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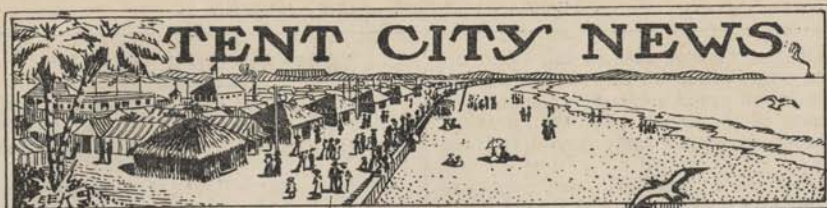

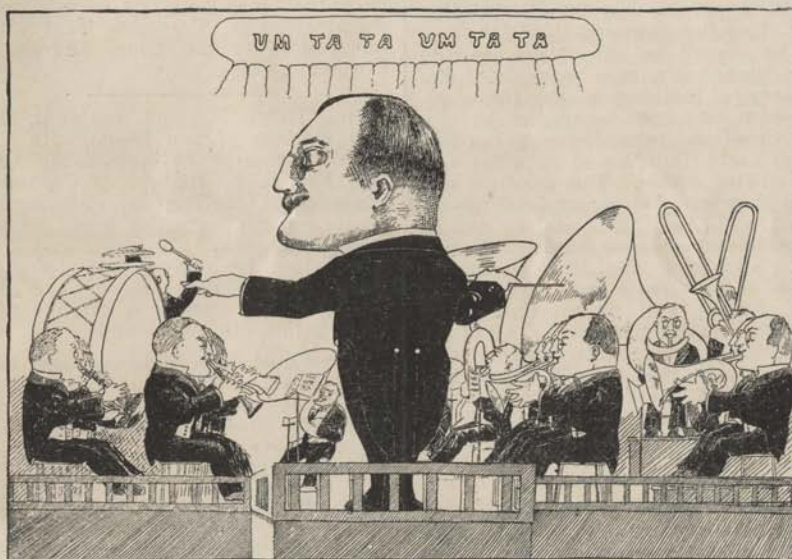

PALLMA DIRECTING "LUCY'S SEXTETTE"---HEAR THEM YELL

There is a place for every man and a man for every place in his line, and, if ever a place had a man to fill it, the Coronado Tent City Band has the leader to direct it and pilot it on the wave of popular success. Sincerity of purpose and great musical enthusiasm are vital attributes in the make-up of a director, and that characteristic pose and sense of command, so absolutely necessary that a director must look the part, not only to his men, but also to the critical public.

All these and more are natural to Frank Palma, and, being eminently practical, the glamor of professional success and popular applause does not

change his simple and unaffected graciousness. His sense of musical duty to the public is easy to discern in his unceasing work to present such programs as appeal to the large audiences who attend his concerts, with all their different musical tastes. A notable characteristic is what the French call "esprit de corps," that is, good fellowship and an all-work-together spirit among the men.

This spirit takes hold of the crowds who hear them play, and the enjoyment is mutual. All the soloists and the whole band, individually and collectively, are favorites, and it is indeed rare to find such a delightful condition

existing anywhere else in big band affairs, and Pallma as director is responsible in no small degree for what will be one of the most delightful musical summer seasons ever enjoyed in Tent City.

Many new musical surprises are stored away in Director Pallma's den, and the fame of this splendid band will be spread all over the country by the thousands of visitors from far and near who carry away the programs as souvenirs of the musical treats given them by Pallma and his great band.

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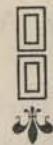
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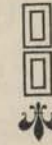

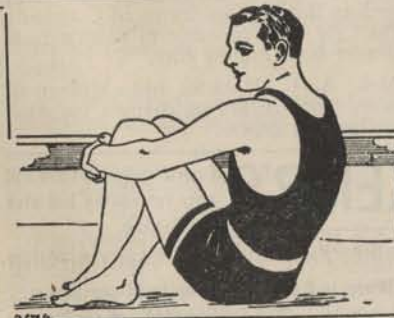
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A REAL CALIFORNIA SONG
