

## Chancellor McGill invites 15 S.D. citizens to serve on urban affairs advisory committee

## June 26, 1969

Fifteen San Diego citizens have accepted an invitation from Dr. William McGill, Chancellor of the University of California, San Diego, to serve on an urban affairs advisory committee designed to aid the UCSD administration in dealing with minority problems.

The initial meeting of the group has been scheduled for 3:30 p.m. Friday, June 27, in Conference Room A on the Matthews Campus at UCSD. The meeting will allow the members to get acquainted and help them learn about the present concerns and activities of the university administration with respect to minority problem. An attempt will he made to clarify the role of the committee and to plan future meetings.

The Reverend Dick Schwitzgebel, pastor of the First Calvary Presbyterian Church and a member of the committee, has been asked by Chancellor McGill to act as temporary chairman for the first meeting.

In addition to Reverend Schwitzgebel, the members of the committee are:

Mrs. Gracia Molina de Pick, an instructor of Spanish at Mesa College who developed the curriculum for Mexican-American studies at Mesa and served as adviser to the Mexican-American Youth Association.

Ruben Dominguez, project director for the Neighborhood House Association and former director of manpower development for the Economic Opportunity Commission. He is a graduate of the School of Social Work at San Diego State College.

Miss Ruby Hubert, executive director of the Neighborhood House Association and a member of the Mayor's Committee on Housing, the Employment Task Force of the Citizen's Interracial Committee and the Manpower Advisory Council.

Herb Ibarra, project director of the English as a Second Language (ESL) Center and actively involved in education and its importance to the Mexican-American community of San Diego.

David Logans, executive secretary of the Community Action Council Area "C" and president of the Inter-Community Involvement Group. He is a board member of the Community Welfare Council, the Western Community Action Training Corporation and the Southeast YMCA.

Arthur Madrid, employed in the personnel office of Pacific Telephone where he works with minority recruitment and employment for that business.

Robert Matthews, coordinator of the Doyle Center of the San Diego City Schools. He is a member of the Elementary Institute of Sciences in Southeast San Diego.

Mrs. Geraldine Rickman, director of COPE at San Diego State College and actively concerned with education of the disadvantaged. She formed COPE (Community Opportunity Programs in Education).

Bert Rivas, director of educational opportunities program at San Diego State College and an instructor in the Department of Sociology at San Diego State.

Jules Robinson, a member of the Community Relations Department of the San Diego Police Department. He heads the Community Relations office of the police department in the Logan Heights area of San Diego.

Mrs. Marta Schlatter, director of the Southeast Family Services and currently a field work supervisor with the San Diego State College School of Social Work and an instructor of ethnic studies at San Diego State.

George Scott, president of Walker Scott Company and chairman of the Communications Task Force of the Urban Coalition.

Carrol Waymon, executive director of the Citizen's Interracial Committee and chairman of the City-Community Dialogues. He has been a teacher, psychologist, probation officer, human relations consultant and author.

Richard Wong, director of the Neighborhood Service Center and an active member of the Mexican-American Advisory Committee.
