MUSIC AND ART LIBRARY OPEN TO PUBLIC

Did you know that the Athenaeum Music and Arts Library in La Jolla is open to the public, that you can use its considerable resources without obligation? And for a modest membership fee you can borrow from its collections?

The library includes some 1400 art books, many of them fine color-plate publications such as those of Skira and Abrams. Books about music number more than 500, sheet music and scores more than 2000. There is also a selection of plays and books about the theatre.

All of these works are available for use within the library. An annual membership fee of \$7.50 permits you to take out books, magazines and items of music; and for an additional fee of \$5 you may borrow record albums from a collection of more than 1300.

The Athenaeum is located at 1008 Wall St., and is open Tuesday through Saturday from 12-5:30, and on Thursday until 9 in the evening.

This unusual and valuable community resource is maintained by the Library Association of La Jolla, an organization that has offered the town one or another kind of library facility since 1897.

A REPORT ON OPERATION ADVENTURE by Maxine Junge

A few months ago in a BEAR FACTS article by Sandy Turner you heard about the beginnings of OPERATION ADVENTURE. We would like to tell you what has happened since then.

OPERATION ADVENTURE is an independent, unorganized organization. It is a group of volunteer teachers offering creative adventures in learning for disadvantaged children.

Classes are small and free-wheeling and as little like "real" school as possible. What is taught reflects the interests and inventiveness of the teachers: A science class where making ice cream becomes a graphic demonstration of chemical principles and eating the ice cream is the enjoyable result of the (CONTINUED NEXT PAGE)

experiment; A newspaper with poems, stories, community-oriented editorials ("Our Park Situation Is Harsh") and a "Gripe of the Week" column;

An "Art Experiences" class where the children may make up a story, express their story in dance movement, accompanying themselves by improvising their own music, and then paint their story in a group mural; A "Science-on-the-go" class for the Junior High age group, where students visit various kinds of research labs and talk with the scientists who run them; A Greek mythology class where the children act out the stories.

There are classes in creative drama, dance, Negro history, cooking and sewing and a class where the children make their own 'first readers' by inventing stories, then turning them into books with their own illustrations.

These classes help disadvantaged children discover new thoughts, new feelings, new experiences. Little by little, the children discover they are actually learning—as if by magic—and that learning can be tremendous fun.

Beginning in January with practically no money, OPERATION ADVENTURE now has about 25 teachers and is offering over 22 classes, with an enrollment of 250 children in the Chollas area of Southeast San Diego. We are about to open a new program in Linda Vista, with art, art experiences, astronomy, creative auto repair, and "Let's Talk It Over" classes.

The value, we feel, is on both sides. For the teacher, it may mean a chance to try out his ideas of creative teaching, to really reach a child in a direct and immediate way. For a child, it means intimate contact with a creative adult. It means exposure to the excitement of learning with a teacher who is excited about learning himself—and excited about teaching. And, after watching our own children as they have participated in OPERATION ADVENTURE, we would even go so far as to say that so-called "advantaged" children benefit greatly from this stimulating approach to learning.

Many UCSD students and OCEANIDS are already involved in OPERATION ADVENTURE. Won't you help too? Will you lead a disadvantaged child on an adventure in art or science or cooking or ...? Will you assist in a class or go on a field trip? Can you donate supplies (we can use almost anything) or (we-hate-to-mention-it) money? This is a real chance to reach children who need you.
