



INSPECTION OF POSSIBLE AIRSTRIP SITES

Several possible diretrip sites in the Upper JIMI and headmaters were inspected in the course of the patrol. Of those inspected, a site near KOL (on "KURAMMI-NA" - ref. heading "Land Investigations" in talk Proof Report) isny far the neet improve-

"KURAKEL-JAH" - near KOL

This siretrip site is very good, by JINI standards.

The 'strip site is contained within the native-owned land "KURANEL-WAM".

Situation: About three-quarters of a mile south-south-east of KOL census ground in the JIMI headwaters, on the left bank of the WAINE River (JIMI tributary).

Operation and Approach: Operation one-may (from the morth-west) with good approach onto a probable up-slope of maybe three degrees-

Blevation: About 5050 feet A.S.L ..

Construction Details and Conventer

The strip would run northwest-southeast.

It sould be developed to a maximum of 2000 ft x 250 ft, with an up-slope of about three degrees.

The top 900 ft x 150 ft (southeast end) is good firm ground, and could be made operational for sirereft with two months' work.

The bottom 1900 ft (northwest end) is pitpit and grees swamp, not too heavy, and could be filled and drained and rolled with the labour force available.... (1200 assemble for causus at KOL, 15 minntent walk away). This work could be completed within air months.

Thus, the full 'strip potential, 2000 ft x 250 ft, could be utilised for aircraft eperation within about six months of commencement of work.



(Inspection of Possible Airstrip Sites) - continued:

2. "GOBO" - near the MANS River

This 'strip site is on the native-owned land "GCBO", in the Upper JIMI, whose alienability was investigated by direction of the District Commissioner following application by the Latheren Mission for Special and Mission Leases (Report references are given under heading "Land Investigations" in this Report Summary.

Stantion: On the right bank of GOND Creek itributery of the MANS River, which flows into the Jimi), 35 minutes' walk domustreen from ININBINING (MANS) Rest House.

Cperation and Approach: Operation one-way (from north-west) with a very restricted approach onto an up-s'ope of maybe four that need.

Elevation: About 4250 feet A.S.L ..

Comments: The slope of the land (plus 4 degrees) and essily useable 'strip length (1500'-1630'), with minimum obtainable width of 150 feet, are in favour of airstrip construction, but the size is all respects inferior to the site at "KURANKL-WIN" near KUL-

a: The approach is few too restricted. The 5300'-5500' north mall of the MANS Valley is directly opposite the landing and of the 'strip site (end beight 4250') at a distance of about a helf-wile (generous estimate).

b. Pessibilities of extension of the 'etrip site at the northwest (landing) and are nil; and at the southeast (top) and, very elight, as far as the Mission is consermed - filling an diverting of GOBO Creek would be a major undertaining; and, in any case, landowners maintain that they are not willing to sall any ground as an extension to the 'strip site.

The 'strip site is still mative-commed. It has been cleared of timber and scrub. No groundwork (levelling, etc.) is to be undertaken before receipt of further advice from the District Commissioner.

It is suggested that this 'strip site should hold little interest for the Administration. It is inferior to the ROL ("RURANZI WAN") 'strip site (3-4 hours' walk away) in which I consider that Administration interest and effort should be concentrated.

3. TEMO" - mear NUBGILE (Upper JIMI)

The 'strip site is on the native-owned ground "WEMO", forty minutes' walk down from BURGILE in the Upper JIMI, north of the JIMI Fiver.

Operation and Approach: A *strip here would probably run E.N.E. - w.S.V., with satisfactory approach from T.N.E. onto a possible up-slope of a few degrees.

Elevation: about 4000 ft 1.S.L.

Comments: The cite is fair, with a doubtful and difficult maximum of about 1500 feet. The situation is favourable from the point of view of administration - a good jumping-off point for patrols into the Biasarcks and Restricted area.

The land "EAMO" has not beer investigated for alienation. It is used as gardening and grazing land by its owners.

All of the 'strip sites discussed above are still native-owned land. In the case of "6080" and the "ADRAGEL-VAR" sites, land investigations have been conducted and reports submitted with a view to possible alienation.

Fending alienation and survey of the sites, no groundwork of any nature (levelling, surfloing, ditching, etc.) directed towards 'strip construction is to be undertaken.

GOOD Se.2, an area of about 5.075 acres, adjoins "GORO No.1*, "FORO No. 2" is sought by the Luther- Nission as a Mission Lease for the possible establishment of a European-manned Mission Station. The land "GORO No.2" is not occupied by natives.

3. "EGH"

My 34/2/1-76 of 30.5.58 to the Metriet Commissioner refers.

An investigation of "KOMS" was carried out april 26-27-28 / 1958 by direction of the District Commissioner (the District Commissioner at 34/2/1-1/49 of 18.12.57 to C.I.C. Jimi refers).

BOME, an area of about 46 acras near CHMA in the Upper Jimi, south of the MAMS/Jimi Limetion, had been sought by Mr A. Corby of KURNIP via RANE (WAHGE) as an Agricultural Lease with a view to its development as a coffee plantation. In the course of the investigation, homover, the native owners of the land "KOME" stated that they were not willing to sell so regotiations were broken-off. In view of the novely of, and interest in, the application by Mr Corby, a fairly comprehensive report was prepared and submitted to the District Commissioner under a/m reference 34/2/1-76 of 30.5.58.

4. "KURANEL-WAK"

My 34-30/64 of 17.5.58 to the District Commissioner refers.

An investigation of "RURANEL-WAN" was carried out May 3-5/1958 with a view to the possible alienation of the land and its development as an administration Post.

The land, appreximate area 85 acres, is near KOL, on the left bank of the Walker River, in the Jiki bandwaters. The land is at present part-occupied, but landowners are anxious to make the land available for alienation by the Administration on condition that the land will as a Post lite (airstrip site, hydro-electric potential, etc.) are discussed elsewhere in this Report Summary.

MAGISTERIAL

(a) In the Court for Native Affairs

One case was heard formally in the Court for Native Affairs in the course of the patrol, and two cases were heard following the patrol as a result of complaints and investigations made during the patrol.

The charges were offensive benaviour (1) and un'awfully laying hold of (2). Convictions were recorded in all three cases, with sentences of one month, six weeks and six weeks.

(b) Sundry Disputes

Mainly involving debts and women, there were numerous. Satisfactory settlements were reached in all cases.

Two lend disputes were brought forward (Lelusi IOGONTS against Luluai KOBUN; and Duluai MANBUL against Luluai ABUN) involving trespass - camerable of the subject land was not, in either case, in question. Satisfactory settlements were reached in both cases and the facts recorded in relevant Village Books and elsewhere. The trespassers, both of them Group Officials, were warned that offences of this nature, if repeated, would lead to recommendations for it is his mature.

(c) The death was reported at BUBULSANGA, late Narch, of the woman PARA, wife of NGUNTS c/- Tultul IAMBO. The woman's body had bll-egedly beenfound one morning late in March/1968 in a deep ditch at BLMI, below KOMBULANKIA. The disgruntled widower NGUNTS vague-ly accused the man KOSIr (c/- Luluai KOLIE) of having been implicated in the death, but could offer little to support his accusation. The direumstances of the death are mysterious, but not necessarily suspicious. In any case, a Constable was detached during the patrol to inspect the ditch at hami, where Pika's body had been found; the same Constable is at present on routine patrol in the headwaters, with instructions to check any leads he may pick up from contacts. If, in the light of any additional information obtained, the report parrants further investigation, the matter will be followed up. Otherwise, on account of the time already elapsed and as I hadd no appointment as a Cormoer, the matter will be allowed to rest.

(d) Serious Crime

Ho serious offences were reported to the patrol.

From this headwaters area six men of GEBAL are at present being held at JIMI Patrol Post, eventually to be sent to District Headquarters for likely committed for Supreme Court trial on charges of having nurdered male notive KABUL at EMUGO (near CEBAL) on/about 1.1.58. (Mr Police Investigation Report 11/3-60 of 20.4.58 has been forwarded to District Headquarters.)

(e) One major dispute was brought forward involving natives of the Groupe of DLNA Lulusi OGUN and NASIN Lulusi KANAN. The dispute is discussed at some length under heading "Native Affaire".

GRIFF OFFICIALS

Most are doing a fair job, on the whole.

- The two most powerful men in the hordwaters are the Luleais MARU (YOGONTS) of the PARA (PAGAU) Group c/- KOL, and KOLIZ of the PARA Group e/- BUSULGAUGA. Between them they control over 2000 natives of the PARA Group. Of the two, MARU is perhaps a shade the less Missish-inclined. MARU was one of the principals in the offer to the Administration of the ladd "KURAKEL-WAR" (near KOL) ref. remarks in this Report Summary under the heading "Land Investigations."
- 2. Two Group Officials, Lulusi AMUE of MARAP and Luluai FORUN of IAWARARON, were involved as trespassers in land disputer brought to the patrol. Both were clearly and consciously in the wrong; both were reprimanced and made aware that repeated offences of this nature would lead to recommendations for their disrisent from affice.

Inlusi KCBUN's position, even before this latest effort of his, was already sheky: He is a WILKAL-born man holding office as Iuliai of the KONMUGA Group (distinct from the WILKAI). His appointment dates back to the early 1950's, when the Upper JINI Valley was administered as part of the Central or Eastern High-lands (probably from KUNDIANA). The appointment does not impress as a sound one, and any deterioration in KOBUN's performance will lead to recommend tion for ravies of his appointment:

- In the course of the patrol, Taltul MORI of the WIGA Group c/- DUIMPINING (MANG) was charged in the Court for Native Affairs under hapilation 83(d) of Native Administration Regulations with having behaved in an offensive inner. He was convicted and sentenced to imprisonment with hard labour for his month. No further action is proposed against MCRI if it is found that his lapse was only temporary.
- 4. One unfortunate practice which is especially common to the majoraty of headwaters officials is the awarding of exhorbitant dimages and compensation in the local attlement of disputed ref. commonto under heading "Native Affairs" in this Summary.
- 5. As far as I know, all Group Officials in the JIMI headwaters hold only provisional appointments. It is intended soon to submit to the District Commissioner the names of those Officials whose confirmation in appointment is to be recommended.

ROADS AND BRIDGES

Novement in the JIMI headwaters is accomplished entirely on foot. The patrol travelled along the graded patrol tracks which now link all census assembly points and are maintained under supervision to a satisfactory standard.

Bridges at all creek and river crossings are in satisfactor condition. These are log bridges, with the exception of two cane suspension bridges at the JJMI crossings between BUBULDANGA-and-BUBULDANGA-and-OLEA.

EDUCATION AND MISSIONS

No school education is provided by the Administration in the area patrolled. The only Administration school in the JIMI to that established late 1957 at JIMI Patrol Post (TABIBUGA), where 35 students are encalled, none from the JIMI headwaters.

In the vicinity of most census points there are native-run mission "schools", which are, in the main, ineffectual. These "schools" appear to receive little supervision from their WHRGI-based European Mission supervisors. As far as I know, none is officially recognised by the Department of Education.

All of these "schools" appear to have trouble with trumts, and many requests were made to the patrol that children be strongly urged to attend school regularly. However, in the light of the conduct of several of the teachers in the past, no official pressure was brought to bear on students. All were advised that attendance at luch "schools" is a purely voluntary matter and one for the discretion of the parents concerned.

If the suggestion that on Administration Post be opened in the JIMI headwaters at NOI (land "KUPLMEL-WAM") is acted upon, I feel that a Station School should be established at the outset.

1. Lutheran Mission: According to the latest advice received the Lutheran Mission proposes to establish a Station in the Upper JIMI, probably at "GOBC" near DJIMBINING (MANS), under supervision of Rev. Junker of KEROWAGI - (the District Commissioner's 34-B-54 (55) (2/1)/3615 of 9.4.58 refers).

By direction of the Nistrict Commissioner (a/m memo refers), land investigations were conducted into two parcels of "Gobo" - d with a view to the possible alienation of the land and the ing of Mission and Special Leases (Land Investigation Report references 34-B-54/66 and 34-7-5/7 of 18.5.58).

Following submission of the Reports to the District Commissioner discussions were held in June with the interested Mission parties. Nothing definite came out of the discussions, but the impression was gained that Mission interest in "GOBO" had perhaps waned, and that the Mission might transfer its attention to the area about TABIBUGA. The further advice of the District Commissioner and the Mission is awaited in this regard.

2. The Moran Catholic Mission: Advice (under date 25.5.58) was received from a Pather Joseph E. McDermott of the Catholic Mission at KEROWAGI that he had been rosted to the JIMI Valley, there to establish a European-manned Station. It appears to be Pather McDermott's intention to settle in the JIMI headwaters, probably in the vicinity of McMoGNA, where he is interested in what he regards as a possible airstrip site (lend name "MINDEI") - ref. comments in this Report Summary under heading "Possible Airstrip Sites".

- Contation of Typus orised Trade Stores:

On Monday, May \$/1958, in the course of the patrol's stay at NOL in the JIMI headwaters, it was found that a trade store was being operated at RWL by the native NAMANE of PERCHASI or behalf of the homan Catholic Minsion at EEROWANI.

The set-up was investigated, premises inspected, inventory and prices checked, system of sales examined, exc., etc..

Items bought at the store from the native store-keeper on May 4 by a constable accompanying the patrol were formanded the District Commissioner under cover my separate repol. on the matter - Jimil reference 23/1 (32/4) - 70 of 27.5.58.

As far as I know, no Licences, Leases or Permits in respect of this state hate been applied for or issued, and it would appear that the Catholic Mission is operating here on an unauthorised and un-licensed footing.

On Wednesday, May 7/1956, a Catholic Mission thede store was found to be operating at MCNOGUM, in the JIMI headwaters, on the same footing as that at MOL.

Action was taken at MANGGUN along the lines of action taken at MOL (outlined above) and the matter was dealt with in my 23/1 (32/4) = 70 of 27.5.58 to the District Commissioner.

RATIVE APPAIRS

The native situation throughput the area patrolled is generally satisfactory. This can be attributed to the fair job being done by Grany Officials and to the activities of "zone police" of the SINI Detachment who operate on more or less standing patrol in the area, with bases at NASAP, NOL and BURGILE.

A common and undesirable practice in the headwaters and the Apper JIMI is the awarding of exacrbitant damages and compensation in the local settlement of disputes in "courts" presided over or droup Officials. Whilst every encouragement is given natives to sattle locally disputes of minor importance, their quite unrealistate in approach to the assessment of fair and reasonable compensation is to be deployed. The ill-effect bound to accrue from the practice year been explained to all in the simplest terms, but the matter till requires constant and close attention. The carrying of negotiations beyond the "approach" stage is a matter for the administration. The European land-seerer may concern himself only with observation and preference and selection. e) Willing and ability to sell or withhold from sale are matters which conners the native landowners and the Administration's Investigating Officer. Discussion at KOL with the WORDM and WARRS people indicated that the migration proposal had come, not from the WORDM people of KOL, but from the main WORDM Group is the WENGL, who were no doubt interested in acquiring the 27 WORDM people of KOL as and interest of the WARGI.

MEDICAL AND HEALTH

No Orderly accompanied the patrol.

In the area patrolled toers are Administration Aid Posts at RME, MONGGUM, BUBUISANGA and RUBURA; and, since the patrol was completed, an Orderly has been despatched from INBOWAGE (Eastern Highlands District) to set up an Aid Fost at BURGILE.

MOL, MONGGRW, BUBUISANCA and BUPFILE are staffed with KEROWAGIsupervised Orderlies; MUHURA to staffed with a MING-supervised Orderly; TABIBUGA (MINI Patrol Fost), from which the patrol was conducted, is suffed with HAJSM-supervised Orderlies.

Despite recommendations by the District Cormissioner (page 4 - Medical and Health" - of the District Cormissioner's 30/1-1571 of 11.3.57 - Corments on Lagen Patrol factor \$-577/97) and comments submitted by S.A.A. Mr Jeo. Mitthe in his Fager Medical Patrol Report H.9 of 30.1.58 (Upper JIMI), it appears that no positive action has yet been taken to implement the pycoonal to schieve some measure of co-ordination and unified control in administration of JIMI And Posts. De hitherto unsatisfactory situation (insjointed administration from Hiddle and MINI and MER(MASI) still obtains with its attendent sad effects: (the lies continue to receive their monthly gratuities for a week's sork at their Aid Posts, a week's leisurely travel to make hospital (HAGEN, MINI or MERCHARI), a week's at Dage Hospital, and a week's leisurely travel back to their Aid Fosts; the overall picture of the native health situation in the JIMI is incomplete — I have part, MINI has part, MAGEN has part, and MINIMASI has part, Dut not one of us has the complete picture.

I have made it clear on a number of occasions that I am prepared to take ver the responsibility of distribution of drugs, collation of Reports, etc.. The next sove would appear to be up to the Department of Public Realth.

AGRICULTURE AND LIVESTOCK

The position remains unchanged from that which obtained at the time of submission of sarlier Reports.

The usual native foods are grown for consumption. Owing to the distance of the only market for their produce (JIMI Patrol Post), sales of food are seldom effected except during the operation of patrols in the headwaters. The position may ahange a little now, with the Missions' decisions to open Stations in the JIMI; the Catholic Firtion in the headenters, or the Lutheren Bission probabily at *COBO, near WIRBINING.

From my own observation, and in agre-then Acting District Agricultural Officth the view of the . Wasliewsky, who patrolled part of the Beadwaters in Pet the economic prospects of the JIMI head Last, it is fait that are not bright. Peanate would appear to be the best proper perhaps passionfruit. Peanuts are give to the JIWI, but the strain is not impressive. Arrangements have been made with the District agricultural Officer, Mr 3. Angell, for supply at an early date of a good quantity of quality nuts for distribution.

Coffee-Growing - Duropeans

There are no European plantations in the area. A WARGI planter, are 1. Corby, had at one time contemplated establishing bimself in the JINI at "MOSE", near CLNA. However, on investigation of the land which he sought, it was found that owners were not willing to sail, so negotiations were broken-off.

In any case, it is considered that nowhere in the Upper JIMI is there land available that could be alienated, without detriment to native interests, as economic areas for the establishment of European coffee plantations. Throught t the Upper JILI resconably sloped ground is hard to come by. But opinion has been expressed by a competent observer that not more than he per cent of the land about that case for most of the Hyper JILI could support per-

All thing considered, I should say it is very unlikely that the Upper Jimi will ever support more than a couple of European planters; and their advent is surely a matter for conjecture.

Coffee-Growing -Matt.

The Acting District Agricultural Officer in his Report on his January-Papruary/1958 pairol of the Upper JDHI to assess the economic potential of the area stated that, in his opinion, native coffee-growing should not be approved or considered in the Upper JIM genhe made an exception in the case of the area about the MA Ever near D'HEBERING, where plots of well-established native-mission-grown coffee have come up well in good soil along the diver near the nair patrol road. This venture was regarded by the A/DiAio. as a useful experiment, provided some attention could be given to the coffee by the occasional patrol - thinning, inspecting, etc..

A further exception to the "no mative coffee" pattern in the Upper SIMI and headwaters might be made in respect of the area about KoL. Here there is a fair extent of rolling grassland and shelves and terraces of gentle slope which would appear to lend themselves to coffeegrowing. The Catroduction or native coffee-growing in that area is a proposal that might well be considered if, as is to be recommended to the District Commissioner, the "KURAKEL-MAD" land near KOL is acquired for establishment of an Administration Fost (ref. relevant headings in this Report Susmary), and subject to favourable soil survey. In the event of the establishment of an ideinistration Fost nearby, the European supervision would be available that would be necessary for the success of the venture, armagement of markets, etc...

DESIGNATION OF ESTABLISHING AN ADMINISTRATION POST IN THE JUNE HEADFATERS

By direction of the District Commissioner (part. (d) on page 2 of the District Commissioner's 34-F-54(55)(2/t)/3815 of 9.4.98 refers) the desirability of establishing an Administration rost in the Simil headwaters is considered in the light of information alpatrol.

All factors considered, I suggest that the establishment of an administration Post in the JIMI headwaters is desirable; a 1 that the ideal site for such a Post is "KURANEL-WAK", near KOL.

Comments in support of this recommendation are given below; the comments should be read with reference to the patrol sketch which accompanies this Patrol Report.

Definition of Terms Used:

In this discussion, the term "JIMI Headwaters" will be used to describe that area of the JIMI Valley from MONGGOK down (west) to OLEA and SUBULSANSA (ref. Sketch Map accompanying this Patrol Report). Approximate population of the area: 7500.

The term "Opper JIMI" will be used to describe that area from BUBULSANGA-GLUA down to and beyond the TSAU and KARAMF Rivers. Approximate population of the area: 6000.

The term "North Wall Upper JIMI" will be used to describe the MOGINI-to-BEKAPII area north of the River JIMI. Approximate population of the area: 4000 under census, and maybe 2000-3000 yet

The term "Middle JIMI" will be used to describe the area about the JABZ River and mest of it. Approximate population of the area:

Present System of Administration of the JIMI:

At present, the JIMI Valley (the JIMI headwaters, the Upper JIMI, the North Wall and the Middle JIMI down to the GAME River area) is administered from the JIMI Patrol Post at TABINUGA as part of the

Though the area is now perviced with fair-graded patrol tracks, effective coverage of the area (wherein movement is entirely on foot, and supporting a total population of about 18,500 now under census and permans 2000-3000 in the Bismarcks still to be contacted) takes a good three months of steady movement: effective, unnurried patrolling of the area would occupy a period in excess of three months. It is felp that, no matter how energetic the Officer stationed at TABIBUGA, contact with the headwaters people is neither as effective nor as frequent as might be desired.

The solution to the problem, if a problem is recognized to exist, lies in the establishment of a second Administration Post in the

Site Suggested for an Administration Post in the Headwaters:

Site suggested: ROL (land name "KURANEL-WAR") in the JINI headsatars where an area of about 85 acres has been investigated with a view



to its possible acquisition as a Station site (my 34-30/64 of 17.5.58 refers).

Type of Do.t Suggested: Native Hospital - ref. page 4 of HAGEN remu. 20/1-1571 of 11.3.57 (the District Commissioner's Comments on HAGEN Patrol Report No. 5 of 1956/57).

Staff Suggested: As experienced European Medical Assistant; and, if available, a Patrol Officer or "adet Patrol Officer.

Advantages of the KOL ("KURAMEL-VAM") Site: About 85 acres of generally fair ground - building sites, gardening suc grasing land, airstrip site (potential of 2000' x 250', with simple of plus about 3 degrees), alter, hydro-electric potential, concentration of population and ready availability of local labour.

Alternative Sites to KOL: Must be considered in the light of situation for effective administration and land availability and the natural advantages above-listed. In these respects, EOL is far ahead of any other site that night be considered in the head maters.

My views on "5080" (near DJEBIVING) are given in thic kepart Summary under headings "Land Investigations" and "Possible Airstrip Sites" and in my Land Investigation Reports 34-E-54(55)/66(65) of 18.5.58, submitted to the District Commissioner.

My views on "ARGS" (near BUBGILE) and "KINDEL" (near MONSOUM)

are given under heading "Possible Airstrip Sites".

Suggested Role of KOL as an Administration Post:

To serve the headwaters people as a Native Rospital. waters population is about 7500.

The presence in the KOL area of an European-stuffed administration Post would help to counter Mission influence already strong among pertain Groups and likely to increase to a not altogether desirable degree with the advent to the headwaters of European Missions of Embheran and Otholic denominations.

Suggested Role of TARIBUGA:

To continue in its present role as the JIMI Patrol Post.

From TARIBUGA the 6000 people of the Upper JLI can be centrally administered, with the most distant within a long day's walk of the Post; the 4000 censused natives of the North Wall Upper JIMI can be conveniently administered, with the sost distant within 12-2 days' walk; and of the 1000-odd people of the Niddle JINI he most distant are within two days' walk. Thus, in all, a population of 11,000 under census can be administered with reasonable ease from TARIRIGA. TABLECGA itself is 19-2 days' walk from ACL.

A Fost below TABISUCA in the lightly populated region of the GARZ River is not warranted in the present stage of development of the JIMI; nor would such a Post be justified without attendant development of the area by European interests.

Purely in the interests of astive administration the establishment of a Post among the Groupe on the North Wall Upper JIMI might be considered. From such a Post effective and relatively constant contact could be maintained with the North Wall Groupe under census population about 4000) and the yet un-contacted Groupe to the Table Total Country (North Table Ta back in the Bismarcks (numbering, at a guess, perhaps 2000).

Rarlier in this discussion, brief mention was hade of the advantages of the "NEWO" site near BUBSTLE to effect coverage and paretrained for of the North Wall Upper SIMI and Dismarche. The site has ite points, but there would be no good reason to develop it as an administration Fost if action is taken with regard to "TURAKKI-TAK" (near EGL). Nost of what could be achieved from "VEYO" could be achieved from TURAKKI-TAKE achieved also from EGL, which is no great distance easy.

In any event, we are limited to working with the resources available and to planning with an eye on the limits likely to be imposed by probable field Staff establishment. For that reason, and for ethers mentioned above, I suggest that the interest and effort of the Jaministration should be concentrated on the further devalors ment of the JINI Patrol Fiet at TableUGA and its 'strip site and on the establishment of a second (headwaters) Post at "EUPZARE-SAR" (NOL).
