Being Out in the Workplace: Is it for you? - HUB 265

Chris Schlarb, Arizona State University

This presentation will feature small group discussion to help participants learn the facts about LGBTQ employment discrimination. What policies, procedures, programs and resources have we developed on college campuses to create a safe learning and working environment for Trans* people? The Experiences of LGBTQ Student-Athletes in the NCAA - HUB 355

The settings of college campuses have improved for LGBTQ students over the years. One group routinely missing from studies are student-athletes. This program will review the findings from the Student-Athlete Climate Study (SACS) focusing on the experiences of over 8,000 student-athletes representing all three NCAA divisions and sports. Specifically, the program will focus on the experiences of the 401 self-identified LGBTQ student-athletes and how the climate (campus, departmental, team) influences their identity, academic success, and athletic success.

Let's Talk About It: A Roundtable on LGBTQ Identities and Contemporary Queer Culture – <u>HUB 269</u>

Lysander Valenzuela, CSULA

What's going on in the Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender, and Straight Ally communities of color? Do you have strong opinions about pressing issues in the Queer culture of today's society? Have we come a long way or do we have a long way to go? Join this safe and welcoming environment as we ponder current LGBTQ hot topics such as intersecting identities, media representation, coming out, bullying, same-sex marriage, allies, etc.

Not Myth but Mithli: Queer Invisibility in the Greater Middle East - HUB 260

Our workshop shall focus on breaking down the stereotype that variant sexuality does not exist inherently in North Africa, The Middle East, The Subcontinent, or neighboring countries. We will explore different expressions of variant sexuality and gender nonconformity within the stated geoethnic boundaries and its role in the changing understanding of queer theory in modern discourse.

THE TOURNEY PICTURE

UC San Diego, Chico State, Cal State Monterey Bay and Cal State East Bay have clinched spots in the eight-team CCAA Tournament. UCSD, Chico and Monterey Bay have also secured home games in the first round of the tourney, which will be played on Tuesday, March 5 (7 p.m. for the UCSD game). The semifinals and final will be contested at Citizens Business Bank Arena in Ontario, Calif., on Friday, March 8 (12 and 2:30 p.m.) and Saturday, March 9 (5:30 p.m.), respectively. UCSD has qualified for the CCAA Tournament every season since the tourney was reinstated in 2008. The winner of the CCAA Tournament earns an automatic berth in the NCAA Regionals.

NATIONALLY SPEAKING

For the second straight week, UCSD is receiving votes in the USA Today Top 25 Coaches Poll. Other CCAA schools involved in the most recent poll include Chico State (No. 13) and Cal State Monterey Bay (receiving votes).

REGIONALLY SPEAKING

The NCAA released its first regional rankings of the season Wednesday. In the West, the top 10 are: 1. Western Washington, 2. Chico State, 3. Simon Fraser, 4. Cal State Monterey Bay, 5. Grand Canyon, 6. UC San Diego, 7. Northwest Nazarene, 8. Montana State Billings, 9. Academy of Art and 10. Hawaii Pacific.

RECORD WATCH

As a team, UCSD holds a .769 (330-for-429) free throw percentage. The program's single season record is .751 (526-for-700), set over the 2006-07 season. Daisy Feder has made 70 three-point field goals this year. That single season mark is held by Meaghan Noud, who drained 84 during the 2007-08 campaign. Career-wise, Feder has 230 treys to her name, 25 behind all-time record-holder Chelsea Carlisle (255).

A LOOK AT THE PIONEERS

Cal State East Bay is 13-9 overall and in fourth place in the CCAA with an 11-7 record. Winners of seven straight, the Pioneers most recently defeated Humboldt State (58-53) and Cal Poly Pomona (52-50) on the road last week. Brianna Terrance, the reigning CCAA Player of the Week, leads the team in scoring (9.2 points/game), while Marlene MacMillan has a team-best 7.8 rebounds/game average.
