Fifteen or more volunteers serve as hostesses to a large crowd of women and small children. We seek to ensure that they have a worthwhile experience in America. Although there is not a formally structured program, we do introduce them to American customs and holidays and make sure they know about activities and opportunities for becoming immersed in American culture.

# CRUCIAL STATEWIDE SCHOOL BOND **MEASURE ON NOVEMBER 3 BALLOT**

Passage of Proposition 1A will provide \$9.2 billion to strengthen, repair and build public education facilities throughout California. \$6.7 billion of the total is slated to construct and renovate K-12 schools . The balance of \$2.5 billion will be divided between the University of California, the California State University, and the Community College system if the measure passes.

The measure is seen as crucial to the University of California's efforts to provide for the rapidly growing enrollments. "...Our needs are urgent, and this measure is an absolutely vital means of addressing them," said UC President Richard C. Atkinson.

At UCSD, the student population is expected to increase by 25 percent over the next six years. Proposition 1A funding, if approved, will build much needed laboratory and instructional infrastructure. Proposed projects include a new building for the natural sciences departments of Biology, Chemistry/Biochemistry and Physics. Proposed structures include teaching, research laboratories and office space, bringing together biologically oriented disciplines to promote interdisciplinary collaboration among students, researchers and faculty. Forty percent of undergraduate majors are in the Division of Natural Sciences on the UCSD general campus.

Other proposed UCSD campus projects include expansion of Eleanor Roosevelt College and a new building for the School of Engineering. Since a high demand is expected for programs in bioengineering and applied structural and computer engineering, additional facilities space will be required.

Proposition 1A is supported by the UC Board of Regents and has attracted broad-based support from other such organizations as the California Taxpayers Association, the California Chamber of Commerce and the Congress of California Seniors.

The ballot pamphlet argument opposing Proposition 1A was signed by People's Advocate Inc., the National Tax Limitations Committee and Assemblyman Tom McClintock, who maintain that the measure is too large and will obligate too much of the state budget for debt service. §

# UCSD: Sixth best public university in the nation

UCSD is ranked the sixth best public university in the nation in the12th annual edition of "America's Best Colleges" issued Aug. 2l by U.S. News and World Report. The guide rated 1,400 schools and selected what, in its opinion, are the top 50 of the largest and best known national universities, and the top 50 of the exclusively "public" national universities. Of the top 50 state-supported universities, UC Berkeley and the University of Virginia tied for number one, followed by the University of North Carolina-Chapel Hill, ranked third; UCLA and the University of Michigan-Ann Arbor tied for fourth, and UCSD was ranked sixth.

UCSD is the only institution among the top ranks to be founded in the post-World War II era. The school moved up from seventh place last year, topping such institutions as the University of Wisconsin, University of Illinois and Pennsylvania State. UC Davis ranked 11th and UC Santa Barbara 14th. Among both private and state-supported national universities, UCSD ranked 32nd, up one rank from last year. Harvard, Princeton and Yale tied for first, followed by MIT and Stanford.

To determine the rankings, the publication polled 1,400 four-year schools on academic reputation, faculty resources, student selectivity, financial resources, graduation rate performance and alumni giving rate. The rankings are available online: http://www.usnews.com.
