


Hermanos del Norte:

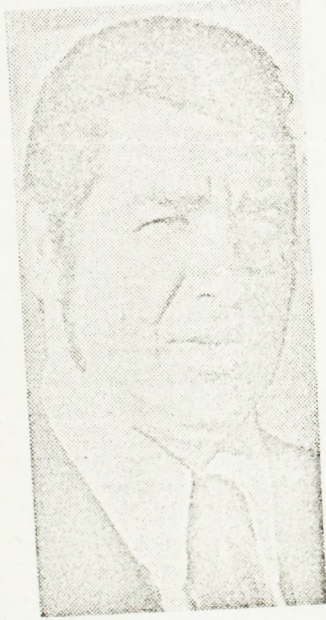

Continued from Page One estimated 34% of the district's 202,433 registered voters went to the polls.

Los Angeles County Registrar-Recorder James Allison had predicted a 35% turnout.

Turnout momentum gained late in the day with the increase attributed to those who waited to cast their ballots until after work.

Looking to the vigorous campaigns which preceded this election, it appears that where the money went, so went the vote.

Robbins, Keysor and Johnson reportedly spent the most money on their campaigns. They finished in the top three positions.

The other 11 candidates based their campaign mostly on personal appearances and handshaking.

In addition to being an important election because it could determine control of the state's upper house, Tuesday's balloting also was important to the political future of candidate Hank Arklin.

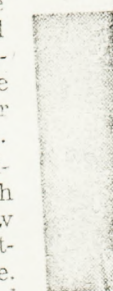
Arklin won a seat in the Assembly in 1968, representing the 41st District. Trying to retain the seat in 1970, he lost to Jim Keysor. In 1972, he tried to make a comeback but again lost to Keysor.

Prior to Tuesday's special vote, Arklin failed to get the endorsement of his party's chieftains. Republican leaders heavily favored Johnson, who apparently stood a better chance of winning.

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ceived a majority of the votes in Tuesday's special election. The runoff winner will fill the seat of the late Sen. Tom Carrell for the remainder of his term.

The complete semi-official election results, with all 259 precincts in, show Robbins the favorite, getting 31.36% of the vote. The young attorney led the field of 14 candidates even as the first votes were tallied.

Assemblyman Jim Keysor, who was running third in early returns, later squeezed past Johnson, a San Fernando City Councilman. Though he finished second in the overall vote, Keysor will not compete in the runoff because he was out-pollied by Robbins.

Chicano in Senate Race Raps Police

Says Volunteers in 22nd District Were Arrested

The sole independent candidate in the special 22nd state Senate District election—a Chicano representing the La Raza Unida Party—charged Wednesday that his campaign workers have been victims of harassment by Los Angeles police.

Andres Torres of San Fernando, a speech professor at Los Angeles Valley College, said there are 13 other candidates in the 22nd District and "this (the alleged harassment) only happens to Torres."

A police spokesman denied that any harassment had taken place and said that arrests of Torres' supporters had stemmed from violations of liquor laws.

At a Greater Los Angeles Press Club news conference, Torres related two separate incidents at which La Raza Unida volunteers were arrested while engaging in campaign activities.

Beer Sold Without License

One was the Jan. 5 arrest of three persons on the campus of Cal State U. Northridge, who were charged with selling beer without a proper license from the Alcoholic Beverage Control Board.

The arrests were made by ABC officers, assisted by both Los Angeles and campus police.

The second incident involved six arrests made by Los Angeles police at the conclusion of a fund-raising dance for the Torres campaign in Sun Valley Jan. 19.

Torres said the dance was ended prematurely after a plainclothes officer told organizers he suspected that minors were being served alcoholic beverages at the function.

"They said they would come back and start making arrests if we did not stop," Torres said, "so the dance

was ended and we started cleaning up."

The arrests were made when a squad of uniformed officers joined the plainclothesmen in dispersing about 50 of the last persons to leave the dance, Torres said.

"The people were leaving and everything was peaceful," he said. "It was their (police officers) return that set off the incident. If they had not conducted themselves as they did, nothing would have happened."

Torres asked for a public meeting with Police Chief Edward M. Davis and Foothill Division Comdr. Capt. Ted Morton in order to "avoid more turmoil and preserve La Raza Unida's relationship with law enforcement."

Torres called on his 13 opponents—seven Republicans, four Democrats and two Peace and Freedom Party members—to "express their opposition to harassment of campaign workers."

Later Wednesday, Capt. Morton said he would willingly meet with the candidate in private, denied any harassment and offered a slightly different version of the Jan. 19 arrests.

Morton said Foothill vice officers, aware of the arrests made at Northridge by ABC officers, had gone to the Sun Valley dance expecting that La Raza Unida sponsors had been forewarned about the technical requirements for selling alcoholic beverages.

Police Version

He said the first officers at the dance, which was held in a bar with a liquor license, saw minors drinking and warned organizers that they would return in half an hour to make arrests unless this was stopped.

Morton said the dance was "still going on, and people were still drinking, when officers returned, so arrests were made."

Six persons were arrested, he said, three for interfering with an officer, one for drunkenness, one for possession of a dagger and one minor arrested for consuming alcoholic beverages.

"More arrests could have been made," Morton said, "but officers left due to the hostility being shown by the crowd," which people estimated at 150.

The special election in the 22nd District, called to fill a state Senate vacancy created by the death of Democratic Sen. Tom Carrell last year, will be held Tuesday.

If necessary, a runoff election will be held Feb. 27 among the highest vote getters in each of the three parties on the ballot. Torres would qualify for the runoff by winning more votes than the candidate of any qualified party.

Police hit by State Senate candidate

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Andres Torres, a Los Angeles Valley College speech professor La Raza Unida party candidate, for the 22nd State Senate seat, says Los Angeles police are harassing some of his campaign workers.

Torres told a news conference Wednesday that police arrested LaRaza Unida party volunteers while they were engaging in campaign activities on two separate occasions.

A police spokesman denied Torres' charges, saying the only arrests of Torres supporters were those stemming from violations of liquor laws.

Three persons were arrested Jan. 5 on the Cal State University at Northridge campus and charged with selling beer without a proper license, authorities said.

Six persons were arrested at the end of a fund-raising dance

for the Torres campaign in Sun Valley on Jan. 19.

After the news conference police said the arrests at the dance came after officers saw minors drinking. Three persons were charged with interfering with an officer, one with drunkenness, one with possession of a dagger and one minor was arrested for consuming alcoholic beverages, the spokesman said.

Torres called on the 13 other candidates in the race to "express their opposition to harassment of campaign workers."

The 14 candidates are vying for a seat left vacant by the death of Sen. Tom Carrell, a Democrat, last year.

The election will be held Tuesday.

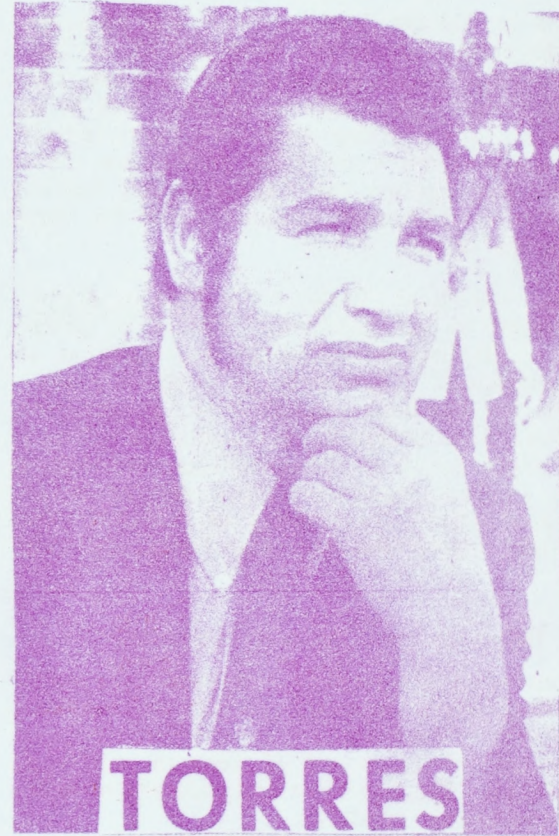

Estimados miembros del Congreso,

After the experience of the National Convention of La Raza Unida Party in El Paso, and the more recent Congreso de Aztlán meeting in Albuquerque, it has become clear that the Partido is failing to deal effectively and openly with certain basic, legitimate, and very important political differences within the Partido. The Partido's failure to completely expose these differences has created an unnecessary organizational disunity among us.

At the El Paso Convention, for example, the Partido leadership and those delegates who were well aware of the underlying political issues and differences failed to present them clearly to the Convention. For this reason, the election for National Chairperson of the Partido, for instance, was incorrectly viewed by many as a contest based on personalities and not on principle. Vague phrases making reference to "unity" and "no compromise," repeatedly heard at the Convention, served only as catch-words reaching only a few, since they were not adequately explained.

Not learning from the mistakes made at the Convention, we again failed to call for a full and open discussion of these basic political issues at the meeting of El Congreso. The specific issues that have been pending for too long and which should be discussed can be found in a letter written by the Partido Chairperson, José Ángel Gutiérrez, and addressed to the National Chicano Political Caucus, held in San José, April 21-23, 1972. This letter, which appeared in an article entitled "San José Conference," published by La Gente newspaper of the University of California in Los Angeles, May 26, 1972, has raised many questions about the political direction of the Partido. La Gente can be obtained by writing La Gente, c/o Communication Board of Associated Students of UCLA, 300 Westwood Plaza, Los Angeles, California 90024.

Because of the importance of these issues, we feel that all Partido chapters should discuss the mistakes made in the past and come to the next Congreso meeting in the spirit of openness and honesty, and make this question the first official order of business.

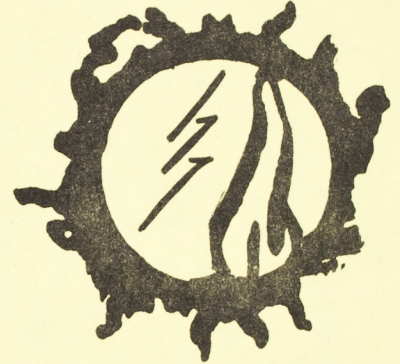


Hermano:

The Committee for Democratic Election Laws is a national organization formed two years ago with the following aims:

- 1) to challenge in the courts those discriminatory local, state or national election laws and regulations that deny access to the ballot or voting rights to any individual or party.
- 2) to bring the issues of these challenges to public attention.
- 3) to raise funds for legal and publicity purposes.

Corky Gonzales, Jose Angel Gutierrez, Bert Corona, and Andres Rodriguez Torres, LRUP candidate for California's 22nd congressional district from San Fernando, have all endorsed the aims of the Committee for Democratic Election Laws.

The two major projects of CoDEL this spring are: one, a challenge to the California election laws governing the formation of political parties and the requirements for small parties and independents to get on the ballot, the most restrictive in the entire country; and, two, the tax suit requested by the California Peace and Freedom Party against the Presidential Campaign Fund Act which favors the two established parties over all other parties.

The suit projected by CoDEL against California's restrictive election laws is of special importance to California La Raza Unida Parties. California is the most populous state in the nation with over one-tenth of the people in the United States living here. And, California's requirements for small parties and independents to get on the ballot are the most restrictive in the country; 100% more restrictive than any other state. Because of this, since 1940 only three times has a third party qualified for the ballot, whereas for the other six most populous states the average was 42 times. Even Eugene McCarthy failed to get on the ballot in 1968 although his campaign was heavily financed and staffed by thousands.

Three of the requirements of the California election laws that the suit will be challenging are:

- (1st) New parties, to qualify to run in the primary must petition for 663,340 valid signatures of registered voters or must register 67,000 voters into the new party 135 days before the primary.
- (2nd) Independent candidates, to qualify for the general election, must secure 368,000 signatures of voters who didn't vote in the primary...all in 25 days. (This section is so prohibitive that it has never been used.)
- (3rd) Registered voters are dropped from voter rolls if they do not vote in each general election. If a party does not qualify in that election many of its members will not vote. The party must then re-register those not voting just to keep the registrations it had before the election.

Vincent Hallinan, noted civil liberties attorney from San Francisco, will file the suit against California's restrictive election laws early in March in advance of the 1974 election deadlines.

As of this week plaintiffs for the suit are the Socialist Workers Party, the Socialist Labor Party, and the Prohibition Party. CoDEL is also seeking other plaintiffs. Andres Torres is enthusiastic about the suit. He will personally be a co-plaintiff. He is also initiating efforts, through the San Fernando chapter, to get all the California chapters of La Raza Unida Party to be plaintiffs in the suit and to endorse the aims of CoDel. Tito Lucero and Raul Ruiz have also expressed an interest in the suit.

If San Diego La Raza Unida Party would be willing to be a co-plaintiff in the suit and would endorse the aims of the Committee for Democratic Election Laws it would be a valuable contribution toward helping to democratize the ballot. While the suit is in progress it will give LaRaza members an important issue on which to speak out publicly. If the suit is won La Raza candidates will be able to get on the California ballot without tremendous expenditures of effort and money.

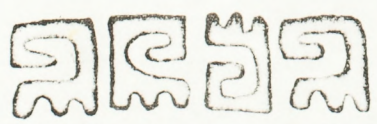

Torres, a speech professor at L. A. Valley State College in Los Angeles, has received a tremendous amount of exposure. A great deal of organizational effort has been put into the campaign and there is a good possibility of Torres winning.

Tejas Organizing for '74

Raza Unida Party organizers met during December in Cristal to plan the strategy for the 1974 elections. Since the ballot will be headed by the congressmen, it was decided to organize the Party by congressional districts. The districts are small enough so that the organizers can work closely together and carry out an effective campaign.

The first district meetings were held during the first week in February. Meetings will be continued for the purpose of developing an effective organizational effort in every county.



10,000 BY '74

A goal to register 10,000 people into La Raza Unida was one of the objectives outlined by the San Diego and National City organizing held over the past two month period. The goal organizers emphasized that they were an organizing committee. Their goal is to register 10,000 people by January of 1974. Having no mandate from our registered membership to run candidates or take positions on issues, it was the consensus of the group that their purpose and function at this time was to develop and build viable political power. It was felt that upon reaching the 10,000 registration goal, a convention would be held to allow registered people to elect spokesmen and plan future political strategy. According to one of the organizers

"1973" should be a bigger success than last year because of the experience and familiarity with precincts and with each other.

Angel Moreno, member Congreso de Aztlan, and candidate for the 7th Congressional District in Chicago, Illinois will be making an organizing trip to parts of Iowa. Moreno will be meeting with local Raza in hopes of establishing an organizing committee to better develop the state of Iowa, and add another state to the list of states working to organize Raza Unida.

NATIONAL PREAMBLE AND PRINCIPLES OF LA RAZA UNIDA PARTY*

PREAMBLE

El Congreso de Aztlan, whose basic purpose is to provide direction for the platform, goals and chairperson of LA Raza Unida Party, proclaim the people of La Raza to be a nation within a nation, endowed with the right and obligation to struggle for self-determination.

For over a century in the United States, La Raza has been a victim of political and economic exploitation and oppression, one of the tools of that oppression being the two-party political system---the Democratic and Republican parties, We recognize the two-party system as being sham democracy serving only the needs of our exploiters and oppressors. The Congreso de Aztlan refuses to recognize the state and national electoral process as the only effective means for liberation. La Raza Unida Party's activity will focus primarily on the local level, on those issues which affect La Raza and which are ignored by the traditional political parties.

El Congreso de Aztlan recognizes that the needs of La Raza, and in fact of the majority of the American people, can never be met within the present political-economic structure of the United States. All our daily action is geared to achieving a just distribution of the wealth, political power and resources of this country in order to create a new society which ends the exploitation of man by man.

PRINCIPLES

1. Self-Determination of La Raza:

We the people of La Raza, have the right to control those institutions which affect our lives.

By La Raza we mean those people from, or descendants of people from Mexico, Central America, South America and the Antilles, and those individuals who identify culturally with La Raza.

2. Our Relationship to Other Oppressed Peoples:

La Raza Unida Party supports those struggles for self-determination of all oppressed peoples which are consistent with our principles.

La Raza Unida Party, on all levels, may participate in coalitions on the basis of principle when it is in the interest of all parties involved.

La Raza Unida Party does not endorse, work, or form coalitions with the Democratic or Republican Parties, nor with other political parties which have goals inconsistent with our principles.

3. Sexism:

La Raza Unida Party is opposed to the domination of one sex by another. The Partido recognize no distinction between men and women in the common struggle for self-determination; both women and men of La Raza must provide leadership.

4. Labor:

La Raza Unida Party will struggle for full employment and the end of exploitation of all working people. The working people must struggle and organize on every front for complete industrial democracy.

5. Health:

Medical care is a basic right. La Raza Unida Party will fight for free medical care for all people. This includes preventive medicine, industrial safety and community control of all medical facilities.

6. Housing:

Decent housing is a basic human right which should be denied no one. Over-taxation, racial exclusion, discriminatory denial of funds by credit institutions should be attacked by La Raza Unida Party. La Raza Unida Party should develop programs to provide housing for all our people.

7. Education:

All education should be free with open admission. Bilingual, Bicultural education is a right of La Raza. We must fight for education based on cooperation, not competition; sharing, not selfishness; and above all, a love for all humanity.

8. Penal and Legal System:

La Raza Unida Party does not recognize the legitimacy of the Anglo-American system of laws and punishment. We seek a system of laws determined and defined by the working people. We will work to abolish the present penal system which confines and brutalizes the victims of an exploitative society. Prisons and jails should be converted into schools and hospitals. The entire concept of prisons as punishment should be abolished and replaced with a concept of true rehabilitation, education and health.

9. The Land:

We support the right of the campesinos to organize to attain their basic human right, and we oppose all those who exploit their labor. La Raza Unida Party believes that the land must belong collectively to those people who work it and fight for it.

We will uphold and support the Treaty of Guadalupe-Hidalgo. The land is necessary to create a Nation with a political philosophy based on principles ~~and~~ unity. There can be no nation unless there is ownership of land.

10. Imperialism:

We call for the immediate end to United States imperialism and colonialism as epitomized by the United States presence in Indochina and Puerto Rico. We recognize a particular solidarity with the liberation struggle of the Latin American people.





I implore you to assist us in our effort to help our migrant population. Migrants have traveled to your state for years and years working for cheap wages, daring the elements, suffering illness and deprivation without complaint.

Today our people are faced with impending disaster. You must help them. They can't help themselves.

The nine steps I propose are the beginning of a solution. Let me hear from you. More importantly let other colleagues, government employees, and President Nixon hear from you.

Migrants, even though they consist of various ethnic groups are predominantly Chicano. As National Chairman of a predominantly Chicano political party, I write to you with a problem and a solution.

I have received far too many inquiries about the "energy crisis" and its consequences for seasonal employment in the Northern states this summer. Our candidates for public office, our elected officials, and our party officials all have repeatedly been deluged with requests for relief from the excessive profits and prices; from the shortages on weekends, nights and end of months; and from the virtual inactivity of the government in solving this problem.

Our party rank and file believes with some accuracy that the only "energy crisis" in America today is found among the politicians in Washington.

Answers on the energy crisis must be found now. I suggest to you that if the migrants cannot or will not travel North this summer in search of employment the entire agricultural production of those states will collapse.

I suggest to you that if means are not found for our people to reach their destination and return, very serious unemployment and subemployment will develop throughout the Southwest.

We propose the following solution:


1. Immediate issuance of I.D. cards for all migrants through the various State Employment Agencies.
2. Compulsory sale of gasoline at any station to all migrants with I.D. cards.
3. Exemption from the Federal tax on gasoline for all migrants during the months of May, June, July, August, September, and October.
4. Emergency grants-in-aid to all states that are home bases for migrants and recipients of migrants to cover food stamps, medical care, day care, and head start during these same months.
5. Increased gasoline allotments for the following states: Texas, Arizona, Florida, California, Montana, Idaho, Wisconsin, Michigan, Indiana, Minnesota, South and North Dakota, Washington, Colorado, Wyoming, and Nebraska during these summer months. This increase should be earmarked for migrant farm workers and their employers, the farmers, only.
6. That the Federal Energy Office hire five Chicanos per regional office to advise and confer with Chicano leaders and migrant associations during the summer months.
7. An emergency conference be called in Laredo, Texas for April with decision making officials of the Department of Labor, Agriculture; Health, Education, and Welfare; and Secretary of State's office present to confer with migrants, migrant organizations such as U.M.O.I. (Michigan), Colorado Migrant Council (Colorado) and Texas Migrant Council (Texas) and representatives of major food processors like Del Monte, Stokeley Van Camp, Libby McNeil Libby, Joan of Arc, Holly Sugar, American Crystal and noted growers. The purpose of this conference would be to map strategy to avert this impending human disaster.

8. Instruct Paul Mayrand, Title III Director of National Programs in the Department of Labor to fund and issue travel orders to his subordinates, migrant programs personnel, and other interested parties to attend this conference.
9. The Texas Migrant Council under the direction of Mr. Oscar Villarreal, Box 917, Laredo, Texas (512/722-5174) be made responsible for hosting the conference, implementing decisions reached, administering and coordinating all activities in behalf of the migrant population.

Your immediate attention to this problem and solution is demanded.

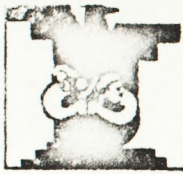

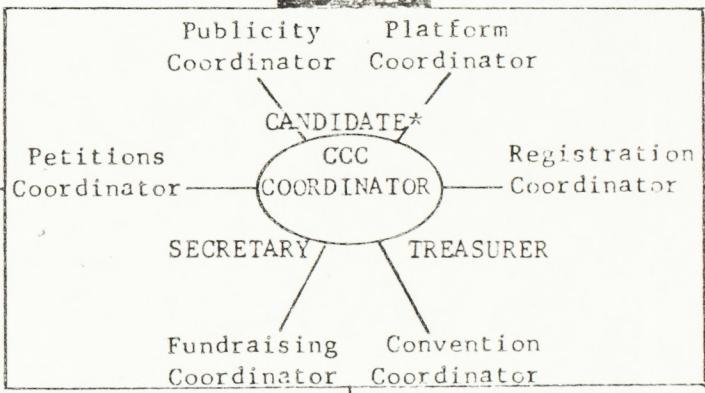
