

5K run and 2-mile fun walk to benefit UCSD instructor Diana Chadwell

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5K RUN AND FUN WALK TO BENEFIT POPULAR UCSD INSTRUCTOR

Colleagues and students of University of California, San Diego Physical Education instructor Diana Chadwell have known her over the years as a woman of boundless enthusiasm and energy.

She joined the UCSD faculty in 1973. In June 1986, however, Diana was temporarily sidelined with breast cancer.

Following a mastectomy and chemotherapy, Diana made an aggressive comeback and remained free of the cancer for four years. She had a recent recurrence of the disease and is now undergoing an experimental treatment at the M.D. Anderson Cancer Center in Houston. Unfortunately, the treatment is not covered by insurance. Medical costs alone are expected to exceed \$100,000.

To help defray those expenses, Diana's colleagues, students and friends are sponsoring a 5K run and 2-mile fun walk on the UCSD campus, Saturday, November 10.

The walk will begin at 7:30 a.m. and the run at 8:00 a.m. Both events will start on Gilman Drive, north of the campus entrance. Registration fees are \$12 for students and seniors, \$15 for all other participants. Co-sponsored by the UCSD Department of Physical Education, the event is expected to draw approximately 500 participants.

Dr. Howard Hunt, recently retired chairman of UCSD's Department of Physical Education, said of the event, "Those of us who have been associated with Diana want to help and support her in any way we can. She has touched each of our lives and has contributed so much to our community, both on campus and off. We could never do enough for her."

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
