

Although TARU'UP was not included in the Patro programe the matter was sorted out in the field and the following an any findings:- A breakdown of Law and Order in rural areas is e Patrol C are ny findingst-A breakdown of Lev and Order in rural areas is definitely evident and mostly instigated by raturning labourers who have experienced high wages and an daflated way of living willst en-ployed by the various mining companies. They are now discontented with rural life and its conditions. They moved in a pack after the Head Superviewr MAS and fully armed with areas and bush knives, chased him a considerable distance until he was able to find refuge with the Catholic Mission at Masap. According to allegations by witnesses there were an estimated sevanteen in the pack but only six could be positively identified. Court was convened and the culvrits dealt with. Hemerous other incidents like this were brought to the notice of the patrol, particularly on the Mabag/Lafagan border, one hour's drive from Wahag and three quarter: of an hour from Lafagan. Trade stores jemmied open with crowbars and robbed, car tyres slambed, and cars laft on the side of the read due to a appearical fault completely stripped of all removable parts in the short space of time while the stripped of all removable parts in the short space of time while the driver was seeking assistance. Mr. A. Flower was attached and stone by a grunken group of Wabags, who followed him in another car well an truly into the Lagain Sub District area. Father Stabos of the Cath. pletely Mission, Lokas, claims that since Bougainville labourers have returned to the area he has noticed the gangster element in their activities. By that he meant that they are now organising into groups when they cause trouble. Formerly, when disturbed, they would discerse and not regroup but scatter widely. However, today, they automatically re-group and attack again. This in itself is indicative that their attacks are more organised and possibly based on what they have seen in cheap Mestern movies during their time on the coast. According to the fifteen tribal leaders who accompanied me on this matrol, the break-down in law and order is due mainly to the fact that these younger men are not afraid of going to prison. In fact, they claim that it is no problem to get certain young men to make a "standin confession" to the Supreme Court in order to cover for a dig man who actually committed the crime. The advantages of going to prison and manifold for the young man. Not only does he receive training whilst in gaal and comes out as a flumber, carpenter or mechanic, but he is welcomed back by his relatives and clansmen as a hero, and the man for shom he "stood in" will purchase him a bride and give him a number of pigs. Mr. Familing had sufficient trouble trying to stay alive himself let alone stop the fight. That day the AMGO clan went on to kill two AMADAM leaders right under the eyes of the Administration field forty who were miding in dense pitpit bushes near the clace of the killings. And the ery of Councillor MAPI, who urged on his clanamen with the words, "Shoot the Hiap, he is symething nothing" was proved to be a reality in the ayes of these clanamen. These words were verified in the Court which convicted MAPI and were heard by both Interpreter TAMU and Constable TAMDA who speak the Enge dislect. To indicate their disrespect for the Administration in the area, the following day the AMADAM people folled a troe across the road and bombarded with rocks and stones, the Toyota vehicle in which Markars. Fanning, Sectt, Reid, some Police and Interpreter and 1 few HAMOD prisonwrs. Messrs. Scott and Reid held the attackers at hay by firing over their heads until the trave was moved sufficiently to allow the car to move on further. However, if the attackers had used spears instead of stones and arrows they especially if they lad thrown their spears through the canvas top of the vehicle, from the adjacent high embandment of the road.

3. Any Law and Order problems and recommendations for a review of Police strength I brought up to visiting Deputy Police Commissioner, Mr. J. Grahfs and Senior Police Officers were met with the official pepty, "Call in the Hiot Squad" and smoothed over with the attitude, "Even if you had a 50-man detachment you would still have the same problems in these densely

populated areas." A clear concise submission was given to the Police Chiefs, substantiated with statistics to show a definite breakdown in the Law and Order situation of rural areas, as listed hereunder for Lagany Sub District:-

Recommendations were made for three Mural Police Stations to be established at Laiagam. One on the Wabag/Laiagam border, one at Murirage and one at Kepilam. It was pointed out that the Laiagam detacament, being small in number, tex (h0) members only, needed to be able to count on every menbeing physically depable of climbing the mountains in the area and gaell fights effectively. It was also printed out that the present detachment has a few physically ill-equipped members which reduces the effective strength of this detachment considerably in times of stress. However, all efforts were net with the same remark, "It is best to call in the Special douad and real/p durn over the area as they are doing now in Chimtu, with Hural Folice Stations you only add to our burdens, because they must be inspected daily by regular Police Officers." This sort of attitude is likely to be of little use in future fights and riots at Laiagam, as we are 100 miles from Mt. The Sergeant of this detachment was stoned in the incident described earlier in the "Faming ambush" and he dropped his rifle, abandoning it to the enemy. Resently, I was again given an assurance by the Superintendent in Charge, Mt. dagen, that the detachment would be reviewed without fail, but no action to date. I have pointed out to the Deputy Police Compo mission . that Outstation Police are dangerously ill-equipped and not sufficiently trained to cope with the sophisticated Law and Order problems that arise in an area as densely populated as this one. The official comment was that detachments under 30 men in strength could not be issued with Riot Belmets, butons and shields. This task should be left to the Police squads which are wined in this type of action. In the meantime it would be handy to have a few helmets when the Lagain people decide to threw zockain a fight, and once again there was no satisfactory reply is to what we should do until such time as the Riot Squad arrives, which could be two or three days.

Although the repatriated Comparatille labourer element, has brought with it evidence of more applisticated orimes in the area, such as breaking and entering and drunkeness, there has in fact been a general improvement in the state of law an order at the village level in the Lagaip edministrative area over the past twelve a The tribal fight in which Mr. Furning was involved was an isolated incident and was the last tribal fight of its kind in the Laiagan area. Mr. Furning was involved, partly because he was new in the Laiagan area and was thus unknown personally by the warring groups. The fight also occurred at a time when there was a spate of tribal fighting in the entire Angl area, and shen it was runsoured at village level that tribal fighting was the "in thing". This attitude towards tribal fighting mat long since been stopped and there has mor not been a fight in the entire lags division of some 154,000 people for over six months.

The maintanance of law and order in the Engs areas and in the largely populated Highland areas generally, has always been carried out on a personal is by field officers and police alike. Once imprist al law enformment is applied ant is applied at f by field officers and police alike. Once improved al law enforcement is ap village level by officers and policement who are manous to the village per breakdown is ours to oppur unless the strength in numbers of such field off police is greatly increased. As the Police Department constantly states the unable to increase the strength of outstation detrohments, there is therefu urgent need for the establishment of Rural Police Stations with resident po-manning them, as only in this way will the necessary trust and confidence is colice and will some the mittained. The Police Department constantion is noe bet police and villager, be maintained. The Folice Department should however easist in the establishment of these posts by providing two-way radios and at least one entra policeman for every Folice Post in an area.

The fact that influential men can get lesser men of their olan to "take the The fact that influential men day get lester and. The "gangater" element rap" for them is far from being a new trend in the Highlands. The "gangater" element reported upon by Mr. Van Buth are not influential men, but are usually young remi-educated school drop-outs who have grown up outside the influence of village discipline. I fully agree homever with Mr. Van Buth that there is a real moed for a st attitude towards crimes by the courts and a tougher system of pannishment in the penal institutions. Unless the average villager can be confident that the Administration's law increases control sufficiently strong to protect them and their property they will certainly take the law into their own hands.



The Councillors thought that although the idea may not be popular, it would be more acceptable an alternative than incurring high traditional expenses which migration to Wabag or Warenamunda involves. 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Planning: Sweet potatoes plantings from new vines should be sufficient to meet local demands of consumption by August 1972. Transport funds for vehicle hire will have to be made available to the Dept. of Agriculture at the rate of \$1,200 per month to import vines from the Wabeg/Wapenamands areas until August, when the demand will be

satisfied.
2. A Targe import of seed potatoes is required in order to reduce to beriod of critical food shortage. Encoding to the Bural Devel newt Officer in Lalagag, potatoes could reduce the hunger period considerably, provided our recommendations are read and acted upon.
3. Indigenous food supplies will be exhausted by the end of December in rost areas and were already exhausted in Emiper and Hamars at the time this petrol was completed - mid-November. If the Councillors of Wabeg and the Lagalp are prepared to help themselves and envert Slo,000 of their Bural Development funds to rations, the Administration should be approached to double this amount from Emergency funds to assist these people.

Action: So far, only \$1,200 has been obtained to assist with the hire of weblicles for the transporting of vines. Mean D.A.S.F. Officers overspent that amount by \$37 the Transport Officer ruled that this amount had to be set by the Officers who had incurred the over-expenditure. 
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

Attached herewith the shawn report which has been prepared in accordance with the Jecretary's 57-1-0 of 25th Now.1971. The report is self explanatory and Hr Scott has done a good job.

Mr.D.J.Hook and myself accompanied Mr.Scott, walking from & Laiagan to Porgers, over the surveyed route.

Only 32 miles of construction remains to be done, but this unfortunately is the most precipitous and hostile part of the whole road.

The area is unithabited, and also has no gardens or fund

I agree with Mr.Scott, the work was bedly hampered by the frost front series and the immgry period following the frost damage and an entry 7.3.4.C. allowance should be made available to both Porgers and Lalagan, on a quarterly besit to assist the Officers working unler three conditions from both ends of the road.

Mr.Scott and Mr. Marrick have both been instructed to construct a track following the survey marks 3-4 feet wide, so that a permanent indication will be visible, before blasting will come ice.

Mr. Hock and I discovered that the constructed road did not follow the surveyed route, in certain places in particular just over the Mt. Maip range.



(b) Road Maintenance. As stated previously road maintenance is fairly well usheld in the m Council area of the N.W.Lagsip, however, the rest houses of Kasap? Muritaka and Yumbili have been letting their sections become unroadworth and thus prosecutions by the Council for failure to do road maintenance have been quite substainsmal during the last two months. Although the prople themselves say that's they have to plant their gariens after the 'big frost' and have no time for working or the road, I have found on se al inspections that the people have been doing everthing also except working in their gardena. working in their gardens.

(c) Forth-coming House of Assembly elections. There has been some discontant in the area over the men who were going to stand for election. The people realize that if only one person stands for election for their area, he has a good chance of macceeding but quite a few young men of the area have decided to stand for election. This has a few young men of the area have decided to stain for election. This caused the majority of the people to feel that the votes of the area will now be scattered and the candidate of their choice will not be elected and alot of unnecessary bickering will be started. However as the closing date for nominations draws hear and only one person from the area has been nominated and there has been very little campaigning done in the area, I think the other would be candidates have dropped out of the running.

(d) Political Mucation.

Before the 29th of November 1 managed to have quite a few talks with the labourers at the road camp and the people of the surrounding area. Although it must be admitted that this area is still basically unaware

of a lot of the political situation, they have come a long way in the last two years. their inclusion into the Council, even in this sort space of time has helped thes enough for them to understand a reasonable smount of political development. During the month of Movember talks were given by Form 4 boys from St.Pauls High School. The people were quite receptive to these talks. Further education in the political field will be continued after the elections.

GRIGULEDRE (2)

There has been no economical development in the area except for several cattle projects. No further development is expected until the completion of the Laisgan-Porgera road, when the flow of traffic will up-grade the present road and new areas will be opened up for Agriculture extension.

(3) EDUCATION.

Improvements to the P.T.S. at Muritaks have been started with the help of the Lagaip L.G.C. An abolution block costing about \$4,000.00 is now being constructed. Education and attendence has been very good this year and with an additional teacher next year it is intended to incre -ase the number of pupils by another fifty.

(4) HRALEH.

During my inspections on the old road section it was noticed that the houses were in rather good condition and the health of the people was satisfactory, there was no evidence of any outbreak of desease. The aid-posts in the area were clean and well supplied with medicines. The aid-post at Tanbili is now constructing a new ward and is two-thirds completed. This ward when finished will increase the bed number at the aid-post by 15.

Depending on the labour force and that funds be hade available that date could be brought forward some three to four menths. There are four main reasons for so few labourers working on theroad. One, there have been no funds on the road from Jan. '71 till Det. '71 and then only \$3,000 was made available. This money has since been expended on both sides of the road and as nom further funds seem to be forthcoming it is reasonable to expect a decelleration in the work done on the construction of the road. E DE

Two, during the month of September there were heavy frosts around Islagan area. Although Tumundan and Muritaka were not affected

asmuch as other areas in the Lagaip, there was an influx of people migrating into the area from Sirunki and Eandop. Thus food supply over the november and December period at Tumundan and Muritaka had been sub-staintually reduced. The people are unwilling to work even for cash and rations saying that they need time to replant their gardens. Three, in the barly part of the year three men from the Tumundan -Muritaka area were killed in pay-backs. Although 'Nogas' have taken place in all three cases, the people of the area are still afraid of new 'pay-backs' and are unwilling to come to Mt.Maip and work with the rival groups or leave their own villages.

Four, men returning from the 'coast' mainly Bouganville seem to think they have reached the stage where they can sit at home and do nothing to build up their area or economy. In their opinion they have become heyond the stage of work and self-help schemes. These men try to undermane the people who have stayed at home by saying that they abould only work for wages similar to those they were receiving in Bouganville. This is one of the major reasons for the quick jurnover of labourers. It is only because of the strong leadership by the Councillors and the talks given by myself that the majority of people have realised the road is for their own benefit and the economic progress of the area. When work commences again in early January all able-bodied men from Maritaks to fummian will be comming to work on the road-head. Due to the situation in the area, as commented on previously this seems more accepte able to the people than the 'kago-boi' system that has been vised during the last mix months.

(6) <u>CONCLUSION</u>. All objects of the patrol were realised. Besides the points raised in this report the area is settled and there is no harmtal cults or organ -isations. The people are basically friendly and loyal to the Alministrat isat

INTROLECTION

The area patrolled is the former SOUTH WHENT LANAIP Consus Division though it has now lost Marinaga and Tambili Assembly Boints to the Maip Marinaga.Because of this, the population of the Kern Legals Nivision has been reduced from 10050 to its present 0,951 which is opread over a total of 10 Assembly Points; they being: Take up, Ingents; Tonges, Junapos, Aiyak, Liop, Hamare, Laiagas (village), Eindarep and Tangyonk Each of these points is situated on the Laiagas to Pongers road with the exception of Kindarep and Tengyenk which are attainable only by walking track.

The sole aim of the Pairol was to conduct the 1972 House of Assembly Riections however the Polling Schedule afforded ample time to be made available to the Patrol to arbitrate in and acttle the disputes of the Locals as they were bought forward. The Elections went of smoothly and disputes were dealt with as they once up.

Boada -

For a month prior to the Elections, there had been an intensive program of maintenance on emisting roads in the Census Division and they were found to be in excellent condition.Furthermore, all able bodied non from Jake'up and Tagenda had been engaged on the Laisgan to Porgers road construction at Help and they returned to their home areas only one day before the Elections compared.

A road to Kindarep is plauned and during polling at this place an agreement with the headmen was reached as to when the project would start and what the labour arrangement would be the existing road is now just entering the Tapai grass lands and with a concentrated effort by the workers, the project should be completed within a year.

In the early 1960's, a road from Yengyenk to Laiagan was commenced but was abandoned after only a mile was completed and is now recognizable as a scar on the billside. Rristing walking tracks were found to be in generally poor condition and was due mainly to the wet and to the general drift of the population from the area.

Agriculture

The area patrolled was not in the main, very greatly affected by the frosts of September last year. Neverthless, Kindarep did come off rather badly and much of the sweet potab crop in the area was destroyed. Consequently there developed a trend in the area for the inhabitants to gather together their possessions and to more off to areas not so badly hit, noticeably Liop, Muriraga, Kandep and Porgera, to sit out the 'hungri'.

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Doring the months of January and February, there has been a general drift of these 'refugees' to their hones and new gardens have been dug. These were seen in abundance by the Patrol.

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The staple diet in the area is potatoes as these are quick growing and their planting has been encouraged by Agriculture.Kaskas, has been planted also but it will be some time before any of it matures as it has a maturing time of 8-9 months and was planted only a few months ago.

House of Assembly Elections.

The total population of the Kera Legalp is a,961.0f these 3330 persons voted.Mamare Assembly point was not included on the Common Role and one Line from Loingun Assembly point was also not included.In all 560 Section 130(1) Potes were recorded.At Einigrep.only one person in a Mine of 200(?) voted, the rest having been absorb voters in the Kander.This state of affairs was due solely to the previously uentioned (hungri(.

Although the sajority of all the voters had node up their minds as to show they would vote for some time prior to shem their votes would actually be recorded, the illustrated Ballet Tapers comein Handy is many consulous and I observed that many voters recorded up to six or sight preferences then they saw on the ballet paper, the photographs of conditates they had peerlously forgottem about find these photos not been included on the paper then the voter would most likely have recorded only one or two preferences.

The actual polling during the patrol went of quickly and monothly and no complaints were given utterance by any person.

So further correspondence resulted from the Patrol.
