Oksapmin Patrol Report No.1 - 63/64.

Tuesday, 25th June, 1963.

over sloughy track for one hour, then commenced ascent southern wall of range 0921, Reached crest 1000. Rested, and commenced descent 1015. Travelled across broken cane grass country and awaited carrier line to regroup on scall hill overlocking B&AK creek 1145. Departed 1245 and descended into DASAK creek. Climbed steadily over sharp limestone assessed precariously, and arrived old campaite 4921. Camped night. Rice issued to carrier line, as no locals present in nearby gardens.

Time on track: 6 hrs.

Walking time: 4 hrs. 45 mins.

Wednesday, 26th June, 1963.

reasonable track, then ascended slowly over sharp limstone outcroppings to reach creat of mountain overlocking bridge site 0840, bescent slow and dangerous - a mountain goat would strike trouble, here. Completed by 0917 - met several KUANMAIN men and boye in garden. Short discussion on state of bridge, which they assured had just recently been rebuilt and was quite strong, Departed 0927 and arrived campaite which is situated on a kunal flat some five minutes from the bridge9940. Little timber available for construction of camp buildings. Food purchased from KUANMANS, and bridge inspected during afternoon.

Thursday, 27th June, 1963.

As bridge in good condition, decided to visit Lake Kopiago. Departed campaite 0629, At bridge 0630. Shuttling of cargo and personnel finished by 0315. Departed downsiver. Arrived TUNBUDU/Strickland junction 0900. Maded across mouth to left bank, and followed bank upriver until 1015. Ascended from river and climbed sceadily through came grass and sharp limentone to rest at 1045 in small forest of 'orima' trees. Departed 1350, and climbain- after a hard climb across hot kunad clopes, rested on ridge looking down on camp at 1255. Note that after leaving the TURBUDU river, there is no water awakabèe until reaching a creek beside the camp. After leaving the 'orima' patch, there is a small stream - but this waters of after very heavy raine. Departed 1315 and arrived camp 1355. Greeted by eight KAKANIN mon who have gardens close to the camp. All very friendly, and appeared glad that OKSAPHINS could visit their area. Women appeared later in the afternoom with food, and ample was purchased for the carriers. Discussions held with KAKANINS during remainder of day, until interrupted by heavy rain.

Oksapmin Patrol Report No. 1-63/64.

INTRODUCTION.

The principle purpose for this patrol was to examine the existing bridge across the STRICKLAND river, in preparation for the P.I.R. assess patrol passing through on the 15th. July, 1963. The bridge had been rebuilt by KAKAMIN-KUAMMIN natives one month previous to our arrival - and was reasonably stable. However, it was decided to leave several police at the site until I returned on the 14th. to meet this patrol. The police were to check any flaws in construction of the bridge, and replace several lengths of cane which had become slightly frayed, and could prove dangerous under constant heavy traffic. LAKE hephage- KOPIAGO was visited mainly to gauge walking times, and introduce my rather parchial OKSAPMIN carrier line into a new environment.

NATIVE AFFAIRS.

Due to the shortness of this patrol, limited native affairs administration was carried out. The KUANNIN are a small group inhabiting mainly the BAK river gorge area. To date, they have not been censused. The KUANNIN do not wear the traditional KEATMIN philocrypt, but rather imitate the KAKAKHIN 'bilam' mode of covering (without the 'tanked'). Whereas the KAKAKHIN wear a 'bilum' of woven bark thread, the KUANNIN wears a small piece of cloth. They appear a timid people - although always contribute willingly when assistance is required at the bridge. Many are bilingual with the KAKAMINS, and an affinal relationship exists between the two groups. More anthropological data will be collected during a prolonged visti into their areas. When this patrol arrived at the bridge, several KAKAMINS greeted us with their KUANNIN neighbours whom they had been visiting over the past two months. The KUANNIN garden settlements are approximately one hour from the bridgeste, but on a patrol reaching the creat of a steep limestone sige-ridge overlocking their valley - and the patented TELEFOMIN yodel is broadcast jubilantly - the KUANNINS invariably meet the patrol with food, and acaist in other menial tasks. This group will be consused when a patrol from Oksapmin Patrol Post moves through the DIAP river region contacting more people from the BHMIN group.

Mr. J. Cochrane refers to the KUANNIN as 'DUVANNIN' in his report Oksapmin No. 1-62/63.

Reference a description of the bridge; the abevenuetien abovementioned report aptly details the frifgtening structure. The ADO, MARE KOFIAGE has ordered lengths of mylon rope from Apatralia which would lessen the continuous maintenance required, and also make the bridge a more permanent structure. The stte will shortly be moved, as the casuarina tree acting as a support on the OKSAPMIN bank is dying. However, there are revoral suitable sites within the immediate vicinity of the present bridge.

The MAKAMIN appear amenable, and although we did not pass through their main area, the small garden settlements we did encounter were friendly and interested in the (Meapain Patrol Post. Several of them had vicited the Post last year, and had worked on the airstrip, although like the OKSAPMIN, they are leathe to work for any predetermed period.

Tracks encountered during the patrol were reasonable. Fortunately, little rain had fallen during the past week, and the TREBOU river was crossed without much trouble. This river could

MATIVE AFFAIRS (cont'd): prove a difficult hurdle after heavy rains - and one might gain a false sense of socurity after having crossed the STRICKLAND on route LAKE KOPLAGO. This patrol forded the mouth of the TURBUDY on going, but returning, a makeshift bridge had to be erected approximately 500 yards up from the junction. The river is obviously capable of becoming a raging, impassable torrest, and patrols should make allowances for delays incurred Guring crossings of the TURBUDY in wet periods, Climbing out of the STRICKLAND gorge one moves through large expanses of kumai grass, and over tracks emothered in sharp limestone. An early departure is advisable when Leaving the campatte for Oksapain Patrol Pest. Previous patrols have been caught clambering up the kumai faces with the hot sun slowly sapping all energy.

It was pleasing to note that no malaria was contacted by any patrol personnel, anti-malarials were given before and during the sojourn in the STRICKLAND gorge area. This could angure well in obtaining carriers for future patrols, However, most of the working on the Post for the past eighteen months - and these OKSAPHIRE's fear of the STRICKLAND and its relative sickness, is not completely ingrained as with their kinsmen. (OKSAPHIRE's refers to this fear of the OM and STRICKLAND by the OKSAPHINS).

CONCLUSION.

A routine type patrol. Virtually negative contact with population - the main objective was to check on the bridge, and strengthen it if need be. This was the first CKSAPKIN patrol to LAKE KOPTAGO, and the accompanying OKCAPHIN carriers were impressed, if not more surprised, at the friendliness displayed by their western Highland nieghbours. OKSAPHIN fear of ultimate hostility by the KAKHINS and other groupe was quickly quickly buried during the walk to LAKE KOPTAGO. Food was copiously offered along the track, and many times personnel were subjected to interminable bouts of handshaking.



> OKSAPAIN PATROL REPORT 2-63/64 - ACCOMPANY PIR. Mr. A. MARKS, PATROL OFFICER.

Attached please find the original and duplicate of the above report which includes claim for camping allowance and sketch map.

The sole purpose of the patrol was to meet a PIR patrol at the Strickland Gorge, and accompany them to Oksapmin Patrol Post thence to the Victor Rmanuel Range on the track to Telefomin.

The aim of the patrol was satisfactorily completed and no difficulty was experienced in crossing the Strickland River due in part to Mr. Mark's work in having the bridge strengthened, and in part due to favourable weather conditions as the river was very low and could have been crossed with little difficulty without a bridge. Such conditions are however exceptional.

With regard to the Strickland bridge I have asked the District Commissioner Wewak to approach the Army construction squadron in Wewak with a view to the possibility of this group constructing a permanend suspension bridge over the Strickland River.

The PIR party in charge of Major T. Gray and Lieutenant J. Underwood arrived on schedule at Telefomin on Wednosday 24th July, and were at Telefomin five days weiting for transport out to Wewak. Major Gray mentioned to me that he was very appreciative of the great deal of assistance his party had bein given by all Native Affairs efficers on the route from EtleBayen to Telefomin.

Sunday, 14th July, 1963.

Departed Fost 0645. Commenced ascent 0730 - at crest 0832. Bescended into 6. AMG river valley0846, and ascended steep kunai hill 0932. Reached crest 0940 - descended, and crossed DASAK creek 0946. Steady climb over sharp limestone and arrived crest mountain 1006. Finished descent 1040. Passed old camp 1104 - climbed along northern slope of razor-backed ridge and reached point overlooking camp 1150. Precipitous descent finished at 1220. Arrived camp 1259.

Food purchased for carrier line during the afternoon, and a firearms demonstration to the locals by several members of the P.I.R.

Wednesday, 17th July, 1963.

Departed on steady descent 0840. Reached foot of range 0932 - across undulating came grass and pitpit' infested country to arrive at the Deck 1022.

Departed Mission 1002 and arrived KUSANMIN resthouse 1010 where patrol nembers immediately regrouped and all departed along good road toward head of valley, Passed ARANINKIN campatte on right bank of TEKIN river 1056 - and rested on kunsi slope 1115, P.I.R. radio contact, and departed 1204. Fassed TOMIANUIN campaite 1213. No people seen here. Arrived DUANMIN camp 1307. Rested. About 40 men were present here Arrived DUANEAR camp 1907. Rected, about 40 men were present here attitude most unreceptive — and no women around. Departed 1319 and rested in old TERMIN gardens at 4405, Departed 4415 — passed Hicks' old campaite 4423 and arrived TERMI river (right bank) 1446. Crossed TERMI river which was only a trickte — due to a very dry spell in the weather, and the main flow of water going underground further upriver; Ascended sloudy along extremely muddy track, and rested on crest of a saddle 1515. Departed 1524 and arrived easn further upriver. Ascended slowly along extremely muddy track, and rested on creat of a saddle 1515. Departed 1524 and arrived camp on right bank of TEAIN river 1535. Several bunk shelters had been erected by police sent the previous day. A large area also cleared and ground straightened for P.I.R. personnel. Rice irsued to carrier line slong with small quantity of native food purchased from a group of DUANNIN men and women who had followed the patrol in.

INTRODUCTION.

This patrol was mounted to accompany the P.I.R. patrol, consisting of Major T.Gray, Lieutonant J.Underwood and 17 native soldiers, from the Strickland Gorge area to the Post, and from here to the base of the Victor Beansel Emanuel Range in the upper reaches of the TEKIN river.

NATIVE AFFAIRS.

The patrol calls for little comment in respect to native affairs and administration thereof. The prime object was to assist the P.I.R with carriers, interpretation, guides and numerous other menial tasks.

The crossing of the Strickland River proved no obstacle. The three police left at the Strickland camp (see Changmin Report No. 1-63/64) had done a commerciable job in strengthening the bridge with new lengths of care. They also erocted numerous native material houses on the campaite, and cleared an expanse of kunai for the P.I.R. soldiers to erect their one-man tents. The ADO, LAKE KOPIAGO, one day previous to the patrol's arrival, had sent down 750 feet of cable in anticipation of a new bridge being constructed. However, on this patrol there was no time to spend looking for new sites and erecting a permanent bridge. The wire has been stored in a shed on the left bank of the Strickland at O'Brien's old campaite. When possible, two patrols will like liaise from both OKSAPKIN and LAKE KOPIAGO, and a permanent wire suspension bridge will then conveniently link both districts.

CONCLUSION.

Very little can be added to the information written on the patrolled areas. Cheapmin Patrol Reports No.1-63/64, No.6-63/69 62.63and No.3-64/69 adequately cover points on reads and bridges, assaudyses agriculture and health. All campeites used by the patrol were situated in uninhabited areas

Across river at 1040, continued on to the LINDANMIN hamlets where people were warned to expect patrol on its return journey. Moved on over poor track to rest in an old DISANMIN garden at 1200. Departed 1210 to arrive at camp site at DISANMIN at 1230. Three temporary structures were in readiness for the patrol. Food purchased.

Saturday 10th August, 1963.

Began calling at 0640 and began census revision at 0810. Carrier line and 3 police sent on to construct camp. The revision of census completed 1030 and departed for YHANMIN after sending a message to a small group reputed to be living just over the Northern wall of the valley to most the parol on the following day. Rested 1130 to 1200 and arrived YUANNIN 1230.

Blood seen on a large rock was found to belong to Const.1.c KANDIL - Suspect fractured ribs. Ribs strapped and stretcher constructed. Const. KANANG and 8 to carry KANDIL to the station tomorrow. Food purchased.

Revised census of LINDANMIN and found that many LINDANMINS, at least two thirds, had attached themselves to the WAWULMIN and BETIANMIN groups. Unfortunately time is not available to correct this on present patrol.

Departed LINDANMIN at 0915, crossed the TEKIN River and climbed into the TERANMIN Valley to arrive at the Patrol Post at 1014.

Contacted D.M.C. and received permission to send injured constable to Wewak on the first plane.

END OF PATROL.

INTRODUCTION.

The aim of this patrol was not to carry out a full census revision, but more to gather such information as was necessary to complete the Common Roll.

This patrol was also restricted by time, in that it was under instruction to be back at Oksapmin by Tuesday 13th August, and then, after the policewan's accident haste was essential.

NATIVE AFFAIRS.

The attitude of the people in this and other areas of Oksapmin is changing for the better. There is a noticeable awakening from the lethargy encountered 6 months previously to what amounts now to almost active interest in Administration Policy in the area.

Perhaps this initial lethargy can be explained as being suspicions and as more contact has been made this suspicion, although always friendly, has given way to an awareness of the failings pointed out on previous patrols. To illustrate this statement, it has been noticed that people with health defects are at last coming freely to the station. Although few in numbers the general health of the area is good and therefore greater numbers would not be expected. Further to this, sections of road have been cleared and work is being done in others.

TERRITORY OF PAPUA AND NEW GUINEA.

An interesting feature of this patrol was the contacting of the small TAGANA and UNGTEM groups.

In discussions at Disammin the name of the TAGANA was raised and as time did not allow a diversion from the patrol route, they were called in to meet the patrol on its return journey. The message had also reached the UNOTEM group and representatives of this group met the patrol at LINDANMIN.

The TAGANA group is an off shoot from the main DISANMIN group and claims complete ties to the perent group although not living in the central area. They occupy two women's houses and one men's house approximately three hours N.S. of the DISANMIN camp site and were initially counted at eighteen. Some DISANMINS garden over the lip of the divide and unless detained by weather return every day to their houses in the Erika River Valley.

The UNGTEN hamlet of two houses is situated N.N.E. of DISANMIN at a distance of two and a half hours. These people initially counted at thirteen are a breakaway group from LINDANMIN although retaining compete ties with that group.

The people of each of these groups have had little or no contact with the Administration and as such have not been included in the Common Roll.

These people also fear the "sickness" of the OM River and do not range as far as that waterway.

The YUANNIN group was found to be closely allied with the ARAMKANIN and TOMIANMIN groups in the main TEKIN Valley through a complex system of inter marriage.

A point of interest was the shame attached to mentioning an in-laws name. When it was found to be unavoidable the utterance of the name was accompanied by a prolonged burst of spitting.

CONCLUSION.

The objects of the patrol were accomplished and led to the completion of the Common Roll in this area.

Moreover, just so much more contact with Administration Policy stc., so NINI vital at this stage, has been perpetrated.





Through this patrol and patrol No. 7 of 1962/63 the 0M valley area has now been thoroughly covered and excellent contact has been made with all groups inhabiting it. Mr. Marks is to be commended for having successfully carried through to completion a difficult task. However, I am far from being as sanguine as is Mr. Esdale that the OM and the HEWA people will never again attack each other. A great deal of work is yet involved in extending and consolidating administration influence amongst all groups of the OM valley and their immediate HEWA (SISIMMIN) neighbours. Patrolling of this area should now form part of the regular programme carried out by the Officer-in-Charge, Oksapmin. I agree that an early visit to the HEMA group or groups immediately to the west of the OM-LogalP-STRIGHLAND junction should be made by the Officer-in-Charge, Gksapmin. However, whilst this will involve a brief incurrion into Lake Kopiago territory, a courtesy note to the Officer-in-Charge Lake Kopiago that this is intended should be sufficient - I do not consider that a combined extensive patrol of the entire HEMA group by the Officers-in-Charge Cksapmin and Lake Kopiago is warranted, since in fact, the entire HEMA group is within the Lake Kopiago area, and our interest is to preserve peace between the westernmost HEMA and the MODUARMIN-DURANMIN people. The map supplied with the patrol was no criented and had been badly crushed. It has been traced, oriented to North and recompiled with the addition of the route of patrol No. 7 of 1962/63. Sun prints will be made of this and forwarded. Please ensure that officers orient all patrol sketch maps to North, u.e the Nestler lettering gules for printing of names and forward maps larger than foolscap size rolled around cardboard or a stick. In my memo of the 16th of July I wrote:

"I wish you to impress upon your officers that I take a serious view of the late submission of pairol reports and consider it to be a reflection upon their efficiency".

Whilst you are not responsible for Mr. Marks late subsission of this patrol report, I want further to emphasize that the responsibility for ensuring that Patrol Officers subsit their reports without undus delay rosts squarely upon Assistant District Officers.

Finally, I expect that having once drawn an Officer's attention to a fault, it will not be necessary for me to have to do so again.

In the diary is very detailed, and will be extremely useful to succeeding officers. In comparatively unknown areas like this where one seldom sees more than a hundred yards of bush at any one time, it is very satisfying for following officers to have the use of a diary like this with all the rivers and creeks mentioned, and times given between each.

The interpretation difficulties were serious, and a considerable amount of patience was required was by the patrolling officer on the 28th October. (page 8 of diary)

The patrol was a hard one physically and involved at times a number of days of very hard walking without sighting any population. The country traversed on the 4th and 5th November is a very difficuly section, and consisted of 16th hours travelling in two days in most inhospitable country, icluding walking at the 10,000 foot level for 5-6 hours and camping just under 10,000 feet. This was the route taken by a PIR party from HAGEN to TELEFOMIN last year and the leader of that party Major Gray described this section as by far the hardest part of that PIR patrol.

NATIVE AFFAIRS.

This section has been very well-covered by Mr. Marks.

For all practical purposes the whole of the OM valley has now been patrolled. Any population north of the petrol route to the south of the SHATTERBURG Range would surely be negligible.

I have no doubts that there is no way in the world that the OM valley people will ever again attack the HEWA people. It would appear unlikely that the HEWA people will ever again attack the OM valley people. The

10

three HEWA girls spent nine months on Telefomin station, and with several of their menfelk visited Wewak for a few weaks.

The HEWA people live in the KOPIAGO Sub-District. We are interested in them however, because firstly the western fringe of the HEWA population appears to be not much more than a day distant from Oraspania Patrol Post, and seconly because the traditional enemnies of the HEWA are inside our Sub-District, and lack of contact with them could lead to possible raids into our OM area.

of the HEWA is warranted, and necessary, and you may wish to take this matter up with the District Officer at Hagon. The patrol should probably start from Skaspmin, and could possibly consist of a Kopiage and Oksapmin officer, the Kopiage officer terminating his section of the patrol at Kopiage, and the Oksapmin officer returning to Oksapmin via the MODUARMIN group after several days in the western HEWA area.

Mr. Marks has completed an interesting and informative report and is to be congratulated.

Time on track: 7hrs 35mins (includes time attending to Constable WASINAU).
Walking time: 5hrs IImine.

17th October, 1963.

Steady rain during morning. Heavy evernight rain had swellen the FU River, and decided to remain in camp. Rice issued to carriers. Abundance of birdlife in this area - and parrel personnel treated to choice morsels of meat during evening meal.

ISth October, 1963.

housely morning rain had flooded our campaite. Past ferty-eight has seen periods of terrential rain. Dacided to move as far dewarder as humanly possible as unscenemical to remain inactive for mother day. Censtable WASIMAU mable to centime and with Censtable POSOK (sick with fever) and several ABUNKAMIN men, departed back for TELEFOKIN. Patrol departed dewarder C82Shrs. FU a mass of samibars, small islands and swift flowing channels. Geing proved arduous for carrier line. At times the patrol out its own track through dense pandamus swamp on right bank - or breit through large areas of 'pitpit'. Rested on samdar 104Ohrs. Departed LIIOhrs. Fellowed rough track on right bank - passed meuth ILIM River IIIShrs and FUGI River, left bank, IISOhrs. Ascended from backwater of FU River I246hrs and fellowed reasonable track through dense forest arriving at ABUNKAMIN garden settlement (three houses) I527hrs.

Isth October, 1963 (cent'd): Several men and women at camp. Bush cleared several hundred yards from the houses and camp constructed. Some native feeds purchased along with pig. Rice issued. Heavy rain began falling as camp was completed.

Time on track: 6hrs 52mins. Walking time: 6hrs 22mins.

19th October, 1963.

Remained at camp. One Came suspension bridge in dire meed for repair, Police and carrier line spent day strengthening bridge. Sufficient feeds purchased for carrier line. Tried to get information from ABUNKAMINs as to approximate location of the SISIMIN group. All very vague and referred matter on to the DURANNINS and MODUARNINS who were sure to know.

20th October, 1963.

Departed camp e648hrs - arrived bridge 0706hrs - cressed to island used as sweet petate garden - moved on to makeshift bridge of saplings spanning a small anabranch of the FU Biver. Creased at 0710hrs and jeined right bank of EEBBEI creek 0727hrs. Passed BABRIM creek (r.b.) 0739hrs. Arrived junctics ArliberBEI creeks 0748hrs. Followed ARI creek upstream Passed meth BASI creek (1.b.) 0818hrs - ascended from ARI creek up steep ridge reaching crest at 0843hrs. Descended - creased MAGARIMO creek 0903hrs and arrived right bank of MURU River 0940hrs. Carrier line reassembled and rested. Departed 1085hrs - cressed MURU River to meth of MURUSAK creek (this creek was called BIRNSO on other patrel - variety of informants breeds prelific change in name.). Travelled up MURUSAK creek cand reached junction MURUSAK/SILIMAI creeks 1056hrs. Travelled up SILIMAI creek and ascended from right bankIIIOhrs. Passed through eld DURANEM garden II22hrs and arrived at small, deserted garden house on crest of ridge everlocking garden II39hrs. Descended and cressed headwaters of MURUSAK creek II57hrs. Climbed steadily then ascended sharply to right bank of KEINU River arriving at I250hrs.

Instead of retracing the route taken downriver by the March patrel I was persuaded to engage a supposed shorter track to DURAMMIN. Gressed KEINU River and ascended rough track directly opposite. Guides encountered difficulty in tracing correct track as area densely evergrown and sections subjected to severe landsliding. We doubt our guide's intentions were honeurable, but the track proved wearisome to all patrel personnel - was certainly no shober shorter than previous route - and is not recommended. Arrived DURAMMIN ISSZhrs. A large expense of forest had been cut back, numerous gardens dug and fenced, and another community house (fortress style - see Oks. Report No. 7-62/63) had been crected some two hundred yards from the other dwelling which was still occupied. Friendly reception by DURAMMIN, and emotional rounion between MANGATIPNOK (see Native Affairs) and his kin. Comporeted on previous site. Foods purchased for morning meal - rice issued to carrier line.

Time on track: 7hrs 5mins Walking time: 6hrs 7mins.

21st October, 1963.

At DURANMIN. General discussions with elders on law and order and salient points of Administration sime. A receptive and amendable people who outwardly bere ne ill-feeling teward myself for taking many of their ablebedied men back to TELEFOMIN last March to face charges of wilful murder.

Crewn Lew had advised that a neutral interpreter must be found who could converse both in the TELEFORIN and SUARMIN dislects. He would be used in the Supreme Court trial destined to begin as seen after suitable SISIMIN (HEWA) witnesses could be contacted. MANGATIPHOK's father was persuaded to return to TELEFORIN with this patrol - an obvicualy unsatisfactory choice - but the best available, and willing.

22nd October, 1963.

Departed camp 0649hrs for MODUANMIN area. Several DURANMIN youths had previously volunteered to show us the way. Descended into KEINU River 0715hrs. Travelled demastrers. Passed mouths ANDELMU creek r.b. 0750hrs, NEIGLMOR creek, l.b. 0810hrs, ABRAMU creek l.b. 0828hrs. Here river became impassable. Climbed from KEINU River - traversed a point - f ellewed MESI creek down to left bank of KEINU at 0854hrs. Travelled dewnriver. Passe i NAMURI creek l.b. 0905hrs, WO creek l.b. 0928hrs, TAYUMA creek r.b. 0934hrs and INAMURI creek l.h. IDIThrs. Arrived OM/KEINU Rivers junction 1049hrs. OM River very lew. Fellewed down left bank of OM River and rested 1054hrs. Carriers regrouped, and several preduced a large reck pythen - prevalent in this area.

When reinfall is low, the CM River is splintered into imnumerable independent streams and backwaters. Midstream are varying treats of sandbars littered with stene and debris. As such, the CM River presents little treuble if crossing to the extreme right bank is necessitated. However, clement conditions are rare and patrols must always be prepared for delays whilst in the CM River area.

Departed dewariver IISShrs. Kept to left bank and arrived opposite KUTIK River mouth I203hrs. Met by two MODUANMIN men who were gathering feed from a garden close to the KUTIK River mouth. Patrol climbed sharply from left bank I216hrs. Climbed steadily over massrous ridges - passed through recently cleared section of forest 125thrs and arrived MODUANMIN communal house I25thrs. From site of house mineranges, MODUANMIN very timid and wary. Several men moved reluctantly from the house to greet patrol. Campaite cleared and trade good distributed freely to MODUANMINS. I discussed the patrol's intention to move into the SISIMIN area and find witnesses to the recent raids upon them. Later in the afternoon MODUANMINs became were receptive and women began bringing small quantities of feeds into comp. Several men began drifting in from outer garden settlements. All heavily armed - and presumed initial MODUANMIN wariness and hesitancy stemmed through constant vigil for SISIMIN raiding parties. Sufficient feed purchased for carrier line.

Time on track: 6hrs 26mins. Walking time: 5hrs 9mins.

Departed than CYCChira. Two MCDUARMIN nen had descent toward OR River. Grossed PIDAN creat Commenced descent toward of River. Grossed PIDAN creat CYCThira. Sharp descent to left bank of OR River CREShra. Moved ever broken ground and followed precentions track running approximately 60° above the river. One carrier load focting - recovered -but has ride in attrev. Passed site of all MCDUARMIN came bridge which had been along everes a section of the OR River as it narrowed into a garge. Site noted will - as reconstructing of this bridge would enable a patrel from CRESHRIN to reach MCDUARMIN within two days, and their discount delays caused in bridging the OR when in flood. Rosted in old SCOUARMIN stand of age pala IOCENTS. Noted here a chalter which had previously been used by the MCDUARMIN for sage namelacture. Serrounding the shelter was a IE' wall of split timber. The wall was a deterrent to any SISERING, and whilst women wanked the sage beneath the shelter, the sen stood guard. Wall and shelter were now broken and in ruin, and had not been used for a long time. Margad exte left bank of OR River again at IISchire Water slack and walking asks easy. Hugged left bank — climbing over spurs falling edjacent to the OM. Slee progress and, and detidete leek for suitable campaite. Mone seen on left bank and finally cleared forested area on large island Liflars. Vesther leeked good - but in case of overnight torownital rain there was a astural causeway of boulders from the island to the left bank of OR River. Seneral area uninhabited. Rice issued to carriers, Malarie suppressives had been issued to all patrel personnel before departing the first bank and finally cleared forested area on large island LOUMN. As a start of OR River. Seneral area uninhabited. Rice issued to carriers, Malarie suppressives had been issued to all patrel personnel before departing

Time on track: 7hrs ISmins. Walking time: 6hrs 53mins.

24th October, 1964.

Departed camp 0652hrs. OM River still running slack - mil svernight rain, Followed left bank dewariver. Rested 0955hrs. Large expense of kunsi grass ebserved parallel to the left bank here. Good drepping some , and possible light sireraft strip. Latter wiled out as area uninhabited. Departed IDI2hrs. Passed eppesite meuth of FA River IIZhrs. MODUARKINS informed me that the SISMIN had several garden settlements close to the meuth of the KARU River (called KOTUFA en Strat Fourati Sertes). Hewever, the two SISMIN girls whe were accempanying the patrel (see Native Affairs) denied knowledge of such settlements. Arrived meuth of KARU River, left bank, at II52hrs. Forded mouth to left bank of KARU River - carrier line regrouped and teld to remain in one group, as I did not want them scattered upon entering SISMIN territory. We garden settlements sight in approximate vicinity. When questioned re reads, distance and direction - two girls waved vaguely toward the east - interpretation difficult. Departed dewarfver IZIShrs. SISMIN girl leading patrel. Began meving inland and fellowed track evergrown with beaboe. Obviously read not used by MODUANMINS and SISMINS for constant social sejourns. Track traversed a point ferming the right bank of LAGAIP River Zizhrs. Discussions with two girls on preximity to first SISMIN settlement - they metioned patrel to continue

24th October, 1963. (cont'd): along left bank of LAGAIP. However, weather not premising and decided to find suitable campsite. Travelled about 300 yards upriver and cleared core area beside small stream. Two girls determined that we continue—ard intimated that the stream was 'tambu' for drinking, and we all would surely perish! Water refreshing, no deaths—and rice issued to carrier line.

7.

Time on track: 6hrs 30mins. Walking time: 5hrs 40mins.

25th October, 1963.

MODUARMINS and DURARMINS who had been accompanying the patrel decided to retrace their steps home. The Eulumi from ADJURAMIN village also wished to return home. He was instructed to pick up MANDATIFICK's father on the return journey and convey him safely to TELEFOMIN, as I had new decided that the patrel would return to TELEFOMIN via OKSAPMIN Patrel Pest. All understeed - and parties left on return trip OSIShre. One injured carrier would accompany them back to the station. Heavy rain commenced - and saturated travellers returned hurriedly to comp for rain to subside. Parties finally departed OS4Ohrs.

Decided to send police party out to recemmenter further upriver. Constables YANCPA, SOIMAGIRA, WAPE and MANDEKAI, tegether with SISIMIN girls and interpreters, departed ecamp Oddars. Group returned T740hrs - survey for signs of habitation proved fruitless. BIAMFREI, the elder of the two SISIMIN girls, had remarked were only one days walk - or less - from where the party turned back. Rice issued to carrier line.

/settlements/

26th October, 1963.

Rations now low - and unable contact TELEFOMIN with portable A5IO for arrangements to organise a carrier line to bring rice atc from OKSAPMIN Fatrel Feat. Campaite within one day's walk from OKSAPMIN - detailed line of 20 to preceed post for supplier. Self, pelice, departed camp 0645hrs together with carriers, in order to locate a suitable crossing of the OM River. Travelled down right bonk of LA6AIP to junction with SURJULAND Strickland River. At this juncture, where the OM River swerves abruptly south, cartegraphers refer to it as the SURJUKLAND River. OKSAPMIN natives refer to the entire length of the CM-STRICKLAND River only as 'wara OM'.

Moved up right bank of OM River and arrived OM/KARU Rivers junction 7 0707hrs. Raining steedily - and heavy evernight rain had swellen both rivers. Cressed KARU River mouth with three pelice and moves further up right bank of OM. Endeaveured ford OM - but current far tee strong - peintless to attempt further cressing, as river riging complemently with continual rain. Returned camp 0900hrs. Attempted radio contact with Wewak, but pertable set new unserviceable.

Decided on second attempt to contact SISIMINs. Pelice party, with girls and interpreters; and rations for approximately three days - departed camp IISONrs. Wet and blescable day - rice issued to carriers.

27th October, 1963.

At camp on LAGAIP River. Sent interpreter, TANDET, back to KARU River to examine possibilities for crossing the OM later in the morning. TANDET returned 1030hrs - OM still swellen - abandened intentions for the day.

Pelice party returned camp unexpectedly ISOOhrs. Had made successful centact with small group of SISMINS gardening close to the left and right banks of Lagarp River. Party had fellowed a different reute from previous excursion. Three SISMIN men and one boy had been persuaded to return to our camp. (See Native Affairs for events leading to friendly contact). SISMINS appeared nervy and uncertain of patrol personnel - large doses of salt, tegother with matches and rezor blades, comented affable relations - but interpretation through three dialects proved tiresme. Constable YANOPA explained that more SISMINS had promised to visit our camp tomorrow, and bring feed. Rice issued to carrier line.

28th October, 1963.

Line departed camp 0700hrs to examine feasibility in erecting a makeshift bridge in two sections at bend in the OM, some 500 yards dewariver from the KARU.

Appreximately I7 SISMINs arrived camp I2 neon. All appreached camp confidently and much feed purchased. However, one woman only ventured into camp - several others remained on the eppesite bank of the LAGAIP calling to the two SISMIN girls excitedly.

Discussions during afterneen - and prepeaal that at least five men - withesses to the radis and killings - return to TELEFOMIN with this patrel. All refused suggestion, and asked if twe girls were free to return to their families. A five-hour dissertation on Government policies - and necessity of preducing witnesses in pending Supreme Court sitting, phenefited with five men volunteering to return to IELEFOMIN and give evidence. Pleased that aggressiveness was not warranted in obtaining witnesses, as this would make future contest and influence a difficult task. Several SISIMINS returned upriver, whilst others erected crude shelters close to sur eamp.

Bridge-party returned camp 1630hrs. Water had slackened sufficiently for bridge to be erected at designated site.

29th October, 1963.

Departed camp 0615hrs. Arrived makeshift bridge 0625 hrs. Several adjustments required, and all across by 0730hrs. Fellewed OM dewarder 0735hrs. Amused by SISIMINS fileting thumb and ferefinger at the sun, apparently to prevent it from becoming tee het and causing discomfort whilst walking. Passed appesite junction LAGAIP/SFIJEKLAND Rivers 0747hrs - turned inland at mouth of small seems stream OSIZNrs - and commenced climbing steadily up same. SISIMIN youth leading patrel, as claimed beknew path to SAMAPTIANMIN. TANDET, the OKSAFMIN interpretes deubted this; but as nobedy seemed sure of the correct route patrel continued upstream. Climbed from left bank O904hrs and rested on ridge 1000hrs. Track badly evergrown and indiscernible for several stretches.

20th October, 1965. (cent'd): Departed IOIShrs. Track became werse. Hard climb to crest of second ridge - rested IOSShrs. Departed IIO6hrs and eventually joined main track used by SANAPTIANNINS - climbed steadily up spur and reached clearing II30hrs. Scenic view of OM valley away to the north-west, and merthern wall of TERANMIN valley. Departed II48hrs. Climbed sharply to reach crest of mountain everlecking TERANMIN valley ISSIArs. An exhausting climb ever very rough track. Departed II47hrs - meved through SANAPTIANMIN settlements and arrived OKSAPMIN Patrel Pest I7IOhrs.

Time en track: IOhrs 55mins (includes 65 mins. shuttling acress OM River).
Walking time: Shrs. 38mins.

30th October, 1963.

Patrel at OKSAPMIN Patrel Pest.

3Ist October, 1963.

Patrel at OKSAPMIN Patrel Pest.

Ist Nevember, 1963.

Preparations made for departure of patrol for TELEFOMIN temestrew. Two SISIMIN girls, and one man flown to TELEFOMIN teday per A.M.A.P. cossmer.

2nd Nevember, 1963.

Patrel departed post 0720hrs. Reached IUK-KUK saddle 0745hrs and arrived track leading to MISSION 0916hrs. Self visited MISSION - patrel moved on to previous campaite on the TEKIN River past TEKNIN settlements.

Self and one constable departed MISSION II29hrs. Passed ARANIMIN restbouse I2Ihrs - TOMIANUM restbouse I22hrs and arrived DUAMMIN restbouse I3E8hrs. Rested. Departed I322hrs - passed BARMIN settlemant 1400hrs - Hicks' eld TEMMIN campaite IAT6hrs and arrived right bank of TEMMIN River IA28hrs. Travelled upriver and climbed from left bank IA39hrs. Met several DUAMMINS carrying food for patrel members. Climbed ever small sadds at head of TEMMIN valley and arrived camp I506hrs. Site on right bank of eld garden, and used by self and P.I.R patrel last July. Sufficient food purchased.

Walking time: 5hrs. 35mins.

3rd Nevember, 1963.

Departed camp O7IShrs. At 'Yam' cressreads 0839hrs. Cressed TEKIN River 0847hrs: - climbed steadily from left bank and rested on ridge I037hrs. Departed downhill ever undulating track II30hrs. Cressed DUINDUI creek I250hrs and made camp on previous July site. Rice issued to carriers.

Time on track: 5hrs 32mins. Walking time: 4hrs 39mins.

4th November, 1963.

Departed camp.0343hrs. Passed Brewn's eld campaite 0820hrs. No water in vicinity at this time. Climbed steadily through stunted mess forest. Fellewed small water-course 0955hrs and climbed from left bank 1022hrs. Small amount of water here. Continued climbing through sounted alphae vegetation - passed through gap in IBAFONDEN. Ranges (Vivter Emanuels) and rested 1051hrs. Carriers meving clewly and well scattered. Height 10,500' bitterly celd drank tea and commenced descent II45hrs. Crossed small stream 1234hrs. passed remmants July army site 1252hrs anvived West's eld campaite 1302hrs (9,825'). Area cleared and settled in to experience a mest celd and chilling night.

Nevember. 1963.

Departed camp O648hrs and commenced fellowing a leng spur between the SEPIK and BLOL (from the north-east) Rivers. Walking made hazardeus as track ran close to shear falls to the south. Rested IO47hrs - carriers regrouped. Departed III5hrs - still fellowing spur dewn - arrived Brewn's eld campsite on right bank of SEPIK River IZO5hrs. Gressed to oppesite bank and elimbed to crest of spur. Dessended gradually ever undulating country - track evergrown, and paradies for stinging nottles! Rested 1600hrs. Departed 1615hrs and arrived left bank of SEPIK River I70Zhrs. Cleared bush for camp - rice issued.

Time on track: IOhrs I4mins. Walking time: 9hrs 3Imins.

6th Nevember, 1963.

Departed camp 0705hrs. Cressed SEPIK to right bank 0715hrs. Moved along kunai grass faces above SEPIK Gerge - descended slewly, and arrived right bank of SEPIK River 0906hrs. Fellewed goed track beside river-p- passed through many new FERMMIN gardens - left SEPIK at 095hrs - passed IGHTIVIP hamlet 1008hrs and arrived FERMMIN resthause IOIShrs. Many people in to greet patrel.

Left rethense restheuse 1030hrs - cressed bridge ever SOL River 1323hrs - climbed sharply from river and rested 1330hrs. Departed 1343hrs and arrived TELEFONIN I4I5hrs.

Time on track: 7hrs IOmins. Walking time: 6hrs 37mins.

INTRODUCTION.

When the patrel from the OM area returned to TELEFOMIN last July after apprehending alleged participants in intertribal killings, it was decided to stand an extended exploratory patrel back into the area, and bring all groups north of the OM River, and south of the SCHATTEBUNG Ranges, under Administration influence and control. The patrel would operate from a base camp positioned at DURAMIN. However, Crewa Law requested in October that witnesses to the July marders must be sought to give evidence in the Supreme Court triel. They urged expedience in the natter, and discussions for an exploratory patrel were disbanded for another hurried excursion back into the OM valley region.

Unfortunately, nothing precise was known at TELEFCMIN as to the exact location of the SISIMIN groups. I presumed they were scattered in the general vicinity of the LAGATP/STRICKLAND junction. Statements taken from DURANMIN-MODUARMIN defendants indicated that SISIMIN territory commenced east of the KARU River. The three SISIMIN girls were not sure of the KARU River. The three SISIMIN girls were not sure whether their people would have remained in this snea after the rais upon them, Moving further east would bring the patrol into the Western Highlands - and relatively close to the HEWA groups which are under LAKE KOPIAGO jurisdiction. The officers there reported no knowledge of a SISIMIN tribe officers there reported no knewledge of a SISMIN tribe -runeurs had reached them of inter-tribal conflict in the OM area, and it was queried whether perhaps 'SISMIN' was just another name used for 'HEWA'. As later investigation proved, this supposition was correct.

Two of the three SISIMIN girls kidnapped in the raids travelled with the patrel, primarily to make initial contact with their people mere friendly and free of possible incident. MANGATIPHOK, one of the youthful DURAMBIN defendants, was used during the patrel to interpret from the TELEFOMIN language to SUARMIN; and NICT, a DURAMBIN now working at TELEFOMIN as a labourer, interpreted from SUARMIN into the SISIMIN language. The entire interpretation precedure proved interme but at least we could converse with the SISIMIN and explain our intentions to them. intentions to them.

The patrol war mounted at TELEFOMIN because we supplies were limited at OKSAPMIN, carriers would have been difficult to engage for OM patrolling, and there was every possibilty of the OM River being in fleed and causing deeps delays.

NATIVE AFFAIRS.

The HEWA tribe extends from the OM junction and up the LAGAIP valley for a distance of approximately 50 miles. Cerrelation of information gained on this brief patrol with that of previous efficers' reports must preve cenclusive that 'SISIMIN' is just another name for the HEWA people. The OKSAPMIN natives refer to the HEWA as 'TERKUTIAN' (TRI MARKE PROPER TO THE CHARLES OF THE PROPERTY AND THE PROPERTY OF THE PROPER

NATIVE AFFAIRS (cont'd): the enuity ceasing during static periods of cordiality and combined hunting trips. Sorcery is rife, and accusations of same by both parties usually flares into a continuation of armed combat. The MODUAMMINS admit their ranks have been sadly depleted ever the years, and I would estimate their total population around 80 only.

The HEWA have had hardly any centact with Europeans. Black and Taylor referred to the sparse "HETWANDIGER" population scattered around the feethalls of the Central Divide Ranges. Sinclair tentacted a half dezen men near the OM junction in 1959 - McDride encountered a small pecket of population in 1960; Permezel fellowed up in 1962, and reported that the large percentage of HEWA population; the rugged forest areas nearth of the LaGALP River - and was so remete and inaccessible as to be beyond the reach of the average petrol. On all these patrols men only visited the camps and were always well armed.

/inhabited/

The HEWA whem I spoke to refer to the LAGAIP River as the 'SAI'. Mr. Permezel writes that the HEWA he met called it the 'NIGI'. In his patrel report No.4-62/63 Mr. Permezel accurately describes the style of HEWA dwelling, which is identical to extended family dwelling of the DURANKIN (Oksapmin 7-62/63). He also gives a good description of the HEWA native:

The HEWA men have a rather distinctive type of head-gear. The hair is gathered into a cone and wound around with fibre, sleating back at an angle from the head. A came belt, which is sensatines intricately made, is wern around the waist, and this may serve as a small cerrying basket such is the way in which it is constructed. Necklaces of shell and pig-tusks are the address of the men - and short skirts of beaten leaf material are wern front and rear. Issels of this same material are often tied around the arms. One or two men were seen wearing capes made from the skin of the cassewary. Two methods of firenaking are employed - one the clost stick and bambee theng using the friction of one against the other made the other the stwinding striking of two film stemes. These are held ever a piece of beaten fibre which begins to smoulder following repeated striking of the stemes.

I cannot elaborate on togographic observations made by Mr. McBride of the LMCAIP valley (Laiagam Patrol Rep. No.2-60/61). I only moved close to the western fringes of HEWA population, and am unable to give som accurate geographic descriptions mer give an estimate of total population. Mc.Bride and Permezel believe the figure could be close to 2,000; but until patrols can centact all remote dwellings no estimate should be considered conclusive. The OKSAPHINS were estimated at IS,000 in 1952 -to date approximately 4,000 have been censused.

Prom information given me by two of the five HEWA men who accompanied the patrel back to TELETCHIN - the HEWA trybe is divided into five clams. These are MORIAN, MATUCH, FUGIARI and TULALOVEI, Each of the clams are divided into inaumerable family units which wander and exist independently frem one another. There is no central authorative head - or any resemblance of clam unity(except effective during the periods of centilist with their CM agitators). The Hewa refer to the MODIANIMNS as "SUAKA" - the SUARMINS as "FAITA" and the TELETCHINS as "NERIAU". The MORIAN clam inhabits the lower regions of the LAGAIP, and the garden settlement contacted by the pelice party belonged to the

NATIVE AFFAIRS (cent'd): MORIAN. Mr. BeBride reported that the HEWA near the CM celled themselves ATSOBA - but with language difficulties it was near impossible to get a preper name.

Trade has been carried out between the HEWA and SANAPTIAN (Oksapmin) groups. The latter inhabit the extreme eastern portion of the TERANMIN valley - are reticent and unes-sperative. Steel axes and laplap for lein cleths apear to be the essential items for borter. In July, when all treuble was reperted; the SANAPTIANGINs denied knewledge of the HEWA. I have recently been informed that many are bilingual with the HEWA, and that several HEWA youths have actually brought feed ents the pest here in company with the SANAPTIANGER.

The how HEWA have been accredited a reputation as men of violence. As previously mentioned, earlier patrels encountered men only, and these were always heavily armed. They afforded friendship upon contact, but endeavoured to detour the patrels from gardens and dwellings when volunteering as guides.

Was mest pleasant, and not one weapon was brought into our camp. Several weapon entered the camp with no trace of fear, and were mest insistent that I shake that hands as well as the men. One of these wemen proved to be the mether of EMETEI, one of the HEVA girls accompanying the patral. She believed her daughter had been killed by the DURAMMING.
EMETEL'S father was one of the five men who returned to EMETEL'S the patral to give evidence. Because we had the girls with us, and we were able to converse with the HEWA; our centact was naturally made easier than that experienced by previous patrals. The DURAMMIN man, NIOT, is now learning Fidgin English at TELEFORIN, and with his knewledge of the HEWA tengue, he will be invaluable on

The method used by the HEWA in cressing rivers is most fascinating. For singular excursions a man laghes three to few smallbegs legs tegether in the ferm of a raft. He then choses a suitable bend in the river, or preferably a river bend flat - sheves the raft in front of him, and using a side-kiek against the current, is conveyed diaguaing a side-kiek against the current, is conveyed diaguaing a side-kiek against the current, is conveyed diaguaing a side-kiek against the current is beth propeller and support for the man's arms. In this fashion, the howe HEWA transported native foodstuffs to our comp from the specialty but the supposite benk of the LAGAIF. Regardless of whether a river is running strong, the HEWA appears offertless when countering the pull of the current. When women and children crees they sit on the raft, which efcourse is much bigger and is guided by at least two men. This method - called suvin wara' - is also used extensively by the SUARMINS and MODUANMING along the OM River.

A constable whe was previously attached to AMBUNTI believes there are several words in the HEWA tengue which are similar to these spaken by the WAGU-IOEI peeple. These inhabit the feethills of the HUNSTEIN Ranges, and it could be that same linguistic link exists with the HEWA. Alternatively, the peeple contacted in the middle AFRIL in 1962 by J. Hunter are possibly an extension group of a large HEWA linguistic—oulture area. DURAMMINS have trade routes with the inland SEPIR River peeple, and it can be feasible to recken on existing trade routes acress the

NATIVE AFFAIRS (cent'd): the Central Ranges cast of the STRICKLAND/LAGAIP function. A small vecabulary of REWA words might help future patrels in some way when penetrating into the main HEWA pepulation areas.

It would also be interesting to learn whether there was any connection between the HEWA people - either linguistically or conflict - and the IMARE and GADIO groups who inhabit the upper headwaters of the KURGAMERI River, and are administered from AMBOIN Patrel Post.

FUTURE ADMINISTRATION.


I feel limisen is necessary between efficers of Orsapmin and Leke Keplage Patrel Posts. Feesibly the main encentration of population is morth of the LaGAIP River between the UNDSWA and PARU Rivers. Although the LaGAIP River presents hardships in crossing - a patrel could ford the river approximately five hours up from the STRICKLANDS LAGAIP junction. Herever, discussions have not yet materialised ever future patrelling in the HEWA. It is quicker to move into the area from Oksapmin - depending of source the CM does not hinder in any way. Until suitable interpreters can be trained extension of Administration influence into the HEWA will be greatly handicapped.





Diary.

I3th January, 1964.

1

Departed station OS25hrs and arrived MIssion IO20hrs. Patrel moved on to set up camp at TERGIN. Self visited MISSION and general discussions with Rev. R. Williams who had just arrived to relieve Rev. Brickmell for six menths. Departed MISSION with Constable ATTUM and interpreter, TANDET I240hrs. Passed DUANNIN I440hrs, and after Domins encountered a small boy sitting on side of track with bad stemach wound. Apparently he had fallen from a tree onto a stake which had penetrated his lewer abdomen. Inquisitive bystanders erdered to construct a stretcher — and with Constable ATTUM accompanying the party returned to the MISSION. An emergency flight test the bey into WEMAK the fellewing meraing but he died several days after an operation.

Arrived campsite ISOShrs - not where originally planned to be because of shortage of water at eld site (in eld BAKMIN garden - took census here in January, 1963). A causin of the wounded bey, UDOK, was sent to the MISSION to accompany the bey into WEWAK. He would not as interpreter, as his pidgin is quite good.

Steady rain during efterneen and night, TEXUEN and BAKMIN groups informed that they were to attend talks re the forthcoming Territory elections - and they were asked to assemble at the campair temperary morning. Small quantity of feed purchased for the patrel's carrier line.

Time-on-treek:

I4th January, 1964.

Idned TEMMINS and BAKMINS and gave talks on elections, cutlined general functions of the House of Assembly, and procedure which would be adopted during casting of ballet papers. Seven men volunteered to attend a course at Oksapmin on the elections in approximately two weeks.

Departed camp I245hrs and arrived DUANMIN I340hrs. Sufficient feed purchased. Talks given en elections in the evening to several visitors into the camp.

I5th January, 1964.

Heavy rain early merning. Miserable attendance by DUANMING. Teld these who had come to return and inform their him it was necessary for all - including women - to hear the talk on the apprecabing elections. A quiet day, very few lecals into camp, feed purchased for carriers.

I6th January, 1964.

Excellent sttendance in merning. Talks given and several men selected to attend course at station. Reatless Sudience, and sevesely obviously struggling to comprehend all

I6th January, 1964 (cont'd): infermation given them. Departed DUARNIN 0942hrs and arrived TOMIANMIN 1020hrs. The read had been cut, and three rough buildings erected at campsite Many locals present - were asked to assemble on Saturday aftermeen 1800hrs. Pelice and carriers remained at TOMIANMIN and self departed for station I145hrs. Arrived MISSION 1245hrs - departed at I450hrs and arrived station 1628hrs. It was necessary for me to return to the station to inspect work being carried out on strip, and also give weather reports for the aircraft due in temperow.

19th January, 1964.

Aircraft did not come in on the 17th - but arrived yesterday. Word sent to the TOMIANMINS re the delay, and all asked to assemble temerrow merming. Departed station IGISHTS at MISSION ISIONES. Departed MISSION REPRESENT and arrived camp at TOMIANMIN 1725hrs. New read had been cut leading into camp, also the ARANIMINE and commenced clearing their section of read Several elders visited camp and talks given them on elections. All keen to learn, but found it hard to understand that the House of Assembly would consist of many people from numerous races - and would not be 'a man'.

20th January, 1964.

A good reliup early morning, and talks given them. Beparted for ARANIMMIN at IIOOhrs - arrived camp II2Zhrs. Three shelters had been built and a good read cut. Heavy rain during aftermson - few locals brought in food.

21st January, 1964.

Peer attendance by ARANIMMINs and ARANKAMINs in merning. Talks given en elections and several aem to attend course at station. Departed camp and moved down the valley to KUSANMIN arriving at campaite IZIShre. Several shelters had been constructed, and general camp area cleaned. It was heartening to see all groups clearing their section of the main track in the TEKIN valley, and also erecting shelters for the comfort of patrol personnel. No immediate directive had been given for such work. People of the Oksapmin are elevity shedding the apathy regularly commented on ever the past two years. Werd sent to all MANNMIN, SEMBATI, TAVINMIN and KUSANMIN groups to attend talks in the morning.

Ample food purchased - heavy evernight rain.

22nd January, 1964.

A cold, wet and bleak merning. Meagre representation from four groups. All disbursed, and told to emphasize the importance of hearing the talks to their kinsmen - all were tald to come in the merning again 'on masse' this time. Interpreters round to all groups in afterneon stressing attendance in the merning. Miserable day - small quantity of food - and very few into camp.

23rd January, 1964.

A satisfactory attendance from all groups early

23rd January, 1964 (cent'd): merning and talk given.

Departed camp II30 and arrived station ISIOhrs.

26th January, 1964.

Mr. M. Flavel (candidate Madang - Sepik Special) and Weani- Wesmi Dekrimmek (candidate Upper Sepik Open) in yesterday per MAF and gave electioneering talk to approximately two hundred locals. All groups were informed of Mr. Flavel's intended visit well beforehand - but again little interest was shown by the Okasmins.

Departed station ICCOArs - and arrived WAWULMIN IIIShrs. Pelice had set up camp here on the 23rd whilst I had gene back to the station. The bridge ever TEXIN, and quite close to the camp, had been washed away, necessitating a deteur of 20mins through pitpit and ever aloughy track. Peer state of affairs. During early afterneen all locals assembled and with police assistance, a bridge built across TEKIN(12'span here, only).

Talks given on the elections to WAWUMINs and LINDARMINS after bridge completed. Hene into camp late evening for the usual informal discussions. These two groups displayed their nermal reticent selves, and WAWUMIN in particular has never co-operated during my term in Oksapmin. Although 'patience' is the magic word, the WAWUMINS will need to be 'smartened up' to bring them in line with most other Oksapmin groups who are new beginning to show some interest in the Administration and Missions.

26th January, 1964.

Departed WAWUIMIN OSIShrs and arrived DISANMIN campaite 0946. Spoke on elections to small group who had gathered at the campaite. DISANMIN is an extension group of the DUARMINs and many had been present at DUARMIN when I had speken on the elections

Several men selected for course at the station, and departed for YUANAIN ISBOnrs. Arrived YUANAIN campaits I45Shrs and heavy rain hindered organization of camp for several hours.

Drizzle during aferneen - ne visiters to camp. Beginning to wender in terms of the advert: * did you Protex yourself this merning ? *

27th January, 1984.

Talks given early morning. TUANMIN an extension group of TOMIANMIN and consisting of family units with garden heldings through to the KUTIGMIN beundary. A good attendance, and several keen to attend course. Departed TUANMIN ITShire - passed DISAMMIN campaite IdoOhre - read being enthusiastically cleared, and several detours cut - passed Hicks' old LINDANMIN campaite FORTHYS, and arrived HETIANMIN campaite FORTHYS, and arrived HETIANMIN campaite FORTHYS, and three shelters close to the main Oksapmin track leading back to the station. Ample food purchased - discussions on forthcoming elections with interested elders.

28th Jamuary, 1964.

Talks given. Good attendence. Departed II2Ohrs and arrived station I2IOhrs.

A course for 22 OKSAPMINS - selected on this patrol - was held at the station from the 3rd-5th February. They were given 2-hour lectures in the mernings and afternoons. All appeared eager, and willing to learn, However, although they grasped little of what was explained - the fact that they volunteered and presented themselves and presented themselves at the station on the appeinted date sugers well for future enlightement.

The OKSAPMING simply did not understand references to candidates, electorates and other relative information pertaining to the House of Assambly. Therefore, emphasis was placed or explaining who and what the Government was, and its immediate functions in respect to the OKSAPMIN peoples. The course toke on all aspects of a minor adult education course and through this an understanding of the more basic principles of the elections was sought.

During Movember, December and January evening telks were given on the elections to all station personnel. Most place police gained substantial knowledge - but the CKSAPMINS working permanently on the station - and many speaking pidgin - were nemplussed ever the entire period. Censequently, wenderous achievements were not expected during the course, where even the interpretors only vaguely understood what was teld them.

I would recommend that a group of selected OKSAPMINs be sent to WEWAK for one of these shift education courses. I om sure the organizers would find a receptive and intrigued andience. Next of these peeple live and die within the walls of their valleys, and have utterly no conception of what lies ever the ranges to the north, A course such as this would cortainly enhance Administration prestige in the area.

20th February, 1964.

Patrol departed for station 0700hrs and errived 0940hrs.

22nd February, 1964.

Departed station OSIShra and arrived BETIANNIN components and departed station late yesterday to organize components set up - Rev Williams arrived O'Adhra and elections commenced for the BETIANNINa at OSOOhra, Sectha closed ISOOhra and Rev. Williams departed for MissionISIShra.

23rd February, 1964.

Patrol departed DETIARMIN OSIShrs - arrived Missien creasweads OSOOhrs. Rested - patrol moved on to DUARMIN OSIOhrs - self visited Missien. Departed Missien with Constable SILLAPOSA IASOhrs and arrived DUARMIN IGEOhrs. An excellent restheuse had been built, and the track leading into the comp well cleared.

24th February, 1964.

Rev. Williams arrived 0745hrs. Beeths erganized, and

Many elders, including several influential man, did not vote for by marking a ballet paper they believed it could full into the hands of a sangama meri and they would eventually be desmed. It was expected that the gleaning red ballet bear would be "Med" with uncertainty and mistrust in many instances. He assume of cominging could persuade the elders that this innecent fibre glass structure did not pessess spiritual powers. Approximately 80 weams veted. Nest were dissuaded by the men - whether through fear of servery, er dissuaded by the men - whether through fear of servery, believing that their womenfelt should prepagate the species and tend to the gardens only - it is difficult to gauge. When asked directly, inswitculates numbled phrases were the answers.

Many of the younger generation, particularly those who have worked on the station for several years, now regard many of their fermer superstitions rather disdainfully. I would not be naive as to recken the spiritual power of the 'haus tambaren' has been discarded by the younger generation; but it is through them that future political awareness can be conceived. An extensive pregresse ever the next three years dealing with the Territory's Gevernmental and political structure would certainly benefit these people at the next elections.

PATROL REPORT OKSAPMIN NO. 8 of 1963/64 - DIAP RIVER - MR. P. J. LANCASTER

As you have observed, this was a good patrol that obviously resulted in closer relations being established with the KUSKUSMIN people, (their recapture and return of the absconding prisoner is particularly revealing) and is the beginnings of consolidation of Administration influence among the BININKAPLANTIN. Since both groups would appear to comprise the link between the CKSAPMIN and OISCEIP administrative areas this is a particularly opportune development, and I support your intention to have patrols from Oksapmin and Oiscbip meet in the Seltamanmin group.

An interesting and informative report. Mr. Lancaster is to be commanded not only for having located the source of the oil, but also for having combined with his search some good extension work among the people in its vicinity.

I notice that he quite frequently spells "DAIP" for "DIAP" river. "Reticance" also is mis-spelled. "KORNINGTON" should be spelled phonetically "KONINGTON" - incidentally, what does it name or describe? (diary entry for 13th Jume).

The description of the return route given in the diary entry for Saturday the 13th of June has me puzzled.

The patrol camped apparently at the point marked on the map BIMIN/KAPIANTIN, between the DIAP and the TEKIN rivers on Friday the 12th of June, yet on Saturday the 13th of June, having left this camp, it descended to the DIAP River, ascended the range and then descended to the Tekin River.

Would you have Mr. Lancaster explain this section of his diary, please.

The BIMUN-KAPAINTIM group were contacted on this patrol for the first time and and it was pleasing that ample time was spent in the area.

With regard to the INKIAKMIN, KWELMIE and SELTAMANIN groups, I have been in contact with the OIC CLEGEIP, the recently established patrol post, three days' walk from Telefomin, and he has substantiated this. However I will arrange with the OIC OKSAFMIN AND CLEGEIP to "remdeavous" in the SELTAMANIN group as soon as possible-'to show the flag; etc.

Roads and Bradges.

It is pleasing to see that the people are attempting road work and maintenance in the area.

A good patrol and Mr. Lancaster is to be commended on his attitude and explanations given to these recently contacted people.

Could you please advise this office whether an analysis will be made of the oil sample, please?

Saturday 5th June.

0900 Departed Chanpmin Patrol Fost. 1050 Arrived Eaptist Mission. L 1330 Departed Mission. Passed ARMINERS campeite. Small nurver of locale present. 1430 Arrived TOMINERS campeite. Local leaders and Lunch. some people present. Campaite prepared. Group told that patrol would camp here on its return journey. 1530 arrived BUANNIN, Set camp, Rough rest house and police camp prepared. DUANNIN, Set camp, Rough rest house and police camp prepared. DUANNIN group assembled in large numbers. Inferent takes with the same hold. Enough fresh vegetables purchased for carrier line (60) and police. All tracks from Okaapmin to DUANNIN in good condition and showed signs of resent charges. clearing. Campod.

Walking time. 3 hours 50 minutes.

Sunday 7th June.

O900 Departed DUADMIN and walked through BAK Car. Track in good repair and showed recent signs of work. 1100 arrived EMETTARIA camp at BAK. Attendence good. Fresh vegetables and two pigs purchased. Vegetables in excess of patrols needs. Mimor medical complaints attended to. Informal talks with the group held. Patrol was told that the UNHIAKMIN. EMEMMIN and SELTAMININ groups had been contacted by an efficer from "Papua". This information substantiated by Const. MASINOR recently of Telefomin. Camped.

Walking time 2 hours.

Monday. 8th June.

0710 Departed Bak. 0735 arrived Bak River. Grossed the case and acconded the steep and arduous AMGU caddle. Arrived summit of case 0910 hours. Rested. 1000 descended down range. 1100 arrived BIMIN campaite. Campaits well attended by locals. Substantial supply of vegetables purchased although of poor quality. Pig also purchased. Talks with Bimin group concerning whereabouts of oil. 10 men agreed to lead patrol to its source. Runner sent to warn previously unvisited BIMIN/ KAPIANTIM group that the patrol would camp at their place. Camped.

Walking time 4 hours.

Tuesday, 9th June.

0700 Departed Bimin campaite. Descended to the No. 3 TEKIN River. Climed "MENI" range and arrived summit 0900. Rested. 0930 departed summit and descended down to mraxim campaite of previous patrol. Arrived 1030. Track overgrown and descent steep and at times dangerous. 1100 Departed and continued down to return point of previous patrol. Arrived 1125. . Continued down range and followed undulating ridge. 1355 arrived at track newly prepared by KAPIANTIM GROUP. 1420 malked down to campaite prepared by KAPIAMTIMS. Arrived 1500. Approximately 20 males present. One rough shelter had been prepared. Set camp. Females (approx. 12) brough vegetables to camp on request. Males produced a pig which was purchased, and requested that it be shot. Fireares demonstration given. Talks with BIMIN and RAPIANTIM people concerning oil reputed to be half a day's walk away. Both groups agreed to lead patrol. Camped in night of Strickland River.

Walking time. 5 hours 25 minutes.

Wednesday. 10th June.

0745 departed campaite. 0815 arrived at small Lake containing duck and fich. Continued down range leading to DAIP RIVER. BIMIN g departed from usual track and led patrol directly down to Daip. BIMIN guides Arrived 0950. Talks with guides concerning track. Chained that it led to garden areas and did not have any connection with the oil. Most circumspect. 1000 Started walking down rough boulder stream bed of the DAIP River. 1025 arrived at a small diversion of the same. Quides request that carrier line romain at this point. Patrol obliged. Self, Sgt. OMAI, Const. YAMOPA and YAGOL with interpreter SALING

proceeded up steep clope following a small creek bad bearing traces of oil for approximately 5 minutes. Arrived at the base of a small cliff (approx. 201) where a large pool of oil had collected. Viewed small syring which welled up water and small amounts of oil. This small syring which welled up water and small amounts of oil, This spall as a standard in the crevase of a large stone. Pool approximately \$7 \times 3 mad 6/9 in depth. Samples of oil and stone surrounding were taken. Short excursion to the rear of spring to find oil traces but acces founds. Returned to River. Rest of police allowed to view oil. Lunch. 1200 Walked back up the River and set camp on aloped 1230. KAPIANTINS to camp bringing fresh vegetables. Talke with BININS concerning oil. Gamped.

Walking time 2 hours 35 minutes.

Thursday 11th June.

Remained at campaite. Approximately 30 KAPIAMTIN males and 15 females brought vegetables to camp. Informal talks with the same. Bush pidgeon in abundance.

Friday 12th. June.

0900 Departed campaits and walked up to main campaits of KAPIAMPINS.
Arrived 1120. Stopped to shoot ducks on lake. Set camp. Talks
with group concerning route to be taken on the return journey.
Agreed to lead patrol along another raute to KUSKUSHIN campaite.
Vegetables (good quality) purchased. Camped.

Walking time. 2 hours.

Saturday. 15th June.

0715 Departed camp and desciented down steep slope to DIAP River.
0785 arrived IRIP Greek. 0789 Arrived Diap River. Accorded range.
0900 arrived crest of saddle. Track and gradient good as compared to previous route. Rested. 0935 descended down range from "KORNINGTON" and arrived TERIN No. 5 River 1020. Initially track steep but gradient of latter portion reasonable. 1030 crossed river and walked up right bank of river high up on the slopes. Track rough and going hard. 1200 lusech at olk KUSHUSHIN garden cite. Departed 1330 and continued up slope. Arrived KUSHUSHIN campaite 1430. Vory few of these people in evidence. This was mainly due to the face that runous had it that dogs accompanying patrol "ate people." Elaborate deg petting ritual conducted and RUSKUSHIN people seemed schilfted. Scant supplies of vegetables purchased and rice issued to carriers. Camped.

Walking time. 4 hours 30 minutes,

Sunday. 14th June.

Observed. Very few KURKUSKINS to camp and rice again issued. Patrol told that a boy had visited the patrol at SIMIN and had died on returning home come three days later. KURKUSKINS summonsed to camp and discussions concerning the matter conducted. Told patrol that they did not blame the patrol for the boy's death and were not unduly concerned with the matter. Rumour had it different and BININ Kuluai told to report any disturbances in this direction to the station at Graspain. Patrol told that a detained had abscended from custody at Oksapmin but had been apprehended by RUSKUSKIN people lower down the valley who had returned him to the station. Camped:

Monday. 15th June.

0815 Departed KUSKUSMIN camp and walked up and along range towards BAK. Going slow as KUSKUSMIN preceeded the patrol clearing track. Slope good. Arrived swant of range 0955. Bak valley under heavy mist. Rested. 1045 descended down to Bak river and then to Bak Campuite. Arrived 1230. Track good and many KWEPTAMIN people serking on it. Set camp and conducted informal discussions with this group who impress greatly with their drive and energy. Campad. Fresh vegetables purchased.

Malking time. 3 hours 25 minutes.

Tuesday 16th June.

0800 Departed Mak. Walked through Bak gap and arrived DUABHIR 0915. Not medical pattro being conducted by medical officer from Maprik. 1020 Departed DUABHIR and arrived TOMIARMIR campaits 1050. Large numbers assembled. Informal talks conducted. Fresh vegetables purchased. Camped.

Walking time. 2 hours 15 minutes.

The primary objects of this patrol was to find oil that was reputed to be found in the DIAP River area. In this the patrol was successful.

The secondary objects of the patrol was to visit INKIAKMIN, KWELMIN and SHEMAMIN groups previously thought to be part and uncontacted. From information gained during the patrol it would seem that those groups have been contacted by a patrol conducted seem that those groups have been contacted by a patrol conducted from Fapun sometime before Christman 1964. It would seem that this information is correct. Because of this information the patrol decided not to visit these groups until official confirmation of the contact is established. Geographically they are all situated in the Papuan area. If the information gained procves to be incorrect the areas will be visited by the next census patrol to the Bak Valley from this station.

During the patrol the BIMIN/KAPIAMTIM group which, previously, had not been visited, was contacted.

NATIVE AFFAIRS.

The ARMINEIN, TOMIANNIE, DUAMMIN, EMELTAMIN and BIMIN GROUPS all accorded the patrol with clargely attended if not enthuastic velcome and willingings supplied the patrol with liberal supplies of vegetables. This is quite good as prior to the patrol's departure it was stated that the patrol would not entail a consum and that stops in those places would be of a "journeying through" nature only. Campaites were well prepared to the best of their ability and the renthouses at TOMIANNIN, DUAMMIN and KOMPTAMIN were of a reasonable standard. The unenthumsatic nature of velcome stems from a natural retisence rather thank any ill feeling that they say harbour against the Administration.

The KUSAUSKIN group present a different picture. I am more inclined believe that they simply could not be bothered to come and meet the patrol and bring food rather than believe the spur of the moment story that the Dogs accompanying the patrol ats people and that they were afraid. All other groups visited also feared the dogs inon sawage variety) but this did not deter them from attending and by the time that the atrol visited the KUSKUN IN group the "talk" must have been issued and received that the dogs were not pauge. It most certainly did in all the other groups. Rusour also had it that the KUSKUNINS bore the patrol a gradge because a youth who had visited the patrol at BRAIN had did on returning home. During extansive talks with the group concerning this matter half were quite omphatic that this was untrue and the patrol was not at fault. However, considerable time was spent with the group trying to stem the flow of any such thought.

The MUSKUSMIN group live in quite a large area and are far too scattered to effectively assemble at one point. On the mest consumpatrol of the area an effort will be made to create two cansums and essembly points for the group in the mhope that this will ensure better attendances. From information gathered by the patrol the inhospitality and truculence of this group is well known and a more concentrated effort of administration will be maintained.

Prior to the departure of the patrol from GRSAPMIN it was runoured that the BIHIN group intended to "plant" cassowary bones and stone are heads in the ground along the patrol route and that this would result in "landelides" that would esgulf the patrol. The leaders of the group, who were at the station at the time emphatically denied any knowledge of this and agreed to lead the patrol to the source of the oil after being assured that the patrol would not intefere with the business transactions that resulted from trading this oil with other groups. The runour which was strong enough to be true is not particularly significant in itself but merely as an indication that the BIHIN group was not particularly happy about a patrol visiting the source of the oil. Yes This reluctance is quite reasonable under the circumstances.

By the time patrol had reached the BIMIN campaite I think that the group had resigned themselves to the fact that eventual sighting of the oil by the patrol was a real thing. All readily agreed to assist as guides but even so time was spent reassuring the group as a whole that the Administration did not intend to disrupt the economics of the oil and theat it would ensure that the right of ownership claimed by the group (unchallenged by any other group) would be maintained. I think that the leading of the patrol over the first route which was tedious and tiresome was a vain endeavour in the hope that the patrol would be discouraged and return. The return route, brought to light only after the alghting of the oils completed, was much easier and less tiresome. The use of this second route by subsequent patrols is recommended. The nonallowance of carriers to view the oil was reasonable and it was for this reason that the patrol camped upstream from the oil site.

The oil represents the sole source of wealth to the BIMIN group. A small bush pumicin full of it will fetch a price of as much as an are or a bush knife. The BIMIN group trade with other groups all areas obtaining bows, arrows, stone area and now, Surepean tools for it. It is used for medicine for their pige and any The BIMIN group trade with other groups from inteference with its source is likely to result in siekness of the When taking stone samples the guides asked that I myself igs. break these off as it would result in the inteference with the wellbeing of their pigs if one of them did so. The oil is collected by dipping leaves into the pool and then squeezing it into containers.

Under the circumstances the attitude of the group to the patrol was excellent.

The BIMIN/RAPIANTIN group had not been visited by a patrol previously but they obviously had expected this patrol and had prepared to meet it. Because of the contact that they have with the main BIMIN group they were well cahooled in the right proceedure that is entailed in meeting a patrol. However, they were naturally shy and it wasnt until the last day that they turned up in full strength (approx. 100). All males and some females had steel axes and these were a result of their oil trading expeditions. It is felt that the three days spent in their area did such to ensure good relations in the future. It is proposed to include the group in the Bak walley patrol and initial census will be done by the next patrol to the area.

ROADS AND BRIDGES.

All tracks in the TERIN Valley area and the BAK valley were in good condition and showed signs of recent work. The track into the BININ area, although maintained is ill chosen and plans for a less vertical and more reasonable route have been discussed with the group who are prepared to construct a new one. The tracks into the Daip Valley and in the Valley are native pads of the roughest kind and make walking difficult. The KAVIMEIN group new plan to open these now that the Administration plans to visit them regularly.

CENSUS AND POPULATION.

No census conducted. Refer to Mative Affiles for information concerning census of the BIMIN/KAPAISTIM group.

BEALTH.

Generally the health was good. Minor seres treated by the patrol. Two bad cases of tropical ulcers (femile) were brought back to the Medical Patrol now in the TEKIH Valley.

VILLAGE OFFICIALS.

All officials and bosbois met on the patrol were keen and active. All apparently were filled with enthuasian after a week at "school" at Oksamin. It is not known how Jong this will last. No outstanding personality was encountered in the MAPAINTIM group.
