From time to time we'd like to publish interesting experiences of Oceanids members. The following is an article submitted by our member, Nona Rowat

I was a lab rat at the Stein research center, UCSD Nov. 27-Dec. 2, 2000!! Why did I do it? Did I like it? What was it like!! Well, very few people really have played guinea pig, sleeping in a lab for a whole week! I really loved most of it. You see our life on this planet has become so busy and open ended that it takes a confinement, an air plane ride, bus ride, a train trip, or a cruise, to limit all the possibilities and stuff that us middle class folks make ourselves feel responsible for. We need an excuse not to continue work, the many projects or concerns of everyday modern living.

When I did my premed year in Utah, a wonderful Prof. really wanted me to do a Ph.D. on circadian rhythms and I chickened out. I needed a clear track, medicine. You come out with a job! I was very practical from the beginning. So I felt I owed Prof. Moroni Brown, or his memory or science. Besides, I am cheap, more politely called thrifty, and the idea of getting \$710 tax -free dollars for having a mini retreat sounded good to me (and of course I got free food). I earn more as a doc, but the change was delightful and an amazing experience. Also, I got to order the free food!! I requested supplies for 2 as my Peter came in for all meals. I truly took advantage of the situation and had them bring in fresh squeezed orange juice from trader Joe's along with fresh avocados, small tomatoes, daily premade salads, guacamole, halvah, baklava, fresh fruits and other goodies, including my favorite gourmet potato chips (habanero chili with ginger kettle chips). And since we only have fish at home, I had 5 T-Bone steaks as an addition for me! so you could see I was very well stocked.

The study involved being at the Stein Research Center in a cubicle unit consisting of a pleasant room with a filthy carpet, a 2 burner stove/small fridge and a small bathroom. There were two similar cubicles with two more human lab rats adjacent to mine. The 2 other subjects were young women in their twenties that roomed together in the real world. Outside there were TV cameras that could watch our every move. Inside I had a computer, a TV with video and a CD/radio/tape player. There was a strict lighting-schedule of 1/2 hour dark and then 1 hour regular lighting, before the light was switched off again for 1/2 hour. This went on around the clock for the whole 5 days and nights I was there. The technician outside tried to keep us semi-awake when we had lights-on. At 8:30 AM, Peter, my spouse, would show up, make oatmeal and I would feel practically normal, even at the end of the week. There was a 1 minute form to fill out every 3 hours, but more lab-rat like was the collecting of urine once each 90 minute light-dark cycle. So each time we woke for the hour, a urine specimen was collected and temperature was taken 3 times during that wake hour. There was a nice water station in the room to help us pee. I was allowed to wander around in the outer dim-lit monitor observation station area but not beyond into daylight. There were larger fridges/freezers in this area for our stored food.

I had just hit 60 so was in the more coveted older group as it is much easier to get subjects for the 18-30 group. Obviously, checking circadian rhythms, sleep patterns and

aging-related issues were all part of the design of this project. There was a negative age discrimination on the pre-physical exams, though. Younger subjects had to trek to hillside hospital only once. For the convenience of the staff, not the rats, the older subjects had to go twice! Once for a quickie physical and another for the treadmill, exercise stress test. Too many of the older rats fail the stress test and are eliminated before the study.

Another part of the experiment started after 2 days for 3 days: a random time was given and the lab rat either had to exercise for an hour or had glaring lights in the room for 3 hours. I was chosen to be a rat that exercised. At 12:30 each night, I was put on a treadmill for a full hour, keeping my heartrate at over 140-150 beats/minute. I would be dripping wet by the end, and then had to give a urine sample and stay awake 'til 3 to even out the experiment for the rats that had the bright lights. Now I love exercise and was lucky to get this end of the bargain, but I am a person that never does or did function very well in the middle of the night, not even when I was young! I even went through med school never staying up past 10:30 (I had to get up at 5 to cram instead). Also I realized, though I swim, ski, hike, bike, I never push myself and rarely sweat even going uphill. The 2nd night I walked on the treadmill, I sure drank a lot of extra water so that it wouldn't be so difficult to pee afterwards.

I didn't read as much as I do at home. I started watching TV or videos on the 3rd day so I would stay awake. I did manage to get all my e-mail up to date and sent out some correspondence. Although, we had a phone in each cubicle, I used it very little. It was more of a chore than I had thought having Peter for supper when I only had an hour in which to pee, take 3 temp. recordings and cook from scratch. But I really felt rejuvenated at the end and didn't miss the light or my freedom for these short 5 days.

Saturday 9:30 AM, I biked home on a quiet foggy morning. I didn't feel tired until about 6 PM. I went to sleep at 8:30PM and woke up at 7 AM! Peter said I had been sleeping like a log! We went for a short 10-mile hike on Sunday and life returned to normal! My only big complaint was that the 2 younger women were rude and didn't bother to say good-bye.
