

Mick Hailey to lecture on "Prisoners of the Tower: Why They Were There and How They Made America Great "

Mick Hailey, an expert on the historical buildings of London, will continue his popular series of lectures at the University of California, San Diego, Wednesday, March 30, with a talk on "Prisoners of the Tower: Why They Were There and How They Made America Great."

The lecture, which is free and open to the public, is sponsored by the Friends of the UCSD Library. It will begin at 5 p.m. in the UCSD Theatre, building 203 of the Administrative Complex. The theatre is directly west of the UCSD Bookstore.

Hailey has so enthralled his audiences that he has spoken to standing-room-only crowds. In February he gave "A Lighthearted Look at a Medieval Fortress - The Tower" and a year ago he spoke on Westminister Abbey. Hailey is a member of the Guild of Guides Lecturers in London and his historical knowledge, anecdotes and behind-the scenes glimpses make his talks memorable.

His talk on the prisoners of the Tower will be illustrated with slides. Hailey, a resident of London, has been doing research at the UCSD library for more than a year. He is scheduled to return to London the day following his presentation.

The Friends of the UCSD Library is an educational organization designed to bring together San Diegans with a shared interest in books and libraries.
