AWARDS AND HONORS

UCSD POLITICAL SCIENTIST ELECTED PRESIDENT OF APSA

Professor Arend Lijphart, a member of the University of California, San Diego Department of Political Science, has been named as president-elect of the American Political Science Association (APSA) for 1994-95 and as president for 1995-96. Lijphart, a political science professor at UCSD since 1978, is an authority on democratic forms of government, international relations, and electoral systems. He is the author of numerous books and articles on these subjects.

INTERNATIONAL RELATIONS SPECIALIST RECEIVES BOOK AWARD

Miles Kahler, a professor at UCSD's Graduate School of International Relations and Pacific Studies (IR/PS), is the winner of the Ohira Memorial Prize for Regionalism and Rivalry: Japan and the United States in Pacific Asia, a book he co-edited with Jeff Frankel, a professor of economics at UC Berkeley. A member of the UCSD faculty since 1986, Kahler's expertise is in international political economy and international relations in the Pacific Rim region.

RECENT BOORS

Yookoso!, which means 'welcome' in Japanese, is the first Japanese language book to be published using the "natural approach," which focuses on the development of conversation skills and puts less emphasis on the study of grammar and syntax. The book, published by McGraw-Hill, was written by Yasu-Hiko Tohsaku, a professor of Japanese language and linguistics at the Graduate School of International Relations and Pacific Studies (IR/PS).

Sociology Professor Andrew Scull has written an historical book tracing society's changing attitudes and treatment of the mentally ill in Britain. The Most Solitary of Afflictions: Madness and Society in Britain, 1700-1900 was published by Yale University.

Steven Shapin, a professor of sociology and a member of the university's science studies program, is the author of A Social History of Truth (University of Chicago Press), an exploration of the history of early modern science, focusing on the social world of gentleman-philosophers in 17th century England.

IR/PS ECONOMIST RECEIVES GRANT TO STUDY VIETNAM

Economist John McMillan, a professor at the Graduate School of International Relations and Pacific Studies (IR/PS), has received a \$20,000 grant from IRIS/University of Maryland for his project, "Bottom Up vs. Top Down: Vietnam in Transition."

Paul Papayoanou, an assistant professor in the UCSD political science department, is the recipient of a grant from the UC Institute on Global Conflict and Cooperation. The grant supports his project "New Games: Modelling International Relations After the Cold War."
