the native to give him a better understanding of the teachings of this Mission. These Missionaries are not interested to obtaining any help from the Department of Mucation for their schools.

The object of the patrol was to make friendly contact with the natives The Coject of the patrol was to make friendly contact with the natives of RAUIT Village and then proceed in a southernly direction to gather information on this area. To use the information gathered in discussions with the A.D.O. Altape with the view of fixing the southern boundaries of the Mitare and Lami Districts. The report is written in time sections dealing with the three village groups contacted.

DIARY :

24.11.52 Lated to TELMEI. Heavy rain in afternoon.

25.11.52 THLOTEI to NAMIL.

WAKIL to YEMPU. Visited O.P.M. Mission Station. 26.11.52

27.11.52 YEMMU to MAUIT via ANGUGINAK Mountain.

RAULT to MACKO (WATALU). We made road - guide with local invaledge necessary. The track passes through thick rain forest crossing two ridges then winding up a third ridge 28.11.52 which is followed until LAKTO is reached. Malking time

29.11.52 LAEKO to Libuat. Welking time I hr. along a good track passing secondary forest.

30,11,52 LIBUAT to YAU-AH (5thrs. aprox.) No made road - guide necessary. The track passes through rain forest crossing several ridges.

1. RAUIT VILLAGE.

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This section should be read in conjunction with Lumi Patrol report No. 5 - 51/52.

It was decided to establish friendly relations with these villagers hoping that information concerning the alleged murder of the BULUWA natives may come to hand after friendly contact had been made.

On entering the village I found the villagers anxious to contact the patrol. We were made very velcome and much food was presented to the patrol and in return for the food presents of salt and boads were given to the people.

After talking with the people it became obvious that I would not gather any further information concerning the alleged murder so it was decided not to press the subject as friendly contact had been made with villagers. As there is little information concerning the alleged murder and it happened over 17 months ago it is considered more important to maintain friendly relations with these villagers and not pursue the matter any further.

These people were invited to attend the Xmas. Festivities at Lumi and it was pleasing to see them come to Lumi for the occasion.

RAULT Village will be visited and included in the No.2 WAPEL Cansus Sub-division and all routine information for this village will be included in the report of the next patrol to that area.

2. LAEKO (WATALU) > LIBUAT VILLAGE GROUP

It is believed that this was the first Administration Patrol to this area, but the villages were visited during the war by Mr. Gavin Stanley who was employed by 61. Search. Also many natives holding Native Assistant's Permits to Engage Labour have entered the area.

Over 300 people were seen in this group and they appear to belong to the same language group as the people of RAULT and NAUBIL Ville ver in the No.2 WAPEI Census Sub-division. They were found to be friendly and appeared anxious/ to come under Government influence. oula

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The people requested tools to build and clean roads between their villages and MAIMBIL Village. They will be supplied with showels as soon as they come available.

I was able to line these people. They were nervous when lining so I thought it would not be wise to hold these people until I recorded their names. A head count was obtained and the figures are as follow.

LAEKO - YILBET Hamlet M/A - 17 F/A - 29 M/C - 22 F/6 - 12 Total -80.

BAROM Hamlet M/A - 19 _F/A - 22 M/C - 17 F/C - 7 Tote1 - 65.

Also approx. 18 men absent at work.

LIBUAT N/A - 34 F/A - 54 N/C - 41 P/C - 29 Total - 158.

At the time of the patrol many of the young sen were absent at work and it is felt that this absence of men was partly responsible for the friendly attitude of these people towards the patrol.

An Education Department Sparrow Radio was found to be of a great help in gotting these publicate overcome their styness. The villagers ircluding women and children would gather around in the evenings to hear the radio.

AGRICULTURE

Pood is plentiful in these villages the staple foods being sage and years. Accamas, taro, pit-pit and sugar came are also plentiful.

Nuch time is spent by these people in hunting and smoking the game which is caught. It was noticed that a small amount of this smoked game is included in their daily diet.

HEALTH.

The general health of these people was found to be good except for a few small sores and yaws. It is felt that if a temporary aid post was established in this area many of the small sores and yaws could be cleaned up. This ratter will be further discussed with the Medasst-in-Charge at Luni.

YAU-AN - YILUI - YEMIN VILLAGE GROUP

These people appear to be of the same language group as those from Southern MAI MAI. They were contacted in September, 1951 by Mr. Martin, P.O. from Drickikir when there was much inter-village fighting. It does not appear that there has been fighting amongst these people since then and one reason for this may be that the fighting strength of the villages have been greatly reduced as many of the men are absent at work.

I was not as successful in contacting these peo le as I was with the LARKO - LIBUAT group but white contact that was made was friendly. The previous patrol to this area took many of the men from this group lack to Drieklitic and the villagers were afraid that the same thing may he per again.

Sago and your appear to be the staple foods of this group. Smoked game also plays an important part in their diet.

The years are cultivated in bamboo baskets. The baskets are filled with rich soil and are placed on the ground. The nature of the area is mostlike, the reason for this method of cultivation.

Many non-indigenous plantskare been introduced into the area by Labourers returning from work. Examples are corn, pumpkin, rice, beans and tomatoes.

HEALTH.

This area is on the edge of the Sepik swamps and mosquitoes are prevalent. Also a number of yaws and sores were seen. But it is felt that little can be done to improve the general health of these people until they are more easily contacted.

DISTRICT BOUNDARIES.

As the LAEKO - LIBUAT group can be easily reached from RAUTF or MAINBIL and that they appear to belong to the same language group, it is felt that these two villages would benefit by being included and patrolled in the No. 2 WAPEI Consus Sub-division from Lami.

The YAU-AM, YILUI people appear to be of the same language group as the people from MAI MAI and it is suggested that they be included in the MAI MAI patrols. Also it appears that these villages are more accessible from MAI MAI.
