

Dr. Nathan Glazer to offer his "Analysis of Jewish Leadership in the United States"

Harvard University sociologist Dr. Nathan Glazer will offer his "Analysis of Jewish Leadership in the United States" at 4:30 p.m. Friday, May 5, in the Humanities-Library Auditorium at the University of California, San Diego.

The free public lecture is sponsored by the Judaic Studies Committee and the UC San Diego Department of Sociology.

Glazer, professor of education and sociology at the Harvard Graduate School of Education, is noted for his studies of urban social policy and ethnic and race relations. Before his appointment at Harvard, he was professor of sociology at UC Berkeley (1963-69), visiting lecturer at Smith College (1959-60) and an instructor at Bennington College (1957-58). He was awarded his B.S.S. in 1944 from the City College of New York, an A.M. in anthropology and linguistics in 1944 from the University of Pennsylvania and a Ph.D. in sociology in 1962 from Columbia University.

He is the co-author of "Faces in the Crowd" (with David Riesman, Yale University Press, 1952), "The Lonely Crowd" (with Riesman and Reuel Denney, Yale University Press, 1950), "Beyond the Melting Pot" and "Ethnicity: Theory and Experience" (both with Daniel P. Moynihan, M.I.T. Press, 1963, and Harvard University Press, 1975). He is also the author of "American Judaism" (University of Chicago Press, 1957 and 1972) and "The Social Basis of American Communism" (Harcourt Brace & World, 1961).

Glazer is a member of the American Sociological Association and the American Academy of Arts and Sciences and has been a Guggenheim Foundation Fellow (1954-55 and 1966-67) and a Fellow of the Center for Advanced Study in the Behavioral Sciences (1971-72). He received an honorary doctor of laws degree from Franklin & Marshall College in 1971 and from Colby College in 1972.

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
